- b. NAP P/CVE Agency Meeting on STRIVE Asia Project, NICA Compound, Quezon City, 17 January 2020. As preparation to the scheduled visit of the UNOCT relative to the initiative on the STRIVE Asia project, OPAPP attended the inter-agency meeting on the implementation of the NAP P/CVE last 17 January 2020. The objectives of the meeting include discussion on the implementation of NAP P/CVE and the proposed visit of the UNOCT relative to the STRIVE Asia Project. The meeting resulted in the identification of existing and/or proposed projects and programs on P/CVE that require funding support from stakeholders outside the government.
- c. STRIVE Asia Project Scoping Visit, NICA Compound, Quezon City, 22 January 2020. The OPAPP attended the STRIVE Asia Project Scoping Visit on 22 January 2020. The meeting resulted in the identification of possible projects supporting directly and/or indirectly to the work of the law enforcement actors in the area of work for the vulnerable sectors enumerated in the NAP P/CVE such as the Community; Persons Deprived of Liberty with terrorism-related cases (PDL with TRC) in jails and Violent Extremist Offenders (VEOs) in prisons; Religious leaders; Learning institutions (Schools, Colleges, Universities and Madrasah); Social media users; and, Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) and students sent abroad for religious studies. These proposals will be reviewed and considered by the UNOCT for possible funding under the STRIVE Asia Project.
- d. Preparatory Meeting for the Workshop on the Development of the NAP P/CVE Implementation Plan, NICA Compound, Quezon City, 3 March 2020. The OPAPP attended the core group meeting on the development of the NAP P/CVE Implementation Plan on 3 March 2020. Necessary preparations for the upcoming workshop to be held on 10-12 March 2020 were discussed. The meeting was able to gather comments/inputs particularly on the program design of the workshop, as well as, on the NAP P/CVE. OPAPP particularly cited the need to develop a results framework on the NAP P/CVE to develop the desired outputs and outcomes and the corresponding indicators therefor.
- e. Joint High-level Visit of the UN Office of Counter-terrorism (UNOCT) and UN Counter-Terrorism Executive Directorate (CTED) to the Republic of the Philippines, PICC, Pasay City, 2-3 March 2020. OPAPP participated in the Joint High-level Visit of the UN Office of Counterterrorism (UNOCT) and UN Counter-Terrorism Executive Directorate (CTED) to the Republic of the Philippines. During the event, Dir. Padilla-Salvan presented the Philippine Peace Process and the Social Healing and Peacebuilding Approach, and the Joint OPAPP-AFP-LDS Program on Deradicalization and Aftercare for Former Violent Extremists in Lanao del Sur. In coordination with the Office of the DPAPRU for Operations and Area Management Office-Northern Mindanao, the PSPD also facilitated the participation of the following CSO representatives for Cluster 7 on Support to Victims of Terrorism:
  - a. Rev. Fr. Teresito L. Suganob of Pakigdait, Incorporated
  - b. Mr. Richard Rejas of Balay Mindanaw Foundation Inc. (BMFI)
  - c. Ms. Jana Jane Dacobor and Ms. Cyril Mae Q. Salera of the Mindanao Tripartite Youth Core (MTYC)
- f. Workshop on the Development of Implementation Plan for NAP P/CVE, Ciudad Christia Resort, San Mateo, Rizal, 10-12 March 2020. The OPAPP participated in the Workshop on the Development of Implementation Plan for NAP P/CVE on 10-12 March 2020, at Ciudad Christia Resort, in San Mateo, Rizal. The workshop aimed to consolidate and harmonize the commitments of the implementing agencies of the NAP P/CVE.

Dir. Pamela Ann Padilla-Salvan of OPAPP presented the National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security as inputs to the workshop. Other presentations were provided to serve as inputs for the participants. These include the following: "Threat Assessment and Overall Conflict Mapping in the Philippines and the Proposed Amendment of the Human Security Act," the "National Action Plan on P/CVE and its Organizational Structure;" "Updates on the implementation of the NAP P/CVE," "National Action Plan on Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear," "Cybercrime Security," and "Updates on Madrasah."

The participants from different agencies tasked with the implementation of the NAP P/CVE provided inputs on the different interventions laid down in the Plan per cabinet cluster. Afterwards, they were grouped according to the particular vulnerable sector that concerns them and ran through an array of interventions for the assigned vulnerable sector. The workshop resulted to the identification of outputs and outcomes for the interventions and the crafting of an initial implementation plan.

- 3. Poverty Reduction and Anti-Poverty Programs
- a. Technical Inputs on the draft Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of the Magna Carta for the Poor. OPAPP provided technical inputs on the draft Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of the Magna Carta for the Poor and submitted rejoinders to the NAPC's responses on OPAPP's comments/inputs, which were submitted to NAPC on 31 January, 20 February, and 6 March 2020, respectively.

OPAPP highlighted and impressed upon the distinct needs of vulnerable groups considered as poor, particularly the youth, women, and indigenous peoples in conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable areas compared to those that are not affected by armed conflict. OPAPP also recommended undertaking conflict analysis to inform the design and delivery of interventions and the adoption of conflict-sensitive and peace-promoting approach, among others.

b. Technical Inputs on Senate Bills 206 and 392 and House Bill 3985 which were submitted to HDRPC on 31 January 2020. OPAPP provided technical inputs on the priority bills namely "Amendments to the Solo Parent's Act of 2000 and the Barangay Health Worker's Act of the Human Development and Poverty Reduction Cluster. OPAPP proposed for additional benefits that would help solo parents including those who situation was caused by the impact of armed conflict. It also proposed for the inclusion of "man-made calamities" and conflict-sensitive and peace promoting disaster response and preparedness, among others.

OPAPP Planning and Adoption of Performance Management System (PGS)

a. OPAPP Conflict Sensitive and Peace-Promoting Conflict-Sensitive and PeacePromoting (CSPP) Planning, 11-13 February 2020. Based on the OPAPP Strategic Framework for FY 2019-2022, one of the targeted outputs identified under Outcome 2 (Communities in conflictaffected and conflict-vulnerable areas protected and developed) is to capacitate targeted local government units (LGUs) on CSPP to be able to integrate its concepts and approaches into their Local Development and Peace and Order Plans. OPAPP, being the agency integrating efforts towards the achievement of Outcome 2, needs to be capacitated on CSPP Planning.

The Policy and Strategic Planning Department (PSPD) and Resource Management Department (RMD) in collaboration with the Monitoring, Evaluation, accountability and Learning Department (MEALD) designed a planning program which was conducted on 11-13 Febraury 2020 and resulted to the capacitation of all OPAPP Executive and Management Committee members and Senior Technical Staff on the CSPP concepts and its approaches. A checklist to ensure that the OPAPP plans are CSPP compliant was also developed.

b. OPAPP Adoption of Performance Governance System (PGS). The Performance Governance System (PGS) for the OPAPP was introduced in November 2019 with the aim to structure and enhance institutional systems, processes and capacities (e.g. planning, programming, budgeting, and monitoring and reporting) and to institutionalize these improvements through translating OPAPP's vision into actionable strategies. OPAPP is currently undertaking PGS interventions under the Initiation Stage (Phase 1), which started with the conduct of Strategic Positioning on 25 November 2019.

The conduct of Strategic Positioning identified and set OPAPP's medium-term and long-term direction through strategic goals and impact statements. The impact and higher-level outcomes have been articulated in impact statements with corresponding performance indicators as measures of success. The OPAPP Strategic Position/Focus, Impact Statements, and Skeletal Strategy Map with the draft Key Results Areas were crafted as outputs of the session/workshop. As finalized by the OPAPP Management Committee, the OPAPP Strategic Position is to have "Peace Agreements Fully Implemented by 2022".

Following the Strategic Positioning was the conduct of **Strategy Formulation** intervention held on 27-28 February 2020. The intervention furthered the details of OPAPP's strategy. Anchored on the crafted strategic position for OPAPP, the participants, composed of OPAPP Program Administrators and Senior Technical Staffs, identified the organization's strategic objectives composed of the core and support processes. Strategic deliverables and success indicators under each program roadmap have also been identified for the operationalization of the strategy and performance measure and tracking.

#### 2nd Quarter

- 1. Mainstreaming and Promotion of Peace Education in Formal Educational Institutions and Non-Formal Organizations. The OPAPP, provided technical inputs on the request of the Department of Education for Core Messages on Disaster Risk Reduction, Climate Change Adaptation and Peace Education, which were submitted on 1 April 2020. OPAPP provided proposed enhancements to some of the draft messages and included further explanation on the topics of violence, conflict, peace, culture of peace, and peacebuilding, which can be used in the development of lesson exemplars. It also stressed the imperative to clarify what is meant by direct and indirect violence to better explain the gravity and scale of its effects, and that culture of peace encompasses living in harmony with earth and imparting a message among students that long-term physical, cultural, structural and environmental violence contribute to the exacerbation of climate change and its effects, among others.
- 2. Mainstreaming Conflict-Sensitive and Peace Promoting (CSPP) Approaches. OPAPP collaborated with DILG, Ateneo de Davao Resource Center for Local Governance and German Development Cooperation-Conflict Sensitive Resource and Asset Management (GIZ-COSERAM) for the development and publication of the Guidebook and the Facilitator's Manuals on Mainstreaming Conflict-Sensitivity and Peace-Promotion in the Comprehensive Development Plans (CSPP-CDP). These knowledge products were designed to provide the LGUs in conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable areas with a reference guide and a practical tool kit they can utilize in adopting a conflict-sensitive and peace-promoting framework in local development planning.

The printing and delivery of the 700 sets of the Guidebook and Facilitator's Manuals to OPAPP was completed. These will be distributed to identified conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable LGUs in partnership with the DILG-Bureau of Local Government Development and the Area Management Offices of OPAPP.

- 3. Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism (PCVE)
- Technical Inputs on the Draft Revised IRR for AO 10, s. 2018, as amended by AO 25, s. 2020

OPAPP, through the PSPD, along with the NAP WPS Division-SHAPED, Legal Affairs Department and PAMANA NPM, provided technical inputs on the draft revised IRR for AO 10, s. 2018, as amended by AO 25, s. 2020, submitted on 4 May 2020 to the Task Force Balik-Loob (TFBL). The AO 25, s. 2020 "Amending Administrative Order No. 10 (S. 2018), Entitled "Centralizing All Government Efforts for the Reintegration of Former Rebels and Creating for the purpose an Interagency Task Force", was issued last 18 March 2020, in a move to include former violent extremists as beneficiaries of the Reintegration Program in the form of Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program (E-CLIP) and PAMANA Program.

In its submission, OPAPP emphasized the inclusion of "gender-responsive," "culture-sensitive" and 
"age-appropriate" as among the characteristics and the goals of the program; inclusion of families 
and communities as beneficiaries of E-CLIP; provision of more details on the composition of each 
of the clusters for FRs and FVEs, e.g., qualification of head of clusters, duties and responsibilities; 
gender-disaggregated database; inclusion of gender-focused activities and sessions inculcating 
peace within one's self and with others, participation of the civil society to participate in the 
implementation of the reintegration program to harness the whole-of-nation approach and their 
familiarity and proximity to the beneficiaries and local implementers, among others. These were 
incorporated in the revised draft presented by the TFBL.

# b. Participation in Task-Force Balik-Loob

The OPAPP participated in a meeting convened by the TFBL on 26 May 2020 to discuss the draft revised IRR for AO 10, s. 2018, as amended by AO 25 and gather more inputs on the same. OPAPP was represented by the PSPD, through Dir. Pamela Ann Padilla-Salvan and Ms. Rowena T. Lopez. During the meeting, OPAPP representatives raised the observation that the National Action Plan on Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism (NAP-PCVE) does not particularly identify "surfacing violent extremists" as among the identified vulnerable sectors in the NAP PCVE. Hence, they are not included in target beneficiaries of interventions outlined in the Plan. OPAPP underscored the need to update the NAP PCVE. Furthermore, OPAPP emphasized the importance of establishing a monitoring, evaluation, accountability and learning system to ensure the program addresses implementation issues and concerns; evaluates the progress in relation to the achievement of outputs, outcomes and impacts; lessons learned and best practices to rantineation of the CAB by building the capacities of relevant actors to sustain peace through the mitigati

On 24 June 2020, OPAPP, represented by PSPD and NAPWPS Division-SHAPED participated in the TFBL Monthly meeting aimed to present and discuss the draft Joint Memorandum Circular (JMC) for the Implementation of E-CLIP for Former Violent Extremists and the draft Task Force Balik-Loob Data Sharing Agreement. During the meeting, OPAPP provided technical inputs relative to the remuneration of the turned-in firearms of the former violent extremists; sourcing of community project funds from the percentage paid on the turned-in firearms; and adapting -a community-driven development approach and process.

OPAPP further provided technical inputs on the draft JMC submitted on 25 June 2020 upon provision of the Secretariat of the copy of the presentation. These include ensuring consistency with the list of benefits outlined in the draft revised IRR for AO 10, s. 2018, as amended by AO 25, s. 2020; inclusion of moral, religious, social, cultural, and identity interventions; as well as health assistance or health protection and educational assistance for FVEs who would want to finish school or take college courses, bearing in mind, that there are teenage FVEs who dropped out of school; and, ensuring the sustainability of the program by extending monitoring of the cases beyond 12 months which is the proposed timeline of the program.

c. Technical Inputs on the Draft Revised IRR for AO 10, s. 2018, as amended by AO 25, s. 2020

As agreed during the TFBL meeting on 26 May 2020, member agencies shall provide additional comments on the draft IRR towards finalizing the same. POPAPP, through PSPD, provided further comments and inputs on the draft revised IRR for AO 10, s. 2018, as amended by AO 25, s. 2020, which were submitted on 28 May 2020. OPAPP recommended, among others, that a component on the Culture of Peace training and peace conversations be included in the proposed interventions for the Former Rebels, similar to those proposed for the Former Violent Extremists, as well as, inclusion of "communities" as beneficiaries of the reintegration program to ensure that the program is holistic and comprehensive to address violent extremism.

# d. NAP PCVE Meeting with Security, Justice, Peace Cabinet Cluster, 15 June 2020

On 15 June 2020, OPAPP participated in the Core Group Meeting of Security, Justice and Peace Cluster on the NAP PCVE, organized by the DILG through the PCVE PMO through video teleconferencing. It was attended by the permanent and alternate representatives of OPAPP, DND, DOJ, NCMF, DSWD, and DFA. OPAPP was represented by members of PSPD and NAPWPS Division-SHAPED.

The said meeting discussed the output of the Security, Justice and Peace Cluster during the Implementation Plans Workshop held last 10-12 March 2020 at Ciudad Christia, Resort, 9 Waves, San Mateo, Rizal. The consolidated plans of those agencies were presented. OPAPP, along with the SJPCC member agencies provided inputs and comments on the programs/projects and agencies that will also be involved in the implementation of their respective NAP PCVE interventions. The meeting resulted in the agreement that member-agencies shall determine which among their interventions will be prioritized, are feasible to implement given the COVID situation and how to adapt the minimum public health standards and comply with the IATF guidelines and protocols in the implementation of the identified interventions.

Provision of Technical Inputs to the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) Technical Inputs on the ASEAN-US Joint Vision Statement. The OPAPP, through PSPD, provided technical inputs on the draft ASEAN-US Joint Vision Statement, specifically on the areas of "Developing Human Capital," "Strengthening Security Capacity" and "Supporting Responsive Governments." Among its pertinent recommendations include the addition of addressing traditional security challenges including promotion of disarmament, arms control, nuclear non-proliferation, cybersecurity, enhancing border security and non-traditional security challenges particularly preventing, countering and transforming violent extremism and fostering a culture of peace through implementation of peacebuilding programs, ensuring and strengthening the participation of women and youth, differently- abled persons, elderly and other marginalized sectors in the development and implementation of policies and programs that contribute to peace and security, social protection and human development, etc. Technical Inputs on the Zero Draft Plan of Action to Implement the Joint Declaration on Comprehensive Partnership between ASEAN and the UN (2021-2025). On 14 May 2020, OPAPP provided technical inputs on the maximum and minimum Philippine negotiating positions and priorities on relevant thematic issues in the Zero Draft Plan of Action (POA) to Implement the Joint Declaration on Comprehensive Partnership between ASEAN and the UN (2021-2025). OPAPP underscored the different phases of peacebuilding which includes peacekeeping, peacemaking, conflict prevention and conflict transformation and the utilization of ASEAN Institute of Peace and Reconciliation and the ASEAN Women for Peace Registry in the promotion of Women, Peace and Security. It also highlighted the provision of support by UN mechanisms to the implementation of individual ASEAN member states' national action plans on preventing and countering Violent Extremism such as that of the Philippines. As lead peacebuilding agency, it stressed the promotrantineation of the CAB by building the capacities of relevant actors to sustain peace through the mitigation of factors driving alienation and radicalization, and through a more inclusive peace process characterized by all-Moro Technical Inputs on the 5th ASEAN-Norway Joint Sectoral Committee (AN-JSCC) Meeting. OPAPP, through PSPD, provided technical inputs on the 5th ASEAN-Norway JSCC Meeting scheduled to be held on 4 June 2020 via videoconference, particularly on key priority issues that the Philippines may raise during the AN-JSCC, including other possible areas of cooperation between ASEAN and Norway, as well as, suggestions on areas of cooperation or possible projects and programs that can be undertaken by ASEAN with Norway. These were submitted on 26 May 2020 to the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA). OPAPP recommended areas of cooperation which the Philippines and Norway may continue to pursue to further their bilateral relations and partnership, which include conduct of regional dialogues, training and technical advice to support ASEAN's efforts in the implementation of the Joint Statement on Promoting Women Peace and Security in ASEAN and provision of support and promotion of women, peace and security through its ASEAN Institute for Peace and Reconciliation (AIPR) and the ASEAN Women for Peace Registry (AWPR), and provision of support to ASEAN member states' implementation of their individual National Action Plans on Women, Peace and Security (NAPWPS); continued partnership and support relative to the Bangsamoro peace process, particularly in the implementation of decommissioning of the MILF forces and weapons under the normalization program and in monitoring the implementation of the ceasefire between the forces of the GPH and the MILF; and, promotion of inclusive governance and social cohesion, addrerantineation of the CAB by building the capacities of relevant actors to sustain peace through the mitigation of factors driving alienation and radicalization, and through a more inclusive peace process characterized by Technical Inputs on the President's Key Messages at 36th ASEAN Summit submitted on 26 May 2020 OPAPP, through PSPD, submitted proposed key messages for the President to deliver at the 36th ASEAN Summit, on 26 May 2020, to the DFA. These messages include the following, inter alia: Call for the support from the ASEAN Community and partners for ASEAN member states pursuing peace and development in troubled and conflict-ridden portions of their territorial jurisdiction through provision of humanitarian support to conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable communities to adapt to risks of COVID-19 as a foundation to effectively resume the implementation of the peace agreements forged with non-state groups; Emphasize the importance of addressing the impact of the pandemic among the vulnerable sectors, such as, women, children, youth, elderly, differently-abled; Eurther emphasize the importance of the participation of these vulnerable groups in the development and implementation of gender-responsive, conflict- and culture- sensitive, and peace promoting policies and programs; and, There must be continued and convergent efforts by all sectors of society to contain and prevent the spread and eliminate the threat of the COVID19 in order to protect the people and mitigate the social, economic and security impacts of the COVID19 pandemic crisis and call for

collaboration among ASEAN governments in addressing the impact of the pandemic to the region.

Disaster Management and People's Participation.

e. Technical Inputs on the ASEAN Vision Statement. The OPAPP, through PSPD, provided technical inputs on the draft ASEAN Vision Statement, which were submitted on 18 June 2020. Said inputs focused on the areas of Security, Women in Peace, Security and Development,

OPAPP underscored the need to ensure that geographically isolated and disadvantaged areas and most vulnerable communities especially those in conflict-affected areas have access to or are provided with public goods,establish mechanisms and strengthen existing cooperation and strategies in response to the possible subsequent occurrence of human-induced and natural disasters, causing double vulnerabilities which can further decrease the capacities of communities to respond, and implementing multi-sectoral approaches to fully address the issues and concerns during the occurrence of such, as well as assuring adaptation and resilience of communities in times of disasters. It further emphasized the importance of undertaking responsive and timely measures addressing the impact of the pandemic among the vulnerable sectors, such as, women, children, youth, elderly, differently-abled, taking into account other vulnerabilities caused by the intersectionality of natural disasters and armed conflict, among others.

f. Technical Inputs on the ASEAN Chairman's Statement. On 19 June 2020, OPAPP, through PSPD, submitted technical inputs on the ASEAN Chairman's Statement for the 36<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Summit. OPAPP recommended the inclusion of the maritime, agriculture and migrant sectors in among the sectors affected by COVID-19.

OPAPP, in furtherance of its mandates, also put forth the need for the ASEAN member states to recognize the importance of creating democratic spaces for dialogues between governments and communities to surface, discuss, and resolve issues that are the root of, resulting from or affecting armed conflict, violent extremism and terrorism and for cooperation in building cohesive relationships among the member states and their peoples through inter-faith and intra-faith, as well as inter- and intra-cultural dialogues, to emphasize our shared humanity in pursuit of peace and stability in the region and providing spaces for the participation of women, youth, elderly, differently-abled, cultural minorities, and other vulnerable groups in various spaces for peacebuilding.

- g. Technical Inputs on the ASEAN Political Security Community Report at 36<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Summit. OPAPP, through PSPD, provided technical inputs on the ASEAN Political Security Community Report at 36<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Summit, on 19 June 2020. In its submission, OPAPP put forth activities and interventions that it participated in at the region-wide level, mostly pertaining to violent extremism and women, peace and security. It recommended the inclusion of the Manila Declaration to Counter the Rise of Radicalisation and Violent Extremism adopted in 2017. It also proposed for the highlight of the Symposium on the Establishment of the ASEAN Women for Peace Registry held in December 2018 and was organized by the Philippine Permanent Mission to ASEAN, in cooperation with OPAPP, Ateneo de Manila University and the Royal Norwegian Government; as well as, the Regional Training on Women, Peace and Security held in Jakarta, Indonesia, on 8-10 April 2019 and the first regional symposium on Implementing Women, Peace and Security Agerantineation of the CAB by building the capacities of relevant actors to sustain peace through the mitigation of factors driving alienation and radicalizati
- h. Technical Inputs on the Draft ASEAN Regional Forum Statement on the Treatment of Children Recruited and Associated with Terrorist and Violent Extremist Groups. The Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA)-Office of the ASEAN Affairs requested agencies for inputs on the draft ASEAN Regional Forum (ARF) Statement on the Treatment of Children Recruited and Associated with Terrorist and Violent Extremist Groups. In response, OPAPP, on 28 June 2020, provided technical inputs on the said draft which include citing that the focus should also include rescue, aside from rehabilitation, and reintegration and that these should be pursued within the framework of restorative justice, social rehabilitation and promotion of the children's protection and that ARF member states must ensure that the children, their families and communities are consulted in the design and implementation of gender-responsive, age-appropriate, culture- and conflict-sensitive and peace promoting programs for their rehabilitation and reintegratrantineation of the CAB by building the cap

## a. Joint Body on the Disposition of Arms and Forces (JBDAF)

- OPAPP participated in the demilitarization of 41 firearms, 54 explosives and 2,198 pieces of ammunition (FEAs) at Camp Sergio Osmeña, Cebu City, Cebu on 13 February 2020, organized by Police Regional Office (PRO) VII. The demilitarized FEAs were inventoried and accounted by PRO VII on 14 September 2019. PRO VII plans to make a memorabilia, plaque, or symbolic peace monument at the PDC Site in Tanjay, Negros Oriental from the demilitarized FAEs.
- The JB-DAF conducted assessment visits from 5 to 12 March 2020 in the areas of Cauyan, San Carlos, and Bago City, Negros Occidental and Janiuay, Iloilo. The JBDAF agreed to set a meeting with the concerned units of the AFP together with the JEMC to discuss and resolve issues on CDU matters to improve its implementation.
- For the month of January, the OPAPP facilitated and monitored the delivery of 267 sacks of nice from NFA to all CDU members in various barangays or detachments within the Settlement Sites.
- On 27 February 2020, a memorandum requesting for the approval and release of the financial support of PhP 2,000.00/month, to qualified members of CAFGU Active Auxiliary (CAA) was approved. Two hundred and sixty-six (266) members of the Community Defense Units received a total amount of PhP 4,000 each (November-December 2019) as part of their financial support in pursuant to Executive Order No. 94. Indespensible

### b. Socio-Economic Reintegration Cluster (SERC)

During SERC meeting held on 22 January 2020 at the Katapatan Conference Hall in DSWD Central Office, the SERC member agencies reiterated their commitment to support the establishment of settlement sites and complement the previously granted interventions to the KAPATIRAN, specifically the Livelihood Settlement Grant (LSG) program implemented in partnership with DSWD. Further, the meeting resulted in an agreement among agencies led by NEDA to craft a monitoring framework to properly monitor the different activities and initiatives of different agencies, submission of bi-monthly reports to the SERC Chairperson, designation of focal person in charge of coordinating updates on assistance to KAPATIRAN members, submission of proposals on possible programs of member agencies of the SERC for the KAPATIRAN, conduct of a joint site visit in KAPATIRAN settlement communities, and OPAPP to provide different agencies with the profile of KAPATIRAN members and the settlement areas.

a) Mrs. Tabara, KAPATIRAN Chairperson and JEMC Member, presented KAPATIRAN's assessment on the implementation of Livelihood Settlement Grants (LSG) as well as updates on the status of released PhP 50,000.00 each to the 724 members. It was reported that members do not have the full PhP 50,000.00 amount because they have agreed on an equity sharing design (ex. 20-20-10, 10-30-10, etc.) to invest the LSG. There are specific amounts allotted for individual, chapter/group and national projects or enterprise. Current fund pooled for the National Chapter has a total of PhP 5,121,000.00 waiting for final contribution from Bago City. Majority of the chapters have pooled starting capital as follows:

This modification is a product of a consensus among the KAPATIRAN. The SERC agreed document the changes made as part of transparency and accountability in which the KAPATIRAN is to submit the following: (1) resolutions from the chapters or members, (2) proposals for the individual, chapter/group, and national projects, and (3) work and financial plan (WFP) (as applicable).

- d) For the capacity building, SLP-NPMO in collaboration with OPAPP, will facilitate capacitybuilding activities, wherein partner agencies and private partners will be tapped to facilitate complementary supports.
- e) The meeting with the JEMC was followed by an interim meeting on LSG of the KAPATIRAN on 7 February 2020 attended by OPAPP, SERC Chairperson, and DSWD focal persons for LSG and Case management. In this meeting, the body tackled and agreed on the preparatory activities for the Joint Site Visit to be conducted on 19 February 2020; the arrangements, participants and facilitators relative to the conduct of three-day Community-based Micro-Enterprise Development Training (MEDT); initial steps for data sharing; operational concerns; and, documents for compliance of the KAPATIRAN relative to the equity sharing design implemented for the individual, group and national chapter LSG projects. The documents to be submitted by the KAPATIRAN is part of transparency and accountably in the implementation of LSG. In connection to the case management, DSWD will draft and formulate a guide document or design a process flow to harmonize the case management with the LSG to maximize the resources. Finally, the SERC wilrantineation of the CAB by building the capacities of relevant actors to sustain peace through the mitigation of factors driving alienation and radicalizati

SERC members namely DA, DPWH, DepEd, DOST, DOLE, DTI, DSWD, DENR, DILG, OPAPP, TESDA, CHED, AFP, NEA, NIA, NHA and PHIC were oriented on the purpose function of the SERC on 19 February 2020 in Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. Locotan, Kabankalan City, Negros Occidental. Updates on the implementation of programs for the establishment of the settlement site was provided as well.

After the joint site visit, a follow-through meeting with SERC Chairperson Usec. Paje was conducted on 2 March 2020 to discuss the following matters: updates on the recently conducted Kabankalan Settlement Site Visit; details of the scheduled Cauayan Site Visit; schedule for the SERC meeting in March; status of livelihood projects of Aklan Chapter; and, draft MOU/MOA with agencies and GoNegosyo.

On 9 March 2020, SERC Chairperson Usec. Paje accompanied by JEMC Member and personnel of DSWD and OPAPP paid a courtesy call to the Provincial Local Government Unit of Negros Occidental and San Carlos City, respectively. Exploring engagements for the supervision of the KAPATIRAN Chapter during the initial stage of the enterprise development, and to harmonize the ongoing and incoming support for the KAPATIRAN.

From Bacolod City, SERC Chairperson was able to visit the KAPATIRAN members in Sitio Punod, Brgy. Prosperidad, San Carlos City.

Usec. Paje met with Mayor Rene Gustilo of San Carlos City. The team was also able to visit a KAPATIRAN stall along Don Salvador Benedicto while traversing San Carlos to Bacolod route.

- Continued capacity building support for the implementation of the livelihood projects pursued by the KAPATIRAN through:
- a. Micro-Enterprise Development Training (MEDT). The MEDT aims to increase the basic technical knowledge and skills that will aid the KAPATIRAN in developing their micro-enterprise. This training will tackle micro entrepreneurship, basic accounting, bookkeeping, and microenterprise feasibility study.

Final date and logistical requirements were set during the preparatory meeting with DSWD RO VI on 22 February 2020. The KAPATIRAN Chapter Officers, composed of Socio-economic Committee (SEC), Site Coordinator and President, underwent the trainings which aims to capacitate the officers on micro entrepreneurship, basic accounting, bookkeeping, and microenterprise feasibility study to develop their micro-enterprise management skills.

A total of 118 KAPATIRAN members were underwent the MEDT, below is the breakdown per KAPATIRAN Chapter:

- Additional interventions supporting the KAPATIRAN livelihood projects;
- As part of capacitating the chapter towards livelihood project sustainability, a Sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT) and organic farming training was conducted from 3 to 5 March 2020 by Mr. Edward Tresico and Jun Ledesma from TESDA. After the training all 15 participants had a practicum on SALT in the Ibajay settlement site. To ensure that the chapter will make use of the new technology they have acquired, the following agreements are to be observed.
- Final work and financial plans, cash flow and calendar of activities were accomplished through a series of planning sessions among the KAPATIRAN Socio-Economic Committee (SEC), Socio-Economic Team (SET), represented by Mr. Nestor Quijano, and OPAPP field staff, in the different chapters from January to February 2020.

- Specific responsibilities were identified among the Kapatiran Luzon through a learning session which was facilitated by the Socio-Econ Team, such as: bookkeeping procedures to assist in the cash flow management of grants from DSWD; accounting of funds released under the LSG Program; balance to date was updated; schedule of expenses were projected based on the community enterprise to be undertaken from March to August 2020; and, formulation of the chapter's projected income-expense statement and cash flow.
- On 5 February, JEMC Co-Chair Usec. Cesar Yano and OPAPP representative met with NWRB Exec. Director Dr. Sevillo David. JEMC Co-Chair instructed the OPAPP to facilitate the compliance of requirements on the following projects:
- ground water sourcing;
- hydrological piping system and management;
- and water permit application for the KAPATIRAN settlement sites.
- The meeting further resulted to tapping of possible assistance of some international NGOs that provide small grants for water projects.
- In Negros Oriental, the OPAPP and Provincial Engineer's Office came up with specific activities and a new implementation timeline that would best address the issue on the delayed implementation of the eight (8) road projects in Negros Oriental through a meeting held in the Office of the Provincial Engineer, Capitol Area, Dumaguete City on 7 February 2020. The meeting resulted to the following consensus points:
- A site visit and a quantification of physical accomplishment was scheduled on the last week of February 2020 onwards; and,
- The body agreed to set the tentative timeline of implementation starting middle of May and expected to be physically completed by December 2020.
- Pursuit of a partnership with GoNegosyo to help strengthen the capacities of the KAPATIRAN in managing micro-enterprises.
- A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) among DA, DND, OPAPP with Go Negosyo has been drafted and submitted to Go Negosyo for their review, after Usec. Cesar Yano and OPAPP Director met with Presidential Adviser on Entrepreneurship and GoNegosyo founder Joey Concepcion on 4 February 2020 to discuss a possible partnership concerning livelihood programs for the KAPATIRAN. The MOU will officialize a partnership among mentioned parties to support and implement the CID.
- d. Partnership with the Jaime Ongpin Foundation, leading to the donation of goats for additional livelihood project to be undertaken by the KAPATIRAN in Aklan.
- Sustained implementation of social and economic programs such as the provision of health insurance through the PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program, and provision of educational assistance through the OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED Study Grant Program
- a. PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program. A total of four hundred fifteen (415) profiled KAPATIRAN members and eight thousand eight hundred forty-four (8,844) individuals from the identified CPD areas were endorsed for renewal. These eligible individuals were submitted to PAMANA NPMD on 17 January 2020, for endorsement to PhilHealth. Below is the summary per province:

b. OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED Study Grant Program. OPAPP/PAMANA grantees were endorsed to the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) for inclusion in the Expanded Listahan database. The Expanded Listahanan list shall be submitted and adopted by the UNIFAST Board to ensure that students who need additional financial assistance shall be included under Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act of 2017. As a result, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) will endorse the list of student beneficiaries to DSWD Field Offices to facilitate the verification and validation processes which will run from the month of April to September 2020 (2nd and 3rd quarters).

4. Continued development of settlement sites, in partnership with regional, provincial and local government units and offices. From January to March, the OPAPP facilitated meetings and consultations between the KAPATIRAN and NHA relative to the pending land acquisition in the Bago City and Janiuay, lloilo settlement sites. These lands will be utilized as production areas for the chapters' respective LSG projects.

On 12 February 2020, the new AFP Chief Engineer paid a courtesy visit in OPAPP, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. Details and updates on AFP implemented projects for socio-economic development and confidence building initiatives for the KAPATIRAN and future engagements/projects that the AFP Corps of Engineers can implement in partnership with OPAPP were discussed during the meeting. The new AFP Task Force on Infrastructure Development (TFID) Commander, BGEN William Ilagan, committed to continuously implement the construction projects under PAMANA 2017 MOA and OPAPP-AFP 2019 MOA.

Implementation of Site Development Projects. The child development center project under 2018 PAMANA-DSWD fund with counterpart from the Local Government Unit of San Carlos amounting to PhP850,000.00 and PhP 725,000.00 respectively was officially turned over to the Barangay LGU in Sitio Malindog, Brgy. Palampas, San Carlos City on 26 February 2020.

On 4 March 2020, the ground preparatory scraping in Ibajay settlement site for the security facility was conducted in the afternoon. The activity was led by the Aklan Provincial Engineer's Office and monitored by the OPAPP.

On March 9, 2020, the 542<sup>nd</sup> Engineering Construction Battalion, AFP installed a 2 horse power water pump to operationalize the unserviceable small water impounding system (SWIS), a project of DENR Kabankalan in 2015, located in the Peace and Development Community (PDC) site in Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. Locotan, Kabankalan City, Negros Occidental. As of to date, the water impounding is now functional for both the temporary shelters and the site in general.

On 20 March 20202, the construction of additional comfort rooms in the Cadiz Settlement Site was implemented by the office of Mayor Salvador Escalante of Cadiz. LGU Cadiz also provided additional materials for the construction.

 Adopted the legal strategies to hasten the disposition of cases filed against Kapatiran as agreed by the Joint Enforcement Monitoring Committee (JEMC) and the Presidential Committee on Bail, Recognizance and Pardon (PCBReP) Secretariat Head.

#### Release of Alleged Political Prisoners

From 20 January to 11 February 2020, the OPAPP verified status of KAPATIRAN cases in the province of Negros Occidental by sending letters to different Courts of Justice in Silay City and Bacolod City. Per letter, the courts were requested to provide updates on cases of five (5) KAPATIRAN members. The updating of cases, through the issuance of court certification, was undertaken in preparation of the convening of the Presidential Committee on Bail, Recognizance and Pardon (PCBReP) Secretariat to determine those who would merit recommendation for bail, recognizance, or pardon.

JEMC Co-Chair Usec. Cesar Yano met with DOJ Usec. Deo Marco in OPAPP, Ortigas on 20 February 2020. Agenda of the meeting was to formulate a strategy (legal assistance/remedies) that would accelerate the process towards the disposition of cases filed against the members of the Kapatiran. Adhering to the consensus points of the meeting, a set of lists were provided to the office of Usec Marco for their reference in the convening of the PCBReP Secretariat in May or June of 2020.

- 6. Support to the effective implementation of Executive Order No. 70;
- a. In compliance to the implementation of EO 70 Whole of Nation Approach, Regions VI and VII
  established the Regional Task Force to End Localized Communist Armed Conflict (RTF-ELCAC).
- b. As co-lead with the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) in the Localized Peace Engagement (LPE) Cluster, PAPRU designated MGen Dinoh A Dolina (Ret) to represent OPAPP in the RTF VI and VII. The OPAPP has already assigned a field staff to serve a focal person for field operations, in coordination with OPAPP's LPE Department (LPED). For the first quarter, two (2) regular RTF-ELCAC VI Technical Working Group meetings were conducted wherein accomplishments as well as issues and concerns of the different Lines of Efforts (LOEs) were presented and discussed. The OPAPP presented updates on the EO 70 implementation.
- c. The OPAPP coordinated with the DILG Provincial Offices in Negros Occidental and Oriental as part of the LPE initiative to engage with stakeholders. In two separate meetings, MGen Dolina met with DILG Negros Oriental PD Johnjoan Mende and DILG Negros Occidental PD Atty. Ferdinand Panes and discussed the conduct of an inter-agency meeting through the Provincial TF-ELCAC, and come up with a concrete action plan to implement the LPE in the provincial level. Said action plan shall be presented to CORDS Roy Cimatu upon concurrence of Negros Oriental Governor Roel Degamo, and Negros Occidental Governor Eugenio Jose Lacson.
- d. During the launching of the Retooled Community Support Program (RCSP), OPAPP participated during its pilot launch dubbed as Serbisyo Negrosanon in the Municipality of Isabela, Negros Occidental where a caravan of multi-agency services was showcased.
- e. As part of information dissemination of the EO 70, OPAPP focal served as resource person during a forum sponsored by the University of St. La Salle in Bacolod City. The forum also had speakers from DILG; 301<sup>st</sup> Brigade, AFP, PA; Negros Occidental Provincial PNP; and Diocese of San Carlos City Social Action Center.
- 2. Re-engagement with the Nilo de la Cruz Group (NDCG)
- a. On 21 January 2020, The Office of Undersecretary for Operations convened a meeting with the AFP Peace and Development Office, PNP Peace Process and Development Center, Police Regional Office VI (PRO VI), 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division representative, JEMC representative, Mio Ibrado, Jr, to assess the current status of the NDCG.
- b. The assessment meeting resulted to an official position of government which is to pursue peace process with the NDCG but with emphasis on the completion of commitments under the Peace Agreement and with full observance of the Ceasefire Agreement.

- c. Specific initial steps were likewise identified for the re-engagement: initial engagement with Rustico Cutanda on the ground to build rapport and regain trust; establish open line communication; and, determine the number of firearms and members, to include their areas of presence. The body agreed to accomplish the initial steps by 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of the year.
- d. The body further agreed to prepare update reports and submit to the JBDAF, which in turn shall furnish the JEMC for discussion and further guidance, copy furnish the Office of the Undersecretary for Operations.

Completion of the 2011 Memorandum of Agreement with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA – CPLA)

The completion strategy for the CBA-CPLA Peace Process has a two-track approach:

- Normalization process (5 years) of CBA-CPLA members and identified communities, with the
  overall objective of transformation into active partners for a peaceful and developing Cordillera
  Region free from CPP-NPA and other threats groups of the former CPLA combatants guided by the
  following principles:
- Transform support the transformation of the CBA-CPLA, building on gains since the 1986 Sipat. This will cover four levels of transformation: (i) individuals; (ii) CBA-CPLA as a former armed organization; (iii) communities supportive to the peace process; and (iv) their relationship with the Philippine Government and its instrumentalities-"From leaders of war to leaders of development and influential advocates of peace; meaningful participation in decision making processes in their communities."
- Sustain sustain the gains of the Cordillera peace process by giving back to communities supportive to the CBA-CPLA;
- Include in the spirit of the Mt Data Sipat, support inclusive regional growth by prioritizing tribal communities that have lagged behind due to conflict and geographic isolation.

The 5-Year Normalization Plan has the following components: (i) Security Component; (ii) Socio-Economic Reintegration Component; (iii) Transitional Justice Component; and (iv) Confidence Building Component.

The Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC), created during the last quarter of 2019, will serve as the mechanism to collate, discuss, analyze and implement interventions of completing the commitments of the government for the CBA-CPLA Peace Process. It will be composed of an (i) Executive Committee; (ii) Secretariat (inter-agency, with OPAPP as the lead); and four (4) subclusters corresponding to each of the components. Government representatives to the JEMC come from the relevant regional line agencies in Cordillera Administrative Region, AFP, PNP, CBA-CPLA representation come from each of the factions/group, and representatives from Civil Society Organizations, nominated by the CBA-CPLA with concurrence by government representatives.

Further, in consonance with the principle of honoring all signed peace agreements, Government will continue to sustain programs and projects under the 2011 MOA.

Provision of support to regional development advocacies towards helping the Cordillera Autonomy Bill be declared as a priority agenda of the Administration and be considered a common legislative agenda.

As of reporting period, the following were accomplished:



- · Security Component: Engr Villamor Basilan of United Cordillera Peoples Organization, Inc.

Program has been a big support (and continues to be) to 428 (86% of the 498) former CPLA members and/or their next-of-kin since 13 March 2014 upon the start of their employment as Bantay Gubat. Through this employment, several of the Bantay Gubat have acquired personal motorcycles, while others have invested in house renovations. Through the years, some of them opted to resign as Bantay Gubat for several reasons, i.e. elected as barangay official, relocation, search for more lucrative job because of acquired skills, among others. However, replacements were accommodated through the regular application process with proper endorsement from their leaders or elders.


# Number of Female Bantay Gubat in Cordillera

Of the 498 employed Bantay Gubat, 69 are women coming from across the six provinces in Cordillera. Kalinga employs the largest number with thirty (30) women or 43% of the total while Ifugao has the least with only three (3) or 4% as shown.

ii. Provided health insurance benefits to 1,635 CBA-CPLA members through the PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program, other PhilHealth sponsored programs, including senior citizens. For FY 2020 there were 1,635 individuals endorsed to be provided with health insurance. Of the total, 966 are under PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program, 459 for other sponsored program, and 210 under senior citizen privileges.

- iii. Provision of educational assistance. OPAPP/PAMANA grantees were endorsed to the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) for inclusion in the Expanded Listahan database. The Expanded Listahanan list shall be submitted and adopted by the UNIFAST Board starting Academic Year to ensure that students who need additional financial assistance shall be included under Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act of 2017. As a result, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) will endorse the list of student beneficiaries to DSWD Field Offices to facilitate the verification and validation processes which will run from the month of April to September 2020 (2nd and 3rd quarters).
- iv. Security Component. The PNP Peace Process and Development Center (PPDC) and AFP Peace and Development Office (PDO) planned for the demilitarization of firearms turned in by the former CPLA members relative to the implementation of the 2011 MOA. The initial proposed schedule of the demilitarization was on 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter of FY 2020.

#### 2nd Quarter

- 1. Continued operationalization of the implementing mechanisms (JEMC, JB-DAF, SERC, and SPT).
- a. Joint Enforcement Monitoring Committee (JEMC). The JEMC acknowledged the consistent support of the local government units in Panay and Negros Group of Islands in the peace initiatives of the Government with the RPM-P/RPA/ABB-TPG now known as "KAPATIRAN" even during the onset of COVID-19. In letters dated April 23 & May 7, 2020, JEMC GPH Co-Chair Usec. Yano, relayed the government's appreciation to local chief executives in Western Visayas for their efforts and assistance to address the basic needs of the KAPATIRAN members in their areas and to the 266 Community Defense Units stationed in Negros Occidental, Negros Oriental, Aklan and Iloilo. The letters served to assure local chief executives of the Government's partnership with them to ensure that the interest of their stakeholders, including the KAPATIRAN would be best served in line with the Government's commitments, despite the challenges posed by COVID-19.

On 9 June 2020, a coordination meeting between JEMC Co-chair Veronica Tabara, Provincial Engineer Frank Alpuerto and staff was arranged by RCCD to discuss the status of peace and development interventions for the Peace and Development Community (PDC) Site in Sitio Ling-ab, Brgy. San Miguel, Tanjay City. The meeting led to the following agreements:

- All six (6) Farm-to-Market (FMR) Projects are to be completed by December of this year,
- Three (3) contractors namely: Philsouth Construction, Molrow Construction and Mighty Hok Construction will undertake the completion of FMR projects in Negros Oriental;
- All contractors will proceed with the implementation, awaiting Notice to Proceed (NTP) from Bids and Awards Committee (BAC) so long that there's clearance from the Provincial Engineer's Office (PEO) Negros Oriental given that the extension date of completion is until December only;
- Compliance of application documents for the tree cutting permit with DENR is being fast-tracked by PEO.
   This is with regard to the FMR project in Brgy Enrique Villanueva, Sibulan;
- LGU Amlan and Philsouth construction are currently negotiating with the land owners concerning the road right of way issue in Brgy. Tambohangin and Silab. PEO will also assist.
- b. Joint Body on the Disposition of Arms and Forces (JB-DAF). The JEMC commended 3ID, PA, AFP Peace and Development Office, 303<sup>RD</sup> Infantry Brigade and 79<sup>th</sup> IB for the quick resolution of a case involving a Philippine Army Cadre in San Carlos, Negros Occidental, stemming from a leadership issue. The speedy conduct of an investigation involving said cadre resulted in the early resolution of the case thus reinforcing the KAPATIRAN's trust and confidence to the armed forces and the government.

JEMC GPH Co-Chair Usec. Yano commended Police Brigadier General Gerardo Rosales in his retirement from public service on May 25, 2020. General Rosales was cited for his contributions to the implementation of the Government's Peace Process with the RPM-P/RPA/ABB-Tabara Paduano Group now known as "KAPATIRAN". In particular, General Rosales was cited for his contribution in the Disposition of Arms and Forces and Interim Security Arrangements component, which facilitated the Government's fulfillment of its commitments, as manifested during the successful launching of the Disposition of Arms and Forces at Headquarters, 3<sup>rd</sup> Division, Camp Peralta, Jamindan, Capiz on September 19, 2019.

- c. Socio-Economic Reintegration Cluster (SERC). The OPAPP convened a series of meetings with DSWD Field Office VI and DSWD Central Office (Sustainable Livelihood Program and Office of the Undersecretary for Inclusive and Sustainable Peace) via video teleconference on 26 May and 29 June 2020. The following next steps were identified and adopted:
- Concerned DSWD offices and OPAPP to comment on the case management concept.
   DSWD Program Management (PMB) to finalization concept;
- Conduct a briefing for the JEMC on the case management concept and process;
  - OPAPP to facilitate release and/or transfer of supplemental fund on or before August 2020;

- Prior to deployment of the PDOs, OPAPP to provide DSWD with Livelihood Settlement Grant (LSG) related documentary requirements for reference. A matrix with information on projects per chapter, amount and location can serve as the alternative reference:
- OPAPP to provide DSWD with KAPATIRAN's individual profile for needs assessment;
- Sustainable Livelihood Program Associations (SLPAs) in Community Peace Dividends (CPD) areas to be included in the monitoring conducted by DSWD SLP; and,
- New accreditation guidelines to be issued by DSWD in reference for the application of KAPATIRAN Chapters and SLPAs.

To date, DSWD has hired/renewed 17 Personnel (9 Project Development Officers (PDO), 6 Social Workers and 2 Admin Assistant) for deployment by July 2020 to undertake work relative to the implementation and sustainability of the LSG and SLPAs.

- d. Site Coordinating Teams (SCT). The SCT Second Quarter Meeting for Aklan was presided by the SCT Co-Chair Engr. Roger M. Esto. The was updated on the Matrix Intervention in the PDC for FY2015-2021; Development and Status in the Settlement Site/ PDC; and, identified issues, concerns and agreed on corresponding solutions.
- Implementation of programs for transformation of combatants, their families and communities to productive and peaceful lives

# a. Disposition of Arms and Forces

Security Arrangements. On 4-11 April 2020, the OPAPP partnered with the Philippine Army (11<sup>th</sup> IB, 15<sup>th</sup> IB, 62<sup>nd</sup> IB, 79<sup>th</sup> IB, and 61st IB) for the distribution of Supplemental Allowance of the Kapatiran Community Defense Unit (CDU) members, pursuant to Executive Order 94, series of 2019. The two hundred sixty six (266) CDU members received a total amount of PHP 2,000.00 each for the month of November and December 2019 respectively. Construction of the security facility in Ibajay, Aklan is ongoing. Eleven (11) CDU members were deployed to help with the construction. Each member receives compensation on a daily basis.

Assistance on License to Own and Possess Firearms (LTOPF) application to KAPATIRAN National Leaders. Seven (7) LTOPF applications were processed on 18 June 2020 in PNP Regional Civil Security Units (RCSU) VI. Of the thirty-seven (37) applications of the KAPATIRAN National Leaders, ten (10) have been scheduled for submission and validation of documents to Firearms and Explosives Offices (FEO) – Main on 7 July 2020; ten (10) are for release of LTOPF IDs; sixteen (16) are for processing due to pending submission of requirements and one (1) completed application.

Implementation of the Livelihood Settlement Grant (LSG) Program. The OPAPP assisted the KAPATIRAN members to complete their LSG requirements relative to their new scheme of LSG implementation

- Sustainability for chosen livelihood projects. The OPAPP, with the support of partner agencies and organizations, conducted the following for the sustainability of each KAPATIRAN chapters' chosen livelihood projects.
- Final proposal for the procurement of 2,500 dwarf coconut seedlings (Banayan specie) was submitted by to the Philippine Coconut Authority Aklan on 1 April 2020. The seedlings will be transplanted at the PDC Site in Ibajay.
- Learning sessions with Kapatiran Chapters in Kabankalan and Cauayan on the cash flow
  management, accounting, and recording of expenses/ income of their livelihood projects initiated by
  the RCCD. The Kapatiran was also assisted in filling-out admin forms such as purchase request,
  cash voucher and acknowledgment receipt.
- Assisted Kapatiran in establishing linkages with local partners, possible suppliers and consumer markets in Negros and Panay. As a result, the Kapatiran now has access to local suppliers and buyers and are constantly being supported by the local government units.
- Facilitated the delivery of livestock and materials for the livelihood projects of Kapatiran in Kabankalan Chapter.

On 26 May 2020, RCCD assisted TESDA-Aklan in paying out training allowances to those who participated (enrolled) NCII Masonry and Carpentry Courses for 50 (25-25) Kapatiran CDU and NOK profiled and non-profiled members in PDC Ibajay, Cabugao. Training conducted last December of 2019. Trainees had received Php780.00 per skills program.

- Facilitated a pre-orientation meeting of TESDA Aklan for additional skills training on welding, masonry and carpentry.
- Facilitated infectious disease test conducted to 18 heads of goat in partnership with the Office of the Provincial Veterinary - Aklan.
- On June 4, a consultation meeting between and among DOLE representative, Brgy. Chair of Locotan, RCCD, and Kapatiran Kabankalan chapter coordinator resulted to finalization and submission of carabao dispersal and rice trading project proposal to DOLE under Integrated Livelihood and Emergency Employment Program (DILEEP), for funding within the year. The documentary requirements are currently being reviewed by DOLE Negros Occidental for approval. Issuance of Deed of Usufruct by LGU Kabankalan allowing Kapatiran to freely utilize the facilities at the PDC site (as requirement of DOLE) will be facilitated as well.

To further enhance the technical knowledge and capabilities of the Kapatiran on the new processes and technologies of mushroom cultivation, the Provincial Agriculture's Office (OPA) of Negros Occidental, in partnership with RCCD, conducted a technology demonstration and training on Mushroom Production in Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. Locotan, Kabankalan City on June 25-26 where twenty five (25) Kapatiran members in Kabankalan Chapter were trained.

The OPAPP field staff met with DOLE R6 RD Cyrl Ticao and staff to discuss the finalization and submission of the KAPATIRAN Project Proposal for Kabankalan PDC. Meeting agenda included timeline, documentary requirements (including template for forms). As agreed, DOLE R6 shall give directive to the provincial office in Negros Occidental to prioritize the KAPATIRAN proposal.

# c. Social Protection Programs

PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program. During the second quarter, eighteen (18) profiled KAPATIRAN members, two hundred sixteen (216) individuals from identified Community Peace Dividends (CPD) areas, and one hundred two (102) individuals from the adjacent CPD barangays were submitted as additional endorsement to PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program FY 2020 to utilize the remaining slots. These eligible individuals were submitted to PAMANA-NPMD on 9 June 2020 and 18 June 2020. In addition, two (2) KAPATIRAN next-of-kin were provided immediate assistance on their PhilHealth membership through walk-in endorsement to process their hospitalization. From first quarter to second quarter, the total number of KAPATIRAN members endorsed for enrollment is 469 (first quarter endorsement was 451), while individuals from CPD areas and adjacent barangays is 9,261 (first quarter endorsement was 8,941).

The OPAPP coordinated with PhilHealth Regional Office VI on 3 June 2020 to discuss the status on the implementation of the Program and monitoring mechanisms. PhilHealth RO VI agreed to provide utilization report quarterly to determine the level of usage of beneficiaries. The PAMANA-PhilHealth focal person advised RCCD to draft formal request letter on the said report. This report will be also used as reference in identifying good stories for the conduct of documentation to start in September 2020. PhilHealth will also assist in the identification of beneficiaries to be featured based on the initial criteria discussed during the meeting.

- OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED Study Grant Program. OPAPP/PAMANA grantees' list was submitted to PAMANA-NPMD on 16 June 2020 for inclusion in the Expanded Listahan database of Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD). The Expanded Listahanan list shall be submitted and adopted by the UNIFAST Board to ensure that students who need additional financial assistance shall be included under Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act of 2017. The list will be endorsed to DSWD Field Offices for inclusion in the conduct of verification and validation processes which will run from April to September 2020.
- d. Establishment of Settlement Sites. The OPAPP assisted the (40) Kapatiran members in Antique Chapter for possible availment of Handog Titulo Program of DENR. As a result, PENRO Antique scheduled a site visit to initially assess the proposed in-situ areas in Culasi, Antique on the 2<sup>nd</sup> week of July.

On 17-19 June 2020, DENR-CENRO Kabankalan conducted the CRMF Planning Workshop in Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. Locotan through the facilitation of the RCCD. The strategic plan/ land use of the CBFMA area was finalized during the workshop.

On 25 June 2020, a video teleconferencing (VTC) was organized between the OPAPP, its Western Visayas Field Office, and the NHA Central Office with its Region VI counterpart. This was a levelling off meeting between the two government agencies and their respective regional offices on the status of implementation of their areas of collaboration and the ways forward. This meeting served as a briefing for newly- designated National coordinator for Indigenous People and Former Rebels, Engr. Jessa Consuegra. The VTC resulted to cascading of information and instructions, enabling land acquisition for congregated sites to gain ground. This meeting also enabled the fast-tracking of the renovation of twenty-four (24) housing units awarded to the KAPATIRAN NCR in 2019, to facilitate the full transfer of the KAPATIRAN members and their family members. A monitoring activity of the Bronzeville Settlement Site was originally planned but had to be held in abeyance due to the restriction of travel during the community quarantine

On 30 June 2020, a coordination meeting with the NHA Region VI and Iloilo District Office, to brief the NHA Regional focal persons of the Clarificatory Implementing Document, discuss the Memorandum of Agreement between the OPAPP and the NHA, map out the next steps for the acquisition of land in the congregated areas, and draw timelines and next steps to expedite the implementation process

3. Release of Alleged Political Offenders. The GPH JEMC Co-Chair Usec. Yano sent a letter to DOJ Undersecretary Deo S. Marco on 29 April 29 2020, submitting documents as agreed upon during the 20 February 2020 meeting of the JEMC with DOJ and OPAPP. The meeting resulted in the identification of initiatives to be undertaken by OPAPP and DOJ as a follow-through for the implementation of the component of the CID on the release of alleged political offenders and political prisoners.

Support to Republic Act (RA) No. 11469 "Bayahanihan to Heal as One Act." Constant coordination of the OPAPP with DSWD and concerned Local Government Units facilitated the inclusion of qualified Kapatiran and CDU members to DSWD's Social Amelioration Program (SAP). Likewise, OPAPP was able to generate a socio economic profile/ database of the Kapatiran members. Of the 727 KAPATIRAN members, 451 qualified for SAP assistance, while 276 did not qualify.

Through the facilitation of OPAPP, TESDA Negros Oriental (represented by the Provincial Director) provided relief goods to twenty four (24) Kapatiran CDUs in Negros Oriental affected by the COVID-19 pandemic on April 30, 2020 at the PDC Site in Brgy San Miguel, Tanjay City. TESDA likewise conducted a community profiling as part of the agri-based program implementation of TESDA for the Kapatiran. The OPAPP also, assisted in the distribution of TESDA-Aklan's Face Mask, Rice and Medicines (multi-vitamins) to Kapatiran Aklan in PDC Ibajay

Regular monitoring of COVID-19 cases in Region VI and Region VII undertaken by the OPAPP, through coordination with DOH and the concerned Local Government Units, aided the MEALD in providing an up to date data on COVID-19 cases at the barangay level.

The completion strategy for the CBA-CPLA Peace Process has a two-track approach:

Normalization process (5 years) of CBA-CPLA members and identified communities, with the overall objective of transformation into active partners for a peaceful and developing Cordillera Region free from CPP-NPA and other threats groups of the former CPLA combatants guided by the following principles:

- Transform support the transformation of the CBA-CPLA, building on gains since the 1986 Sipat. This will cover four levels of transformation: (i) individuals; (ii) CBA-CPLA as a former armed organization; (iii) communities supportive to the peace process; and (iv) their relationship with the Philippine Government and its instrumentalities."From leaders of war to leaders of development and influential advocates of peace; meaningful participation in decision making processes in their communities."
- Sustain sustain the gains of the Cordillera peace process by giving back to communities supportive to the CBA-CPLA;
- Include in the spirit of the Mt Data Sipat, support inclusive regional growth by prioritizing tribal communities that have lagged behind due to conflict and geographic isolation.

The 5-Year Normalization Plan has the following components: (i) Security Component; (ii) Socio-Economic Reintegration Component; (iii) Transitional Justice Component; and (iv) Confidence Building Component.

The Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC), created during the last quarter of 2019, will serve as the mechanism to collate, discuss, analyze and implement interventions of completing the commitments of the government for the CBA-CPLA Peace Process. It will be composed of an (i) Executive Committee; (ii) Secretariat (inter-agency, with OPAPP as the lead); and four (4) subclusters corresponding to each of the components. Government representatives to the JEMC come from the relevant regional line agencies in Cordillera Administrative Region, AFP, PNP, CBA-CPLA representation come from each of the factions/group, and representatives from Civil Society Organizations, nominated by the CBA-CPLA with concurrence by government representatives.

Further, in consonance with the principle of honoring all signed peace agreements, Government will continue to sustain programs and projects under the 2011 MOA. Provision of support to regional development advocacies towards helping the Cordillera Autonomy Bill be declared as a priority agenda of the Administration and be considered a common legislative agenda.

- 1. Implementing Mechanisms of Peace Agreements Established and Operationalized
- Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC). Drafted five (5) of the 12 resolutions to be signed by the JEMC Executive Committee. These are the following:
- o Resolution No. 001: Defining the structure, functions and duties of the JEMC
- o Resolution No. 002: Establishing the parameters of recognizing the bona fide members of the CBA-CPLA
- Resolution No. 004: Establishing the guidelines and procedures in the selection of CSO nominees to the JEMC by the CBA-CPLA
- Resolution No. 005: Confirming the CSO representatives in the JEMC
- Resolution No. 011: Declaring the end of recruitment as a trust and confidence building measure to promote peace and development in the Cordillera
- Security Component. Coordinated with the Firearms, Explosives, and Ammunitions Disposal Committee (FEADC) of Police Regional Office Cordillera (PROCOR) related to the demilitarization of firearms under Executive Order No. 49, particularly on the needed documents for the procurement of supplies and materials. P/LTCOL Reguel B. Sta. Maria, the head secretariat of the FEADC, has submitted the initial set of canvass forms from possible suppliers of supplies and materials needed in the destruction of firearms. The group is still completing the other canvass forms and documents in the conduct of the demilitarization activity.

Collaborated and coordinated with 503rd Brigade for the preparation and invitation of participants to the JEMC Security Component Regular Meeting originally set on June 24, 2020 but was postponed to July 1, 2020 due to other pressing concerns of the host AFP Unit. Below is the agenda of the meeting:

- Discussion and adoption of the final consolidated list of the CPLA members;
- Initial discussion of the profiling activity for the CPLA Members based on the final consolidated list;
- o Presentation of the Peace and Development Force (PDF) concept; and,
- o Other matters:
- Updates on the disposition of arms and forces under EO 49
- Next Steps and Schedules of the Security Component

The intended outputs of the meeting will be the final consolidated list of CPLA members, covering all factions or group; understanding of the Security Component that there will be a profiling of CPLA members based on the final consolidated list to serve as reference of the various socio-economic interventions and other program or projects for the households and communities of CPLA; knowledge on the Peace and Development Force concept that will serve as a guide in the provision of security arrangements including socio-economic interventions that will bridge the CPLA into the mainstream economic undertakings; and the tentative schedule of demilitarization of firearms under EO 49 in collaboration with PROCOR and 5ID.

- Implementation of programs for transformation of combatants, their families and communities to productive and peaceful lives
- Socio-Economic Reintegration

Employment. Monitored the status of Bantay Gubat across Cordillera to determine their role and status in checkpoints for the covid19. All CENROs encouraged their BG personnel to help in the checkpoint for Covid-19 in their respective barangays or communities. RCCD received reports from Manabo, Abra that the Bantay Gubat deployed at the checkpoint were able to confiscate several bundles of illegal lumber: seven (7) pieces of narra lumber (10x10x6ft) on April 8, 2020 and four (4) pieces of narra lumber (16x8x7ft) on April 29, 2020.

Livelihood. A member of Highlander for Peace and Development Organization, Inc. from Manabo, Abra was able to sell more than 40 kilograms of siling labuyo earning him Php 8,000 as part of his initial harvest in early June 2020

Facilitated the engagement of eight (8) peoples' organization in CAR to the SURE AID Program of the Department of Agriculture thru the Agricultural Credit Policy Council (ACPC) on 18 April 2020. The goal is to augment the financial requirement of farmers in their production activities that were affected by the covid19 pandemic. The POs that responded were the following:

Educational Support. One hundred twenty-three (123) out of two hundred forty-five (245) OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED grantees (50%) were tracked via Facebook to gather their academic status and their situation during the Enhanced Community Quarantine due to COVID-19. Of the 245 grantees, 94 have graduated, 20 are currently enrolled, 5 have stopped attending school, 4 waived their grants in lieu of other sponsored programs. Tracking is ongoing for the remaining 122 grantees.

The list of OPAPP/PAMANA grantees were submitted to PAMANA-NPMD on 16 June 2020 for inclusion in the Expanded Listahan database of Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD). OPAPP provided 50 sacks of rice and 3 cattles to supplement the food items in the celebration of Kanduli on 18 March 2020 at Camp Astanah, Barangay Kagay, Indanan, Sulu.
				With the declaration of national health emergency and the placement of Metro Manila under community quarantine starting 16 March 2020, Chair Misuari issued a directive on 15 March 2020 which was posted on the MNLF's Facebook page calling all MNLF members to strictly comply with the directive of the President on Covid-19 pandemic. Hence, all activities related to their anniversary were postponed.

The OPAPP through the secretariat of the MNLF-Misuari group continue to coordinate to verify reports of MNLF members or communities that are violating the protocols of community quarantines or those that will need additional support such as food supplies.

The OPAPP continue to monitor also the activities of the MNLF-Misuari in Sulu who are assisting the 11ID in the conduct of operations against Abu Sayyaf group in the province.

Engagement with Jikiri Group. On 11 February 2020, the OPAPP facilitated the 3rd GPH-MNLF (Jikiri/Sema) Coordinating Committee Meeting at Berjaya Hotel, Makati. The meeting was attended by the members of the GPH and MNLF senior leaders and coordinating committee. This resulted to the finalization and approval of the Terms of Reference (TOR) of the GMCC subject to formal signing.

On 17 March 2020, the OPAPP with the assistance of the AMO ZamBaSulta facilitated the delivery of 50 sacks of rice and 3 cattles to the camp of Chair Yusop Jikiri in Indanan, Sulu to augment the food supplies of MNLF members who were supposed to attend the 52<sup>nd</sup> Founding Anniversary but were unable to go home due to community quarantine protocols.

The OPAPP through the secretariat of the MNLF-Jikiri Group and the AMO-ZAMBASULTA continue to coordinate to check on the situations of the various MNLF communities amidst the Covid-19 pandemic. Some communities have already relayed their request for food and non-food items (such as masks and hygiene kits) to alleviate the difficulties they are facing under community quarantine.

Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) Visit in the Philippines on 25-30 January 2020. The delegation of the Organization Islamic Cooperation (OIC) arrived in Manila on 25-30 January 2020 to discuss necessary preparations for the OIC Secretary General's visit to the Philippines this year. The delegation is composed of:

- El Habib Bourane, Director of the Muslim Minorities under the Department of Political Affairs
- Datuk Ibrahim Abdullah, Special Envoy of the OIC Secretary General for Peace Process in Southern Philippines; and
- · Mr. Hassan Abedin, Adviser to the Muslim Minorities

The visit aimed to hold meetings with the government officials and Moro groups involved in the peace process in Southern Philippines, gather updates on the developments on the peace process with the MILF and the MNLF as well as other

peacebuilding initiatives in the Bangsamoro areas and prepare a report for the Secretary-General to inform his itinerary and agenda for the visit to the Philippines this year. On the part of the Government, the visit is an opportunity to solicit the OIC's commitments on the establishment of the Bangsamoro Development Assistance Fund (BDAF) and the Tripartite Implementation Monitoring Committee (TIMC), two remaining commitments under 1996 FPA which the latter have agreed upon with the GPH and MNLF as a result of the Tripartite Review Process which concluded on January 2016.

With the visit, the OIC delegation were able to dialogue with the OPAPP leadership led by Secretary Galvez and some government executives from the Department of Finance (DOF), National Economic Development Authority (NEDA), Southern Philippines Development Authority (SPDA) and Mindanao Development Authority (MINDA) on 27 January 2020. Further, they also travelled to Cotabato City to meet with the BARMM officials led by Interim Chief Minister Ahod Ebrahim on 28 January 2020 and the leadership of the MNLF (Misuari and Jikiri group) in Davao City on 29 January 2020.

OPAPP Other Engagements in Support to MNLF, their Families and Communities

- a. Provision of technical assistance in the conduct of PAMANA-related activities in BM Areas. In March 2020, the OPAPP coordinated with the concerned PLGUs on the finalization of required documents for the project in Zamboanga Sibugay. However, with the declaration of community quarantines in different parts of the country, the MNLF Coordinating Committee have yet to visit the concerned MNLF community to work out the requirements.
- b. Provision of technical assistance in the conduct of PAMANA-related activities in BM Areas under Support to Peace Building and Normalization (SPAN) Program. The OPAPP provided technical and administrative assistance on the current inventory and assessment of the implementation of the OPAPP-UNDP SPAN Program.
- On 31 January 2020, the OPAPP convened the first meeting with the Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) and United Nations Development Program (UNDP) in Cagayan de Oro City which was organized by the Ateneo Resource Center for Local Governance (ARCLG). The meeting aimed to address issues and concerns encountered by the CSOs during the implementation of the program and to come up with the concrete plan on the upcoming culmination activities for Build Peace in February 2020.
- On 4 February 2020, the OPAPP met with the Executive Director of the Mediators Network for Sustainable Peace Inc. (MedNet Inc.). The Mednet is the implementer of the WAVE-ADR that is intended to provide capacity building of identified community leaders/members of the SPAN Component 3 communities on alternative dispute resolution. The meeting discussed preparation for the conduct of learning sessions of ADR for the provinces of Basilan, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi.
- The OPAPP attended the meeting on Support to Peacebuilding and Normalization (SPAN) Program Board Meeting on 5 February 2020. The meeting discussed the status of the program as well as the guidance of the PAPRU for all components to complete the projects by 31 March 2020.
- On 26 February 2020, the OPAPP attended the 2<sup>nd</sup> Coordination Meeting with the CSOs and UNDP in Davao City. The meeting resulted to the finalization of the plans for the conduct of the culminating activity for the BuildPeace Project scheduled on 4-5 March 2020 in Manila.

- The MCD together with the ARCLG and the partner CSOs facilitated the culmination activities of OPAPP-UNDP-SPAN Component 3: BuildPeace Project in Manila on 4-5 March 2020. The culminating activities are the ceremonial turn-over of the Barangay Development Plans and the Field Exposure Activity for the Barangay Captains and partner CSOs with the City Government of Manila. The following are the highlights of these activities:

  The MCD together with the ARCLG paid courtesy call to the Administrator of City of Manila on 3 March 2020. The meeting aims to discuss further the program flow for the conduct of field visit of the 180 participants from the provinces of BARMM.

  On 4 March 2020, the MCD together with AMOs, ARCLG and UNDP facilitated the Ceremonial
- The MCD together with ARCLG and UNDP facilitated the conduct of Lakbay Kapayapaan / field exposure activity of the 98 barangay captains, focals and representatives of the 14 partner CSOs. The activity aimed for the partner barangays and CSOs to appreciate the learning experiences and realizations of the BLGUs while attending the workshops and crafting the BDPs and to enhance BLGUs capability by observing replicable best practices of host LGUs such as City of Manila. This activity also served as the formal closure of the project after it was launched

Turn-over of the CSPP-BDPs of the 98 barangays held at Bayview Park Hotel, Manila. DPAPF Isidro Purisima represented PAPRU in the event together with other government officials of the

On 13 March 2020, the MCD and AMO ZamBaSulta facilitated the conduct of learning sessions
of alternative dispute resolution for the focals from the province of Sulu. Consequently, MedNet
scheduled the same for the provinces of Basilan and Tawi-Tawi on 15 and 18 March, respectively.
However, due to the declaration of the community quarantine in Metro Manila starting March 16, the
personnel of MedNet had to return to Manila.

#### 2nd Quarter

- 1. Engagement with the Misuari Group. To operationalize the directive of the President to continue the dialogue for peace and friendship in the hope to promote the interest of the MNLF and the rest of the Moro of Mindanao, the government, through the OPAPP continuously engages with MNLF Chair Nur Misuari and his group for an inclusive and sustainable peace in Mindanao, through provision of technical, administrative and logistical support.
- In June 2020, the OPAPP facilitated the request of Chair Nur Misuari relative to the five (5) MNLF members stranded in Taguig City. The aforementioned members were released from Manila District Jail Annex 5 in Camp Bagong Diwa, Lower Bicutan on 12 May 2020 with the approval of their plea bargain agreement. Due to the community quarantine implemented in Metro Manila, their return to their respective areas was moved to July 2020.
- On 26 June 2020, the OPAPP facilitated the delivery of confidence building intervention for the MNLF-Misuari group through provision of support to stranded MNLF members in Indanan, Sulu due to the imposed community quarantine in the country. OPAPP provided 50 sacks of rice and 3 cattle.
- During the pandemic, the OPAPP ensured that the needs of the MNLF-Misuari members are being attended and endorsed to the appropriate government agencies.
- 2. Engagement with Jikiri Group. Since the start of the pandemic, the OPAPP through the Area Management Office and with support of the MNLF Area Coordinators and leaders has been monitoring the status of the MNLF members related to Covid-19. As of this writing, MNLF has not reported any case of covid-19 among its members.

# 3. Provision of technical support on other issues related to the Bangsamoro

- On 22 June 2020, the OPAPP monitored the security concerns involving MNLF in Sulu. The
  OPAPP also clarified that the news on the "normalization" of the MNLF circulating in social media is
  not connected to any of OPAPP's program. It was further communicated to the MNLF to ask their
  members to refrain from posting fake or misleading news that could jeopardize the current
  engagement with the Government.
- The OPAPP, as a member of the secretariat of the National Government, provided assistance in the conduct of the 1st Meeting of the Joint Body for the Zones of Joint Cooperation (JBZJC) on 26 June 2020. The meeting aims to discuss the TOR and operationalization of the JBZJC and its next activities.
- The OPAPP through its MNLF Concern Department (MCD), participated in the meeting with the Directorate of Intelligence of the Philippine National Police on 17 June 2020. The meeting aims to provide updates on the ongoing engagement with the two (2) MNLF groups the Jikiri and Misuari groups. The meeting also aims to strengthen the relationship of the peace process and the law enforcement agencies.
- 4. Provision of technical assistance in the conduct of PAMANA-related activities in BM Areas under Support to Peace Building and Normalization (SPAN) Program. OPAPP conducted inventory and assessment of the implementation of the OPAPP-UNDP SPAN Program. The following were undertaken:
- On 22 May 2020, the OPAPP met with UNDP and discussed the solidarity activity for Muslims in the Celebration of Holy Month of Ramadan. Through this meeting, both parties were updated on the procurement process of goods and schedule of delivery of goods to the identified families from Sulu, Basilan and Lanao del Sur.
- On 19 June 2020, the OPAPP together with the AMO Zamboanga facilitated the delivery of relief goods to the 585 MNLF families in communities of Mohammad Ajul, Al-Barka, Tuburan and Maluso, Basilan. This was followed on 20 June 2020 for the delivery of same goods to around 500 families from MNLF Jikiri group in Barrangay Kagay, Indanan, Sulu. These good were received by the MNLF commanders and their family members.

3. Writeshop with DILG and AFP on FY 2020 PAMANA on proposed national level Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) held last 13 February 2020 at OPAPP as led by the Legal Affairs Department.

Anent the abovementioned activities held last 7 February 2020 and 13 February 2020 and corresponding follow-through work, the national level MOA was finalized and signed on 10 March 2020 at the DND. The signing ceremony was attended by DILG Secretary Eduardo M. Año, OPAPP Secretary Carlito G. Galvez, Jr. and DND Secretary Delfin N. Lorenzana as signatories.

The PAMANA-NPMD also prepared various compliance and reference documents including the draft implementation MOAs and 656 project profiles as well as attended internal coordination meetings.

In light of the COVID-19 pandemic and the need of putting into practice the New Normal, however, targets and timelines were adjusted in May 2020. A reduced number of projects pegged at 473 out of the 656 projects amounting to PhP 555,650,000 were being proposed for implementation across the PAMANA Zones in FY 2020. Corresponding compliance and reference documents were set and prepared, respectively.

- Monitoring of the PAMANA. In aid of project facilitation and completion, the following activities were pursued:
- a. INTER-AGENCY. The OPAPP PAMANA-NPMD commenced preparation for the 1<sup>st</sup> PAMANA Inter-Agency Meeting for FY 2020 set on 27 March 2020 in Metro Manila. The activity was expected to be attended by representatives from the AFP, BARMM-BPDA, BARMM-MPW, BARMM MSWD, CHED, DA, DAR, DENR, DILG, DSWD, NCIP, NEA, PHIC, PNP and OPAPP.

The activity did not push through as originally scheduled on 27 March 2020 or as re-scheduled on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> week of April 2020 in view of the continuing community quarantine brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic.

- BILATERAL. As a follow-through to the bilateral coordination cum assessment sessions
  initiated in FY 2019 and in collaboration with OPAPP's partner implementing agencies, the OPAPP
  PAMANA-NPMD conducted the following coordination cum assessment sessions:
- i. OPAPP-BFAR Partnership. The FY 2013-2015 PAMANA-BFAR Assessment Session with BFAR Central and Regional Offices was held last 20 February 2020 at the Ace Hotel and Suites in Pasig City. The activity, which aimed to facilitate progress updating and discussion on issues and concerns for decision, was attended by representatives from the OPAPP (NPMD, AMO Davao and Zamboanga) and BFAR (Central Office and Regional Offices).

Ways forward were discussed and agreed upon including the conduct of a follow-through meeting on 16 April 2020 in Manila. The activity did not push through as planned in consideration of the continuing community quarantine brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic. Set to be rescheduled sometime in October 2020.

ii. OPAPP-DA-DAR Partnership. FY 2015 PAMANA-ARA Follow-through OPAPP-DA -DA Coordination Meeting on 27 February 2020 at the Apo View Hotel in Davao City. The activity, which aimed to follow-up on project implementation progress vis-à-vis project implementation timelines, was attended by OPAPP (NPMD, AMO Davao and South-Central Mindanao), DA (CO and RFO IX, XI and XII) and DAR (CO. DARPOs).

Ways forward were discussed and agreed upon including the conduct of a follow-through meeting as scheduled. In consideration of the continuing community quarantine brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic, the activity is set to be re-scheduled sometime in October 2020.

iii. OPAPP-DA Partnership. FY 2013-2016 PAMANA-DA Assessment Session on 28 February 2020 at the Apo View Hotel in Davao City. The activity, which aimed to follow-up on project implementation progress vis-à-vis project implementation timelines, was attended by OPAPP (NPMD, AMO Davao/Caraga and South-Central Mindanao), DA (CO and RFO IVA, V, VI, IX, XI, XII, XIII and CAR). DA RFO X, IVB and VIII were unable to attend.

Ways forward were discussed and agreed upon including the conduct of a follow-through assessment meeting of FY 2013-FY 2016 PAMANA Accomplishment as scheduled. In consideration of the continuing community quarantine brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic, the activity is set to be re-scheduled sometime in October 2020.

c. IMPLEMENTATION SUPPORT. In line with the implementation of the FY 2017 PAMANA, the PAMANA-NPMD commenced preparations for the 11 assessment and planning sessions with local partners on 2-24 June 2020, to wit

On 19 February 2020, the National Government JBZJC, presided by DA Usec. Zamzamin L. Ampatuan, conducted its 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting at the Department of Agriculture (DA) in Quezon City to discuss the formation of the National Government JBZJC Secretariat and Technical-Level Committees. The National Government IGRB Secretariat, represented by Director Ma. Scheherazade Ruivivar Ariate, presented to the body the draft Terms of Reference of the JBZJC and its Joint Secretariat.

Intergovernmental Energy Board (IEB). On 28 February 2020, the National Government IEB held its 1st meeting at the Department of Energy (DOE) in Taguig City. The National Government IGRB Secretariat, represented by Dir. Farrah Grace V. Naparan, oriented the body on intergovernmental relations and energy-related provisions in Republic Act No. 11054 or the Bangsamoro Organic Law (BOL). The body also threshed out issues that may arise once the IEB convenes. The DOE already formed its Technical-Level Committee that shall support the National Government IEB.

Continuing monitoring and support to the implementation and observance of the GPH-MILF ceasefire agreement. The OPAPP through the GIP-MILF Secretariat provides technical and administrative assistance to the GPH-MILF ceasefire mechanisms, particularly the GPH Coordinating Committee on the Cessation of Hostilities (CCCH), GPH Ad Hoc Joint Action Group (AHJAG), and the International Monitoring Team (IMT). The GIP-MILF Secretariat also assists the GPH Panel in the eventual transition of the CCCH, AHJAG, and IMT into appropriate mechanisms in normalization.

- 1. Technical Workshop on the review of the mandate of the IMT. During the 23<sup>rd</sup> Meeting of the GPH and MILF Peace Implementing Panels on 10 December 2020, the Panels formed a TWG to conduct a review of the mandate of the IMT and proposed recommendations for its transition. On 17 January 2020, the GIP-MILF Secretariat, represented by Mohamad B. Dipatuan and Elgie V. Baluyot, facilitated a technical workshop for the GPH TWG to review the mandate of the IMT. The GPH TWG drafted a proposed revised Terms of Reference of the IMT which was presented to the GPH Panel during its meeting on 23 February 2020. During the 24<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the GPH and MILF Peace Implementing Panels on 24 February 2020, the Panels agreed that the GPH-MILF TWG should convene to reconcile and finalize the revised Terms of Reference of the IMT.
- 2. Meetings with the IMT. On 3 February 2020, GPH Peace Implementing Panel Chair Usec. Diciano, assisted by Mohamad B. Dipatuan and Elgie V. Baluyot of the GIP-MILF Secretariat, visited the IMT Team Site 2 in Iligan City to discuss administrative issues concerning the operations of the Team Site 2. Usec. Diciano, assisted by Mohamad B. Dipatuan of the GIP-MILF Secretariat, also met the personnel of the IMT Headquarters in Cotabato City on 17 February 2020, where there was a discussion on administrative issues, particularly on the liquidation and replenishment of operational funds and reimbursement of cash. Usec. Diciano also shared with the IMT the possible renewal of the mandate of the IMT and the revisions in its Terms of Reference.

The IMT – Mission 14 (IMT-M14) Head of Mission Major General Dato' Ya'cob bin Hj Samiran conducted an Exit Call om 27 February 2020 with Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity Secretary Carlito G. Galvez, Jr. and the GPH Panel led by Usec. Diciano. Sec. Galvez and Usec. Diciano presented to Maj. Gen. Samiran a plaque of recognition for his service in the IMT. They also discussed the arrival of the new Malaysian contingent of the IMT, which shall lead Mission 15.

### 2nd Quarter

### 1. Political-Legislative Track

In line with its mandate to support the Government of the Philippines Peace Implementing Panel (GIP) and the peace process between the GPH and the MILF, the OPAPP through the GIP Secretariat facilitated the conduct of the following during the reporting period:

a. 25<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the GPH and MILF Peace Implementing Panels, 5 June 2020 via Video Conference. The GPH and the MILF Peace Implementing Panels, chaired by Usec. Diciano and Mohagher Iqbal, convened for their 25<sup>th</sup> meeting to discuss issues pertinent to the timely implementation of deliverables under the Program for Normalization in the Bangsamoro, amid limitations relative to the COVID-19 pandemic. These include socioeconomic development programs for combatants decommissioned under Phase 2 and the conduct of the third phase of the decommissioning process. The GPH Panel also provided its counterpart with updates on the operationalization of the Bangsamoro Normalization Trust Fund (BNTF), the work for amnesty and pardon, and the National Task Force for the Disbandment of Private Armed Groups (NTF-DPAGs).

The GPH Peace Implementing Panel also presented to its counterpart its proposed revision on the TOR of the Technical Working Group on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation (TWG-TJR), which was signed on 16 August 2019. The MILF Peace Implementing Panel committed to take the matter to its leadership for review. The GIP-MILF Secretariat is constantly following up its MILF counterpart on the resolution of the MILF leadership on this matter.

The Panels agreed to put on hold the scheduling of the Special Meeting in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia until the threat of COVID-19 is over.

### b. Inter-Governmental Relations (IGR).

• Meeting of the IGRB Co-Chairs, 29 May 2020 via video teleconference. The IGRB Co-Chairs, Finance Secretary Carlos G. Dominguez and Bangsamoro Education Minister Mohagher M. Iqbal, along with Asec. Mayor on behalf of Sec. Carlito G. Galvez, Jr. and Bangsamoro Executive Secretary Abdulraof A. Macacua, met prior to the second meeting of the IGRB to ensure the smooth flow of discussion of issues during the meeting proper. The Co-Chairs firmed up the agenda for the second meeting and agreed on which side will initate the discussion on certain issues.

Second meeting of the IGRB, 29 May 2020 via video teleconference. The second meeting of the IGRB was initially scheduled on 20 March 2020, but it was not pursued because of the escalation of COVID-19 cases in the Philippines. The Co-Chairs of the IGRB decided to convene the IGRB on 29 May 2020 to discuss and reach resolutions on issues on IGR between the National Government and the Bangsamoro Government. The IGRB discussed updates on issues discussed during its first consultative meeting on 16 December 2019, particularly the turnover of Cotabato City to the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM), nationally funded programs in the BARMM, and the salaries of teachers and education sector employees in the 63 barangays in North Cotabato and in Cotabato City.

The IGRB agreed to immediately convene the other IGR mechanisms prior to the conduct of the launch and oath-taking which was supposed to be conducted in February 2020, but was postponed pending the confirmation of the Office of the President. The IGRB also agreed to conduct the launch activity in a virtual manner. In June 2020, the National Government IGRB Secretariat submitted the event profile sheet and concept note for the activity (which was vetted with the Bangsamoro Government IGRB Secretariat) to the Office of the President – Appointments Desk for consideration.

Other issues discussed during the second meeting of the IGRB include the convening of the JBZJC and the creation of the Bangsamoro Sustainable Development Board (BSDB), operations of the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration (POEA) and the Overseas Workers Welfare Administration (OWWA) in the BARMM, powers and functions of the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP) and the Ministry of Indigenous Peoples Affairs (MIPA-BARMM) in the BARMM, omnibus request of the Bangsamoro Government to the Civil Service Commission (CSC), transfer of the Al-Amanah Islamic Investment Bank of the Philippines, and the engagement and relationship of the BARMM with the diplomatic community. The IGRB agreed on action points for the resolution of these issues which have to be accomplished prior to its third meeting which is projected to be held on or before 27 August 2020.

In June 2020, IGRB Co-Chair Sec. Dominguez met with Interior and Local Government Sec. Eduardo M. Año to discuss the turnover of Cotabato City to the BARMM. The National Government IGRB Secretariat is closely coordinating with the DOF on the discussion during the said meeting. The DOF also apprised the National Government IGRB Secretariat that during the meeting of Sec. Dominguez with Budget and Management Sec. Wendel E. Avisado, the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) retained its position that the National Government will only shoulder the salaries of teachers and education sector employees in the 63 barangays in North Cotabato and in Cotabato City for FY 2020, which was also formally relayed to the Bangsamoro Government IGRB. On the omnibus request of the Bangsamoro Government to the CSC, the CSC formally informed the National Government IGRB that the request is currently undergoing legal evaluation.

c. Convening of other IGR mechanisms. Pursuant to the directive of the IGRB during its second meeting on 29 May 2020, the National Government IGRB Secretariat is closely coordinating with the concerned National Government agencies to facilitate the convening of other IGR mechanisms. For this period, the IFPB and the JBZJC already convened for their first meetings.

The National Government IGRB Secretariat is in coordination with the DOF on the eventual response of the National Government Co-Chairs of the Philippine Congress – Bangsamoro Parliament Forum (PCBPF) and Intergovernmental Infrastructure Development Board (IIDB) on the convening of these mechanisms. The National Government IGRB Secretariat is also constantly following up with its Bangsamoro Government counterpart on the legislation creating the BSDB and the convening of the Council of Leaders.

First meeting of the IFPB, 29 May 2020 via video conference. Similar to the IGRB, the IFPB also agreed to meet every 90 days and its Joint Secretariat every 60 days, or as often as may be required. The meeting was presided by IFPB Co-Chair Sec. Dominguez and Bangsamoro Public Works Minister Eduard U. Guerra, who represented IFPB Co-Chair and Bangsamoro Chief Minister and concurrent Finance, Budget, and Management Minister Ahod B. Ebrahim.

Pursuant to its mandate to address revenue imbalances and fluctuations in regional financial needs and revenue-raising capacity of the Bangsamoro Government, the IFPB discussed the delays encountered by the Bangsamoro Government in the downloading of the block grant, procedures and requirements for obtaining loans and grants in the BARMM, and the request of the Bangsamoro Government for the release of its Special Development Fund (SDF) for FY 2019 and FY 2020. The IFPB also agreed on the creation of a study group for tax collection in the BARMM.

First meeting of the JBZJC, 26 June 2020 via video teleconference. The JBZJC convened for its first meeting, which was presided by alternate Co-Chair Usec. Zamzamin L. Ampatuan of the Department of Agriculture (DA) and Co-Chair and Bangsamoro Agriculture, Fisheries, and Agricultural Reform Minister Mohammad S. Yacob, and was moderated by Director Farrah Grace V. Naparan, on behalf of Asec. Mayor for the National Government IGRB Secretariat, and Bangsamoro Government IGRB Secretariat Co-Head and Bangsamoro Attorney General Sha Elijah B. Dumama-Alba. The JBZJC finalized the details of its TOR and the TOR of its Joint Secretariat. The session on WPS aimed to identify and discuss gender issues in peacebuilding initiatives and armed conflict situations. The objectives of PDOS were to acquaint participants with the functions and operations of Foreign Service establishments, prepare them for relocation to a foreign environment, and provide them certain basic skills to carry out their tasks effectively.	
					e. Meeting with Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) on the NAPWPS Implementation, Quezon City, 7 February 2020. OPAPP attended the updating meeting with Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) on the NAPWPS Implementation on 7 February 2020. The objectives of the said meeting were to update the CSOs on the status of implementation of the NAPWPS, including major accomplishments, works in progress, and areas for improvement; for women's CSOs to share their own programs, projects, and activities in relation to WPS; and to scout for potential spaces for collaboration, especially with regard to gaps in the implementation of NAPWPS.	

OPAPP GAD Plans, Policies, and Mechanisms Workshop. On 31 January 2020, the OPAP NAPWPS Division facilitated this workshop to the assess if OPAPP policies were using gender sensitive language, gender-blind/specific/neutral. A total of 16 policies, protocols, and mechanisms were reviewed by OPAPP Units' GAD Focal Persons. Likewise, they were also provided an orientation on Safe Spaces Act, an act defining gender-based sexual harassment in streets, public spaces, online, workplaces, and educational or training institutions, providing protective measures and prescribing penalties therefor 2nd Quarter During this quarter, the following were accomplished: OPAPP's post Ramadhan gift giving activities. The package amounting to PhP 1,500 composed rice, canned goods, hygiene kit, face masks, and alcohol was funded, and procured by UND SPAN distributed in Marawi and other parts of Lanao del Sur, Sulu and Basilan. The unloading of goods from the boat from Zambonga City to Jolo and Basilan was aided by AMO Zambasulta, with the help of 11th Infantry Division, MNLF Misuari and Jikiri personnel lead the distribution on June 23, in the respective MNLF camps 1,585 members have received the goods from both camps. The ERR team on the other hand conducted coordination to the leaders of service areas, as well as with the AFP, TFBL and respective local government unit, in preparation to the same activity by 1st to 2nd week of July. This activity is contributory to Output 2.3, peace promoting socio economic and humanitarian interventions delivered. Technical Inputs on the Draft Concept Note on the ASEAN Workshop on Enhancing the Role of Women in Peace and Sustainable Security. The OPAPP provided technical inputs on the draft concept note on the ASEAN Workshop on Enhancing the Roles of Women in Peace and Sustainable Security submitted on 15 June 2020. OPAPP emphasized the need to identify the outcomes that the workshop intends to achieve and the need to direct the activity to a discussion on the new context vis-à-vis its implications to women and girls possessing varying capacities, vulnerabilities, roles and needs within the intersecting dimensions of gender, peace and security. Reviewed and assessed CSOs for GCERF funding. The Global Community Engagement and Resilience Fund is not for profit Swiss Foundation that supports local community level initiatives that addresses the local drivers of violent extremism, and trengthen resilience against the violent extremist agendas. For the second round of funding, there are twenty eight (28) civil society organizations nationwide applied, the OPAPP reviewed and assessed the intents, profiles, and proposals and have turned over to DILG-PCVE PMO for finalization and Resource person for GAD WPS. The Philippine National Police had conducted a 2 day on line Gender and Development (GAD) Webinar for the first batch composed of Police Non-Commissioned Personnel (PNCO) with the ranks of Patrolman/Patrolwoman to Police Staff Sergeant and second batch composed of Police Commissioned officers with the ranks of Police Lieutenant to Police Major who are assigned at Women and Children Protection Desk. An OPAPP representative served as resource person on the topic-Laws on Women and Girl Child Relative to the NAPWPS, 80 participants have attended the GAD Webinar. The session provided the participants a more comprehensive knowledge on the different concepts related to gender and women, peace, and security, and to help them recognize these concepts' importance in attaining gender equality in conflict affected areas. Director Salvan was also the resource person on WPS for the batch 2 of DFA-FSI Pre Departure Seminar. DFA and other government agency personnel capacitated on WPS, which aimed to identify and discuss gender issues in peace building initiatives and armed conflict situations. Processed and complied requirements for the IEC materials for National Womens' Month, and Anti VAWC campaign such as t-shirts and katsa bags, which tshirts are to be distributed upon inspected by the COA. Attended the meeting DILG PCVE PMO SJP Cluster via zoom, presented the implementation plans of the agencies such as NCMF, DND, DOJ, DFA, OPAPP, in which some of the funds were re- aligned for COVID19 response. The agencies are encouraged to refine their implementation plans for finalization, and presentation on next meeting by the end of June. OPAPP have to revisit the implementation plan and to confirm with respective peace tables. Attended via zoom the monthly meeting of Task Force Balik Loob. The draft Joint Attended via zoom the implementation of E-CLIP for Former Violent Extremist (FVEs) was presented. It was also reported by the WesMincom, that they already processed the certificates from the Joint AFP PNP Intelligence Committee of almost 700 former violent extremist from the different provinces in BARRM, once the implementing guidelines signed, government interventions will be provided, Philhealth through OPAPP PAMANA will be extended to the identified FVEs. SHAPED will be preparing the list of this FVEs for endorsement to PhilHelath through AMOs in Zambasulta and ERR/Northern Mindanao. This activity is contributory to Output 1.2. on programs for the return of combatants, their families, and communities to productive and normal lives implemented. The normalization track runs alongside and in complementarity to the political-legislative work on the Bangsamoro. Normalization is defined in the agreements as a process whereby conflict affected communities can "return to conditions where they can achieve their desired quality of life, which includes the pursuit of sustainable livelihood and political participation within a peaceful of deliberative society." This also aims to accomplish the gradual decommissioning of MILF forces and their weapons; provide assistance to MILF former combatants, their families and communities; and transform former MILF camps into peaceful and productive communities. The normalization program under the CAB covers four aspects: security, socio-economic development, confidence-building measures, and transitional justice and reconciliation.

The Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) conducted its 6th meeting on 19 February 2020 in Cotabato City. The meeting tackled proposed Terms of Reference on the role of the Nonviolent Peace Force and Swiss Foundation for Mine Action on its work under the Normalization Program, roundtable discussion on small arms and light weapons, and development program for communities outside the six previously-acknowledged MILF camps.


To strengthen and ensure collaborative efforts among normalization mechanisms, the JNC held a briefing and action planning sessions with the government representatives to the Task Force for Decommissioned Combatants and their Communities (TFDCC), Joint Task Force on Camps Transformation (JTFCT), and Joint Peace and Security Committee (JPSC) on 6 March 2020 to discuss important issues and updates regarding the implementation of normalization projects and activities.

### 67,657.58 a. Security Aspect.

Completion of the Phase 2 Decommissioning of MILF Combatants and Weapons. The second phase of decommissioning of MILF combatants and weapons, which began on 28 August 2019, has concluded on 10 March 2020 and met the target of 12,000 combatants and 2,100 weapons decommissioned. The closing ceremony for the Phase 2 decommissioning was set on 18 March 2020, but it was postponed due to the suspension of mass gatherings and implementation of social distancing policy due to the outbreak of COVID-19 in the Philippines.

For this quarter, the decommissioning covered three clusters –Tamparan cluster in Lanao del Sur, Camp Salman cluster in Zamboanga Sibugay, and Al Barka cluster in Basilan. A total of 3,121 combatants and 558 weapons were decommissioned from February 18 to March 10. Each of the decommissioned combatants received a transitional immediate cash assistance amounting PhP 100,000.00 provided by the TFDCC through the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD).

To help ensure the safety of all personnel that are stationed in the decommissioning site and to avoid threat or sabotage during the process, the JPSC, together with Independent Decommissioning Body – Verification and Monitoring Assistance Teams (IDB-VMAT), conducted a security survey inspection at the Assembly and Processing Area (APA) and site inspection and visitation to the deployment sites of the Joint Peace and Security Teams (JPSTs) at the APA and the Secured Arms Storage Area (SASA) on January 8 and 23, respectively.



The Memorandum of Agreement between OPAPP and the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) on the disposal of ammunitions has been signed. The scheduled disposal of the decommissioning ammunitions was postponed due to COVID-19 outbreak.

The decommissioned firearms are currently stored at SASA in Camp Abubakar, Bañra, Maguindanao and secured by the JPST following the turn-over of their barracks on 12 February 2020.

With its mandate to track and monitor the implementation of normalization activities based on agreed milestones and timeline, the Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) summarized the accomplishments of the Phase 2 Decommissioning in a one-page snapshot on the next page.

<u>JPST Training and Deployment.</u> In addition to the five JPSTs deployed to provide security during the decommissioning, one JPST has been deployed in SASA to secure the storage of the decommissioned weapons. The duty strength of each deployed JPST is properly maintained, while allowing the members to alternately go on a break to see their families and attend to personal matters. Shown below is the deployment area of six JPSTs, as of 31 March 2020.

Since the completion of the construction of JPST stations supported by the Japanese Government is the key for the full deployment of the 15 JPSTs trained in 2019, the target deployment in March 2020 was tentatively moved to August 2020 as the new projected date of completion by July 2020 (assuming the construction will resume immediately by 13 April 2020).

Regarding the funding support for the training and deployment of the JPSTs, the JNC and the JPSC have been coordinating with the AFP and the Philippine National Police for the execution of Memoranda of Agreement in 2020. As of January 2020, the 75 MILF-BIAF members to the JPSTs and completed the Basic Military Training have received their additional financial support amounting to PhP 6,000.00, pursuant to Executive Order No. 94, s. 2019, otherwise known as "Authorizing the Grant of Financial Support to the Citizen Armed Force Geographical Unit Active Auxiliary Service".

<u>Disbandment of Private Armed Groups.</u> In February 2020, the Implementing Rules and Operational Guidelines of the National Task Force for the Disbandment of Private Armed Groups (NTF-DPAGs) in the Areas of the Bangsamoro and the Adjacent Regions IX to XII has been approved by Executive Secretary Salvador C. Medialdea. OPAPP transmitted the signed document to the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) on 12 March 2020.

The JPSC is holding constant coordination with AFP and PNP on the collection of data and reports on private armed groups. The crafting of proposal for various schemes and activities that can be harmonized as platforms for the surrendering of loose firearms is ongoing. The said proposal is expected to be tabled for initial discussion with MILF counterparts during the next JPSC meeting

Rido Monitoring and Support to Conflict Resolution. The JPSC Secretariat, together with the Coordinating Committee on the Cessation of Hostilities (CCCH) and the Ad Hoc Joint Action Group (AHJAG), have started collating data from the AFP and PNP on establishing a database of rido incidents and actors involved. Initial data shows that there were 397 rido happened from 2011 to 2019. Through this, the JPSC Secretariat staff and JPST personnel are gradually being linked up to the CCCH and AHJAG joint staff during conflict resolution activities in PNP Regional Office in BARMM and Region XII.

### Socio-economic Development Programs

<u>Transformation Program for the Decommissioned Combatants.</u> A total of 3,121 combatants were profiled and provided transitional immediate cash-based assistance by the TFDCC, through the DSWD – of which 145 combatants received their cash assistance on a later date.

Following the delays on the pay-out and the declaration of Enhanced Community Quarantine and lockdowns in several parts of the country, the remaining 111 out of 145 decommissioned combatants were prevented to return to their residences in Sulu. Despite the efforts exerted by the TFDCC, JNC, JPSC, and Joint Normalization Division (JND) to facilitate their transport, the 111 decommissioned combatants are still stranded in Camp Darapanan, Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao, as of 31 March 2020. OPAPP and the MILF ensured that their needs, such as accommodation, food, medical needs, and advisory support, were provided. On 25 March 2020, the TFDCC Secretariat requested the Provincial Government of Sulu to assist the families and dependents of these 111 decommissioned combatants.

 <u>Camps</u> <u>Transformation</u> <u>Program.</u> To jumpstart the process of crafting the Camps Transformation Plans, the JTFCT, together with the Bangsamoro Planning and Development Authority (BPDA), held a series of capacity development programs to prepare community leaders for community development.

From February 18 to 19, an overall framework formulation and project inception for the Camps Transformation Planning was conducted. The MILF commanders from Camps Abubakar, Omar, and Badre participated in a two-day program for exposure and capacity development on good governance from February 15 to 26, while those from Camps Bilal, Bushra, and Rajamuda took part in the same program from February 27 to 28.

On March 3, the JTFCT met BPDA and their facilitators to finalize the tools and approaches or methodologies for the area visits and assessments, and firm-up the tasking, schedules, and other arrangements for the field visits. In each camp, pilot testing will be conducted in one barangay for the crafting and implementation of the Camps Transformation Plans (CTP). In the CTP formulation, the conduct of a series of area profiling, area assessment, and data validation in pilot barangays will be part of the process. Two out of six camps – Camp Badre on March 4 and Camp Abubakar on March 10 – already underwent the pilot core area assessment. The schedule for the four remaining camps (Rajamudah, Omar, Bushra, and Bilal) will be scheduled once quarantine measures on COVID-19 are lifted, and regular office operations have been resumed.

# c. Confidence Building Measures

<u>Updates on the Drafting of the Presidential Proclamation on Amnesty.</u> Following the presidential directive on amnesty, Executive Secretary Medialdea issued a memorandum on 27 March 2019 to the Department of National Defense (DND), Department of Justice (DOJ), and OPAPP to undertake an inter-agency coordination to draft an amnesty proclamation for the various classes of rebels, insurgents, and members of rebel groups, and formulate the parameters of the amnesty grant.

During the hearing of the Senate Committee on Local Government for the implementation of the Bangsamoro Organic Law (BOL), Senator and Committee Chair Francis No. Tolentino urged OPAPP to push for the approval of the amnesty proclamation. In response to this directive, the OPAPP Legal Affairs Department sent a letter to the DOJ requesting support and assistance for the immediate presidential approval on amnesty proclamation on 16 March 2020. As of this report, no feedback has been communicated to OPAPP.

Previously, OPAPP forwarded the draft copy of the amnesty proclamation for the MILF to the DOJ, DND, and Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) for comments and recommendations.

## d. Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Component

<u>Crafting of a Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Roadmap.</u> From January to March, meetings, orientations, and workshops had been conducted for the formulation of a transitional justice and reconciliation roadmap. A draft roadmap was already submitted for comments and recommendations of Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization (ICCMN) Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Cluster member-agencies.

In February, Technical Working Group on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation were created in AFP and PNP to define specific agency tasks based on the recommendations of Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commission (TJRC). Capacity building efforts were initiated for the Technical Working Group members to prepare them on the task of roadmap formulation.

Former TJRC Chairperson and Special Envoy of the Swiss Foreign Affairs Department Mo Bleeker visited the Philippines in February 2020. During her visit, a discussion / workshop with the Technical Working Group on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation (TWG-TJR) and officials of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) was conducted in Cotabato City on February 17. On February 24, she met the GPH and MILF Implementing Panels and the roadmap formulation formed part of the meeting. It was decided that a copy of the draft roadmap will be circulated for comments. The MILF leadership also signified interest to participate in related workshops on transitional justice and reconciliation that will be held.

On 11 to 12 March 2020, the OPAPP Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Unit facilitated an interunit meeting to review and propose enhancements of OPAPP inputs to the 2020 work plan, which 
was an output of the Working Groups, across the four pillars — Truth / Education, Justice and 
Reparations, Land Issues, and Guarantee of Non-Recurrence. This meeting was in line to the 
ongoing efforts on enhancing the roadmap of the transitional justice and reconciliation component. 
A workshop for four working groups under the ICCMN Transitional Justice and Reconciliation 
Cluster was scheduled on 13 March 2020, but it was postponed due to COVID-19 pandemic.

- Transitional Justice and Dealing with the Past. The second batch of member-agencies of the ICCMN Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Cluster underwent the Transitional Justice and Dealing with the Past Training Camp facilitated by the Independent Working Group on Transitional Justice and Dealing with the Past on 9 to 10 March 2020 in Antipolo City, Rizal. This activity sought to understand the context of transitional justice in the Bangsamoro, familiarize with the basics of transitional justice in light of the Dealing with Past framework, and come up with an initial agency action plan on the implementation of transitional justice initiatives based on the recommendations of the Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commission (TJRC). A same training-workshop for the PNP Technical Working Group on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation was planned by last week of March, but it was cancelled due to COVID-19 pandemic.
- <u>Continuing Mapping of Atrocities and CSOs with TJR-Related Component.</u> The OPAPP Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Unit has an ongoing initiative to map out, gather data, and develop a database of mass atrocities committed and a list of profiles of organizations working on transitional justice and reconciliation.

Normalization Program Amid The Covid-19 Pandemic. With the COVID-19 pandemic, the entire country has been placed under a State of National Calamity starting March 16, thereby causing major shifts in all aspects of the Filipino's way of living. The Normalization Program in the Bangsamoro is no exemptions on the current realities being confronted due to the crisis. Measures were undertaken to address the immediate concerns of normalization stakeholders and activities. The following are the initiatives implemented to avert the ongoing public health emergency:

1. An Operations Center in OPAPP Central Office supervised by the CAB Implementation Department / JNC Secretariat, and a counterpart Coordinating Center Mindanao managed by the JND were organized to gather pertinent information on COVID-19 responses, coordinate with the concerned national government agencies on the needs of BARMM and its provinces, Lanao del Norte, and Sultan Kudarat, produce daily situation reports submitted to Secretary Galvez, and conduct preliminary assessments in the ground situation.

In order to monitor the situation of the COVID-19 outbreak, the Operations Center, with the assistance of the CAB Implementation Department Monitoring and Evaluation Team, launched a dashboard system that reflected the status of COVID-19 cases and different issues in the implementation of COVID-related responses in Mindanao. These information were based from the data culled out by the Coordinating Center Mindanao.

- 2. OPAPP, in partnership with UNDP, delivered 144 sacks of rice to the six JPSTs deployed in different areas across the BARMM on 30 March 2020. The provision of rice supplies is part of the OPAPP's commitment to provide administrative and logistical support to the JPSTs under the SPAN Programme. The JPSTs provided security to MILF communities and decommissioned combatants during these times. They also help on transportation and distribution of food packs to stranded decommissioned combatants in Camp Darapanan, Maguindanao.
- 3. The TFDCC led the provision of support for the 108 MILF decommissioned combatants and three focal persons from Provincial Committees of Northern, Central, and Southern Sulu who were unable to return home due to the implementation of lockdowns in several areas in Mindanao since 16 March 2020. The body was able to set-up and implement the Advisory and Referral Support and immediately respond to the needs of these stranded decommissioned combatants.

To subdue the unlikely impact of the pandemic to the stranded decommissioned combatants and their families, the TFDCC wielded all its efforts to request for their safe passage, however, requests were not favorably acted upon due to the existing directives that complemented the presidential proclamation on enhanced community quarantine.

On 18 March 2020, the JNC Secretariat began preparing a one-month logistics plan to support the extended stay of these decommissioned combatants in Maguindanao and made the necessary coordination with Sulu-based commanders to help explain their situation. It also continued the provision on the needs of the decommissioned combatants for the duration of the enhanced community quarantine.

#### 2nd Quarter

The Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) conducted its 6th meeting on 19 February 2020 in Cotabato City. The meeting tackled proposed Terms of Reference on the role of the Nonviolent Peace Force and Swiss Foundation for Mine Action on its work under the Normalization Program, roundtable discussion on small arms and light weapons, and development program for communities outside the six previously-acknowledged MILF camps.

To strengthen and ensure collaborative efforts among normalization mechanisms, the JNC held a briefing and action planning sessions with the government representatives to the Task Force for Decommissioned Combatants and their Communities (TFDCC), Joint Task Force on Camps Transformation (JTFCT), and Joint Peace and Security Committee (JPSC) on 6 March 2020 to discuss important issues and updates regarding the implementation of normalization projects and activities.

## Security Aspect.

- Decommissioning of MILF Combatants and Weapons. On 17 April 2020, JNC Co-Chair Ariel Hernandez wrote to JNC Co-Chair Eduard Guerra to request the assistance of JNC-MILF in the submission of the list of MILF combatants and weapons for the Phase 3 decommissioning, which was discussed by the GPH and MILF Implementing Panels during their meeting on 24 February 2020 in Cotabato City wherein the MILF Implementing Panel has agreed to submit the said list. The submission of the list will provide ample time for planning and preparations for the next phase, particularly in addressing the details required by OPAPP for budget releases, and the challenges taking into consideration the lessons learned during the Phase 2. Based on the Joint Normalization Meeting on 29 May 2020, the list will be submitted by the last week of July 2020.
- JPST Training and Deployment. The JPSTs were continuously providing security at the Assembly and Processing Area (APA) at the Old Provincial Capitol in Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao, and at the Secured Arms Storage Area (SASA) in Camp Abubakr, Barira, Maguindanao. As of 30 June 2020, there are six JPSTs that are currently deployed.
- Rido Monitoring and Support to Dispute Resolution. In view of the recent cases of rido that erupted in the Bangsamoro communities and its adjacent localities, the Joint Peace and Security Committee (JPSC) and its Secretariat participated in the following activities as part of its role to assist in rido settlements:
- Field verification at Sitio Bahar, Barangay Pandan, South Upi, Maguindanao on 1 June 2020 to ascertain and mediate on the reported encounter between the members of the MILF and the Teduray group in connection with land issues;
- Peace dialogue in Polomolok, South Cotabato on 12 June 2020; and
- Series of peace meetings in Pikit, North Cotabato to address the cases of rido in Barangays Talitay and Rajah Buayan.

The JPSC submitted an initial database on rido to the GPH Implementing Panel Chair on 26 June 2020 through the Coordinating Committee on the Cessation of Hostilities (CCCH), together with an analysis on the currently ongoing ridos within the past three months involving various MILF groups. Historical research on rido to aid future conflict resolution mechanisms has been already started.

Disbandment of Private Armed Groups. Following the approval of the Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Memorandum Circular No. 83, s. 2015 that created the National Task Force on the Disbandment of Private Armed Groups (NTF-DPAGs), the JNC, which is the head of the NTF-DPAGs Secretariat, organized a Secretariat meeting with the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), and Philippine National Police (PNP). The meeting resulted on the designation of representatives from the NTF-DPAGs Secretariat member-agencies. It was agreed that a small group meeting to be led by the DILG as the NTF-DPAGs chair will be conducted to come up a baseline information on the private armed groups that the program will be covered. The list will be presented during the reconvening of the NTF-DPAGs by the last week of July.

b. Socio-economic Development Programs. On 5 June 2020, the Implementing Panels agreed to subsume the mandate of the Working Group on Vulnerable Sectors on the work of the TFDCC. With this decision, the Working Group established in 2016 will no longer be constituted.

On 15 June 2020, the TFDCC agreed to revisit the framework for socioeconomic development program for decommissioned combatants, their families and communities to adjust based on the "new normal" and align with the current government efforts on COVID-19.

For this quarter, regular coordination activities with concerned implementing national government agencies were undertaken, particularly those that will be involved in the initial roll-out of socioeconomic programs that will be sourced out from the PhP 412.34 million Congress-introduced increase in the Locally Funded Program – Normalization Program in the Bangsamoro budget for 2020. As communicated, the implementing agencies will formulate a catch-up plan to keep up with the projected timeline of transfer of funds. The following are the programs and implementing agencies involved in this endeavour:

- Peaceful Return and Aggressive Inclusion Social Entrepreneurship with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI);
- Health Insurance Grant with the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PHIC);
- Bangsamoro Grants-in-Aid Higher Education Program with the Commission on Higher Education (CHED);
- Alternative Learning System in the Bangsamoro with the Department of Education (DEPED);
- Construction of Equipped Rural Health Units with Birthing Facilities in Six MILF Camps and Communities of Decommissioned Combatants with the Department of Health (DOH); and
- Rehabilitation of Irrigation System with the National Irrigation Administration (NIA).

Coordination was also conducted with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and the IDB for the roll-out of the reengagement process and comprehensive needs assessment for combatants. Exploratory talks with the World Bank have been ongoing to discuss the setting up of Information Advisory and Referral System (IARS) for the decommissioned combatants based on case management to monitor the combatant-to-civilian transformation of decommissioned Bangsamoro Islamic Armed Force (BIAF).

Assistance to 111 Stranded Decommissioned Combatants. The TFDCC continued its provision of assistance to the 111 decommissioned combatants, who are currently stranded in Camp Darapanan, Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao since March 2020 and restricted to come back in their places of origin due to the imposition of lockdowns in several localities in Mindanao. The TFDCC ensured that said decommissioned combatants were checked and provided with their basic needs for the duration of community lockdown. The concern of these decommissioned combatants was brought up to the Office of the Chief Minister of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM), and the national government through OPAPP. Requests had been sent to the Provincial Government of Sulu, where they are presently residing, to allow their entry to the province in time for the observance of the holy month of Ramadhan. However, the Office of Provincial Governor Abdusakur Tan denied these requests and invoked the lockdown being observed in Sulu. Thrantineation of the CAB by building the capacities of relevant actors to sustain peace through the mitigation of factor

In May 2020, the Sulu Provincial Government, through an Executive Order, allowed the entry of these individuals, upon presentation of medical certification that they are in good health. The TFDCC facilitated the medical check-ups and x-ray examination for 108 decommissioned combatants, three focal persons, and one TFDCC-Basilan member at the United Doctors Hospital in Cotlabato City. On 20 May 2020, they were transported to Polloc Port in Parang, Maguindanao, where a private ferry was docked that transported them to Sulu.

# c. Confidence Building Measures

Transformation Planning for Six Previously-Acknowledged MILF Camps. The Camps Transformation Program is envisioned as a six-year initiative that will provide the overall process and direction for transformation of six previously-acknowledged MILF camps from 2020 to 2025. In doing so, a camp transformation planning is conducted to come up a roadmap to implement the transformation program of the six previously-acknowledged MILF camps into peaceful and productive communities. The camp transformation plan will provide equal focus on three elements that will underpin camp transformation – human security of decommissioned combatants and their families, community development (e.g. social, cultural, economic, etc.), and area development (e.g. physical, environmental). The plan formulation, which will be done in partnership with the Bangsamoro Planning and Development Agency (BPDA), will be undertaken in three phases – preparation phase, plan formulation phase, and refinement and finalization phase.

After the series of consultations and area assessments conducted by the BPDA, the following are the identified core areas that will serve as center of development:

- Camp Abubakar: Barangay Tugaig, Barira, Maguindanao;
- Camp Badre: Barangay Ahan, Guindulungan, Maguindanao;
- · Camp Omar: Barangay Talibadok, Datu Hoffer, Maguindanao;
- Camp Rajamuda: Barangay Rajahmuda, Pikit, North Cotabato;
- · Camp Bushra: Barangay Sandab, Butig, Lanao del Sur; and
- Camp Bilal: Barangay Tamparan, Munai, Lanao del Norte.

On 29 June 2020, the GPH JTFCT Co-Chairs released a resolution recommending the delivery of pending development projects for the six previously-acknowledged MILF camps, construction of farm-to-market roads, and changing the GPH camp coordinators-representatives in Camps Badre and Omar. The pending development projects, such as solar power projects, community living room, and quick response projects, and farm-to-market roads form part of the PhP 1.46 billion budget proposal to be submitted by OPAPP to the Department of Budget and Management (DBM), which is based on the Unprogrammed Appropriations of the Normalization Program in the Bangsamoro under the 2020 General Appropriations Act.

Development Program for MILF Communities Outside of the Six Previously-Acknowledged MILF Camps. On 5 June 2020, the JNC Secretariat met the UNDP and Balay Mindanaw to tackle the resumption of preliminary activities for the development program for MILF communities, which were supposed to be held in March, but were postponed due to COVID-19 pandemic. Due to the restrictions brought by COVID-19 pandemic, it was agreed to recalibrate the target for this year and prioritize five areas as pilot for the program. As proposed by the JNC-GPH Secretariat to the JNC-MILF, the MILF communities in Tungawan, Zamboanga Sibugay and Al-Barka, Basilan should be included as pilot areas. The JNC-GPH Secretariat also requested to the JNC-MILF to recommend on the three other areas to be covered by the program. As of this report, the JNC-MILF is yet to provide their recommendations.

# d. Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Component

Crafting of a Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Roadmap. A set of parameters was drafted by the OPAPP and issued to assist the ICCMN Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Cluster member-agencies on assessing their commitments to support the implementation of a transitional justice and reconciliation program.

The parameters seek to firm up the agency's commitments vis-à-vis its current priorities due to the pandemic and transition to the "new normal". The review will be guided by the following:

- Relevance It refers to key interventions of strategic value that can significantly contribute
  or respond to transitional justice and reconciliation program measures to address legitimate
  grievances, correct historical injustices, and address human rights violations and marginalization;
- Importance It refers to basics or "first-things-first" prerequisite activities that will the lay the foundations of a sound transitional justice and reconciliation program;
- Urgency It refers to quick response / stop-gap measures needed to immediately address problems that may have detrimental implications to the community at large and the peace process; and
- Doability It refers to the programs, activities, and projects that can be realistically
  implemented within the current Duterte administration considering the priorities of the agency.

As of this report, seven out of 22 agencies have submitted recommendations to the OPAPP.

• Conducting Technical-level Coordination Meetings with the Representatives of the MILF Technical Working Group on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation (TWG-TJR). Coordination was made with the MILF TWG-TJR to follow up on the GPH Implementing Panel's proposed amendment to the Terms of Reference of the TWG-TJR transmitted by its Secretariat in May 2020. Based on the coordination made, the MILF TWG-TJR is yet to consult and seek guidance from the MILF Implementing Panel Chair on the proposed amendment.

Coordination with the MILF TWG-TJR was also maximized to get a sense of priority programs and target areas or communities from their side. It hopes to inform the ICCMN Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Cluster and ensure resources are maximized and complemented by the "jointness" on implementing the transitional justice and reconciliation efforts.

Support to Community-Based Initiatives on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation. The OPAPP undertaken the continuing endeavour on creating a database of mass atrocities in Mindanao and civil society organization with mandates related with transitional justice and reconciliation operating within and outside the jurisdiction of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM). The OPAPP also drafted proposal for the conduct of community visits with previous experiences on mass atrocities, and conducted research on community reparations models. Target communities to be supported have yet to be determined since these are subject to the concurrence of joint TWG-TJR and approval of the Implementing Panels. Continuing coordination, consultation, and monitoring with the Bangsamoro Commission on Women (BCW) on the status of their transitional justice and reconciliation-related programs, especially for women and other programs, and on the possible engagements or partnerships after the lifting of rantineation of the CAB b

### Youth, Peace and Security.

Accomplishment Report on the Implementation of Philippine Youth Development Plan 2017-2022. The National Youth Commission (NYC) requested for OPAPP's accomplishment report relative to the Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) 2017-2022 implementation and for OPAPP's youth focal persons. In response, OPAPP, through PSPD coordinated with the Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Unit, to gather information on the said request. OPAPP submitted its report and the designation of focal persons on 17 June 2020.
