Also, the Peace Policy Unit provided substantial technical inputs in the following policy documents:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP). Provided the National Youth Commission (NYC) comments and inputs for the Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) 2017-2022. These focus on incorporating strategies that would provide the youth spaces for participation and protection in peacebuilding, and conflict prevention and management. Guidebook on Mainstreaming Conflict-Sensitivity and Peace Promotion (CSPP) in Comprehensive Development Planning (CDP). Finalized the draft of the Guidebook on Mainstreaming Conflict-Sensitivity and Peace Promotion (CSPP) in Comprehensive Development Planning (CDP) for final approval. Once approved, it will be submitted to the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG)- Bureau of Local Government Development (BLGD) for dissemination to local government units (LGUs). The LGUs can use the Guidebook in incorporating CSPP in the various stages of the CDP formulation. The Guidelines were also informed by the COA-DBM-DSWD Joint Resolution No. 2014-001 "Guidelines for Accreditation of Civil Society Organizations as Implementing Entities of Government or Public Funds;" and the 2015-001 "Supplemental Guidelines for Accreditation of Civil Society Organizations." These two guidelines provided criteria, application process, and documentary requirements, among others that the DSWD, DBM, and COA required from CSOs. The OPAPP CSO-Accreditation Guidelines aims to standardize the processes and mechanisms in accrediting CSOs to allow them to receive public funds from OPAPP as beneficiaries or implementers of OPAPP projects. | 029 | CLOSURE AGREEMENT SECRETARIAT - (GPH-CBA/CPLA and GPH-RPM-P/RPA/ABB CLOSURE PROGRAM) | 16,426,700.00 | 8,156,004.34 | <p>Immediate conclusion of the peace process with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA-CPLA) and the Rebolusyonaryong Partido ng Manggagawang Pilipino/ Revolutionary Proletarian Army/ Alex Boncayao Brigade (RPM-P/RPA/ABB)</p> <p>1. GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process The 2011 Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the GPH and the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA-CPLA) covers the implementation of (1) disposition of arms and forces; (2) community development projects; (3) inter-barangay and inter-municipal development; (4) economic reintegration of former CPLA members; (5) documentation of the CBA-CPLA struggle; and 6) transformation of CBA-CPLA into a socio-economic organization. The commitments of the parties have been significantly implemented and its completion is projected in 2017.</p> | |

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| | | | <p>The completion strategy for the peace process with the CBA-CPLA will focus on the sustainability of the socioeconomic intervention that would facilitate the peaceful and productive lives of the former CPLA members, their families and communities. Of equal undertaking is the continuing of peace and development interventions for the Cordillera region and supporting its aspirations for autonomy.</p> <p>Status and updates of the MOA components as of the 1st Quarter are as follows:</p> <p>a. Disposition of Arms and Forces. At the end of 2016, a total of three hundred thirty-nine (339) inventoried firearms were turned in, pre-demilitarized and transferred to the custody of Police Regional Office – Cordillera (PROCOR). Following the agreements on inventoried firearms from the meeting with CPLA leaders on 25 November 2016, the turn in activity was scheduled in the first quarter of 2017.</p> <p>The turn in and remuneration of forty-nine (49) (47 for turn in and remuneration, 2 previously turned in and are for remuneration) inventoried firearms in Kalinga, Mountain Province and Benguet were scheduled on various dates in March 2017. A total of nine (9) out of forty-seven (47) firearms for turn in were turned in and remunerated and are now in the custody of the Police Provincial Offices (PPOs) of Kalinga and Mountain Province. At the end of the first quarter, three hundred forty-eight (348) inventoried firearms are in the custody of PROCOR and corresponding Police Provincial Offices.</p> <p>The conduct of turn in activity for Apayao and resolution of issues on the turn in of remaining inventoried firearms is targeted in the second quarter.</p> <p>b. Socio-economic Reintegration</p> <p>i. AFP Integration Program. There were one hundred sixty-eight (168) former CPLA members and their next of kin integrated in the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP). One was killed in action while the remaining are still on active duty, with some detailed in Mindanao as augmentation to AFP battalions. On 9 November 2015, the Joint Declaration of Successful Completion of the Military Integration Component of Executive Order No. 49 was signed by MGEN Lysander Suerte (Commander, 5th Infantry Division) and Mrs. Marcelina Bahatan (Cordillera Bodong Administration) at Camp Melchor F. Dela Cruz, Upi, Gamu, Isabela.</p> <p>ii. DENR-OPAPP Forest Guard Program. In 2016, a total of five hundred forty-three (543) profiled former CPLA members and their next of kin were employed under the DENR-OPAPP Forest Guard Program.</p> <p>A total of five hundred eighteen (518) individuals were renewed as Forest Guards in Cordillera as of March 2017. Continuous monitoring of the implementation of the program for forest guard employment under the DENR is facilitated through the various communication channels, meetings and visits with the forest guards, Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Offices (PENROs) of Abra, Benguet and Kalinga, and DENR Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR). The issues and concerns regarding open slots, delayed salaries, deployment, etc. were consolidated and are currently being reviewed for appropriate action.</p> <p>iii. Livelihood. Former CPLA members who did not opt for army integration or forest guard employment organized into People's Organizations (POs). The ten (10) People's Organizations (POs) were provided with training and funding for livelihood projects by the Provincial Local Government Units (LGU) (7 POs in Benguet, Ifugao and Mountain Province) and by the Department of Agriculture (DA) (3 POs in Abra, Apayao and Kalinga) in 2016.</p> <p>Complementary to the livelihood program implemented under the DA and the Provincial LGUs, the Program for Enhanced Enterprises was initiated to capacitate the POs to become sustainable enterprises. In the first quarter of 2017, the 10 POs underwent diagnostic assessment to determine their organizational health. Nine (9) POs were registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), however they have not been complying with the report requirements. In general, these POs are still restructuring their leadership, policies, and procedures. The Matagowan Tako PO in Paracelis, Mountain Province is registered with the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE). The members meet regularly and have a simple set of policies.</p> <p>A planning workshop for each PO is targeted in the 2nd quarter as part of the program to capacitate POs. The results of which will be the springboard for the market study on the enterprise the POs have decided to engage in. It is noted that POs in Abra, Apayao and Kalinga opted for cattle raising and dispersal implemented by the Department of Agriculture. The DA has distributed one hundred seventy five (175) cattle head to Kalinga and one hundred one (101) cattle head to Abra in the first quarter. PAMU CAR coordinator has also observed the training on Feed Making the DA conducted in Abra on 2 February 2017.</p> <p>iv. Social Protection Programs. Accompanying the economic/livelihood programs are social protection programs in collaboration with PhilHealth and CHED. To date, eight hundred eighty-seven (887) former CPLA members were renewed as beneficiaries of the PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program for 2017 while one hundred seventy (170) next of kin of former CPLA and CBA elders are enrolled as ongoing grantees of the OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED Study Grant Program.</p> <p>c. Community Development Projects, Inter-municipal and Inter-barangay Development Projects. Eighty-one (81) projects were identified and funded in the provinces of Cordillera wherein majority of these are farm to market roads, communal irrigation system for agricultural support, community infrastructures like tribal centers, warehouses, pathways, among others. As of January 2017, seventy-three (73) projects have been completed while eight (8) projects are in different stages of implementation in the provinces of Ifugao, Kalinga and Mountain Province.</p> <p>To facilitate implementation of development projects in the Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR), the following activities were conducted:</p> <p>i. On 13 January 2017, Undersecretary for Peace Accords Cluster Atty. Nabil A. Tan met with the consultants for CAR to level off on the completion work to be done in the region and to define the roles of the contributors to the completion work. The consultants expressed their support to the strategies of OPAPP for the peace process in the Cordillera.</p> |
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ii. To strengthen the established network of local government units and agencies, the Peace Accords Management Unit (PAMU) continues to coordinate with the offices of the local chief executives and responds to their queries on documentary requirements of PAMANA project proposals. On 25-29 March 2017, PAMU together with NPMO personnel, conducted ocular visits to the tramline and FMR projects in Tinglayan, Kalinga and Sadanga, Mountain Province with the help of the respective LGUs. Actual physical status of the projects was documented and recommendations were listed upon discussion with LGU concerned.

iii. On 10 February 2017, PAMU participated in the Regional Peace and Development Council held in Lagawe, Ifugao to gather updates on the implementation of PAMANA projects. PAMU also participated in the Sectoral Committee on Development Administration and Good Governance Q1 Meeting on 15 February in Baguio City. PAMU updated the body on the CPP/NPA/NDP peace talks and reviewed the draft chapter on Peace and Development of the CAR RDP 2017-2022. OPAPP has also provided its input for the chapter on Reducing Vulnerability of Individuals and Families.

iv. Collaboration with the regional offices of TESDA and NEDA were established. On 7 March 2017, PAMU CAR met with TESDA Regional Office to identify programs that can be tapped to deliver skills training to former CPLA members wherein initial steps were identified. On 21 March 2017, PAMU met with RD Milagros Rimando and ARD Jedidia Aquino together with CBA leaders and OPAPP consultant Thomas Killip for initial discussions on the Five-Year Development Plan stipulated in the 2011 MOA.

d. **Documentation of the CBA-CPLA Struggle.** Penned by a CBA elder, the purpose of the document (currently written in two volumes) is to account the legacy of the CBA-CPLA. Merging of the two volumes and identification of a fund source to fund the publication of the book is currently ongoing.

e. **Transformation of CBA-CPLA into a socio-economic organization.** The CPLA has ceased to exist as an armed group through the signing of the 2011 MOA. The Regional Law Enforcement Coordination Committee (RLECC) of the Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR) and the Benguet Provincial Peace and Order Council (BPPOC) asserted the non-existence and non-recognition of CPLA or anyone claiming to be CPLA. On 2 July 2015, the CFPDI was invited to become part of the Cordillera Regional Peace and Order Council (CRPOC).

Support to Cordillera Initiatives for Autonomy. With OPAPP supporting autonomy for Cordillera, PAMU monitored the social preparation of the CAR into an autonomous region and attended the Cordillera Leaders' Forum on 24 January 2017 and the briefing of the new House Bill on 31 January 2017 both held at the Batasan Complex, Quezon City. On 13 February 2017 (in coordination with the RDC) Secretary Jesus G. Dureza attended the RDC meeting in Tubbuk, Kalinga. He restated his support for Cordillera's bid for autonomy and urged the congressmen to file the new House Bill prior to the recess in Congress. The new House Bill 5343 "An Act Establishing the Autonomous Region of the Cordillera" was officially filed on 20 March in the 17th Congress.

2.The GPH- RPMP/RPA/ABB peace process. The draft Closure Agreement is being reviewed both by the GPH and RPMP/RPA/ABB national leaders. Some sections on the agreement and its annexes were clarified and refined. Moreover, vetting with concerned agencies relative to the 2017 budget for the implementation of projects and activities for the RPMP/RPA/ABB was ensured, and initial steps have been identified.

The Closure Agreement with the RPMP/RPA/ABB will have the following components: (1) Community Peace Dividends (CPD), for communities influenced by RPA; (2) Socio-Economic Reintegration; (3) Disposition of Forces and Arms with provision of Interim Security Arrangement; (4) Provision of Civil-Political Rights; and (5) RPA Institutional Transformation.

The agreement will have the following scope and coverage: (1) Areas: Negros Provinces, Iloilo, Aklan, Antique, Bukidnon and parts of Davao and Ilocos Sur; (2) 727 profiled RPA members; (3) 556 inventoried firearms and 404 explosives; (4) Five (5) settlement sites and four (4) congregated areas; (6) 100 barangays under Community Peace Dividends; and, (7) 267 RPA members to form Community Security Force.

In preparation for the eventual signing, and implementation of the Closure Agreement the following have been accomplished in the first quarter of 2017:

i. **Community Peace Dividends (CPD)**

Out of the 100 associations organized under the PAMANA DSWD Sustainable Livelihood Program, 46 associations have been accredited in DSWD Central Office's Bureau of Standards, and have received the seed capital of Php 500,000.00. Adjacent barangays of the CPD were identified as candidates for the 2018 PAMANA Sustainable Livelihood Program implementation, and other conflict affected /conflict vulnerable areas, in the provinces of Negros Occidental, Negros Oriental, Aklan, Antique, Capiz, Iloilo, and Bukidnon.

ii. **Socio-Economic Reintegration**

DENR-OPAPP Forest Guard Program. There are 118 members of RPM-P/RPA/ABB who are employed as Forest Guards under the National Greening Program through the DENR-OPAPP Joint Memorandum Circular No. 2013-02. The slight delay on the release of their monthly salaries was experienced due to the downloading of funds from the central office to regional and provincial offices.

Settlement Sites. The following activities were conducted to facilitate the establishment and development of settlement sites:

a. DENR Region VI submitted the requirements for the Presidential Proclamation to DENR Central Office. Relative to this, Regional Director Sampulna has instructed PENRO Aklan to work on requirements for the Community Based Forest Management Agreement (CBFMA) as an alternative tenurial instrument in realizing the settlement site since the Presidential Proclamation will take a very long process. A required document for the CBFMA is a resolution of no objection (of CBFMA application) to be issued by the affected barangays. Consultations were made in the three concerned barangays, and a resolution will be crafted to comply with the requirements. Though there are other claimants opposing the intention, Aklan Governor Florencio Miraflores assured that he will negotiate with these opposing parties.

b. Negros Oriental's application for CBFMA the corresponding attachments were received by DENR Central Office on 28 February 2017. The document is for review of the Field Management Bureau and for signature of Director Nonito Tamayo of FMB. Once signed, this will be forwarded to Undersecretary Philip Camara for final approval.

c. For Negros Occidental, the updated for the settlement site in Cadiz City for application of Presidential Proclamation was submitted to DENR Central Office on 25 January 2017. The same documents were submitted by DENR San Carlos City on 31 January 2017 for review by related bureaus. A bilateral meeting with OPAPP and DENR will be conducted to fast track the otherwise long process. For the City of Kabankalan, re-work and revalidation was made and all requirements will be complied by the 2nd week of April.

Development Programs

a. The Negros Oriental Provincial Technical Working Group had a meeting conducted last 10 February 2017 convened by DILG Region 7. This resulted in an action plan for the compliance of the documentary requirements for the 60.5M project (6 km Farm to Market Road project and construction of a multipurpose building). The Provincial Government received the first tranche (80% of the total allocation) of the 60.5 M last 3 February 2017.

b. On 17 July 2012, Gov. Alfredo G. Maraon, Jr. of the Province of Negros Occidental signed Executive Order No. 12-016, series of 2012, creating the Provincial Peace, Integration and Development Unit or Pro-PIDU. Geared towards the attainment of sustainable peace, recognizing the utmost call for resolving conflicts and putting a permanent closure to armed conflicts, Pro-PIDU was created to spearhead the peace efforts and peace development projects of the Province of Negros Occidental anchored on the PIDP. A Pro-PIDU Membership Assembly was conducted, followed by the preparation of its work plan for 2017. Relative to this, a Provincial Peace and Order Council Quarterly Meeting was convened to discuss the PIM Pro-PIDU budget in support to the PAMANA Implementation.

iii. Social Protection Package

PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program

a. 597 community members from the community peace dividends barangays in Negros Oriental were endorsed in PhilHealth Region VII, while 365 in PhilHealth Region VI towards the end of the quarter. Results of the endorsement will be provided by the respective PhilHealth Regional Office upon verification of details provided by OPAPP.

b. In Panay, 1,508 Member Data Records (MDRs) were distributed to 24 CPD barangays through the PAMANA focal persons in respective local government units in Iloilo, while 276 and 186 MDRs were distributed in Aklan and Antique respectively, these were endorsed to the municipal and development officers of respective local government units, for distribution to the beneficiaries.

c. 3,187 members were renewed from Negros Occidental, MDRs and ID cards were released and transmitted to the LGU Level; the PhilHealth focal person already facilitated the distribution of the MDRs and ID cards to the beneficiaries.

d. In Negros Oriental, 1128 CPD members were renewed as beneficiaries of the sponsored program. Distribution of MDRs is scheduled on the first week of April 2017.

e. In Negros and Panay Islands, 362 RPA members were renewed as beneficiaries of the sponsored program and have received their MDRs.

OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED Study Grant Program. Documentary requirements of 71 Scholars from CPD barangays were processed allowing all of them to avail of the grant amount ranging from 5,000.00 to 10,000.00, depending upon the releases of respective regional offices. The grant covers one to three semesters, and depends upon the complied requirement of scholars. Grants for 25 TPG next of kin have been processed. They have received the corresponding amount.

2nd Quarter

Status and updates of the MOA components as of the 2nd Quarter are as follows:

a. **Disposition of Arms and Forces.** The completion of this component entails the turn in, remuneration and demilitarization of inventoried firearms. Inventoried firearms which cannot be turned in due to unforeseen circumstances are subjected to a validation process. This ensures that while not all inventoried firearms are turned in, all firearms are accounted for and issues are resolved. During turn in activities, a Verification Team composed of representatives from OPAPP, Police Regional Office - Cordillera (PRO-COR), Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), Cordillera Bodong Administration (CBA), Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CPLA) and a Civil Society Organization (CSO) is tasked with the inspection, verification and remuneration of validated inventoried firearms.

A turn in activity was held from 13 to 21 June 2017 in the provinces of Apayao (June 13-14), Kalinga (June 15-16) and Mountain Province (June 19-20) which resulted in the following:

- Turn in and remuneration of five (5) inventoried firearms which are currently in the custody of Police Provincial Stations of Apayao, Kalinga and Mountain Province;
- Resolution of issues on lost or sold firearms: four (4) in Apayao, one (1) in Kalinga, and four (4) in Mountain Province. The firearm owners will issue affidavits to support claim of loss or sale.

b. Economic Reintegration

i. **DENR-OPAPP Forest Guard Program.** As of June 2017, a total of five hundred seventeen (517) profiled and certified former CPLA members, their next of kin, and Comprehensive Local Integration Program (CLIP) beneficiaries were employed under the DENR-OPAPP Forest Guard Program.

A validation process of applications is continuously being conducted to facilitate the process of endorsing eligible individuals to fill seventy (70) posts in the program. More posts are seen to be opened for this year under the program which will accommodate more eligible beneficiaries. Further, OPAPP regularly monitors the implementation of the program in coordination with the respective CENROs, PENROs, and the DENR CAR RO.

ii. **Livelihood.** The Program for Enhanced Enterprises for former CPLA members aims to capacitate People's Organizations (POs) into sustainable enterprises, complementary to the livelihood program implemented under the Department of Agriculture, through the following: assessment of POs' organizational health to determine needed interventions; partnership/collaboration/networking with existing enterprises, and; establishment and operationalization of sustainable mechanisms per PO.

After the conduct of diagnostic assessment to determine their organizational health in the first quarter, consultation meetings are regularly conducted to assist and mentor the progress of POs. The meetings resulted in the following:

- The Benguet-Saguday Livelihood Association (BSLAI) of La Trinidad, Benguet presented an updated General Information Sheet (GIS) from the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC). Through this, the PO was able to update its basic information and has notified SEC that it is still active and operational. As of 12 April 2017, BSLAI conducted an election for a new set of officers.

- A mediation process was conducted with the PO in Kalinga on 30 May 2017 to resolve differences between and among former and present officers of the PO. As agreed, the PO's name has been changed from Kalinga Community People Livelihood Association (KCPLA) to United Kalinga Livelihood Organization (UKLO) and is now under the leadership of Mr. Eddie Linohawan.

- Feedback sessions were conducted with five (5) POs in the provinces of Apayao, Kalinga and Mountain Province from the period of 13-26 June 2017 as a step to complete the diagnostic analysis of POs towards sustainability as an enhanced enterprise. The POs were reminded of their basic functions and responsibilities to ensure their progress.

c. **Community Development Projects, Inter-municipal and Inter-barangay Development Projects.** In recognition of the communities which actively participated in the struggle of the Cordillera and selflessly aided the CBA-CPLA in its cause, the CBA-CPLA in its Memorandum of Agreement with the GPH pursued the implementation of eighty-one (81) community development projects in fifty-seven (57) barangays. The CBA-CPLA and the GPH further recognize the necessity to sustain the gains of the MOA that such gains can be enjoyed by the communities even after the agreement has been fulfilled.

On 2-3 June 2017, the MOA signatories and stakeholders leveled off on the five-year partnership strategy stipulated in the MOA (Section 7.d provides that *"the parties shall craft and implement a five-year partnership strategy that will sustain economic development efforts between the GPH and CBA-CPLA, beyond closure, including drawing the support of donors, the international community, the private sector and the LGUs."*) and drafted a working concept note. They have also resolved to create a Technical Team composed of persons from their communities who have the expertise in development planning to aid them in the crafting of the five-year development plan. The Technical Team should also advocate the cause of the CBA-CPLA to support the economic and infrastructure development of their target communities.

OPAPP thru PAMU is consistent in its presence in the meetings of the regional bodies. In the Sectoral Committee on Development Administration and Good Governance (SecComDevAd) on 20 June 2017 in Baguio City, OPAPP presented the track of its support for the region's aspiration for autonomy; and in Regional Development Council (RDC) and Regional Peace and Order Council (RPOC) on 23 June 2017 in Baguio City, it took note of Ifugao's new proposals of PAMANA projects resolved to be endorsed through the RPOC.

Support to Cordillera Initiatives for Autonomy. Succeeding the filing of House Bill 5343 "An Act Establishing the Autonomous Region of the Cordillera", RDC CAR in partnership with OPAPP organized a forum on 24 April 2017 at Mt. Data, Bauko, Mountain Province where CPLA factions and other senior advocates for Cordillera autonomy discoursed on the attainment of regional autonomy. The participants signed the Mt. Data Declaration of Support for the Establishment of the Autonomous Region of the Cordillera as a result of the forum. As stated, the signatories declared their commitment by supporting the initiatives of the OPAPP that facilitates the autonomy advocacy together with Muslim Mindanao.

Partnerships for support to Cordillera autonomy widened as Institute of Autonomy and Governance (IAG) of Notre Dame University-Cotabato collaborated with RDC CAR and OPAPP in the conduct of knowledge sharing on autonomy, federalism and peace on 7 June 2017 at the Malayan Hotel, Ortigas, Pasig City. Representatives from the CBA-CPLA, MILF, MNLF, and ARMM participated in the sharing session. The following next steps/ways forward were identified during the conference:

- Advocacy for the passage of the BBL/New Autonomy Law and the Cordillera organic law. Work to include this in the SONA, and for PRRD to certify it as urgent;
- Continuing study of federalism including the configuration of the autonomous region within a federal state;
- Review of Regalian Doctrine and other related laws relative to the Bangsamoro and Cordillera,
- Strengthen unity in the Cordillera; and,
- Support mechanisms for converging/reconciling assertion for Bangsamoro autonomy

Prior to this, the RDC through NEDA leveled off with the CBA-CPLA on the HB 5343 on 2 June at the Burnham Suites, Baguio City where they clarified provisions and underscored points to improve the House Bill.

Consensus Building on the Completion of the Implementation of the MOA. With the projected completion of the components of the MOA in 2017, the MOA signatories and stakeholders opened the discussion on the indicators of a completed MOA on 3 June at Burnham Suites, Baguio City. In the coming third quarter, the signatories and stakeholders aim to firm up the indicators and the method of consensus building.

1. **GPH- RPMP/RPA/ABB Peace Process**

The draft Closure Agreement is being reviewed by both the GPH and RPMP/RPA/ABB national leaders. Some sections of the agreement and its annexes were clarified and refined. Moreover, vetting with concerned agencies relative to the 2017 budget for the implementation of projects and activities for the RPMP/RPA/ABB was ensured, and initial steps have been identified.

The Closure Agreement with the RPMP/RPA/ABB will have the following components: (1) Community Peace Dividends (CPD), for communities influenced by RPA; (2) Socio-Economic Reintegration; (3) Disposition of Forces and Arms with provision of Interim Security Arrangement; (4) Provision of Civil-Political Rights; and (5) RPA Institutional Transformation.

The agreement will have the following scope and coverage: (1) Areas: Negros Provinces, Iloilo, Aklan, Antique, Bukidnon and parts of Davao Icos Sur; (2) 727 profiled RPA members; (3) 556 inventoried firearms and 404 explosives; (4) Five (5) settlement sites and four (4) congregated areas; (6) 100 barangays under Community Peace Dividends; and, (7) 267 RPA members to form the Community Security Force.

In preparation for the eventual signing, and implementation of the Closure Agreement, the following have been accomplished in the 2nd quarter of 2017:

a. Community Peace Dividends (CPD)

One hundred (100) identified CPD areas in Negros and Panay Island (91), Davao City (6), Bukidnon (2) and Ilocos Sur (1) by the RPM-P/RPA/ABB and validated by the GPH will be provided with grants as support to livelihood and enterprise development.

The identification of the 100 CPD barangays is based on the areas the RPA have made commitments for development under the 2000 Peace Agreement, signed by Mr. Edgardo J. Angara (Chairman, GPH Peace Panel) and Mr. Nilo Dela Cruz (Chairman, RPM-P/RPA/ABB Peace Panel).

For the second quarter, PAMANA-DSWD accredited twenty-one (21) Sustainable Livelihood Program Associations (SLPAs) from Negros Occidental (12), Negros Oriental (7) and Bukidnon (2) as a People's Organization, and were awarded the seed capital (amounting to Php 500,000.00) to fund their approved project proposal. A total of five (5) awarding ceremonies were held during the second quarter with the corresponding number of accredited SLPAs:

- 21 April 2017 – six (6) SLPAs in Negros Occidental, and five (5) SLPAs in Negros Oriental;
- 30 May 2017 – two (2) SLPAs in Negros Oriental;
- 31 May 2017 – three (3) SLPAs in Negros Occidental;
- 1 June 2017 – three (3) SLPAs in Negros Occidental; and,
- 22 June 2017 – two (2) SLPAs in Bukidnon

A total of sixty-seven (67) SLPAs are now implementing various livelihood projects ranging from community enterprise, animal raising and production. The remaining thirty-three (33) SLPAs are still in the process of validation by the DSWD field offices, and or deliberation by the Bureau of Standards. In Iloilo province, representatives from DSWD regional office, and respective municipal social welfare and development officers started to validate and monitor livelihood implementation.

Once accredited, they are considered as legitimate peoples' organizations, who can implement livelihood and community based projects, and manage their own funds.

b. Socio-Economic Reintegration

Settlement Sites. The settlement sites were jointly identified by the RPM-P/RPA/ABB-TPG, the LGUs and concerned agencies where three hundred eighteen (318) RPA-TPG members have agreed to resettle and rebuild their lives with the community. The following activities were conducted to facilitate the establishment and development of the settlement sites:

· Compliance to Documentary Requirements

1. A meeting was conducted with Atty. Baleva, DENR Assistant Secretary of Legal Affairs, to respond on OPAPP's agenda on the requirements on the issuance of tenurial instruments for the settlement sites. She committed to follow up the status from other bureaus, and also to have a follow up meeting by mid-July.

2. The application for Community Based Forest Management Agreement (CBFMA) of Kapatiran Para sa Progresong Panlipunan Negros Oriental Chapter, was approved, and the agreement certificate was already signed by the DENR Undersecretary for Operations. The certificate is for final stamping of CBFMA document number and notarization, by the NIR Regional Office. This tenurial instrument is crucial in the implementation of development projects and activities inside the settlement site.

3. Kapatiran Negros Oriental Chapter has entered into an agreement with DENR as recipient of financial assistance worth Php 1.4M in support for the implementation of National Greening Program.

4. For Negros Occidental, the updated Complete Staff Work (CSW) for the settlement sites in Cadiz and San Carlos Cities for application of Presidential Proclamation was reviewed by the Forest Management Bureau (this was endorsed for review by the National Park Division). PENRO Kabankalan has submitted all the necessary documents in applying for the issuance of Presidential Proclamation to NIR office.

c. Civil and Political Rights. Letters of request on certification of status of legal cases filed against twelve (12) (7 profiled, 5 not profiled) RRA members, was sent to fourteen (14) Clerks of Court in the Negros Island Region, and Panay provinces through the provincial coordinators. This aims to update the status of their legal cases, and categorize cases who are eligible for the Presidential Committee on the Grant of Bail, Release or Pardon and Recognizance (PCBRP). Responses from the Clerks of Court are also being collected by the respective provincial coordinators.

d. Disposition of Arms and Forces (DAF) and Interim Security Arrangement (ISA). Three coordination meetings were conducted with the AFP and PNP general headquarters, and their counterparts on the ground (including the 3rd Division Commander of Philippine Army). The meetings focused on the discussion of the following:

i. Identification of RPA-TPG members who will be joining the training on Community Security Force (CSF)

· the number of RPA-TPG members has been finalized, but the names of the two hundred sixty-seven (267) is still undergoing discussion.

ii. Identification of sessions for the training design on CSF

· the AFP Peace and Development Office (PDO) presented the training design and is currently being reviewed for finalization in partnership with the PNP Peace Process and Development Office (PPDO)

iii. Phases of implementation of DAF and ISA

· the phases of implementation were presented by the AFP PDO during a meeting with OPAPP and the PNP PPDO. Discussions are ongoing in relation to its finalization.

The Interim Joint Action Committee (IJAC), which is composed of representatives of the AFP and PNP at the provincial and regional levels, and TPG chapter representatives (2 per province), was created to serve as a quick response mechanism to address issues and concerns of RRA especially when the security of RRA TPG members is at stake.

The GPH Implementing Panel is headed by Undersecretary Nabil A. Tan (Chair), with members OPAPP Usec. Dosita Andot, OPAPP Asec. 2017 SECOND QUARTER ACCOMPLISHMENT REPORT OF THE AREA MANAGEMENT TEAM, WESTERN VISAYAS (AMT-WV) -(Negros Island & Panay Group of Islands)

As the local unit assigned to upkeep all OPAPP activities on the ground, the AMT-WV assists in the implementation of projects and programs under the Closure Agreement with the Rebolusyonaryong Partido ng Manggagawang Pilipino/Revolutionary Proletarian Army/Alex Boncayao Brigade (RPMP/RPA/ABB), which includes, among others, facilitation of activities and undertakings that involve the government peace table team.

Moreover, the AMT-WV facilitates the implementation of PAMANA projects in areas influenced by the Communist Party of the Philippines/New People's Army/National Democratic Front (CNN) to address socio-economic needs, which often times, cause unease in the communities.

The AMT-WV's responsibilities are not limited to the peace tables, but rather expand to other components of the peace process, such as the implementation of the National Action Plan on Women Peace and Securities (NAP-WPS) and the Conflict Prevention and Management Unit (CPMU), which manages the initiatives on constituency building and peace education (focused on youth & children), civilian protection, conflict resolution, and healing and reconciliation.

Validation/assessment on 26 January 2017 in Butig, Lanao del Sur of the actual situation and interventions provided to Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs). Inputs which are essential for the development of Civilian Protection framework and integration of CSPP framework in local DRR plans and mechanisms were gathered from the PDRRMO, MDRRMO, PSWDO and LGU-Butig. Information on LGUs socio-economic development plan and proposed measures were also generated to prevent resurgence of violent extremism in Butig;</p> <p>b. Strengthening government peace and development institutions and mechanisms to increase their responsiveness to peace, conflict, and security issues

a. CSPP Mainstreaming

Conflict sensitivity and peace promotion (CSPP) will be mainstreamed in the work of NGAs, LGUs, and other government mechanisms such as the peace and order councils, local development councils and disaster risk reduction and management (DRRM) councils. Likewise, the continued implementation of the UNSCR 1325 and NAP-WFS will ensure the protection of women's rights in conflict situations and expand their role in the peace process.

To ensure that the implementation of development projects in conflict affected and conflict vulnerable areas are CSPP compliant, OPAPP through the Rehabilitation and Development Unit have undertaken the following efforts and interventions:

- Drafted the Enhanced PAMANA Program Design and submitted to ManCom for approval.
- Reviewed and provided inputs on the following PAMANA manual/guidelines:
 - PAMANA Manual of Operations prepared by the PAMANA NPMO
 - PAMANA-DSWD Sustainable Livelihood Program Guidelines for 2017 Implementation prepared by DSWD
 - Guidelines for the PAMANA-NCIP Educational Assistance for IPs
- Prepared draft program document on the PAMANA-DSWD Community Driven Development for Indigenous Peoples (IP-CDD), for further discussion with DSWD.
- Provided technical inputs on the formulation of the Mindanao Peace and Development Framework through participation in the inter-unit meetings, workshop with MinDa, and processing of inputs coming from the discussion with agencies and development partners (Mindanao Working Group)
- Submitted to the OPAPP Assistant Secretary for Policy and Programs the draft Program document on the "Kapayapaan at Kalikasan Para sa Kaunlaran (3K): An Integrated Bamboo Production Project" which is a partnership with the Natural Resources Development Corporation, a government-owned and controlled corporation attached to the DENR.
- Provided inputs to the Donor Coordination and Partnership Unit (DCPU) for the formulation of the program document for the Comprehensive Peace and Development Fund (AECID-funded).

i. Enhanced Integration, Healing and Reconciliation Framework

In the development of an enhanced Integration, Healing and Reconciliation Framework for combatants, families and their communities across peace tables with consideration of the special needs of children in communities affected by situations of armed conflict, security, peace education, socio-economic and other peace and development interventions, OPAPP participated in various consultation workshops organized by UNICEF, national government agencies and other local bodies. Said events are as follows:

- Consultation-Workshop organized by UNICEF on 27 January 2017 relative the draft strategy to support children disengaged and at-risk of association with armed groups. This activity was held to gather inputs on the design of program interventions for children in MILF camps within the communities. It forms part of the next phase of implementation of the UN-MILF Action Plan for Children in Armed Conflict. In line with the proposed OPAPP inputs there is also a need to clarify the treatment of "release" of children associated with armed groups as recommended by UN agencies vis-à-vis "normalization" processes as defined and agreed upon by the GPH and MILF per CAB;
- Meeting with USec. Austere Panadero and other DILG-NBOO staff on 17 February 2017 in DILG-NAPOLCOM to discuss and provide guidance on the (a) Presidential Directive No 2016-0341-0342 - "facilitating the safe surrender of old and sickly individuals in the underground movement"; and, (b) OPAPP's propositions and recommendations regarding the implementation of the Comprehensive Local Integration Program (CLIP) this year. This meeting paved the way for the ongoing crafting of a set of guidelines on the two concerns. There were also discussions on the proposed CLIP review and clarification on the utilization of remaining funds of 2015-2016 proposed to be used for the construction of half-way houses as requested by some LGUs and direct assistance to around 1,300 former rebels to be processed in 2017, and;
- Consultation meeting in Malaybalay, Bukidnon on 16 March 2017 hosted by Diocese of Malaybalay City and participated by DILG Province, MLGU, Indigenous Peoples Apostolate (IPA), IPMR, NAPC Sectoral Representative and families of the victims of NPA atrocities. A proposed "listening process" activity was discussed. This activity will gather victims who lost family members due to armed conflict in their community. The design of the proposed OPAPP activity is still being finalized due to sensitivities of opening deep-seated wounds of family victims. Integration of debriefing sessions should be taken into consideration due to the activity's complexity. Results of the activity will provide inputs to the enhancement of the framework which could also be utilized in other groups/families with similar cases particularly in CPP/NPA/NDF areas.

2nd Quarter

The Peoples' Peace Tables serve as a government platform to ensure peoples' participation in the peace process. These peace conversations are considered the larger peace tables which involve different sectors with varying thematic concerns. It provides the democratic space for continuing dialogues between government and community stakeholders to surface, discuss and clarify issues on participation in proposing solutions to identified issues that can either be responded to by the communities themselves and the government institutions, whether efforts to resolve conflicts are independently or collectively done. All peoples' peace tables efforts are geared towards concrete peace actions to support the peace process through policy development, peacebuilding programs and constituency building.

Following is a list and results of peace conversations that have been undertaken for the second quarter:

a. Youth Peace Table

Launched the Peace Table for the Mindanao on 15-19 May 2017 at the MTRC-IPHC, Bajada, Davao City. This was participated by different youth organizations across Mindanao namely: Youth for Peace Development and Movement Philippines Inc., Supreme Student Council – Basilan State College, Solidarity for Peace, Batang Transformers Association (BTA), United Youth Action Group (UYAG), United Voices for Peace Network (UVPN), Ateneo de Davao University, Junior Chamber International (JCI) – Basilan and Nagdilaab, MYDEV, Youth for Peace Movement – ComVal, NAPC-YS, and Young Educators' Convergence of SOCCSKARGEN, Inc. Outputs of the training workshop were:

- Equipped young peacebuilders on the basic knowledge of the Culture of Peace and other learning and experiences gained;
- Youth Action Plan of each organizations;
- Consolidated documentation of issues, strategies harvested in the conversation; and,
- Network of young peacebuilders.

b. IP Peace Table Conversations

The Peace Table Conversations with key Mindanao IP leaders was launched on 26 April 2017 in Davao City where human security issues affecting resource-rich IP areas surfaced, including the persistent clamour for IP representation in the peace process. This resulted in the PAPP's pronouncement to immediately form and activate the government IP Peace Panel that is mandated to engage, meet, converse with and/or hear the concerns, inputs, recommendations of the IPs; represent their voices or register their concerns to the peace negotiating table of the NDFP; provide their inputs to the BTC; and, support the crafting and passage of the enabling law.

This historic event was immediately followed by the next leg of Peace Table Conversations with key IP leaders from Luzon and Visayas on 19 May 2017 in Mandaluyong City, to generate and consolidate IP aspirations and positions that would input to the crafting of provisions for incorporation into the draft GRP and NDFP Comprehensive Agreement on Socio-Economic Reforms (CASER), draft Ceasefire agreement and guidelines, for the 5th round of the GRP-CPP/NPA/NDF peace negotiations.

The GRP-IP Peace Panel has also engaged the Bangsamoro Transition Commission (BTC) focal for IPs on 8 June 2017 in Malayan Plaza, to propose enhancements in the Bangsamoro Enabling Law (BEL). Noting that the BEL is already due for submission to the President, the IP Peace Panel proposed for the conduct of the IP Legislative Assembly to come up with a separate article on non-Moro IPs in proposed Bangsamoro areas. This proposed participatory discourse is intended to provide a venue to clarify and address contentious issues affecting both Moro and non-Moro IPs within the proposed Bangsamoro Territory as had been registered by key IPO leaders with whom the IP Peace Panel has engaged with. The output of the IPLA is a formal legislative proposal for Congress to form part of the proposed Bangsamoro Enhanced Bill. This inclusive undertaking is also geared towards building and mobilizing a peace constituency that would eventually support the passage of the BEL.

Series of GRP-IP Peace Panel meetings were also conducted between May and June 2017 which resulted to the following policy recommendations and issuances that have been approved by the PAPP and supported the GRP peace panels:

- Terms of Reference of the GRP-IP Peace Panel (IPPP)
- Memo for the PAPP dated 25 May 2017 to update the PAPP & submit its recommendations on GRP & NDFP Drafts on CASER, draft Ceasefire Agreement and Guidelines
- IPPP Resolution No. 01, Series of 2017, 09 June 2017: "Resolution to organize and convene representatives of Indigenous Cultural Communities within the proposed Bangsamoro Territory"
- IPPP Resolution No. 02, Series of 2017, 09 June 2017: "Resolution organizing the members of the IP Peace Panel representations in the Reciprocal Working Committees (RWC)/Reciprocal Working Groups (RWG)/ Monitoring Committee of the OPAPP for the GRP-CNN Talks and Bangsamoro Peace Process"

Among other IP peace conversations organized and undertaken by CSOs/NGOs and LGUs which OPAPP-CPMU participated in were as follows:

- IP Mindanao Summit organized by SILDAP and TEBTEBBA on 17 May 2017 in Tagum City. This was an opportunity to update around 100 participants on the 6-point Peace and Development Agenda and its relevance to the IPs of Mindanao as well as to introduce the IP Peace Panel chaired by Atty. Lingating. The presence of Atty. Lingating and the OPAPP-CPMU in the summit was to listen to the voices of IP Leaders as one of the mandates of the IP Peace Panel and to promote the bigger Peace Tables' initiative.
- National IP Peace Conversation organized by the Sulong CARHRIHL network on 30 May-1 June 2017 in Baguio City. Similarly, participants from IP areas nationwide were apprised on the 6-point Peace and Development Agenda and possible areas of collaboration and partnership to support local peacebuilding initiatives in IP areas (i.e., local conflict monitoring and indigenous conflict resolution mechanisms) were also explored for possible support.
- Peace Conversations with Mangyan Leaders on 21 June 2017 in Mansalay, Oriental Mindoro. This activity was attended by 160 IP participants representing 7 tribes in Oriental Mindoro, with the presence of the Congressman, Mansalay Mayor, NCIP, AFP local command, the PAPP and the IP Peace Panel. Commitment to facilitate the CADT issuance processes and provision of scholarship for IPs through PAMANA was made by the PAPP in response to the expressed need as articulated by the Mangyan participants in this IP Peace Conversation. A follow through meeting was set by the IP Peace Panel to guide the Regional and Provincial NCIP and Mangyan leaders in working out details that would facilitate CADT issuance processes.

c. Women Peace Table. OPAPP through CPMU conducted an orientation on the peoples peace table initiative and peace building conversations to 15 core officers and members of the Society of Empowered Royal Ladies of Empire Cotabato (SERLEC). The activity is in support and compliance to NAP-WPS. The activity was held on 13-14 May 2017 at the Alnor Hotel, Cotabato City.

d. Multi-sectoral Peace Conversations:

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| | | | | <p>A Joint Multi-sectoral Peace Building Conversation was conducted for the municipalities of Claver and Gigaquit, Surigao del Norte. The activity is in support to the PAMANA program's implementation in the said municipalities and to draw out the current peace and security situation in the said areas in relation to PRRD's six-point peace and development agenda. It was participated by around 150 participants representing eight sectors. The activity was supported by the Provincial Government of Surigao del Norte, Gigaquit and Claver LGUs, and NCIP was held in the municipality of Gigaquit - 11 May 2017.</p> <p>Multi-sectoral Peace Building Conversation with the PAPP. The activity was a continuation of the multi-sectoral peace building conversation in the municipality of Gigaquit, where the result of the said activity was presented to the PAPP and to key government officials in the Province of Surigao del Norte. Major issues and concerns were discussed with the PAPP and representatives from multi-sectoral groups resulting in the recommendation of courses of action. It was one of the highlights during the celebration of the 116th founding anniversary of the province of Surigao Norte held on 15 May 2017 in Surigao del Norte.</p> <p>A. Strengthening government peace and development institutions and mechanisms to increase their responsiveness to peace, conflict, and security issues</p> <p>1. Peace Corridors</p> <p>In reference to the guidance of President Rodrigo Roa Duterte on the establishment of "peace corridors" that will serve as venue for collaboration between the Government (GPH) and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) to help address pressing concerns arising from the Marawi crisis, the GPH and MILF Implementing Panels established Joint Coordination, Monitoring and Assistance Centers (JCMACs) at the Provincial Capitol of Lanao del Sur and in the municipality of Malabang.</p> <p>OPAPP through its Cotabato Office provided technical, administrative and logistical support to the entire operations of the JCMAC. As of this report, a total of 255 trapped civilians were retrieved through the JCMAC of the GPH-MILF Peace Corridor. Around 28,321 food packs were distributed by the Regional Coordinating and Command Center of the ARMM through the DSWD and the ARMM HEART, the Bangsamoro Development Agency (BDA) and other humanitarian organizations; and, around 4,380 non-food items provided by the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) were accompanied by the JCMAC-Malabang team, to some 24,324 families who sought refuge in the towns of Marantao, Ganassi, Madamba, Madalum, Balindong, Buadiposo-Buntong, Poona Bayabao, Bacolod-Kalawi, Ditsaan Ramain and other affected towns of Lanao del Sur. These families are mostly residents of Marawi City and nearby areas who are affected by the crisis.</p> <p>2. CSPP Mainstreaming</p> <p>Conflict sensitivity and peace promotion (CSPP) will be mainstreamed in the work of NGAs, LGUs, and other government mechanisms such as the peace and order councils, local development councils and disaster risk reduction and management (DRRM) councils. On 21 March 2017, the GPH and MILF Implementing Panels signed the Terms of Reference of the Implementing Panels and the certificate of renewal of the International Monitoring Team (IMT) and the Ad Hoc Joint Action Group (AHJAG) in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

A Joint Statement was issued declaring that:

- a. Dato' Kamarudin bin Mustafa assumed the role of Malaysian Third Party Facilitator and/or Special Adviser;
- b. the respective mandates of the IMT and the AHJAG were extended for another year until March 2018;
- c. Presidential Adviser on the Peace Process Secretary Jesus G. Dureza, MILF Chairman Al Haj Murad Ebrahim, the government of Malaysia and the members of the International Contact Group (ICG) namely Japan, the Republic of Turkey, the United Kingdom, Center for Humanitarian Dialogue and Conciliation Resources witnessed the signing of the documents;
- d. The Parties expressed appreciation to President Rodrigo R. Duterte for his firm resolve to pursue a just and lasting peace in Mindanao, His Excellency Malaysian Prime Minister Dato' Sri Mohd. Najib bin Tun Haji Abdul Razak for his continued support to the GPH-MILF peace process and the MILF Central Committee for its unwavering commitment to the full implementation of the GPH-MILF peace agreements.

Formal platforms and mechanisms for public participation in the peace process have been institutionalized towards expanding, nurturing and sustaining the peace constituency

People's Peace Tables

Consistent with OPAPP's aim to infuse greater inclusivity and public ownership to the peace process, the People's Peace Tables are being formed per sector, per geographical area and per group in various parts of the country where significant stakeholders such as the Sultans, indigenous peoples, local government units, women, youth, sectoral groups, and others will be able to participate in the peace process. It is a venue that will allow building of relationships, healing and reconciliation and where people's voices can and will be heard and taken seriously.

Convenors of the Peoples' Peace Tables had since been mobilized for Mindanao, Northern and Southern Luzon and the NCR in the first two months of 2017.

The People's Peace Tables Conveners' Group Workshop was conducted on 31 March- 1 April 2017, in Davao City. This workshop among 15 eminent leaders and peace-builders discussed the goals, objectives, strategies and outcomes of the People's Peace Tables and came up with a one-year plan with budget and resources, and working structure.

The Women's Public Leadership in Peace Seminar was also held in March 2017, aimed to promote empowerment of women as a key element in building capacities for peace. It exposed the Bangsamoro and IP women leaders to non-violence as a response to conflict and as a means of struggle for social change. Women grassroots leaders from South Asia (who have used non-violent means to obtain land, water and forest rights), Middle East and Eastern Europe shared their experiences in peacebuilding and conflict transformation.

2nd Quarter

Work of the Implementing Panels

On 10 April 2017, the respective secretariats of the GPH and MILF Implementing Panels conducted an informal meeting in Davao City to thresh out some of the remaining issues from the previous meeting of the Panels in March 2017. The meeting enabled the Secretariats to clarify the issues for further vetting with their respective principals.

On 10 June 2017, the GPH and MILF Implementing Panels held its 8th meeting in Davao City. The meeting served as an opportunity for the Panels to discuss the Marawi crisis and the establishment of the GPH-MILF Peace Corridor in the routes from Malabang to Marawi, updates on the drafting of the proposed Bangsamoro Basic Law (BBL), proposed amendments in the operational guidelines of the Ad Hoc Joint Action Group (AHJAG), the proposed "Protocol of Cooperation on Anti-Illegal Drug Operations and Related Activities in MILF Areas/Communities," assessment of the status of the IMT-Civilian Protection Component (IMT-CPC), and other matters pertaining to the implementation of the different components of the normalization process.

Political-Legislative Track

On 16 June 2017, the Bangsamoro Transition Commission (BTC) finalized the draft of the new Bangsamoro Basic Law. The proposed bill was turned over to President Rodrigo Roa Duterte by the BTC on 17 July 2017 at the Malacanang Palace. Witnessing the event were BTC members, members of the Cabinet, representatives from the House of Representatives, Senators, GPH and MILF Implementing Panels, representatives from the donor agencies, diplomatic corps, and members of the different GPH-MILF peace process mechanisms.

The proposed bill will be submitted to Congress and thereafter it is expected to be certified as urgent by the President.

Ceasefire Mechanisms

For the quarter, a total of 3 misencounters between the GPH and the MILF forces in (1) Brgy. Bualan, Pikit, Cotabato due to the *rido* of CAFGU and 105th BC, BIAF-MILF; (2) Brgy. Elian, DSA, Maguindanao during the coordinated LESO of 61D, PA in the area against the BIFF; and (3) Brgy. Bual, Isulan, Sultan Kudarat during the uncoordinated LEO of PNP in the area were recorded. These incidents were immediately taken action by the Joint Coordinating Committee on the Cessation of Hostilities (JCCCH) and AHJAG to avoid the escalation of conflict.

To avoid misencounters in the future, the PNP through its Peace Process and Development Office (PNP PPDO) and the OPAPP through the GPH Implementing Panel organized a forum on the GPH-MILF Peace Process for key PNP officials in Mindanao on 24 April 2017 in Davao City. They were briefed regarding the ceasefire protocols and peace process.

The Joint Coordination Centers composed of the ceasefire mechanisms from both parties during the coordinated Law Enforcement Operations (LEO) of 6th Infantry Division, PA in Central Mindanao was also established to avoid the possibility of misencounters on the ground. Meanwhile, a Joint Ceasefire Monitoring Post (JCMP) Pikit was established in the boundary of Sitio Valencia, Brgy. Bualan, Pikit and Sitio, Tubak Brgy. Pagangan, Aleosan, both in Cotabato Province to pacify *rido* between BPATs of Sitio New Valencia and 105th BC, BIAF-MILF of Sitio Tubak.

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| | | | | <p>During the Marawi Crisis in May 2017, the CCCH and AHJAG of both parties established JCMAC in Marawi last 25 May 2017 to closely monitor ongoing military operations against the Maute Group and ensure that the ceasefire agreement will be implemented in the adjacent areas where ceasefire violations will most likely occur.</p> <p>During the crisis in Brgy. Malagakit and Simsiman, both of Pigcawayan, Cotabato, the CCCH of both parties immediately undertook the joint security cooperation between the 602nd Inf Bde, PA and 105th BC, BIAF-MILF under Cmdr Haun Sindatuk and Musa Alamada @ Cmdr Paradise who successfully drove away the BIFF, who held the civilian hostages in Malagakit Elementary School, occupied the Brgy Hall and Market Place of Simsiman, Pigcawayan and those who surrounded the Simsiman Detachment. Allegedly, the said attack of the BIFF was to show sympathy to the Maute Group.</p> <p>Another milestone for the quarter was the signing of the "Protocol of Cooperation on Anti-illegal Drug Operations and Related Activities in MILF Areas/Communities" by the Chairmen of the CCCH and AHJAG of both parties witnessed by the DILG, AFP, PNP, MILF, NICA and PDEA on 30 June 2017 in Davao City.</p> <p>Other significant activities</p> <p>a. GPH-MILF Peace Corridor. On 29 May 2017, the Parties agreed to establish the GPH-MILF Peace Corridor following the meeting between the President, the CCCH Chairman, GPH Implementing Panel Chair and the MILF led by Al Haj Murad Ebrahim. The Peace Corridor is intended to provide safe and secure corridor for the rescue of stranded or trapped individuals inside the conflict zone in Marawi; and to provide a reliable space for humanitarian assistance to pass through affected municipalities in the Province of Lanao del Sur.</p> <p>On 4 June 2017, the GPH-MILF Peace Corridor was operationalized with the establishment of the Joint Coordination, Monitoring and Assistance Center (JCMAC) at the Lanao del Sur Provincial Capitol and in Malabang, Lanao del Sur.</p> <p>The said peace corridor was manned by the personnel of CCCH, AHJAG, LMT and JCMAC of both parties. Other OPAPP/normalization bodies also provided operational support such as OPAPP Cotabato, JNC, Socio-Econ and TFDCC. To date, the peace corridor remains active with a total of 255 civilians retrieved and numerous humanitarian assistance facilitated.</p> <p>a. The Peoples' Peace Tables. He also instructed concerned Cabinet Secretaries to undertake specific actions in support its implementation.</p> <p>Since the resumption of formal talks in August 2016, there were three rounds of formal talks with the NDF that have been conducted under the facilitation of the Royal Norwegian Government (RNG) in August and October 2016, and on 19-25 January 2017 which resulted in the signing of a Joint Statement which contains the following key points of discussions/agreements:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The Reciprocal Working Committees on Socio-Economic Reforms (RWCs-SER) signed the Ground Rules for the conduct of their formal meetings and discussions were made on the first four parts of the draft Comprehensive Agreement on Socio-Economic Reforms (CASER); - The Reciprocal Working Groups on Political and Constitutional Reforms (RWGs-PCR) formally exchanged full drafts of the tentative Agreement on PCR and exchanged and presented as well their respective comparative matrices of the drafts. The ceasefire committees agreed to meet again during the period 22-27 February 2017 in The Netherlands simultaneous to the opening of the bank safety deposit box account for safekeeping of the JASIG documents of identification; - The Parties signed the Supplemental Guidelines for the Joint Monitoring Committee (JMC) which will guide and fully operationalize its work in its task of monitoring the implementation of and achieving the objectives of the Comprehensive Agreement on Respect for Human Rights and International Humanitarian Law (CARHRIHL) in upholding and promoting human rights and international humanitarian law; - The Parties agreed to continue to study the issuance of an amnesty proclamation of all political prisoners (as listed by the NDFP) and reiterated that it is the most expeditious way of releasing them; - The GRP Panel committed to facilitate the release of the three remaining NDFP consultants: Eduardo Sarmiento, Emeterio Antalan and Leopoldo Caloza, through presidential clemency, and other legal modes; and the GRP, with the assistance of the defense lawyers, shall expeditiously process the release of all the political prisoners listed by the NDFP starting the 200 qualified prisoners either through bail, recognizance, pardon or other legal processes in compliance with the CARHRIHL and allow them to participate in activities and mechanisms of the peace process; <p>- The Parties agreed to meet for the fourth round of formal talks in Oslo, Norway on 2-6 April 2017 to continue to work on strengthening the mechanisms in the implementation of CARHRIHL and the unification of the drafts CASER and CAPCR.</p> | |

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| | | | | <p>On 9-14 March 2017, the GPH Panel and its Secretariat conducted backroom talks with the NDF in Utrecht, The Netherlands, which resulted in the signing of the Joint Statement where the Parties agreed, among others, to continue the formal talks and to forge a joint ceasefire agreement.</p> <p>During this reporting period the GPH Panel and its Secretariat conducted the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Engaged with stakeholders ("the bigger table") to share updates and developments in the peace talks, including the matter on ceasefire which generated inputs from them for the Panels negotiations work. - Convened committee/working group workshops which resulted in initial drafts of CASER, CAPCR and EHDF. - Convened joint meetings of ceasefire committees and JMC which resulted in further discussions of the draft interim joint ceasefire agreement and on the draft Joint Supplemental Guidelines for the Operationalization of the JMC, respectively. - Coordinated with concerned government agencies to facilitate GRP action on releases based on humanitarian reasons. <p>OPAPP through its Conflict Prevention and Management Unit, provided the following policy inputs for consideration of the GPH Panel in their negotiations with CPP/NPA/NDP Peace Process:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - the need to respect and protect the rights of indigenous people specifically through the non-usage of the term "National Minority"; - the need to strengthen the existing CARHRIHL conflict monitoring mechanism to monitor cases of HR/IHL violations in response to the recent cases of killing and increased threats/vulnerabilities of IP leaders and communities from NPA attacks or harassments which recently occurred in Caraga, Davao Oriental and Makilala, North Cotabato; - the need to respect and support indigenous community initiatives applying traditional conflict resolution mechanisms in conflict-affected areas; and, - the need to recognize the rights to indigenous ownership of ancestral lands and domains and its exclusion to the proposed agrarian reform provisions of the draft CASER. <p>2nd Quarter Accomplishment Report Fourth Round of Formal Talks</p> <p>With the positive results of the back-channeling talks, the Parties resumed the fourth round talks on 3-6 April 2017 at Radisson Blu Palace Hotel, Noordwijk Aan Zee, The Netherlands where they signed a Joint Statement that contains the following points:</p> <p>a. Agreement on an Interim Joint Ceasefire. The Parties signed the Agreement on an Interim Joint Ceasefire, which will take into effect upon the approval of the guidelines and ground rules for its implementation, as follows:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> i. Rules governing the presence of armed units and elements of both Parties in local communities and the creation of buffer zones; ii. Agreement on prohibited, hostile and provocative acts; and iii. Ceasefire monitoring and verification mechanisms relative to the implementation of the ceasefire and the handling of complaints and alleged ceasefire violations. <p>Towards this end, the Parties agreed to direct their respective Ceasefire Committees to meet (even in-between formal talks) and discuss, formulate and finalize the above guidelines and ground rules. The Interim Joint Ceasefire Agreement shall be in force upon approval and signing of the ground rules, and shall be effective until a permanent ceasefire is in place as part of the Comprehensive Agreement on End of Hostilities and Disposition of Forces (Final Peace Agreement).</p> <p>Pending effectivity of the interim joint ceasefire, the Parties also agreed to enhance the liaison between the Panel Chairmen for resolution of possible incidents relative to acts allegedly committed by armed units and elements of either or both Parties.</p> <p>b. Discussion on Socio-Economic Reforms (SER). The meetings of the Reciprocal Working Committees (RWCs) on SER were held to follow through their discussions in past rounds-of-talks. The high point of the RWCs-SER meetings was the agreement in principle to the distribution of land for free to the agrarian beneficiaries as the tenet of the genuine agrarian reform of the Government.</p> <p>The RWCs also agreed to accelerate the process for concluding the Agreement on SER through the creation of Bilateral Teams that will tackle the contentious issues to avoid the disruption of the discussion at the RWC level.</p> <p>c. Release of AFP/PNP Elements in NPA Custody. The Parties agreed to undertake the necessary measures to effect the immediate, safe and expeditious release of AFP/PNP captives in SOCSKARGEN before Easter and those in Bukidnon and CARAGA after Easter.</p> <p>d. Release of NDFP-listed Prisoners. Noting the release of NDFP Consultant Arie Arbitario that enabled him to participate in the fourth round-of-talks, the GRP Panel informed the NDF that the Presidential Committee on Bail, Recognizance or Pardon (PCBRP) Secretariat has reviewed the status of 23 NDF listed prisoners, 19 of whom (including 3 NDF Consultants) have been recommended for conditional pardon to the PCBRP. a. The Strategic Framework for Mindanao Peace and Development. Acknowledging the extreme social and economic divides that exist in the region, the Government through the OPAPP in coordination with MINDA, TESDA and NEDA, is currently developing a Strategic Framework for Mindanao Peace and Development (SFMPD). This Strategic Framework defines the Philippine government's integrated approach towards achieving a peaceful, cohesive and inclusively developed Mindanao. It establishes a set of interrelated strategic outcomes, which, when pursued together, will help bridge the gaps and facilitate the transition of communities from instability and underdevelopment to sustainable peace and inclusive development. It also establishes the principles and mechanisms for the implementation of peace and development initiatives in Mindanao, asserting government leadership and encouraging harmonization, complementarity and coherence of peace and development programmes for peace and development in Mindanao.

On 8 February 2017, the first meeting of the Mindanao Working Group (MWG) under the administration of President Rodrigo Roa Duterte was held. In the said activity, the following were discussed: (a) the proposed Strategic Framework for Mindanao Peace and Development, (b) the options for the new funding mechanism, and (c) the draft Terms of Reference for the MWG.

The MWG is a coordination mechanism envisioned to harmonize development partners' requirements and approaches in providing assistance to target partners and communities affected by conflict in Mindanao in support of the government's Peace and Development Roadmap, the Philippine Development Plan and the long term vision "Ambisyon Natin 2040".

Currently, the MWG, which started in 2005, is being reconstituted and strengthened by government with the help of development partners to continue its critical role in coordinating efforts and initiatives towards peace and development. It is being co-chaired by the Office of the Presidential Adviser on the Peace Process (OPAPP) and the Mindanao Development Authority (MinDA).

On 2 February 2017, OPAPP met with EU to discuss the MPDP and the EU's ongoing Mindanao Needs Assessment which will inform the EU's formulation of its programme on peace and development for the next years. The EU has introduced to OPAPP the independent team which will be doing the study. The team consists of:

- a. Mr. Bernard Jolly – Team Leader and Governance Expert;
- b. Mr. Pierre Roosbroeck – Environmental Specialist; and,
- c. Ms. Lily Hidalgo – Social Protection and Gender Specialist

The expected output of the Needs Assessment is a study on comprehensive approach/strategy to peace and development in Mindanao.

A follow through meeting was held on 3 March 2017. It was agreed that EU will revise the Aide Memoire based from the discussions and will submit to OPAPP.

b. **Setting up of the Multi-Partner Trust Fund Facility.** The Multi-Partner Trust Fund (MPTF) is the new funding facility to support government's peace and development efforts in Mindanao. It will support the building of resilient communities, enhance responsiveness of institutions, inclusive economic growth, ensuring a secured environment, and the building of consensus for peace in the conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable areas of Mindanao. The MPTF has the feature of an umbrella trust fund to support several funding windows especially those that have the commitment of the Philippine Government in the Peace Process such as the Bangsamoro Normalization Trust Fund (BNTF) and the Bangsamoro Development Assistance Fund (BDAF).

2nd Quarter

1. The Strategic Framework for Mindanao Peace and Development (SFMPD)

On 3 April 2017, OPAPP, MinDa and TESDA met in a workshop to draft the Executive Order that will serve as the legal basis of the SFMPD. In the same workshop, the three agencies discussed the projects of OPAPP and MinDa that will be prioritized among the projects identified under the Comprehensive Reform and Development Agenda (CRDA) which would now be subsumed under the SFMPD. The budget proposal for the CRDA will be presented along with OPAPP's under the Tier 2.

On 10 April 2017, a workshop aimed at enhancing the SFMPD was conducted in Davao City which was attended by OPAPP, UNDP Consultants and AMT Heads. A follow-up meeting to finalize the SFMPD was conducted on 27 April 2017.

On 4 May 2017, OPAPP met with relevant government agencies who will be involved in the Strategic Framework for Mindanao Peace and Development. The latest copy of the draft SFMPD along with the draft Terms of Reference (ToR) for the Multi-Partner Financing Facility (MPFF) was presented.

On 24 May 2017, OPAPP, MinDA and TESDA met to discuss updates on the SFMPD and the Comprehensive Reform and Development Agenda (CRDA). TESDA discussed the proposed Operational Guidelines for the CRDA.

On 25 May 2017, a writeshop participated in by OPAPP and MinDA was held to incorporate revisions on the revised program document for the SFMP.

On 29 May 2017, OPAPP presented to the Cabinet Assistance System (CAS) the revised document on the SFMPD and updates on the CRDA.

On 6 June 2017, Usec. Andot presented to the Human Development and Poverty Reduction Cluster (HDPRC) of the Cabinet the Strategic Framework on Mindanao Peace and Development. The SFMPD has been approved and adopted by the HDPRC with minor comments. These issues have been addressed in the subsequent versions of the draft SFMPD.

2. Setting up of the Multi-Donor Financing Facility (MDFF)

On 27 April 2017, a workshop to discuss the operationalization of the MDFF was conducted in Davao City by OPAPP and MinDA. The strategic framework and the draft E.O. were reviewed and revised.

On 4-5 May 2017, OPAPP met with NGAs and ODA partners, respectively, to discuss the draft Terms of Reference (ToR), implementation structure and other concerns with regard to the setting up of the MDFF. Government agencies and development partners have expressed general interest and support to the initiative of OPAPP to set up the new funding facility for peace and development in conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable areas in Mindanao.

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| | | | | <p>The Multi-Partner Trust Fund (MPTF) is the new funding facility to support government's peace and development efforts in Mindanao. It will support the building of resilient communities, enhance responsiveness of institutions, inclusive economic growth, ensuring a secured environment, and the building of consensus for peace in the conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable areas of Mindanao. Mindanao Trust Fund – Reconstruction and Development Programme (MTF-RDP)</p> <p>OPAPP through its DCPU attended the Technical Management Group (TMG) Meeting held last 17 May 2017. In said meeting, the Concept Note on the proposed MTF-RDP Phase II was presented. The proposed MTF-RDP II would be funded through remaining funds under the existing MTF (TF054035) plus new contributions from Australia and Spain and a possible new contribution from the European Union.</p> <p>OPAPP officially requested for the extension of the MTF-RDP until 30 June 2019. This extension will allow MTF to embark on a new project for the sustained development in conflict-affected communities and build the capacity of key institutions in the Bangsamoro. This could also include assistance to help lay the groundwork for the new funding mechanism.</p> <p>4. Mainstreaming Peace and Development in Local Governance in the Philippines (MPDLGP) Project and Community Peace Dividends Fund (CPDF) Project</p> <p>On 9 May 2017, the proposal for the MPDLGP rapid appraisal was approved by the AECID. The rapid appraisal sought to: (1) examine project implementation in terms of adherence to peace and social cohesion principles; (2) map emerging outcomes, including unintended consequences, from project implementation and contributions to peacebuilding based on peace effectiveness criteria; and, (3) identify challenges, good practices, lessons learned, and recommendations to enhance and mainstream CSPP processes in different stages of the project cycle. The rapid appraisal was conducted by teams composed of OPAPP personnel from the Area Management Teams, Donor Coordination Partnership Unit, and the Peace Policy Unit.</p> <p>As part of the data collection for the rapid appraisal, from 14 May - 2 June 2017, 61 key informant interviews and 14 focus group discussions were conducted in 15 barangays in 8 provinces:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Lanao del Sur (Tamparan) for the rehabilitation and expansion of the public market -22 May 2017 - Sulu (Omar and Parang) for the boats and seaweeds livelihood project -23-24 May 2017 - Samar (Sta. On the other hand, the Inter Agency Committee on Anti-Trafficking proposed for a joint effort with OPAPP in addressing trafficking of women. In a recent report, there are allegedly more than 100 Filipino women who are being housed in a *zoo* in Kota Kinabalo and are forced into prostitution. Accordingly, majority of the women were coming from the Provinces of Basilan, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi.

In order to validate the information, a bilateral meeting was arranged by OPAPP with the PNP of Basilan, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi, and the RIACAT of Region IX, to address the issue.

As an offshoot, a comprehensive program is being conceptualized to address the issue, particularly in terms of recovery.

2nd Quarter

Strategic Planning Workshop on the Implementation of the of NAPWPS 2017-2022 for the TWG of NSC WPS on 23-24 May 2017. As an output, all the participating agencies (DSWD, DFA, PNP, PhilHealth, DA, DAR, PCW, NCMF, DND, and Philippine Army) were able to formulate their respective Agency Strategic Action Plans (ASAP) which outline how they will implement their respective commitments under the NAPWPS from 2017 to 2022.

Formulation and implementation of a comprehensive program to address trafficking. As an off-shoot of the meeting that took place in February 2017 between and among OPAPP, Philippine National Police (PNP), and the Inter-Agency Committee on Anti-Trafficking (IACAT), a comprehensive program to address trafficking in persons (TIP) was formulated. The program was formulated through an inter-agency informal workshop participated in by the OPAPP, PNP, DOJ, and the IACAT.

The proposed program aims to provide a holistic strategy in addressing trafficking. In order to ensure a whole-of-government approach, the following relevant implementing agencies will work together to provide the needed interventions:

- International Organization for Migration (IOM)
- Inter-Agency Council on Anti-Trafficking (IACAT) - Region IX
- Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD)
- Office of the Presidential Adviser on the Peace Process (OPAPP)
- Philippine National Police (PNP)
- Bureau of Immigration (BI)

The program will focus on conducting a study to generate and analyze data. The analysis will then inform the development of effective, efficient and appropriate strategies, measures and interventions to prevent trafficking and to rehabilitate victims/survivors.

Strengthening the Women and Children Protection Desks (WCPDs) of PNP-CAR on Women, Peace, and Security. Under NAPWPS 2017-2022, one of the PAs identified is integrating NAPWPS in the educational and training programs of the PNP. To operationalize this commitment, a continued capacity building on NAPWPS for the WCPDs of the PNP is one of the programs to be implemented.

With the objective of strengthening the WCPDs of PNP in conflict affected areas, WCPDs of PNP-CAR were capacitated on NAPWPS.

As an assessment, it was noted that participants lack knowledge and understanding of GAD, WPS and CSPP. Although Gender Sensitivity Training (GST) is part of the PPSC curriculum, it appears that it is not well understood, hence, not appreciated and observed by the participants. Gender and WPS mainstreaming is also seen as not a priority.

Orientation for ARMM Council on Anti-Trafficking (ACAT) on NAPWPS 2017-2022. Mainstreaming Women, Peace and Security in the Regional Peace and Order Council (RPOC), Regional Development Council (RDC), and Regional Inter-Agency Council Against Trafficking (RIACAT).

This activity had the primary objectives of:

- Raising awareness, understanding, and appreciation of duty bearers at the regional level on WPS,
- Triggering starting point for the integration and sustained implementation of 1325 and 1820 at the regional level
- Strengthening inter-agency collaboration and coordination in implementing the NAPWPS towards addressing trafficking in person (TIP)

One of the significant observations raised by the Office of the Regional Governor (ORG) was that there is no WPS intervention for ARMM under the current NAPWPS. In response, it was stressed that the NAPWPS was formulated at the national agency level, while for the ARMM, there is the Regional Action Plan on WPS (RAPWPS) whose formulation was coordinated/spearheaded by the Regional Commission on Bangsamoro Women (RCBW). As a result, the RIACAT committed that in the review and updating of the Strategic Plan, it will be guided by the results framework of the NAPWPS.

Engaging the Society of Empowered Royal Ladies of Empire Cotabato (SERLEC) in Peace Process

From the series of engagements with OPAPP / NAP and expressing their desire to be part of the peace process, the SERLEC was capacitated by OPAPP as a strategic partner in terms of influencing decisions of political leaders in their area and in winning the ground in support of the peace process.

Inputs during the capacity building included the following: 6-Point Peace and Development Agenda, Conflict Sensitive and Peace Promoting (CSPP) Approach, BEL and Federalism, Do No Harm Principle, and Dialogue and Open-Space Technology (OST). As an output, SERLEC formulated their action plan.

NAPWPS National Steering Committee on Women, Peace, and Security-Executive Committee (NSCWPS-ExeCom) Meeting re Marawi Crisis. In view of the Marawi Crisis, NSCWPS-ExeCom was convened with the primary purpose of surfacing issues and concerns affecting women and children, and identifying concrete strategies to respond to the said issues and concerns. Agencies present were DFA, DILG, NCIP, DND, NCMF, PCW, and OPAPP.

As an output, the committee agreed to pass a resolution entitled "Ensuring Gender-Responsive Conflict Management, Conflict Resolution and Humanitarian Action in the Crisis in Marawi City, Lanao Del Sur and the whole of Mindanao."

1. Mainstreaming of Peace Education.

OPAPP, in ensuring the mainstreaming of peace education, in formal and non-formal settings and towards the promotion of culture of peace, the following interventions were conducted in partnership with LGUs, NGAs and various peace partners:

On 10 February 2017, President Rodrigo R. Duterte appointed the following to the 21-member BTC: Atty. Jose I. Lorena, Atty. Maisara Dan-El-Latif, Samira Gutoc, Datu Mussolini S. Lidasan, Dr. Susana S. Anayatin, Atty. Hussin U. Amin, Romeo C. Saliga, Hatimil Hassan, Atty. Firdausi Ismail Y. Abbas, Atty. Omar Yasser C. Sema, Ghazali Jaafar, Mohagher M. Iqbal, Abdulraof Abdul Macacua, Ibrahim D. Ali, Haron M. Abas, Atty. Raissa H. Jajurie, Said M. Shiek, Hussein P. Munoz, Melanio U. Ulama, Gafur A. Kanain and Ammal D. Solaiman.

The BTC was formally launched on 24 February 2017 at the Garden Pavilion, Waterfront Insular Hotel, Davao City. President Rodrigo Roa Duterte graced the event. The appointment of the BTC members signaled the start of the crafting of the enabling law with a target to submit the same to Congress by mid-2017, in time for the second State of the Nation Address (SONA) of the President.

To meet the deadline, the BTC is holding marathon plenary and committee meetings in April. The BTC organized the following committees:

- Political Autonomy (chaired by Commissioner Mohagher Iqbal)
- Fiscal Autonomy (chaired by Commissioner Raissa Jajurie)
- Justice and Security (chaired by Commissioner Firdausi Abbas)
- Basic Rights, Culture, Social Justice and IP matters (chaired by Commissioner Hussin Amin)
- Transitory Provisions, Amendments, Revisions and Miscellaneous Matters (chaired by Commissioner Jose Lorena)
- Constitutional Amendments (Chaired by Commissioner and BTC Chair Ghazali Jaafar)

The BTC also agreed to use the previous draft Bangsamoro Basic Law (BBL) that was transmitted to Congress on 10 September 2014 as its working draft.

2nd Quarter

1. Implementation of the Normalization Process

As defined in the agreements, normalization is the process whereby communities can achieve their desired quality of life, which includes the pursuit of sustainable livelihood and political participation within a peaceful, deliberative society. It aims to ensure human security in the Bangsamoro and build a society that is committed to basic human rights where individuals are free from fear of violence or crime and where long-held traditions and values continue to be honored.

a. Security

With the reconstitution of its new membership, the Government Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) and the Joint Peace and Security Committee (JPSC)[1] reconvened on 6 April 2017 in Manila to level off and discuss the pending issues on coordinating and monitoring the implementation of the normalization process vis-à-vis the anticipated positive developments in the political-legislative track of the CAB.

This was followed by a series of meetings in Manila and Davao where the JNC and JPSC discussed policy and operational issues with respect to the security aspect of the normalization process, such as the constitution and re-training of Joint Peace and Security Teams (JPSTs), establishment of the JPSC Operations Center (JPSC OpCen), and the disbandment of Private Armed Groups (PAGs) as provided in the Annex on Normalization.

In an effort to review and update the progress of the different components of the normalization process, the GPH and MILF JNC organized a joint planning workshop on 23 – 24 May 2017 in Davao City with the participation of the various GPH-MILF normalization mechanisms.

In April to June 2017, the Government JNC and JPSC also conducted several consultation meetings with AFP and PNP in reviewing the proposed operations manual of the JPST, and with the Philippine Public Safety College in reviewing the refresher course in preparation for the JPST training.

In June 2017, the GPH Panel, JNC-GPH and JPSC-GPH also conducted several consultation dialogues with the DILG, AFP, PNP and NICA on reviewing and finalizing the draft IRR of the National Task Force on the Disbandment of Private Armed Groups (NTF-DPAGs), which is part of the Phase 1 of the normalization process. The draft IRR of the NTF-DPAGs is currently undergoing careful review process with the concerned agencies before transmittal to the Office of the Executive Secretary for its final review.

Socio-Economic Development

As part of the normalization process, the MILF and GPH agreed to intensify development efforts for rehabilitation, reconstruction and development of the conflict-affected areas. In particular, socio-economic programs will be instituted to address the needs of Bangsamoro Islamic Armed Forces (BIAF) members, internally displaced persons (IDPs) and poverty-stricken communities in the Bangsamoro.

As part of the continuing effort of the Panels to enable the decommissioned combatants to transition to peaceful and productive lives, the Task Force for Decommissioned Combatants and their Communities (TFDCC) conducted several meetings with different government agencies to follow-up on the status of the delivery of assistance to the decommissioned combatants (DCs). This includes the follow-through meeting with DA RFO X on 4 April 2017 in Iligan City to discuss the release of assistance to the 18 DCs from Lanao del Sur and Lanao del Norte, and with DA RFO XII on 11 April 2017 for the remaining DCs based in Maguindanao and North Cotabato.

The TFDCC also facilitated a dialogue session between the DepEd and 6 DCs to discuss the current educational program being delivered by the government that may be availed or offered to the DCs.

The TFDCC also facilitated the processing of student permit and authenticated birth certificate of 10 DCs who previously underwent skills training with TESDA in April 2016.

On 20 April 2017, the TFDCC also facilitated the initial distribution of livelihood assistance for the 18 DCs from Lanao del Sur and Lanao del Norte on 20 April 2017.

To better improve the home visitation tool and review the applicability of the questionnaire to the DCs, the TFDCC conducted pre-testing of its home visitation tool to 5 DCs on 22 June 2017. This activity also enabled the TFDCC to gather substantive feedback from the DCs to enhance the said monitoring tool.

Confidence-building Measures

Transformation of the Six Previously Acknowledged MILF camps. As part of the Confidence-building Measures under the Annex on Normalization, the Government of the Philippines (GPH) and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) agreed to undertake necessary measures for the transformation of the six previously acknowledged MILF camps, namely: Camps Abubakar-as-Siddique, Omar, Rajamuda, Badre, Bushra, and Bilal. It is for this reason that the Joint Task Forces on Camps Transformation (JTFCs) coordinate and facilitate development programs for the camps communities.

During the 2nd quarter of the year, the Joint Task Forces on Camps Transformation delivered, distributed and installed the 34M (3,001 units) worth of Solar Power System (Off-Grid) in the conflict-affected and conflict vulnerable areas in Camps Abubakar, Badre, Omar, Rajamuda, Bushra and Bilal. These Camps are located across Maguindanao, North Cotabato, Lanao del Sur and Lanao del Norte.

This project, as committed to the communities of the said camps, was identified by the Joint Task Forces as part of the Quick Response Projects (QRPs) in 2015.

Before the actual distribution and installation, JTFC conducted a briefing on the GPH-MILF peace process, orientation on QRPs and Solar Power System (Off-Grid) Project, and review of the technical training on the utilization and load management of solar power units with the TF Camps and community beneficiaries.

In April 2017, the JTFC also conducted several meetings to coordinate, facilitate, ensure security of the team and goods during the said project operations with the different representatives from the TF Camps and the AFP (e.g., AFP 2nd Mechanized Brigade and 5th Mechanized Brigade). These were followed by post-installation assessment to evaluate the program implementation.

a. Transitional Justice and Reconciliation

Following the turnover of supplementary reports of the Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commission (TJRC) in February 2017, OPAPP facilitated the formulation of the roadmap to implement the transitional justice and reconciliation program under the supervision of Atty. Cecilia Jimenez-Damary who previously served as government representative to the TJRC. This roadmap includes the crafting of a legal basis to create the body tasked to oversee its implementation.

In view of crafting a coherent roadmap, Atty. Jimenez-Damary conducted initial meetings with the National Historical Commission of the Philippines (NHCP), Department of Education (DepEd) Bureau of Learning Resources, and the Armed Forces of the Philippines Peace and Development Office (AFP PDO) in June 2017 to discuss the initiatives and capacities of these government bodies pertinent to the recommendations in the TJRC report.

As part of the transitional justice and reconciliation initiatives of the previous administration, the NHCP Board of Commissioners has already approved the placement of several historical markers in the Bangsamoro. Some historical markers have already been put in place, while some are still pending due to the non-response of the corresponding local government units (LGUs). NHCP is also in the process of restoring several heritage sites in the Bangsamoro, including the transformation of the Old Capitol Building in Cotabato City as a museum of Muslim history.

Also part of the initiatives of the previous administration, a teaching module for Grade 5 on Bangsamoro History was created, and has been submitted to the DepEd for review. This has not been acted upon since the start of the Duterte administration. On the side of the AFP, a Technical Working Group on Dealing with the Past / Transitional Justice (TWG on DwP/TJ) has been established in July 2016 but is yet to be convened.

OPAPP is in the process of reviewing the draft Executive Order on the creation of the National Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commission on the Bangsamoro (NTJRCB). Once fine-tuned and after due diligence with various government agencies, the draft Executive Order will be submitted to the Office of the President for its review and approval.

Remaining implementation of the Sajahatra Bangsamoro Program. Although the Sajahatra Bangsamoro Program (SBP) officially concluded its operations in November 2015, the GPH and MILF committed to continue the delivery of pending commitments. From April to June 2017, the following were delivered by various government agencies under the SBP:

- turnover of one (1) Barangay Health Station in Datu Tumangong, Tungawan, Zamboanga Sibugay on 22 April 2017
- additional amenities to a day care center in Datu Tumangong, Tungawan, Zamboanga Sibugay on 22 April 2017
- 413 grantees of scholarship programs graduated from different state universities and colleges, 3 of whom graduated *cum laude*.

On 17 May 2017, the SBP focal persons also met with the DA's Office of the Undersecretary for Special Concerns on 17 May 2017 to discuss and level off on the possible actions to implement the remaining deliverables under the DA.




