On 17 July 2017, the BTC turned over to the President the draft BBL, witnessed by the Speaker of the House and the Senate President. On 14 August 2017, the Office of the President's Presidential Legislative Liaison Office (PLLO) submitted the draft Bangsamoro Basic Law (BBL) that the Bangsamoro Transition Commission (BTC) submitted to President Rodrigo Duterte on July 17 to the Senate and the HOR.</p> <p>On 26 September 2017, Speaker Pantaleon Alvarez and 75 members of Congress filed the BTC drafted bill as HB 6475 though there were other versions filed in the HOR. On the other hand, Senate Bill No. 1608 was filed on 6 November 2017 by Senate President Aquilino "Koko" Pimentel III. The target date for the passage of the BBL is on the first quarter of 2018.</p> <p>b. Implementation of the Normalization Process of the CAB. Internal retooling activities, refresher courses and regular trainings will be</p>

GPH-MNLF Peace Process. Continuing the implementation of remaining commitments, the GPH and the MNLF Panels conducted their 1st Formal Meeting on 11 September 2017 in Ortigas, Pasig City. The parties agreed to seek a clarification from the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) on its commitment to provide funds for projects of the Bangsamoro Development Assistance Fund (BDAF). To facilitate the filling up of seventy (70) posts in the program (for Cordillera), forty-nine (49) validated applications were endorsed to DENR Central Office on 28 July 2017. Of the 49 applications, twenty-eight (28) were approved for hiring; the remaining twenty-one (21) applications are still undergoing review. A total of five hundred forty-five (545) qualified individuals were employed under the DENR-OPAPP Forest Guard Program at the end of September 2017.</p>
