### FY 2017 PAMANA

The National Government has allocated a total of PhP 8.074 Bfrom the General Appropriations Act of FY 2017 for the implementation of various peace and development interventionsunder the PAMANA Program for peace agreement, conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable areas in the seven (7) PAMANA Zones. For FY 2017 budget year, the OPAPP serves as implementing agency as well as oversight agency for interventions lodged with the CHED, DENR, DOH, DSWD, NCIP, PHIC, and PNP. As of the reporting period, these interventions are in various stages of implementation as shown in the table below.
