I. Terms & Conditions

- a) The ABC is inclusive of applicable taxes.
- b) Bid offer exceeding the ABC shall be automatically disqualified.
- c) The bid offer must be valid for Thirty (30) calendar days upon receipt by the procuring entity.
- d) Documentary requirements must be submitted on or before the deadline of submission of bids. Late bids will not be accepted.

If you intend to send your bids through a courier, please ensure that we shall receive it before the deadline of submission of bid.

e) Bids must be submitted in a sealed envelope with the (i) bidder's complete (postal) address; & (ii) telephone number, fax and email address printed under its postal address.

Unsealed bids will not be accepted.

- f) All quotations shall be considered as fixed price and not subject to price escalation. I should include also all necessary fees, i.e. fees for crew and staff, parking fees and the likes.
- g) Subcontracting is not allowed.
- h) The procuring entity may require the supplier/distributor for product demonstration to determine the technical compliance of the latter's product.

II. Delivery Period

Within fifteen (15) days from receipt of Job Order.

III. Place of Delivery & Acceptance

IV. Terms of Payment

Full payment shall be made to the supplier or distributor upon issuance of billing statement after the complete delivery of all the goods.

V. Warranty

Replacement of defective unit/s shall be made within seven (7) days from receipt of the supplier or distributor of the formal written notice.

VI. Deadline of Submission of Bids

Bids/Quotations must be submitted on or before SEP 1 2 2018.

The OPAPP reserves the right to reject any and all quotations or bids, declare a failure of bidding or not award the contract in accordance with Section41 of the IRR of R.A. 9184.

The contract will be awarded to the *lowest quotation* and *responsive* to our specifications and requirements.



ABOUT OPAPP



The agency was created through Executive Order No. 125, s. 1993, which was later amended in 2001 with the signing of Executive Order No. 3, s. 2001 as a reaffirmation of the government's commitment to achieving just and lasting peace through a comprehensive peace process.

VISION

A just and lasting peace for the nation and for all Filipinos.

MISSION

To oversee, coordinate, and integrate the implementation of the comprehensive peace process.

Three Principles of the Comprehensive Peace Process

The comprehensive peace process shall continue to be governed by the following underlying principles:

- a. A comprehensive peace process should be community-based, reflecting the sentiments, values, and principles important to all Filipinos. Thus, it shall be defined not by the government alone, nor by the different contending groups only, but by all Filipinos as one community.
- b. A comprehensive peace process aims to forge a new social compact for a just, equitable, humane, and pluralistic society. It seeks to establish a genuinely pluralistic society, where all individuals and groups are free to engage in peaceful competition for predominance of their political programs without fear, through the exercise of rights and liberties guaranteed by the Constitution, and where they may compete for political power through an electoral system that is free, fair, and honest.
- c. A comprehensive peace process seeks a principled and peaceful resolution to the internal armed conflicts, with neither blame nor surrender, but with dignity for all concerned.

The Six Paths to Peace

The components of the comprehensive peace process comprise the processes known as the "Paths to Peace." These component processes are interrelated and not mutually exclusive, and must therefore be pursued simultaneously in a coordinated and integrated fashion. They shall include, but may not be limited to, the following:

- a. PURSUIT OF SOCIAL, ECONOMIC, AND POLITICAL REFORMS. This component involves the vigorous implementation of various policies, reforms, programs, and projects aimed at addressing the root causes of internal armed conflicts, and social unrest. This may require administrative action, new legislation, or even constitutional amendments.
- b. CONSENSUS-BUILDING AND EMPOWERMENT FOR PEACE. This component includes continuing consultations on both national and local levels to build consensus for a peace agenda and process, and the mobilization and facilitation of people's participation in the peace process.
- c. PEACEFUL NEGOTIATED SETTLEMENT WITH DIFFERENT REBEL GROUPS. This component involves the conduct of face-to-face negotiations to reach peaceful settlement with the different rebel groups. It also involves the effective implementation of peace agreements.
- d. PROGRAMS FOR RECONCILIATION, REINTEGRATION INTO MAINSTREAM SOCIETY, AND REHABILITATION. This component includes programs to address the legal status and security of former rebels, as well as community-based assistance programs to address the economic, social, and psychological rehabilitation needs of former rebels, demobilized combatants, and civilian victims of the internal armed conflicts.



- e. ADDRESSING CONCERNS ARISING FROM CONTINUING ARMED HOSTILITIES. This component involves the strict implementation of laws and policy guidelines and the institution of programs to ensure the protection of non-combatants and reduction of the impact of the armed conflict on communities found in conflict areas.
- f. BUILDING AND NURTURING A CLIMATE CONDUCIVE TO PEACE. This component includes peace advocacy and peace education programs and the implementation of various confidence-building measures.
