The OPAPP Information Systems Strategic Plan (ISSP) 2019 to 2023 was approved by the DICT in August 2020. The ISSP refers to a three (3) to five (5) year computerization framework of an agency which describes how the organization intends to strategically use ICT in pursuit of its mission and functions. With its implementation, the following were accomplished: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Acquired and renewed software. OPAPP is utilizing an annual based subscription for its Office productivity suite. The OPAPP ICT have acquired perpetual licenses and volume-based licenses to save in our annual based subscriptions in the next few years while addressing the need of OPAPP to add additional licenses. • Document tracking tool for Central, Finance and OSEC. Central, Finance and OSEC have requested for a system to monitor incoming and outgoing documents in their respective units. This is to improve the tool to track incoming and outgoing documents as per user suggested modifications. • 2nd QUARTER Enhancement of the agency Information and Communications Technology (ICT). Due to the effort of ICT to provide approval of the agency's Information Systems Strategic Plan modification (ISSP), the funds that were approved and provided this year and next year will to support the agency in it's capital outlay procurement including VTC requirements (e.g internet, vtc equipment, laptops, tablets, printers and infrastructure upgrade). These procurements are very much needed by the agency as we move to the new normal. Even with the limited resources, the ICT system developers was able to complete and start most of the requested systems. Completing these systems resulted in accurate tracking of ICT's performance. The OPAPP Program Dashboard which was completed this June 2021 will automate the monitoring and update of OPAPP's Unit Program and Fund utilization. Projects like structured cabling and the procurement of security firewall is on track helping secure and stabilized the agency's ICT infrastructure. As part of the OPAPP's continuous effort to to improve quality in its operations and services in line with the Administration's thrust to ensure 'real change' in the government and in compliance to the Executive Order No. 605, s. 2007, <i>Institutionalizing the Structure, Mechanisms and Standards to Implement the Government Quality Management Program</i>, was issued to all departments and branches of the Executive branch, including all government-owned and controlled corporations (GOCCs) and government financial institutions, to effect improvements in public sector performance. Bulk of the disbursements were payments of OPAPP mandatory expenses, Accounts Payable 2020, fund transfer to implementing agencies under Operations (For Congress-Introduced Funds), and support in combating COVID-19.

				<p>3. Conduct of the Brown Bag Session on Republic Act 11313 Safe Spaces Act of 2019 in celebration of the National Women's Month 2021. On March 8, 2021, the OPAPP hosted a Brown Bag Session on the Safe Spaces Act 2019. The activity provided a platform for the distinguished resource persons from the Philippine Commission on Women (PCW), Philippine National Police-Women and Children Protection Center (PNP-WCPC), and Bangsamoro Women Commission (BWC), to discuss issues and challenges faced by women and girls, which were aggravated by the COVID-19 pandemic. The event resulted in the increased awareness of participants on the women's and girls' plight in public and private spheres and on the government's response to the issues and challenges presented. Ultimately, the session created an opportunity for OPAPP personnel to pose relevant questions, and impart insights, to keep homes, workplace, and public spaces safer as the country navigates through the cross-cutting impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.</p> <p>4. Conflict Sensitive and Peace Promoting (CSPP) Approaches for OPAPP personnel. OPAPP employees composed of 57 technical and administrative staff from 24 OPAPP offices, departments and units were trained on the Basic Conflict-Sensitivity and Peace-Promotion Training Part II (Module 2 and 3) on 14-15 January 2021 and Part III (Module 4) on 29 January 2021.</p> <p>2ND QUARTER</p> <p>1. Performance Governance System (PGS) Compliance Stage. In line with the efforts institutionalize the PGS framework in OPAPP, the PSPD led the establishment of the Office of the Strategy Management (OSM) and the Multi-Sectoral Governance Council (MSGC). Office order on the OSM and the terms of reference of the MSGC were approved during the first quarter. In furtherance of this, the PSPD gathered nominations of OPAPP departments and submitted these to the PAPRU for approval in May 2021. To date, eleven (11) MSGC members confirmed their membership in the said council. The first MSGC meeting was originally scheduled on June 18 but was cancelled due to the non-availability of the Secretary.</p> <p>2. Furthermore, the data management practices for each program were assessed to determine the gaps and improvements needed to aid in the operationalization of MEAL plans. Starting February 19, OPAPP Departments have been regularly submitting their respective weekly PGS Program Dashboards which track the achievement of PGS targets as provided in the PGS roadmaps and scorecards, financial utilization, and the conduct of PAPS. All submissions have been reviewed for standardization and quality checks to ensure that these have been duly accomplished and are addressing the information need for operational decision-making. There is a simultaneous effort in automating the weekly dashboard submission in collaboration with the Information and Communications Technology Division. In line with the effort to increase the access of OPAPP personnel and partners to peace information materials, the AMTYPRC continues to disseminate access to subscribed magazines (Time magazine and The Economist) as well as other publication from the private and other government agencies (FAO Philippines Newsletter, ASEAN Magazine, etc.) the list of new library acquisitions through e-mail blast sent to all personnel. By the end of the 1st Quarter of 2021, total of 30 library clientele was recorded as of reporting.</p> <p>b. Management of Peace Information Materials. The collection of peace process-relevant materials and management of the same are on-going. The OPAPP's Knowledge Management and Peace Institute Department (KMPID) worked with the GIP-MILF Secretariat in collecting the critical documents of the GPH-MILF Peace Process from 2011 to 2020. This compendium of documents was subsequently packaged and published as a knowledge product. In addition, consolidation of experiences, issues, lessons learned, and best practices in the implementation of the Bantay Gubat program was conducted in line with the documentation of the CBA-CPLA Peace Process. Coordination with target stakeholders and partners is ongoing for the documentation of other components of the CBA-CPLA peace process. Next steps will be the conduct of data gathering activities for other program components, writing of technical report, and publication of knowledge products. Meanwhile, for the MPDLGP program, the documentation design was discussed with ICPD and succeeding activities will be identification of projects and coordination with different NGAs, LGUs, and other peace partners to document their experiences in the implementation of the selected projects.

1. CSPP-MEAL System Development and Enhancement

a. Workshop on Harmonization of OPAPP Results Framework and cascading to PGS documents, WFPs, OPCR's and IPCR's. To facilitate the operationalization of the OPAPP Results Framework, the MEALD initiated in the previous quarter the Workshop Series on the Harmonization and Cascading of the OPAPP Results Framework (RF). For this quarter, said workshop series was continued for Programs 2, 5 and 6 to ensure the strategic alignment among the organizational goals, commitments of the departments, and expected outputs. The Program MEAL Plans were also reviewed, revised, and enhanced based on discussions among participants. The RF MEAL Plan was also reviewed to determine to which objectives and indicators each program contribute. Programs' data management practices were assessed to determine data management protocols that they can implement to improve them. The MEAL competencies of Programs' PCME focal persons and technical personnel were also assessed to inform the design of the basic M&E Training. Likewise, the Reporesent the proposed activity and acquire comments and/or recommendations from the said local mechanisms in Region XI. The activity was initially programmed in May 2021, but was cancelled due to a COVID-19 case in the venue. As decided by the research team, the activity shall be held on 20 – 23 July 2021 these workshops, reports containing highlights and assessment results were submitted to the program departments to inform the next steps of their MEAL system development/ enhancement. Conduct of the workshop for Program 1 is being scheduled with concerned Departments.

b. Basic M&E and Data Management Training. Following the FY 2021 Harmonization and Cascading workshop, a follow-through Basic M&E and Data Management Training for PCME Focal Persons and technical officers was conducted on 27-28 May 2021 to enable them to improve their MEAL competencies such that they can routinely apply MEAL knowledge and skills. A refresher on basics of M&E and data management was presented to level off understanding on the integration of MEAL processes across the program management cycle. Enhancements made to the OPAPP Results Framework were presented to vet sufficiency of adoption of inputs raised during the workshop series on OPAPP RF cascading. Participants of each program updated the plenary on efforts made and challenges encountered in operationalizing their PGS-based MEAL Plans. Next steps identified commonly included the finalization/ refinement of indicators and data collection methodologies; formalization of M&E structure within the program; and the need for continued technical esent the proposed act

Participants were refreshed on conventional data collection methods and tools and they were tasked to develop data collection tools for select program indicators that have no existing data methodology. Each program shared the tools they developed which they will still enhance/ refine based on comments during the training so that they can then facilitate tracking of program performance on those indicators. Participants then completed the data processing exercises using basic spreadsheet software functions (Microsoft Excel) that they can utilize in processing data that they regularly gather and consolidate. Inputs and exercises on maintaining data quality and data analysis, interpretation and results-based reporting were last to be conducted. To synthesize the training, OPAPP Data Management Standards was presented for Programs to consider in developing and executing their MEAL plans. Such standards aim to protect and ensure data quality, integrity, and accuracy. There will be another batch of the same trainingsesent the proposed activity and acquire comments and/or recommendations from the said local mechanism

c. Program Performance Evaluations for Program 3 and 7. Performance Assessment Results for Programs 3- Local Peace Engagement (LPE) Track 1 and Program 7 – Liquidation, Planning and Budgeting Process were completed for submission to the concerned programs/ departments. Areas assessed included policy, structure, process, feedbacking, monitoring, and sustainability. Reports contain findings and recommendations for consideration in the improvement of program implementation. Program Departments will be provided space for vetting and validation of the reports either through direct inputs or comments on the reports or through the conduct of validation meetings.

d. FY 2021 1st Semester Program Implementation Review. Management Committee Members, Area Management Officers (AMOs), and key technical personnel participated in the FY 2021 1st Semester Program Implementation Review (PIR) to assess the first semester accomplishments and contributions along the PGS scorecard, early wins, and corresponding challenges, strategies, innovations, and additional support and resources needed. It was found that some programs have progressed substantively to achieve their 1st semester targets and a portion of their 2nd semester targets. Early wins were documented for all programs including how these impacted on the OPAPP Strategic Position, along with other facets of its achievement. Programs also shared about how they have operationalized Conflict-Sensitive and Peace-Promoting practice in their planning and implementation. Held via Zoom teleconference on June 28, the PIR facilitated the generation of insights among programs that may be used to inform the mid-year planning processeesent the proposed activity and acquire comments and/or recommendations from the said local mechanisms in Region XI. The activity was initially programmed in May 2021, but was cancelled

e. Internal Roll-out of the Feedback and Response System (FRS). Programs have integrated the FRS in their implementation through the FRS Coordinators' efforts. In anticipation of possible system errors/ glitches and the potential influx of incoming public feedback, a soft-launch of the system was pursued first after the series of orientation/ hands-on training in lieu of a large scale roll-out. FRS Coordinators were advised to limit the sharing of the system internally and to those who will be raising feedback. This would also explain the limited number of log-in attempts. In the second semester, a full roll-out shall be conducted to cover more prospective areas and beneficiaries once concurrence of the Management Committee has been secured.

Operationalization of the Community Defense Units (CDUs).</i> Monthly Subsistence allowance of CDUs in Cauayan, Kabankalan City, Bago City, San Carlos City, Cadiz City, Tanjay City, Janiuay, and Aklan detachments were distributed from January to March in partnership with 3ID-AFP. 234 CDU members were able to receive their subsistence allowance, each amounting to PHP4,500.00.</p> <p>On 19 February 2021, the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between OPAPP and AFP was signed amounting to 10M for the CDU subsistence and supplemental allowance FY 2020.</p> <p><i>ii. Security Arrangements.</i> The Firearms, Explosives and Ammunitions disposal Committee (FEADC) VI together with the OPAPP conducted the final inspection of demilitarized firearms of the Kapatiran Members for final disposal. Demilitarized firearms (metal scrap) had a total weight of 513 kilograms and shall undergo the regular bidding process as indicated in the signed memorandum by the Chief PNP. Implementation Plan was presented by FEADC VI on 11 March 2021 at Rio Hall, PNP 6 Camp Delgado, Iloilo City.</p> <p>b. Social and Economic Reintegration of the KAPATIRAN Members</p> <p><i>i. Establishment of Settlement Sites.</i> For the establishment of settlement sites, the OPAPP conducted several coordination meetings and site monitoring visits to check on the status of the implementation, discuss and finalized details for new or additional implementation of interventions and to gather and address implementation concerns.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - On 15 January 2021, the OPAPP met with the NHA Regional Office VI focal Atty. John Solinap and NHA Iloilo represented by, NHA District Manager Fe Jamoyot, & Vergie Ramos in Iloilo City relative to the finalization of WFP, IRR and scheme of payment in acquiring a privately owned land as resettlement/congregated site for the Kapatiran in Iloilo. A meeting with the land owner, Kapatiran and LGU Janiuay was scheduled accordingly. Coordination with the concerned was also facilitated by OPAPP. - The OPAPP through its field office representative participated in the First Quarter Regional Development Council (RDC) meeting in Region VII last 26 February 2021 via VTC. The OPAPP presented the updates on the implementation of CID in Negros Oriental and the proposed PAMANA projects FY 2022 needing endorsement from the RDC. Endorsement of proposed projects was conditionally approved pending LDC endorsement from the Provincial Development Council of Negros Oriental. - Subsequently, on 15 March 2021, the OPAPP participated in the Development Administration Committee of PDC Negros Oriental special meeting wherein the proposed Projects FY 2022 under PAMANA was presented. This was duly approved at the committee level for endorsement to the PDC Full council. Schedule to be determined. - On 1 March 2021, the OPAPP coordinated with City Engr. Rachel Catague of LGU Kabankalan relative to the road grading leading to the PDC site in Brgy. Locotan, Kabankalan and the building permit application of the Kapatiran chapter. Accordingly, CEO will provide dumptruck and backhoe to be used to transport aggregates to patches of unpaved roads that were destroyed due to heavy rain. Also, Fees for the application of building permit will be waived. - The Local Government Unit of Cauayan conducted a site validation/survey of the water source in Sitio Binacay, Brgy. Talacdan, Cauayan, Negros Occidental. Subsequently, the Municipal Planning and Development Office (MPDO) drafted the Program of works and proposal to be endorsed by the Municipal Mayor to Governor Lacson for funding. The project will provide access to water to the Kapatiran members on site and CDU members. - The OPAPP, Kapatiran, PLGU Aklan, LGU Ibajay, and 552nd Engineer Construction Battalion of AFP conducted series of site visits in the PDC Site, Brgy. Cabugao, Ibajay, Aklan relative to the site development and construction of 16 Housing units for the Kapatiran. <p><i>ii. Livelihood and Employment.</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - On 13 January 2021, the OPAPP met with DENR Regional Focal Elmer Colacion, representatives from PENRO Negros Occidental, CENRO Kabankalan, and Kapatiran to discuss the final list of Kapatiran members for endorsement to DENR under PAMANA Forest Guard Program. - The OPAPP assisted DSWD RO VI represented by Cheddar Novilla, Regional Focal, in the conduct of consultation meetings cum provision of technical assistance on fund management and utilization with the Kapatiran Chapter Socio Economic Committee in Negros and Panay. As a result, LSG fund utilization of each chapter was updated and new project proposal finalized. DSWD RO VI also informed the Kapatiran Chapters of the reinforcement grant that will be provided for this year.

Last 15-26 March 2021, the OPAPP together with Mr. Nestor Quijano of the Socio-Economic Team (SET) facilitated the conduct of Rapid Project Management Appraisal in Kabankalan, Cauayan, San Carlos, Cadiz, EB Magalona, Bago & Tanjay Chapters respectively. Mr Quijano and the Kapatiran Socio Econ Committee of each chapter discussed the implementation status of their LSG Projects, facilitating and hindering factors that affect the project implementation and ways forward.

Specifically, through the coordination and facilitation of the OPAPP and the SET the following were accomplished:

- The Local Government Unit (LGU) Cauayan in partnership with the Central Philippine State University (CPSU) conducted a training workshop on vermi composting and concoction in support to organic farming. 25 Kapatiran members were capacitated on poultry production management, techniques on vermi composting and feed formulation. Kapatiran likewise received seedlings from the LGU such as eggplant, pepper, ampalaya, among others.
- The Livelihood project under DOLE Integrated Livelihood Program has been approved. The cheque amounting to PhP1,000,000.00 was awarded to Brgy. Locotan Government Unit (BLGU) as Accredited Co-Partner (ACP) together with Kapatiran Kabankalan Chapter as Beneficiary PO.
- A site validation with TESDA VI Regional Director Tizon and TESDA Aklan Provincial Director Babalo was conducted on 5 March 2021 in the PDC Site, Brgy. Cabugao, Ibajay, Aklan. The activity was initiated by TESDA to assess the needed additional intervention/ training program for the Kapatiran. In addition, the Provincial Government of Aklan distributed 30 sacks of rice for the Kapatiran CDU.
- The Multi-Service Caravan activity led by the Kapatiran Chapter in EB Magalona in partnership with AFP, PNP and LGU of EB Magalona. The Kapatiran and community members of barangay Tabigue availed services such as free medical consultations, medicines, dental services, supplemental feeding, food pack distribution, among others. A community dialogue/ orientation on EO 70 was likewise conducted.
- Complementary to the objectives of NAPWPS and as part of the National Women's Month Celebration, the OPAPP facilitated the conduct of Training Needs Assessment (TNA) for Kapatiran Women and Wives in Negros and Panay. Results of the TNA as follows:

The OPAPP coordinated with TESDA RO VI and concerned Local Government Units (LGU) relative to the identified skills and livelihood trainings of the Kapatiran Women in Transformation. TESDA and the LGUs expressed their support to the program. Training arrangement will be finalized.

On 30 March 2021, the Skills and Livelihood Training Program for the Kapatiran Women in Transformation was formally launched via VTC. The activity was hosted by OPAPP and was attended by JEMC Co-chair Usec Cesar Yano of the DND & Ms Veronica Tabara, RD Jerry Tizon of TESDA RO VI, representatives from DOLE, DSWD, Provincial Government of Negros Occidental and Kapatiran Chapter in Aklan,

Implementation of Social Protection Programs. The OPAPP facilitated the endorsement of individuals for enrollment to PAMANA Philhealth Sponsored Program FY 2021. A total of 8,410 individuals from the Community Peace Dividends (CPD) Barangays

B. Completion of the 2011 Memorandum of Agreement with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA - CPLA)

1. Support to the Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC) and Components

A video teleconference with MGEN Lawrence Mina, JEMC Chairperson was conducted on January 21, 2021. The meeting resulted in the following agreements:

- Identification of activities requiring the presence of the JEMC Chairperson;
- Coordinate with the CBA-CPLA Leaders so they can endorse individuals needed by OPAPP as CBA-CPLA Division staff to be based in SID;
- Emphasize the importance of Cordillera Autonomy in the entirety of interventions for the CBA-CPLA Peace Process

On 23 February 2021, a meeting with the JEMC Socio-Economic Component was convened in Baguio City. The meeting was attended by OPAPP (Joey Olpindo, Jessica Banganan, Marzsya Rañola), Department of Agriculture-CAR (Mr Julius Manabeng), Department of Social Welfare and Development-CAR (Ms. Libertine Balicdang), National Economic and Development Authority-CAR (Mr. Art Aro), and Technical Education and Skills Development Authority-CAR (Mr. Allen Yadao). The meeting resulted in the following agreements:

- The Socio-economic needs assessment will be spearheaded by DSWD-CAR;
- Endorsement of CBA-CPLA areas to socio-economic member agencies;
- Soft and hard skills training for the Peoples Organization will be identified by OPAPP;
- TESDA will provide support on skills training that are within their mandate;
- A follow-up meeting to prepare the tool for the conduct of needs assessment profiling of the former CBA-CPLA members and/or communities; and,
- Conduct of commitment setting process based on the results of the Needs Assessment Profiling for the deliverables of the member agencies.

On February 26, 2021, RCCD proposed the engagement of BGEN Ramon Yogyog (ReL) as a highly technical consultant of CBA-CPLA Peace Process. He will provide support in the Security Component of the JEMC particularly in the process of validating the "old guards" and actual accounts of programs and projects implemented by the AFP for the CBA-CPLA to include socio-economic integration programs.

			<p>A meeting with highly technical consultants was convened on March 26, 2021. The VTC meeting, via Google Meet, was attended by Dir. Susan Marcaida, Mr Thomas Kilip, BGEN Ramon Yogyog (Ret.), Joey Olpindo, Jessica Banganan and Marzsya Rañola. For Highlanders for Peace and Development Organization, Inc. of Abra, only those venturing on hot chili production in partnership with Herrero Farms based in Licuan-Baay, Abra were busy in terms of production technology. The PO in Sadanga, Mountain Province, the Sadanga Peden Livelihood Association was busy with their consumer store and swine fattening projects while the Matago-an Peoples Organization in Paracelis, Mountain Province was on its normal agricultural production activities. The rest of the Pos in Apayao, Benguet, and Kalinga, were on status quo and have not provided updates on their operation.</p> <p>3. Implementation of the OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED Study Grant Program. A total of two hundred forty-five (245) CPLA next of kin are grantees of OPAPP/PAMANA-CHED Study Grant Program. Of the 245 grantees, 132 grantees were tracked via Social Media to gather their academic status and their situation during the Enhanced Community Quarantine due to COVID-19. Of the 245 grantees, 101 have graduated, 23 are currently enrolled for AY 2020, 7 have stopped attending school, 4 waived their grants in lieu of other sponsored programs. Tracking is ongoing for the remaining 110 grantees.</p> <p>4. Implementation of Educational Assistance Program. Due to the implementation of the "Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education" or "Free Tuition Act", delays in accessing the allocated fund for the said program were encountered resulting to the non-release of financial grant since SY 2018. Discussed were the operationalization of the OPAPP-DENR-KAPATIRAN MOA; infrastructure support for the establishment of the PDC Site; Implementation of Kapatiran Livelihood projects; and security of the area.</p> <p>The problem-solving sessions of the JEMC with the KAPATIRAN Chapters resulted in the issuance of strategic guidance of the JEMC in order to fast track the holistic delivery of commitments under the CID.</p> <p>b. Joint Body on the Disposition of Arms and Forces (JB-DAF). The OPAPP facilitated the conduct of meeting with the JEMC, JEMC Secretariat, AFP & PNP PPDO, NORPPO, 3ID, 302nd BDE, Tanjay and Zamboangita PS, CDU Delcom, and Kapatiran on April 22 via VTC. The purpose of the urgent meeting was to discuss the updates on the investigation relative to the killing of a CDU member of Negros Oriental namely "Michael Parao"; and strategies/ security arrangement on how best to safeguard the safety and security of CDU and Kapatiran.</p> <p>On May 11-1, 2021, assisted the PNP-PPDC Chief PCOL Ritchie Posadas and staff on their scheduled site visits in Tanjay and Kabankalan PDC sites. The RPA Division likewise provided an overview/profile of the Kapatiran PDC site. Discussed were the security concerns of the Kapatiran and the current/ future activities onsite.</p> <p>Participated in the IEC activity of PNP NOCPPO held at Kapanalig Hall, Alfredo Montelibano, Bacolod City. In attendance were PBGEN Rolando Miranda of PNP PRO 6, PCOL Ritchie Posadas of PPDC, PCOL Romy Palgue of NOCPPO, and COPs of respective LGUs in Negros Occidental. Updates on the implementation status of the CID, including the profile of the Kapatiran settlement sites, were presented by the RPA Division. This was followed by an open forum wherein the RPA division answered and noted some questions coming from the PNP in relation to the security and remaining cases of the Kapatiran.</p>

c. **Socio-Economic Reintegration Cluster (SERC).** The OPAPP facilitated the conduct of SERC Sub-Cluster Meetings every Friday which provided for an avenue to update the body on the status of CID implementation particularly on the Socio-Economic Reintegration component as well as discuss issues and concerns needing immediate action:

· On April 16, 2021, the DSWD presented the results of the SWDI Assessment conducted in 2020. 614 Kapatiran members were interviewed by DSWD personnel using the SWDI Tool of which 30% are considered survival, 63% are subsistence, and 7% are sufficient. The SWDI result will serve as a reference of DSWD in identifying appropriate interventions for the Kapatiran

· On May 7, 2021, the RPA Division presented the results of the Training Needs Assessment (TNA) conducted for the Kapatiran Women and Wives in partnership with the respective Local Government Units (LGUs).

· Discussed during the May 14 SERC sub cluster meeting, were the status of Land acquisition thru NHA in Negros and Panay congregated; application requirements for accreditation to DOLE, DSWD, among others; and, updates on the construction of housing units for the Kapatiran in Tanjay, Kabankalan and Aklan.

· On June 11, 2021 SERC sub-cluster meeting, the SERC members agreed to create a separate viber group or the information offices/officers of member-agencies that will be included. The VG will be a platform for sending or posting their respective information about their programs, publication materials, information of their events relative to the Kapatiran. Also discussed is the agenda setting of the cluster. Consensus is for the cluster to have a major agenda to be tackled before convening the scheduled weekly meeting. If the agenda can be communicated thru the viber group, the meeting may be postponed unless a major agenda is tabled for discussion. The SERC Quarterly Meeting has been likewise scheduled on June 22, 2021. Each member-agency is requested to prepare an update report to be presented during the SERC 2nd Quarter meeting.

d. **Site Coordinating Teams (SCTs).** The OPAPP assisted the SCT secretariat of the concerned Local Government Unit (LGU) in the conduct of Quarterly/Monthly meetings of the SCT in Negros and Panay.

On 06 April 2021, the Aklan SCT convened to discuss the updates on the implementation of Kapatiran livelihood projects and infrastructure onsite particularly the status of construction of 16 housing units for the Kapatiran members in Brgy. Cabugao, Ibajay.

Through the peace efforts of the local SCT in Negros Oriental, the PDC boundary conflict between the Kapatiran and Claimants was resolved thru an actual survey conducted on 29 April 2021.

Participated in the 1st convening of the Provincial Site Coordinating Team in Negros Oriental on 8 June 2021 held at Negros Oriental Convention Centre, Capitol Area, Dumaguete City. In attendance were Gov. Roel Degamo of Negros Oriental, JEMC Co-chair Veronica Tabara; Brigade Commander Col Leonardo Peña; representatives from LGUs of Amilan, Tanjay, Sibulan; TESDA; DENR; NOPPO; and dept heads of the Provincial Govt. Presented were updates on the implementation of the Clarificatory Implementing Document (CID), profile of the Kapatiran Chapter in Negros Oriental, and the SCT composition and functions. This was followed by a discussion on the proposed eco-tourism project of the Kapatiran on site (blue lake lagoon and tunnel). A special meeting was scheduled on June 10 to further discuss the scheme requirements for the operationalization of the proposed projects.

2. Implementation of programs for transformation of combatants, their families and communities to lead productive and peaceful lives

a. Disposition of Arms and Forces

· **Sustainment of the Community Defense Units (CDUs).** The OPAPP assisted the respective army battalions in the distribution of CDU allowances from Sept 16 – Dec 31, 2020, plus the additional allowance per EO 94 from Mar-Dec 2020, amounting to 10.2M in Negros and Panay. Also facilitated the released of Jan-June CDU allowances amounting to 12.671M.

Moreover, the MOA between OPAPP & AFP on the CDU Allowances for July-Dec has already been routed for signature of principals.

On 22 April 2021, the OPAPP thru the Provincial Government of Negros Occidental, distributed 6 sacks of rice and 4 boxes of canned goods for 18 Kapatiran CDU in Bago Chapter as additional support to the CDU detachment.

b. Social and Economic Reintegration of the KAPATIRAN Members

· **Livelihood and Employment.** The OPAPP monitored the implementation of Livelihood Settlement Grant (LSG) projects of the Kapatiran in Negros and Panay, in partnership with the concerned Local Government Unit and DSWD.

The OPAPP also facilitated series of meetings with the Socio-Economic Committee (SET) via VTC to discuss the results of the rapid management appraisal (RMA) of Kapatiran Chapters conducted by SET in the first quarter of 2021. Among the issues that emerged were: (1) limitation of personnel focused on the project (2) disease control management and environmental challenges; and, (3) operational cost of projects. The RMA will be the basis of SET in the catch-up planning activities that will be conducted with the Kapatiran Chapters.

On 14 April 2021, the RPA Division had a meeting with the Provincial Government of Negros Occidental, University of St. La Salle-Bacolod, Kapatiran EB Magalona and KAFAWA. The activity was presided by Atty. Rafrando Diaz, Provincial Administrator of Negros Occidental. The meeting resulted to identification of skills trainings for both chapters that are relevant to their chosen livelihood.

On 19 April to 9 May 2021, the OPAPP assisted the SET in the catch-up planning activities with the Kapatiran chapters in Negros and Panay. The activity resulted to finalization of the work plans and budget of the chapter to include their projected income/expense statement and cash flow.

The OPAPP had a meeting with DSWD on 20 April 2021 and 6 May 2021 respectively via VTC to discuss the breakdown of PHP29M MOA between OPAPP and DSWD and the updates on the livelihood settlement grant utilization of the Kapatiran. The draft MOA was further reviewed for additional inputs.

On 6 May 2021, conducted a consultation meeting with the Provincial and local SCT focal for livelihood in Kabankalan and Cauayan via VTC. Discussed was the initial plan to assist the Kapatiran in the utilization of the remaining LSG Fund in Kabankalan and Cauayan. Local partners expressed their willingness and enthusiasm to provide technical support for the 2 chapters. Subsequently, the respective SCT focal had a site visit of the Kapatiran settlement in Cauayan and Kabankalan. The technical team distributed vegetables seeds as well as provided their contact information for easy coordination with the Kapatiran chapters.

OPAPP facilitated a meeting with the Iloilo Science and Technology University (ISAT-U) on 14 May 2021 via VTC to discuss the proposed needs assessment research study of ISAT-U to Kapatiran Iloilo and Antique Chapter. The research study is expected to commence in June. A courtesy call with the ISAT-U President has been likewise scheduled.

On 17-18 May 2021, the OPAPP in partnership with the Provincial Government of Negros Occidental and University of St. La Salle jointly organized a 2-day Business Development Training workshop for EB Magalona and Bago Chapters, held at Negros Residences, Provincial Capitol Bacolod City. The activity aimed to capacitate 20 Kapatiran members on organizational transformation and development; accreditation, certification and accounting; and basic entrepreneurship and value chain analysis.

In partnership with TESDA Aklan and Philippine Institute of Certified Public Accountants (PICPA) conducted a training on simple bookkeeping and financial literacy to 25 Kapatiran women/wives as part of the Kapatiran Women in Transformation framework.

Series of consultation meeting with JEMC Co-chair Veronica TAbara and the Socio Economic Team (SET) was conducted via VTC to discuss the operationalization of the DSWD LSG Process Guide relative to the implementation of remaining LSG of the Kapatiran chapters. Also presented was the project proposal template to be accomplished by the chapter.

On 24 June 2021, a virtual meeting was conducted with DTI Iloilo and Iloilo Kapatiran representatives to discuss the proposed assistance of DTI thru their business kit tool amounting to Php6,000.00 each member. The intervention jumpstarted with a profiling and validation of Kapatiran's individual project on June 28, 2021 in Brgy. Caraudan, Iloilo.

Establishment of Settlement Sites. The OPAPP coordinated with various partner-agencies such as DOLE, DA, DILG, NIA, TESDA, among others relative to the proposed projects FY 2022 for the establishment of the Kapatiran settlement sites.

On 28 April 2021, the OPAPP had a meeting with the Mines and Geoscience Bureau (MGB) Regional Office VI and discussed the result of the geological scoping study or the geohazard identification report conducted by MGB in Bago Chapter. The GIR will be presented to NHA as basis for the construction of Kapatiran housing units.

The following activities were conducted, contributing to the finalization of the Kapatiran Community Resource Management Framework (CRMF) in Kabankalan:

- On 3-4 May 2021, the RPA division in partnership with CENRO Kabankalan conducted a workshop with the Kapatiran Officers of Kabankalan relative to the packaging of CRMF. Output of the activity were: Digitized maps such as community map, topographic map, vision map, among others; and, consolidated data and narrative presentation
- Convened a consultation meeting with the PDC Site Claimants of Brgy. Locotan, Kabankalan on 19 May 2021 in partnership with LGU Kabankalan and CENRO Kabankalan. Presented were the role of the actual claimants in the implementation of the provisions of the Kapatiran CFMA and identified other areas of concern such as: benefit sharing agreement, permissible production activities within the CBFMA; and scheduled activities.
- Facilitated the conduct of Kapatiran Kabankalan Chapter General Assembly at Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. Locotan on 27 May 2021. Presented was the final draft of CRMF to include the Kapatiran VMGO, updated community map of the PDC, proposed land use map, and the 5Year Strategic plan of the Kapatiran. The CRMF was duly ratified by the Kapatiran members.
- On 7-9 June 2021, in partnership with CENRO Kabankalan and LGU Kabankalan, conducted the relocation of PDC boundaries using GPS instruments and installation of monuments along the PDC boundaries of Kapatiran CBFMA area in Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. Locotan. The group successfully installed 23 monuments/markers.

The OPAPP attended the inauguration of the Farm-to-Market Road Projects leading to the PDC site in Sitio Ling-ab, Brgy. San Miguel, Tanjay City on 19 May 2021. Gracing the activity were Gov. Roel Degamo of Negros Oriental, JEMC Co-Chair Veronica Tabara representing the Kapatiran, PD PCOL Bryant Demot of NORPPO, CO COL Leonardo Peña of 302nd BDE AFP, PD Joel Villagracia of TESDA Negros Oriental, PENRO representative, department heads of PLGU NegOr and Kapatiran. Governor Degamo committed to provide additional livelihood support to the Kapatiran amounting to 5M. Also part of their program is a tree-planting activity and distribution of organic fertilizers, seeds, cacao seedlings and native chicken.

A *Pulong-Pulong* was conducted with the community of Sitio Binacay, Brgy. Talacdan, Cauayan, facilitated by OPAPP and in partnership with CENRO Kabankalan, on 25 May 2021. Presented were the profile of the Kapatiran congregated site and Presidential Proclamation no. 1056 declaring parcel of land (16 hectares) in Sitio Binacay as civil reservation for housing and resettlement site purposes. Also, part of the activity is the relocation of 12 monuments of the Presidential proclaimed site.

The OPAPP together with JEMC Co-chair Veronica Tabara had an onsite meeting with Governor Roel Degamo of Negros Oriental at the PDC site in Sitio Ling-ab, Brgy. San Miguel, Tanjay City on 26 May 2021. Also in attendance were Brigade Commander COL Leonardo Peña of 302nd BDE, PD Joel Villagracia of TESDA, Dept heads of the PLGU Negros Oriental and Kapatiran Chapter members. The meeting resulted in the finalization of proposed projects for the establishment of the Kapatiran PDC Site amounting to 5.5M under the regular program of the province.

On the same date, CENRO Kabankalan, LGU Cauayan and the Kapatiran chapter conducted the site suitability assessment held at the congregated site of Sitio Binacay, Cauayan. Discussed were the results of the Area Development Planning workshop conducted last 9-11 December 2020 and the updated community map and proposed land use map. Installation of monuments along the boundaries of the presidential proclaimed area will be scheduled.

In addition, the OPAPP had a VTC meeting with PENRO Antique to discuss the land ownership status of the Kapatiran members in Antique and identify available forestland to be proposed as congregated site for the Kapatiran.

On 27 May 2021, conducted a meeting with the National Housing Authority (NHA) via VTC to review documents submitted by the Kapatiran Bukidnon chapter re. Land ownership of individual members and discussed modalities by which housing packages for the 29 Kapatiran can be delivered. Also discussed and assessed the implementation status of the housing program for 24 Kapatiran members in Bronzville, Naic, Cavite.

Furthermore, OPAPP facilitated the conduct of JEMC Meeting with State Universities and Colleges and Private Universities in Negros and Panay via VTC on 9 June 2021. In attendance were JEMC Co Chair Usec Cesar Yano of DND and Veronica Tabara of Kapatiran; JEMC members Milo Ibrado and Pastor Noel Villalba; Representatives from University of St. La Salle Bacolod, Central Phil State University, Iloilo Science and Technology University, Aklan State University; and, Dir. Susana Marcaida of OPAPP. Presented were the concept of the proposed M&E partnership, its scope, methodology and expected outputs, which include inception report, final needs assessment report, inputs to the M&E framework, and Knowledge products. Representatives of the SUCs present signified their interest in the partnership.

c. **Implementation of Social Protection Programs.** A total of Four Hundred Sixty-nine (469) Kapatiran members and Nine Thousand Two Hundred Sixty-one (9,261) individuals from the identified Community Peace Dividends (CPD) areas were endorsed to Philhealth for enrollment this year. The RPA division is set to distribute the MDRs and IDs on 28-29 June 2021 across Negros and Panay Areas.

3. **Support to the Implementation of Executive Order No. 70.** The OPAPP conducted series of coordination with MGEN Dinoh Dolina, LPE Consultant for Regions 6 & 7 and 3ID Deputy Commander BGEN Noel Balyuan on the preparation of presentations for the conduct of RTF ELCAC 6 and LPE Cluster meetings with Western Visayas LGUs. Also discussed further enhancement of the LPE Implementation plan for the region which will serve as guide of the respective Provincial Task Force in the preparation of their Provincial LPE action plan.

On 19 April 2021, the OPAPP participated in the RTF ELCAC VI 2nd Quarter Meeting with CORDS held at Smallville 21 Hotel, Iloilo City. In attendance were CORDS Roy Cimat, RTF ELCAC VI Members, OPAPP, PLGUs of Aklan, Capiz, Antique, Iloilo, and Negros Occidental. Presented were updates & accomplishments of RTF ELCAC VI Lines of Efforts; Security situation of Western Visayas; and, the LPE VI Implementation Plan.

The OPAPP also participated in a meeting with the Vicente Bacordo Group to (1) assess and validate the identity of the group for possible inclusion in the enhance ECLIP program, and (2) identify peace and development interventions for the group. The activity was conducted on 24 April 2021 led by DILG Negros Occidental and 303rd BDE. Discussed were the membership type of the Bacordo group in the CTG based on JAPIC certification, and the process requirements to qualify them in the ECLIP program

On 5 May 2021, a site survey of the Ati resettlement area in Brgy. Aliputos, Numancia, Aklan was conducted in partnership with LGU Numancia and Caritas Italian/DSAC Kalibo. The group validated the current condition/ situation of the resettlement site including its elevation, terrain boundary, road access, profile among others.

The OPAPP through the RPA Division, participated in the RTF-ELCAC VI levelling session with respective LGUs in Iloilo via VTC. An orientation of the EO70 and its efforts was provided by the JRFT-ELCAC. Presented also were the significant activities and accomplishments of the Iloilo PTF and ways forward. As a result, the Province of Iloilo issued an Executive Order, forming the Local Peace Panel. Governor Arthur Defensor, Jr shall serve as the chairperson with the AFP as vice-chairperson. At the same time, 15 municipalities of the province have already created their respective Local Peace Panel as part of the implementation of the Localized Peace Engagement.

A. **Completion of the 2011 Memorandum of Agreement with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA - CPLA)**

			<p>1. Support to the Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC) and Components. A video teleconference meeting with AFP Peace and Development Office (AFP PDO) was conducted on 13 April 2021 to discuss the structure of Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC) of GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process and to formalize the designation of a head secretariat in the JEMC Secretariat to ensure responsibility and accountability of documents, flow of programs and communications between and among the JEMC Executive Committee. The meeting was attended by OPAPP (Joey Marcial Olpindo and Marzysa Nicole Rañola) and COL Noel Bunceb, Chief of CNN Peace Support Division of AFP PDO.</p> <p>On 24 April 2021, a meeting with CBA-CPLA Leaders of the JEMC was convened via Video Teleconference. It intends to deter disgruntled MNLF combatants from joining the Abu Sayyaf Group and other violent extremist groups in Southern Philippines and avoid another "Zamboanga Siege" or "Marawi Siege". The Transformation Program will focus on socio-economic, security, confidence-building and community healing and reconciliation.

As of this reporting period, the following were accomplished:

1. Coordinating Committee Meetings

a. 3rd Joint GPH Coordinating Committee Meeting on 03 February 2021. During the meeting, the members of the Coordinating Committee were apprised on the highlights of the previous meeting and other preparatory activities undertaken relative to the MNLF Transformation Program as well as available funds for the implementation of the MNLF Transformation Program for FY 2021 such as the GPH internal profiling and verification process and hiring of personnel and identification of location for OPAPP-PMO's physical office within Camp Bautista.

The MNLF Transformation Program was also discussed wherein terminologies, objectives, and program specifics were taken up. It was also in this meeting that it was agreed to fully operationalize the GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee by instructing the secretariat to identify agencies that shall be involved in the sub-committees for socio-economic, security, confidence-building and community healing and peacebuilding.

For the next steps, the secretariat was instructed to organize a briefing for the GPH Coordinating Committee by the AFP and PNP on the available data on forces and arms of the MNLF.

b. Technical-level Meeting with the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) and the Philippine National Police (PNP) on the harmonization of data on arms and forces of the Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) on 10 February 2021. Relative to the agreement during the meeting of the GPH Coordinating Committee dated 03 February 2021, this meeting was organized to discuss the available data from the security sector in so far as the MNLF is concerned to inform the position/decision of the GPH Coordinating Committee in the upcoming discussion with the MNLF coordinating committees on the Transformation

Program.

Undersecretary Arthur I. Tabaquero presided the technical-level meeting with the AFP and PNP on harmonizing data on the forces and arms of the MNLF.

In the said meeting, the following points were agreed upon: 1) The AFP through the QJ2 shall coordinate with the AFP leadership and PNP counterparts on the proposed activity to instruct operating units to gather information on the strength and arms of MNLF members in MNLF identified areas; 2) creation of parameters to address benefits to be provided MNLF members identified prior the 1996 Final Peace Agreement; and, 3) for the AFP to write a letter to the GPH Coordinating Committee to formalize its membership in the GPH Coordinating Committee Secretariat.

c. 4th Joint GPH Coordinating Committee Meeting on 10 March 2021. Through the representatives from the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) and the Philippine National Police (PNP), members of the coordinating committee were apprised on the data on the strength and arms of the MNLF members in MNLF communities to support the position/decision of the coordinating committee in the upcoming discussion with the MNLF counterparts relative to the proposed Transformation Program. The GPH Coordinating Committee have discussed and finalized the proposed agenda for the upcoming GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee meetings for both groups. Further, the secretariat has provided updates on the list of agencies and their representatives relative to their participation to the sub-committees of the GPH Coordinating Committee. A briefing with these member agencies is set to be conducted within March 2020.

d. Joint GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee Secretariat's meeting on 22 March 2021. In line with the agreement during the Joint GPH-MNLF Secretariat's Meeting dated 21 January 2021, the MNLF Secretariat finally presented the proposed concept of its development program. One of their members also presented a summary of comments, analysis, and review on the proposed Transformation Program roadmap of the MNLF. On the normalizing and transforming phase, the MNLF reiterated that the certain terminologies should be made clear to make the program readily understandable.

During the presentation of the MNLF's Development Framework, it was emphasized that MNLF and OPAPP must continue to maintain their partnership throughout the program.

It was also emphasized that both sides should involve other local and international implementing partners. Further, peace and development should be the anchors of the program which would benefit not just the MNLF but also the local communities.

On the number of registered MNLF in their database, there are 60,000 registrants identified with 200 camps, with other pending applications due to certain complications on the ground. The MNLF has been collecting data since 2007.

During the meeting, several security related concerns were raised by the MNLF. Dir. Gallardo requested the MNLF Secretariat to submit their concerns in writing to be formally addressed or endorsed. The meeting ended with high hopes for the resumption of the GPH-MNLF Peace Coordinating Committee meetings.

e. 1st Inter-Agency Meeting with the Sub-committees of the GPH Coordinating Committee on 31 March 2021. This meeting aimed to brief the member-agencies on the updates of the GPH-MNLF Peace Process including the developments in the MNLF Transformation Program. Moreover, this serves as a venue to solicit comments and insights from the agencies to further enhance the proposed Program as well as get concurrence of the agencies proposed to be OPAPP's implementing partner agencies for FY 2022.

The meeting was presided by the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity, Secretary Carlito G. Galvez, Jr. together with Undersecretary Arthur I. Tabaquero, Chair of the GPH Coordinating Committee for the Sema Group. Further, it was attended by the other members of the GPH Coordinating Committee, permanent and alternate focal of the sub-committees from different government line agencies and its technical staff.

The body agreed that follow through meetings of the sub-committees on Socio-Economic, Security, Confidence Building and Community Healing will be conducted to discuss and finalize the Transformation Program for the MNLF combatants, their families and their communities.

2. Coordination Meetings

a. Coordination Meetings with DSWD and PSA on the implementation of the Transformation Program. Series of coordination activities with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) were conducted on 28 January and 04 February 2021, respectively. The meeting aimed to discuss the proposed Transformation Program for the MNLF and possible collaboration on the implementation of socio-economic activities for the MNLF combatants and their families. Currently, the DSWD submitted their inputs to the draft Memorandum of Agreements while the PSA will be submitting by the third week of April 2021.

b. Coordination Meeting with AFP 11ID and Sulu State College (SSC) in Jolo, Sulu on 16-18 February 2021. The Coordination Meeting was a two-day activity that aimed to properly finalize the initial steps in the implementation of the Transformation Program for around 3,000 MNLF combatants, their families, and communities in Sulu, particularly on the management of financial matters for the project. It is expected that the data to be gathered from MNLF combatants would serve as the baseline information for the interventions and programs to be utilized for such combatants, their families, and communities.

In coordination and collaboration with the OPAPP, the MNLF Transformation Program shall primarily be implemented by the AFP, through its 11th Infantry Division, and the Sulu State College (SSC). As such, the OPAPP executed Memoranda of Agreements (MOAs) with the AFP and the SSC on 19 November 2020 and 16 November 2020, respectively.

3. Other interventions for the MNLF

a. Travel Assistance to fifteen (15) MNLF members granted with plea bargain agreement relative to the 2013 Zamboanga Siege. On 08 January 2021, the Regional Trial Court Branch 158 ordered the release of the sixteen (16) MNLF members from the Metro Manila District Jail Annex 5 (MMDJ Annex 5) and the Taguig City Jail-Female Dormitory of Camp Bagong Diwa, Lower Bicutan, Taguig City, upon completion of their service relative to their approved plea bargain agreement.

After they were released from the said detention facility on 21 January 2021, these MNLF members have temporarily resided in Brgy. Maharlika, Taguig City. Assistance was sought as the said individuals cannot sustain living in Taguig City and have no funds to pay for their transportation expenses to return to their respective residences in Mindanao.

The OPAPP facilitated the return of fifteen (15) MNLF members to their respective places of origins (Zamboanga City, Provinces of Basilan, Sulu, and Zamboanga Sibugay). Prior to their departure, the OPAPP coordinated with the MNLF Secretariat on the compliance of necessary documentary requirement such as medical certificates and travel authorities for them to be able to travel from Manila to their respective places of origin. Likewise, the MCD has also facilitated the conduct of their RT-PCR tests as a requirement before they can return to their respective localities. Necessary coordination with the LGU of Zamboanga City, PLGUs in Basilan, Sulu, and Zamboanga Sibugay on the situation and return of these MNLF members were also carried out.

b. Implementation of Integrated Small Scale Entrepreneurship Project under the PAMANA. During the quarter, the OPAPP in coordination with the Area Management Office of Western Mindanao has been closely monitoring the implementation of the livelihood project in Tungawan, Zamboanga Sibugay. On 12 March 2021, the OPAPP turned over the 1st tranche of funds (Php1,080,000.00) to the PLGU of Zamboanga Sibugay to operationalize the aforementioned intervention. The PLGU will conduct a validation and community assembly with the beneficiaries.

c. Support to the Observance of Post Eid'l Adha and Covid-19 response in Mindanao through provision of food supplies and hygiene kits for the MNLF families under Support to Peacebuilding and Normalization (SPAN) Program. In December 2020, the OPAPP through the MNLF Concerns Department (MCD), together with AMO-Western Mindanao, South Central and Northern Mindanao and the United Nations Development Program – Support for Peacebuilding and Normalization (UNDP-SPAN), facilitated the distribution of food and non-food items to the 7,590 families in solidarity with our Muslim brothers and sisters in the observance of post Eid'l Adha in Mindanao through provision of food supplies and hygiene kits. The MCD together with AMO South Central Mindanao and Northern Mindanao and the UNDP conducted jointly the distribution of the rice subsidies to the beneficiary families and communities. This was preceded by the conduct of ceremonial turn-over of the rice provisions for the MNLF communities in Madamba, Lanao del Sur andes. Specific indicators with corresponding gender issues and cause of gender issue³ in the context of peace and security concerns were identified, this will feed into the crafting of the Bicol Regional Action Plan on WPS. Also, the activity i

d. Preposition of rice, new normal and hygiene kits for the 3,000 combatants to be profiled. The OPAPP facilitated the procurement of goods under the SPAN Programme. During the profiling activities, the MCD will provide 1 sack of rice, new normal supplies, materials and supplements such as vitamins, alcohol, face mask and face shield, and hygiene kits with soap, hand towel, shampoo, tooth paste and tooth brush. The aforementioned goods will be distributed during the actual conduct of profiling. Currently, the UNDP delivered the goods to the OPAPP and being facilitated by the MCD to be transported to Sulu and Basilan.

e. Health Insurance Premium for the MNLF communities. The Government continues to engage communities with presence of MNLF members and their next-of-kin through the Payapa at Masaganang pamayaNaN (PAMANA) program to address socio-economic challenges.

On the other hand, under the OPAPP-PhilHealth Sponsored Program, a total of 2,131 beneficiaries in 2020 were provided with health insurance. From FY 2013 up to FY 2021, a total of 11,497 individuals from MNLF communities were renewed and benefited from the said program.

4. Implementation of the Amnesty Program for MNLF Members. On 05 February 2021, President Rodrigo Roa Duterte issued Executive Order No. 125 which created the National Amnesty Commission (NAC). The NAC shall primarily undertake the following: (1) receipt and processing of amnesty applications; and, (2) determination of entitlement of applicants to amnesty. Corollarily, President Duterte issued four amnesty proclamations including Proclamation 1091 (s. 2021) which grants amnesty to MNLF members who have committed crimes under the Revised Penal Code and special penal laws in furtherance of their political beliefs.

Per EO No. 125, s. 2021, the OPAPP has been tasked to provide the Secretariat for the NAC. The OPAPP Directors of the concerned Programs shall serve as Proclamation Secretariats.

a. Support to House Committee Level Deliberations on House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) No. 13 concurring with Proclamation 1091 (s. 2021). Considering that amnesty requires the concurrence of a majority of the members of Congress, Speaker Lord Allan Velasco, together with Deputy Speaker Ferdinand Martin Romualdez and Rep. Joseph Stephen Paduano, has filed House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) No. 13 on 23 February 2021, which intends to concur with Proclamation 1091 (s. 2021) on the grant of amnesty to MNLF members.

HCR 13 was one of the amnesty-related resolutions referred to the House Committee on Justice and the House Committee on National Defense and Security. The said House Committees subsequently called for a joint hearing to deliberate HCR 13 and the other amnesty-related resolutions on 16 March 2021.

In this regard, the OPAPP, through ASec. Agripino G. Javier, has accordingly provided the House Committees on Justice and on National Defense and Security with a briefer on the Amnesty Program for MNLF Members, including the following points: (1) expected number of applicants thereto; (2) socio-economic programs for their rehabilitation and reintegration; and, (3) budgetary requirements for the implementation thereof.

Support for the Adoption/Approval at the House Committee Level of HCR 13 concurring with Proclamation 1091 (s. 2021). On 24 March 2021, the Joint House Committees on Justice and on National Defense and Security called for the final deliberations on HCR 13 and other amnesty-related proclamations. In support of HCR 13, the OPAPP was represented by the PAPRU, ASec. Javier, and Dir. Gallardo.

Accordingly, the House Committee on Justice adopted HCR 13 while the House Committee on National Defense and Security approved the same with a vote of 13 in favor and one (1) against. As such, the HCR 13 concurring with Proclamation 1091 (s. 2021) will now be submitted for plenary deliberations of the House of Representatives.

2nd QUARTER

As of this reporting period, the following were accomplished:

1. Coordinating Committee Meetings

a. **5th Joint GPH Coordinating Committee Meeting on 27 April 2021.** The GPH Coordinating Committee had a meeting to discuss the proposed agenda in preparation for the upcoming 5th GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee Meeting (Sema Group). The aforementioned meeting discussed the following concerns:

- Nominees for the permanent members of the National Amnesty Commission (NAC); and
- Update on the status of support to the MNLF Coordinating Committee members

b. **5th GPH-MNLF (Sema Group) Coordinating Committee Meeting, 29 April 2021.** The Government of the Philippines (GPH) and Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) Sema Group signed the Terms of Reference (TOR) of the coordinating committee, which would jumpstart the implementation of various peacebuilding and development interventions in MNLF-identified communities.

The signatories to the TOR were the chairpersons of the GPH and MNLF Coordinating Committee, Presidential Adviser on Military Affairs Undersecretary Arthur Tabaquero and Datu Ali Montaha Babao, respectively, and witnessed by MNLF Chairman Muslimin Sema. The TOR was signed during the 5th GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee Meeting held on April 29. The signing of the TOR marks another milestone in the GPH-MNLF peace process, as this would help pave the way for the former MNLF combatants to become productive, self-

reliant, and empowered members of the community through the Transformation Program.

Further, the concept of the MNLF Transformation Program was approved by the GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee while the timelines, processes and implementing structures of the Program are still subject to further discussion and finalization.

c. **Meeting with the co-chairs of the Joint Security Committee of the GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee, 11 May 2021.** Undersecretary Cesar Yano and Datu Randy Karon met and discussed the concerns on the security component of the MNLF Transformation Program especially on the profiling and verification process of the 3,000 combatants in Sulu. Discussion in this meeting served as the reference for the conduct of the 1st GPH Security Subcommittee Meeting.

d. **20 May 2021: 1st GPH Security Subcommittee Meeting.** The meeting was held on 20 May 2021 and attended by the members of the security subcommittee from AFP, PNP and NICA. The meeting resulted to the following agreements:

- For the Secretariat to coordinate with the PNP PRO-BAR and AFP Western Mindanao Command for the conduct of the IEC activities relative to the Updates of the GPH-MNLF Peace Process and its Mechanisms;
- For the member agencies to convene a TWG meeting to discuss and enhance a profiling mechanism for the MNLF combatants.
- For the Secretariat to consolidate approaches of other peace tables on security components; and
- For the Socio-Economic Subcommittee to convene and determine the available socio-economic packages for the MNLF

e. **Courtesy Visit of the GPH Coordinating Committee to the Leadership of the Armed Forces of the Philippines, 10 June 2021.** On 10 June 2021, the GPH Coordinating Committee paid a courtesy visit to the leadership of the Armed Forces of the Philippines at GHQ Building, Camp Aguinaldo, Quezon City. The meeting was attended by the Chief of Staff of the AFP, General Cirilito E. Sobejana and other high-ranking officials of the AFP. The meeting aimed to discuss ways to further strengthen cooperation between the GPH-MNLF peace mechanisms and the AFP on matters pertaining to security and the MNLF Transformation Program.

f. **6th GPH Coordinating Committee Meeting, 15 June 2021.** The 6th GPH Coordinating Committee Meeting was convened on 15 June 2021 to discuss the comments/recommendations of the Chief of Staff and other officials of the AFP in the enhancement of the MNLF Transformation Program especially on the security component. Strategies to fast-track the implementation of the MNLF Transformation Program such as the profiling and verification process were also formulated.

g. **Information, Education and Communication Activity with the Police Regional Office-Bangsamoro Autonomous Region relative to the GPH-MNLF Peace Process and its Mechanisms, 17 June 2021.** An IEC activity with the PNP PRO BAR spearheaded by Undersecretary Arthur Tabaquero of the GPH Coordinating Committee was conducted last 17 June 2021. The activity aimed to provide updates to the PRO-BAR on the status of the GPH-MNLF Peace Process and the proposed transformation program for the MNLF. The activity resulted to agreements on the establishment of a clear coordination mechanism among security sectors and the MNLF.

h. **Information, Education and Communication Activity with the Western Mindanao Command of the Armed Forces of the Philippines relative to the GPH-MNLF Peace Process and its Mechanisms, 24 June 2021.** An IEC activity was also conducted with the Western Mindanao Command of the Armed Forces of the Philippines led by Undersecretary Arthur Tabaquero of the GPH Coordinating Committee last 24 June 2021 with the same objective with the PRO-BAR. A clear coordination mechanism for security concerns involving MNLF groups was also discussed as well as AFP's critical role in the MNLF Transformation Program

a. **Formulation of MNLF Women's Strategic Plan Workshop, 29 June – 01 July 2021.** Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) women leaders under the leadership of Chair Nur Misuari convened for a strategic planning workshop to formulate their mission, vision, and strategies which shall address key development and security issues in their communities. As a result, the MNLF Women Committee of the Misuari Group now has a 5-year Strategic Plan which is still subject to finalization in consultation with the women in the MNLF communities.

2. Programs for the return of combatants, families and their communities to productive and normal lives implemented

a. **Formulation of Transformation Program for the MNLF combatants, families and their communities.** Through the joint coordinating committees, a transformation program for the MNLF combatants, their families and communities will be implemented beginning with the profiling of MNLF combatants in Sulu this year. It shall mirror the normalization program of the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) whereby combatants are transformed to have a productive and peaceful lives. It intends to deter disgruntled MNLF combatants from joining the Abu Sayyaf Group and other violent extremist groups in Southern Philippines and avoid another "Zamboanga Siege" or "Marawi Siege". The Transformation Program will focus on socio-economic, security, confidence-building and community healing and reconciliation.

The draft Transformation Program were initially presented to the GPH Coordinating Committees, government implementing partners as well as to the MNLF counterparts. Fortunately, the GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee (Sema) approved in principle the Transformation Program (TP) on 29 April 2021 subject to the finalization of the timelines, processes (i.e. Profiling and Verification Process) and implementing structures

				<p>b. Coordination Meetings with DSWD and PSA on the implementation of the Transformation Program. Series of coordination activities with the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) and Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) were conducted on 7 and 8 April 2021, respectively. The meeting aimed to discuss the proposed Transformation Program for the MNLF and necessary requirements for the implementation of socio-economic activities for the MNLF combatants and their families. Another meeting with the DSWD was held on 18 May 2021 to fast-track the approval and signature of the MOA with OPAPP to fast-track the transfer of funds for the implementation of the transitional cash assistance and cash for work program. The MOAs between DSWD and PSA were finally signed on June 18 and 29, respectively.</p> <p>c. In partnership with the Sulu State College, 11th Infantry Division, PNP Sulu and the PLGU of Sulu, the MCD facilitated the conduct of Basic Conflict Sensitivity and Peace Promotion (CSPP) Training for the Implementers of the MNLF Transformation Program on 24-27 May 2021 in Jolo, Sulu. The aforementioned training was organized with the help of the AMO Western Mindanao and Social Healing and Peace Building Department of OPAPP.</p> <p>The Basic CSPP Training generally intends to enhance the capacities of the Implementers of the MNLF Transformation Program to develop a deeper understanding of the conflict-sensitive and peace-promoting approaches that are quintessential to peacebuilding. The training likewise intends to harness their distinct and potential skills in thoroughly analyzing conflict situations and correspondingly applying the appropriate approach thereto in a holistic, effective, and efficient manner.</p> <p>d. Support to the entry of MILF and MNLF Members into the PNP</p> <p>3rd Joint Technical Working Group (TWG) Meeting of the GPH-Bangsamoro Government on Policing for the Entry of MNLF and MILF Members to the PNP, 16 April 2021. As part of the ongoing efforts to facilitate the entry of qualified MNLF and MILF members to the Philippine National Police (PNP), the technical working groups (TWGs) of the National Government and the Bangsamoro Government discussed the remaining unresolved issues on the draft Guidelines for Policing, to wit: (a) minimum educational requirement in view of the recent K-12 system, (b) number of applicants to be admitted, particularly from the MILF and the MNLF, (c) whether the entry should be by unit (i.e. with respect to their unit in the MILF or MNLF) and whether the qualified MILF and MNLF applicants should only be deployed within the BARMM territory later on, (d) prescriptive period for the application for entry of qualified MNLF and MILF members to the PNP considering the delays arising from the plebiscite approving RA 11054 and the current COVID-19 pandemic. Also, the activity increased the awareness and appreciation of concerned stakeholders on the implementation of the NAPWPS and strengthened links with partner implementers in Catanduanes. Arrangements to inform the next steps of their MEAL system development/enhancement. Conduct of the workshop for Program 1 is being scheduled with concerned Departments, Government and the BARMM Government.</p> <p>Technical Working Group (TWG) Meeting of the National Government on Policing, continuing discussion and recap of the resolved and unresolved issues with the Bangsamoro Government TWG Meeting, 23 April 2021. In relation to the issues and concerns raised during the 3rd Joint TWG Meeting on 16 April 2021, the National Government TWG on Policing discussed and reviewed the draft Guidelines on the Entry of MNLF and MILF Members to the PNP in order to collate, organize, and fortify the legal bases justifying the position of the National Government on the remaining unresolved issues on Policing, in preparation for the IGRB Meeting between the National Government and the BARMM Government. The National Government TWG likewise discussed on the proper and strategic approaches that would facilitate the resolution of these policy issues.</p> <p>4th Joint TWG Meeting of the GPH-Bangsamoro Government relative to the entry of MILF and MNLF Members into the PNP, 29 April 2021. Pursuant to Executive Order 125 (s. 2021) and Proclamation Nos. 1090, 1091, 1092, and 1093, the four amnesty secretariats in OPAPP as represented by their respective Directors and technical staff, conducted a technical-level meeting on the draft implementing rules and regulations (IRR) for the amnesty proclamations, particularly on crafting the process flows or procedures that will be utilized in the amnesty process for the members of MNLF, MILF, RPM-P/RPA/ABB, and former rebels of the CTG. 1. **Capacity Building for Implementing Partners on Area-based Planning/Conflict Analysis and IP Students on Peace Formation.** The conduct of the area-based planning and/or conflict analysis training for 52 partner LGUs and four (4) partner NGAs and peace formation training for 497(Batch 1) and 148 (Batch 2) IP students were moved from March 2021 to the 2nd Quarter of 2021. Activity further moved to 3rd Quarter of 2021. Conduct of the same might extended to the 4th Quarter of 2021 in consideration of public health protocols. Preparatory work is still ongoing including finalization of activity schedule. The activity is a new initiative for FY 2020 PAMANA implementing partners.

2. **Monitoring of FY 2012-2021 PAMANA projects lodged under OPAPP and Implementing Partners.** The PAMANA-NPMD conducted bilateral meetings with the PAMANA implementing agencies to discuss project implementation updates, concerns and ways forward.

Inter-Agency. The activity is a regular quarterly monitoring activity with implementing partners at the national level, i.e., AFP, BARM-BPDA, MPW-BARM, BARMM-MSWD, CHED, DA, DA-BFAR DAR, DENR, DILG, DPWH, DSWD, NCIP, NEA, PHIC, PNP and OPAPP. None scheduled during the reporting period. Activity is set on 29 July 2021 via video teleconferencing.

In consideration of the public health concern, these targets were adjusted to December 2021 per the PAMANA Roadmap.

During the reporting period, the PAMANA-NPMD initiated the conduct of FY 2017 PAMANA Mid-Term Assessment with Implementing Partners in Region XIII on 29 June 2021 and in Regions VI, VII and VIII on 30 June 2021. These sessions were conducted via video teleconferencing. The two (2) remaining sessions are set on 1 July 2021 for implementing partners in Region X (Misamis Oriental, Bukidnon and Lanao del Norte) and 13 July 2021 for implementing partners in Region X. These sessions will also be conducted via video-teleconferencing.

Status of FY 2017 PAMANA-OPAPP Projects

Physical Accomplishment. As of 31 December 2020 following the conduct of assessment sessions with implementing partners in November-December 2020, 313 of the 533 FY 2017 PAMANA projects lodged under the OPAPP budget or 59% of target were reported as completed. As of 31 March 2021, the number of completed projects increased to 340 or 64% of the 533 FY 2017 PAMANA projects.

As of 30 June 2021, the number of reported completed projects further increased to 356 or 67% while 107 or 20% were reported ongoing, 57 or 11% in procurement phase, 6 or 1% in preparatory phase, 1 or .18% suspended, 2 or .37% cancelled, 3 or .56% waived, 1 or .18% for revalidation.

Financial Accomplishment. Of the PHP 7,073,878,491 project cost, PhP 6,857,209,586 or 96.94% was released to the different implementing partners as of 31 December 2020. Of which, PhP 4,932,115,695 or 71.93% was reported as liquidated by implementing partners, PhP 38,605,247 refunded to OPAPP/Bureau of Treasury and PhP 1,886,488,64 for liquidation.

Additional fund releases were facilitated during the 1st Quarter of 2021 pursuant to the DBM approval of OPAPP's Notice of Cash Allocation request in November 2020 per NCA-BMD-D-20-0014223 dated 25 November 2020 amounting to PhP 207,057,964.

As of the reporting period, fund releases had increased from PhP 6,857,209,586 (96.94%) to PhP 6,867,609,585.40 (97.08%) of the total project cost.

Subject to confirmation reports from LGU implementing partners, AMO monitoring updates with additional inputs from PAMANA-NPMD indicated a total of 3 or 0.634% completed projects, 37 or 7.822% ongoing, 67 or 14.165% in procurement phase, 364 or 76.956% in preparatory phase and 2 or 0.423% waived out of the 473 FY 2020 PAMANA projects during the reporting period.

Financial Accomplishment. The DBM approved OPAPP's Notice of Cash Allocation request in November 2020 per NCA-BMB-D-20-0014224 dated 25 November 2020 amounting to PhP 301,150,000. Status of release during the reporting period is summarized as follows:

I. OUTCOME 1: PEACE AGREEMENTS WITH ALL INTERNAL ARMED CONFLICT GROUPS SUCCESSFULLY NEGOTIATED AND IMPLEMENTED

A. Meaningful implementation of the agreement with the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) toward healing in the Bangsamoro

The implementation of the Comprehensive Agreement on the Bangsamoro (CAB) has two main thrusts: the political-legislative track and the normalization track:

The political-legislative track includes the passage and ratification of the Bangsamoro Organic Law (BOL), the enabling statute that gave rise to the creation of the Bangsamoro political entity which replaced the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM). With the establishment of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM), OPAPP is now focusing on setting up governance mechanisms and structures to accompany the BARMM Government in its transition phase until 2022.

The CAB and its Annexes are being implemented and monitored by the Government of the Philippines (GPH) and MILF implementing Panels. An exit document between the Parties will be signed once all agreements have been fully complied with and its components fulfilled.

The political-legislative and normalization tracks of the CAB

1. On the Political-Legislative Track. In line with its mandate to support the Government of the Philippines Peace Implementing Panel (GIP) and the peace process between the GPH and the MILF, the OPAPP through the GIP Secretariat facilitated the conduct of the following during this reporting period:

a. The GPH Peace Implementing Panel Meetings. The GPH Peace Implementing Panel, led by its Chair Usec. David B. Diciano, met four times: on 05 January 2021 via videoconference to discuss the necessary preparations to be undertaken for the third phase of the decommissioning process, after the MILF submitted to the Independent Decommissioning Body (IDB) its list of combatants and weapons in December 2020; on 13 January 2021 via videoconference to discuss and finalize the details of the GPH proposed Terms of Reference (TOR) of the International Monitoring Team (IMT), which was then transmitted to the MILF Peace Implementing Panel for their review; on 04 February 2021 at the Seda Centro in Cagayan de Oro City to discuss and resolve pertinent issues on the implementation of the Program for Normalization in the Bangsamoro; and on 15 February 2021 via videoconference to review the updates on the GPH-MILF peace process in preparation for the meeting with the Third Party Monitoring Team (TPMT).

b. Meeting of the GPH Peace Implementing Panel with the Third Party Monitoring Team (TPMT). The GPH Peace Implementing Panel met with the TPMT, led by its Chair Mr. Heino Marius, on 16 February 2021 via videoconference for its 40th monitoring session. The GPH Panel provided the TPMT with updates on the GPH-MILF peace process, particularly on the implementation of the Program for Normalization in the Bangsamoro and the progress of the proposed postponement of the regular elections for the Bangsamoro Government and extension of the transition period of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM).

c. Meeting of the GPH Peace Implementing Panel with the International Contact Group (ICG). On 04 March 2021, the GPH Peace Implementing Panel met with the members of the International Contact Group (ICG) via videoconference. Since it was the first meeting with the ICG outside the special meetings of the GPH and the MILF Peace Implementing Panels in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, in which the ICG and the Third Party Facilitator and/or Special Adviser are regular attendees to, the GPH Panel took the opportunity to update the ICG on the developments in the GPH-MILF peace process. The meeting also served as an avenue to revisit the Terms of Reference (TOR) of the ICG. The ICG committed to submit to the Panels its proposed revision of its TOR to reflect how the ICG will be able to have an active role in the implementation of the CAB.

d. Coordination meetings of the Panels with GPH-MILF mechanisms. On 06 March 2021, the GPH Peace Implementing Panel met with members of the GPH Joint Peace and Security Committee (JPSC), GPH Coordinating Committee on the Cessation of Hostilities (CCHC), and GPH Ad Hoc Joint Action Group (AHJAG) at the OPAPP Maguindanao Office in Datu Odin Sinsuat, Maguindanao. Violations of the Agreement on the General Cessation of Hostilities by the MILF were discussed, particularly on the rise of *rido* incidents and illegal encampments and checkpoints.

e. Support to the Inter-Governmental Relations Body (IGRB). As part of the National Government Secretariat of the National Government – Bangsamoro Government Intergovernmental Relations Body (IGRB), the OPAPP through the GIP-MILF Secretariat provides technical and administrative support to the IGRB and the other IGR mechanisms created through Republic Act No. 11054 or the Bangsamoro Organic Law (BOL).

i. National Government – Bangsamoro Government Intergovernmental Relations Body (IGRB) Meetings. The IGRB convened for its 7th meeting on 26 March 2021 via videoconference. The IGRB Joint Secretariat updated the body on the progress of the work of technical working groups (TWGs) for the resolution of issues raised to the IGRB. The IGRB also tackled the participation of the Bangsamoro Government in the Southern Philippines Development Authority (SPDA); inclusion of the BARMM in the Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP) under the Department of Agriculture (DA) and in the Mining Review to be conducted by the Mining Industry Coordinating Council (MICC); and amnesty.

To further thresh out and eventually resolve the matter of participation of the Bangsamoro Government in the SPDA, the IGRB Co-Chairs agreed to hold an executive session in which the SPDA Administrator shall be invited. The IGRB also agreed to issue a resolution for local government units (LGUs) in the BARMM to be included in the PRDP. For the Mining Review, the Bangsamoro Government committed to nominate experts and assign personnel from the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, and Energy (MENRE-BARMM) to be involved. The OPAPP also committed to fast-track the concurrence of the Philippine Congress on the proclamations on amnesty. OPAPP also committed to have the draft Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of the National Amnesty Commission transmitted to the Bangsamoro Government for vetting.

ii. Presentation of the 1st Program Report of the IGRB to the President. At the occasion of the 2nd anniversary of the BARMM on 21 January 2021, members of the IGRB from the National Government and the Bangsamoro Government gathered at the Malacañan Palace, Manila for a ceremony with President Rodrigo Roa Duterte and Chief Minister Ahod B. Ebrahim. The IGRB presented to President Duterte its 1st Progress Report, covering one year of activities of the IGRB since its 1st consultative meeting on 16 December 2019 until its 6th meeting on 18 December 2020. The report includes the accomplishments of the IGRB, particularly on issues that were resolved, such as the turnover of the supervision of Cotabato City to the Bangsamoro Government, transfer of properties and assets of some National Government agencies within the BARMM to their counterpart Bangsamoro Government ministries, transfer of management of existing nature reserves and protected areas within the BARMM, and creation of regional offices of the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP) and Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) in the BARMM, and the Bangsamoro Electoral Office.

i. Other IGR mechanisms

Meeting of the Intergovernmental Fiscal Policy Board (IFPB). After holding its 1st meeting on 29 May 2020, the IFPB convened for its 2nd meeting on 05 February 2021 via videoconference. During the meeting, the IFPB approved the Guidelines on Foreign Grants to the BARMM. The IFPB also discussed the progress of the Tax Study Group (TSG) on the remittance of shares in national taxes in the BARMM, establishment of the *Shari'ah* Supervisory Board, and creation of a regional office of the Bureau of Local Government Finance (BLGF) in the BARMM.

Meeting of the Intergovernmental Infrastructure Development Board (IIDB). Following its first meeting on 26 November 2020, the IIDB convened for its 2nd meeting on 08 February 2021 via videoconference. During this meeting, the IIDB discussed the details of the TOR of its Joint Secretariat and the manner of turning over the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) Cotabato City District Engineering Office, which is tentatively due for turnover on 15 March 2021, and transfer of properties and assets of the DPWH within the BARMM to the Bangsamoro Government. The IIDB also tackled the matter of National Road Network Inventory and the Schools Building Program in the BARMM, the draft Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for which shall be circulated to the Department of Education (DepEd), Ministry of Basic, Higher, and Technical Education (MBHTE-BARMM), and Ministry of Public Works (MPW-BARMM). The Bangsamoro Government committed to constitute its side of the IIDB Joint Secretariat and its Co-Head.

The TOR of the IIDB was signed by its Co-Chairs, Public Works Secretary Mark A. Villar and Bangsamoro Public Works Minister Eduard U. Guerra, on 07 January 2021.

a. Continuing engagement and consultation with various stakeholders to ensure inclusivity and constituency in the implementation of the CAB.

			<p><i>f. Congressional deliberations and related meetings on the proposed postponement of regular elections for the Bangsamoro Government.</i> On 17 November 2020, the Bangsamoro Transition Authority (BTA) adopted Resolution No. 93 urging the Philippine Congress to extend the BARMM transition period to 2025 from 2022 in order for the BTA to have more time to perform and fulfill its mandate. Following the resolution, a total of 7 bills have been filed: 5 bills in the House of Representatives and 2 bills in the Senate of the Philippines. House Bill (HB) Nos. 8116, 8117, 8161, and 8277 and Senate Bill (SB) Nos. 2019 and 2025 propose that the first regular election for the Bangsamoro Government be held and synchronized with the 2025 national elections instead of 2022. HB No. 8222, however, proposes that the first regular election be held instead in 2028 to ensure the successful implementation of the Annex on Normalization.</p> <p><i>ii. Hearings of the House Committee on Suffrage and Electoral Reforms.</i> On 20 January and 16 February 2021, the House Committee on Suffrage and Electoral Reforms conducted hearings on HB Nos. 8116, 8117, 8161, 8222, and 8277. Upon invitation, the GPH Peace Implementing Panel represented the OPAPP during the deliberations and served as resource on the progress of the implementation of the CAB, especially the Program for Normalization in the Bangsamoro.</p> <p><i>iii. Informal dialogue with provincial governors and BARMM officials.</i> The OPAPP, through the GIP-MILF Secretariat, provided administrative support to the informal dialogue with provincial governors and officials of the BTA and the Bangsamoro Government on 27 February 2021 at the Seda Abreeza in Davao City. The meeting was facilitated by Sen. Francis N. Tolentino, who heads the Senate Committee on Local Government to which SB Nos. 2019 and 2025 were referred to. It was attended by Defense Secretary Delfin N. Lorenzana, Budget Secretary Wendel E. Avisado, and Commission on Elections (COMELEC) Chair Sheriff M. Abas for the National Government. The meeting served as an avenue for provincial governors in the BARMM and its surrounding provinces of North Cotabato and Sultan Kudarat to express their support as well as reservations on the proposed postponement of regular elections for the Bangsamoro Government, considering that it may entail the extension of term of the current BTA.</p> <p>During the meeting, Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity Sec. Carlito G. Galvez, Jr. discussed the position of the OPAPP on the proposal, while OPAPP Chief of Staff and GPH Peace Implementing Panel Vice Chair Asec. Wilben M. Mayor presented its overview. After the presentations, the body proceeded to an executive session, in which a covenant is being drafted to reflect the support of the National Government, Bangsamoro Government, and provincial governors to the proposal.</p>

Hataman at the Edsa Shangri-La in Ortigas Center, Mandaluyong City to discuss how to move forward with garnering the support for the proposed postponement of regular elections for the Bangsamoro Government and the extension of the transition period following the developments made during the informal dialogue on 26 February 2021. IEC campaign and meetings with Bangsamoro Islamic Armed Forces (BIAF-MILF) commanders.</i> The GPH Peace Implementing Panel, together with the GPH peace process mechanisms, conducted an IEC campaign with BIAF-MILF commanders in early February 2021 to update the latter on the developments in the GPH-MILF peace process, particularly on the implementation of the political and normalization tracks of the CAB. It also served as an opportunity to discuss with the MILF commanders their accomplishments in supporting the OPAPP in dispute or <i>rido</i> resolution and in the case build-up for MILF members who will be subjected to amnesty.</p> <p>The IEC campaign was held on 03 February 2021 in Marawi City with commanders based in the Lanao provinces and on 08 February 2021 in Cotabato City with commanders based in Central Mindanao.</p> <p>Continuing monitoring and support to the implementation and observance of the GPH-MILF Ceasefire Agreement</p> <p><i>a. A total of 88 displaced women and girls residing in Barangay Kuya participated in the assessment. It was found that most of them are unable to return to their homes which have either been looted or destroyed. The socioeconomic conditions of the community is a strong driver for early marriages. However, the geographical isolation of their communities and the absence of affordable public transportation makes it difficult to find markets from their crops and agricultural produce, as well as native handicrafts which also serve as additional income for Jail Management and Penology (BJMP) and Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) in the BARMM, and the Bangsamoro Electoral Office.ncerns were identified, this - A total of 56 women participants took part in the activity titled 'Assessment of the Situation of IP Women and Girls in the PAMANA Areas of Occidental Mindoro Affected by and Vulnerable to Conflicts', 27 were from Monte Claro and 29 from Naibuan. Majority of them belong to a household earning a monthly income of Php 5,000.00 with most earning on an irregular basis. Although the data processing is still ongoing, initial results from the guided survey revealed that the Mangyan women in the said areas are in need of economic/livelihood interventions as well as infrastructure projects that would provide easier access to basic services. The geographic isolation of Naibuan and absence of affordable public transportation already makes it difficult to find markets for their crops and agricultural produce. The community is only accessible through dirt roads which go through dried riverbeds which become impassable during periods of heavy rains. Although there is a primary school near the community, most stu Jail Management and Penology (BJMP) and Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) in the BARMM, and the Bangsamoro Electoral Office.ncerns were identified, this will feed into the crafting of the Bicol Regional Action Plan on WPS. On 20 March 2021, JNC-GPH Co-Chair Hernandez and Basilan Governor Hadjiman Hataman-Salliman led the meeting of the Core Group – Basilan on the implementation of the small arms and light weapons (SALW) management program in the province. The focus of the discussion was to situate the implementation of the SALW program based on the context of the province and the initial immediate next steps for the Core Group. The SALW program seeks to establish similar core groups in four other provinces (Lanao del Sur, Maguindanao, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi) that will act as the primary collegial body, which is composed of the provincial government and the security forces, to supervise the implementation of the SALW program. The SALW program is based on the deliverable of the JNC under the Annex on Normalization to develop a program on SALW for individuals or groups in the Bangsamoro. Recognizing the role of the local government in community-level interventions. Specific indicators with corresponding gender issues and cause of gender issues in the context of peace and security concerns were identified, this will feed into the crafting of the Bicol Regional Acti</p> <p>ii. Socio-economic Development Programs</p> <p>(1) Reengagement Process for the Decommissioned MILF Combatants. The DSWD, together with the TFDC, conducted the 4th and 5th batches of the reengagement activity for the decommissioned MILF combatants under Phases 1 and 2. This activity is in lieu of the needs and skills assessment stipulated in the Annex on Normalization under the CAB to conduct a comprehensive profiling of the decommissioned combatants for the development of responsive socio-economic programs that address their needs and that of their families and communities. For this quarter, the reengagement activity, which was done through home visits, was able to reach a total of 3,190 decommissioned combatants. The 4th batch, which was held from 11 to 17 February 2021, reached a total of 1,719 decommissioned combatants in Lanao del Sur and Zamboanga provinces. The 5th batch, on the other hand, held from 25 February to 04 March 2021 was able to reengage a total of 1,471 decommissioned combatants.</p> <p>Prior to this activity, a total of 76 local government units in seven provinces (Lanao provinces, Zamboanga provinces, Bukidnon, and Sultan Kudarat) were engaged for courtesy visits and calls to inform the local chief executives on the purpose of the reengagement process with the decommissioned MILF combatants in their respective jurisdictions.</p> <p>With this accomplishment, the DSWD and TFDC already reengaged a total of 8,217 out of 12,145 decommissioned combatants since October 2020. A total of 146 out of 160 target local government units were already engaged and visited for this endeavor.</p>
			<p>(2) Distribution of Rice Assistance for the Decommissioned Combatants. To support the decommissioned combatants under Phases 1 and 2, especially during this time of pandemic, OPAPP, through the TFDC and in partnership with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), distributed rice assistance for the 12,145 decommissioned combatants. The endeavor, which was supported through the Support to Peacebuilding and Normalization (SPAN) Programme, was able to provide rice assistance to 931 target decommissioned combatants in Zamboanga provinces, Maguindanao, and Cotabato City. OPAPP and UNDP held a ceremonial turnover of PhP16 million worth of rice assistance on 10 February 2021 in Camp Darapangan, Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao.</p> <p>iii. Confidence-Building Measures</p> <p>(1) Camps Transformation Program. On 26 February 2021, the JTFCT presented and submitted to the GPH and MILF Implementing Panels the Camps Transformation Plan to seek their approval and strategic policy and/or operational guidance / direction on the plans.</p> <p>(2) Amnesty Program for MILF. On 05 February 2021, President Rodrigo Duterte issued Proclamation No. 1090 granting amnesty to MILF members who have committed crimes punishable under the Revised Penal Code and Special Penal Laws in furtherance of their political beliefs. The proclamation recognized the undertaking of the GPH to take immediate steps towards the resolution of cases and persons charged with or convicted of crimes and offenses connected to the armed conflict in Mindanao as essential on attaining healing and reconciliation in the Bangsamoro. The proclamation covers MILF members who committed crimes in pursuit of their political belief, except to those who have already been proscribed or those charged under the Human Security Act of 2007 or the Anti-Terrorism Act of 2020; those who committed kidnap for ransom, massacre, rape, terrorism, and other crimes committed against chastity as defined in the Revised Penal Code; those who committed crimes for personal ends; those who violated the Comprehensivees. Specific indicators with corresponding gender issues and cause of gender issues in the context of peace and security concerns were identified, this will feed into the crafting of the Bicol Regional Action Plan on WPS. Also, the activity increased the awareness and appreciation of concerned stakeholders on the</p> <p>Proclamation No. 1090, together with three other presidential proclamations on amnesty for three armed groups in the country, was submitted to the Congress of the Philippines for concurrence. Based on the Philippine Constitution of 1987, the Presidential mandate to issue amnesty proclamations should be concurred by a majority of all members of Congress. On 16 March 2021, the Joint House Committees on Justice and on National Defense and Security held its first public hearing on its House concurrent resolutions on the amnesty proclamations. On 24 March 2021, the two Committees approved the four House concurrent resolutions, including House Concurrent Resolution No. 12 for Proclamation No. 1090 – which was unanimously approved by both House committees.</p> <p>Parallel to Proclamation No. 1090, President Duterte also promulgated Executive Order No. 125, s. 2021 that created the National Amnesty Commission, which is tasked with receiving and processing applications for amnesty.</p> <p>iv. Transitional Justice and Reconciliation (TJR)</p> <p>(1) Assessment and Planning Workshop of the GPH-MILF TWG on TJR. The GPH-MILF Technical Working Group on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation held its Assessment and Planning Workshop/Meeting last 20 February 2021 at Café Mindanaw, Cotabato City. It was presided over by the GPH TWG on TJR member, Dir. Jana Jill Gallardo and attended by Annmer Dodo and Fahad Mama representing the MILF TWG-TJR.</p> <p>Accomplishments of the ICCMN-TJR and TWG, as well as the current status/updates on TJR were presented. The MILF TWG still considered the establishment of the National Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commission for the Bangsamoro (NTJRCB) to be included in the TJR Roadmap but as a separate track. Also discussed were the operational requirements or support needed for the operationalization of the TWG on TJR. It was agreed to conduct a capacity-building for the 14 MILF TWG volunteers who will man the operations in the communities (4 in Central Mindanao; 5 in BaSuTA; and 5 in the Lanao provinces). The training is proposed to be conducted in April 2021, pending the availability of the Independent Working Group on TJR, the capacity-building partner of TJRU.</p>

Meanwhile, the continuing conduct of Information, Education and Communication (IEC) Campaigns in the Bangsamoro areas and its neighboring communities, capacity development on TJR for other key BARMM ministries/agencies and joint engagement with BARMM ministries and agencies are among the activities identified for joint implementation of the TWG within the year.

(2) **ICCMN-TJR Cluster and Working Group (WG) Meetings to finalize the ICCMN-TJR Roadmap and Work Plans.** In preparation for the Meetings of the ICCMN-TJR Cluster on 23 March 2021 and ICCMN body on March 30, 2021, a series of ICCMN-TJR Cluster Working Group (WG) meetings were conducted from 29 January and 02-04 February 2021, with objectives as follows: (i) to be updated on the accomplishments and recent developments on TJR at the working group and/or agency-level; (ii) to review/assess programs/plans/activities (PPAs) that were targeted for implementation in FY 2020 that may still be implemented in FY 2021; and, (iii) to prioritize deliverables until 2022 and identify possible trajectories. The results of the three (3) remaining ICCMN-TJR Working Group Meetings held in early February 2021 were as follows:

- **Working Group on Truth and History, 29 January 2021.** Present WG members were from the Department of Education (DEPED), CHED, National Commission for Muslim Filipinos (NCMF), Commission on Human Rights (CHR), Human Rights Violations Victims' Memorial Commission (HRVVMC), and the National Youth Commission (NYC).

Among the agreements were as follows: (i) NCMF to coordinate with concerned agencies (HRVVMC, NCCA, NHCP, and BCPC) on how to proceed with the documentation, recognition and preservation of Mindanao history, cultural heritage, and ethno-linguistic diversity; (ii) CHED to submit copies to OPAPP of all issuances related to peace studies, Bangsamoro and IP history; (iii) OPAPP and CHED to discuss possible partnership for the capacity development and provision of resource persons/subject-matter experts on peace education and IP studies; (iv) OPAPP and HRVVMC to discuss joint research and memorialization activities in Malisbong, Palimbang and other areas that will be identified; (v) HRVVMC to submit list of sites of historical significance in BARMM. Preliminary list to be submitted to OPAPP by the end of April 2021.

- **Working Group on Land-related Issues, 02 February 2021.** Five (5) agency members comprised of the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP), Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR), Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Department of Justice (DOJ), and NCMF attended the meeting. The working group maintained the two deliverables in the draft TJR Roadmap, namely: (a) continuing case build up for Camps Omar and Badre within the Teduray-Lambangan Ancestral Domain Claim (TLADC) as the pilot area for intervention; and, (b) continuing dialogues at the policy and community levels with key stakeholders or duty bearers. It also identified the conduct of an inventory, mapping and overlaying of property claims, resource and tenurial instruments as basis for addressing policy and program overlaps and to prevent recurring land-related conflicts. Courses of action include submission of the digital data and other related (validated) data/info for the two (2) camps and/or BARMM in June 2021 by tes. Specific indicator

- DAR in coordination with MAFAR - areas covered by Certificates of Land Ownership Award (CLOA); CLOAble areas; privately-owned land (within CLOA areas and those issued with notice of coverage) within BARMM; other data (i.e., public land)

- DENR - existing land and resource tenurial instruments (LRTIs) within BARMM.

- NCIP -Ancestral Domain (AD) areas (CADTs/CADCs) within BARMM.

These data sets will be overlaid to inform policy and program interventions geared towards addressing complex patterns of land dispossession in BARMM.

Relatedly, a set of issues and recommendations have been elevated by the TJRU to the GIP in January 2021 on the implications of land-related issues in the said pilot case areas for further guidance/instructions.

2ND QUARTER

For this quarter, the following were the accomplishments per component of the Normalization Program:

a. **Security Aspect.** This covers the decommissioning of MILF forces and weapons, disbandment of private armed groups, programs for small arms and light weapons management, redeployment of the AFP, policing, and the clearing of unexploded ordnance and landmines.

- **Inspection of Assembly and Processing Areas (APAs) for the Decommissioning of MILF Forces.** The JNC, JPSC, and JND hold ocular inspection or site visit of possible APAs and pre-APAs in Ipil and Tungawan in Zamboanga Sibugay, Marawi City in Lanao del Sur, and Kauswagan in Lanao del Norte.

- **Conduct of Basic Military Training for JPST.** A total of 90 members of the MILF-BIAF finished the 45-day Basic Military Training being facilitated by the Philippine Army's 6th Infantry Division. The graduates are now officially members of the BMT Class 77 and 78 of 2021. The training started on 1 March 2021 and concluded on 8 April 2021. The training is a prerequisite for the MILF-BIAF members to become part of the JPSTs, whose primary mandate is to provide support on the maintenance of peace and order in their deployment areas. Upon conclusion of this training, these 90 MILF-BIAF members will undergo the JPST Training together with their counterparts from the AFP and PNP to prepare and develop their skills as peacekeepers prior to their deployment. This contingent is part of the JPSTs targeted to be established and deployed this year in these areas: Kabuntalan in Maguindanao; Midsayap in North Cotabato; Sultan sa Barongis in Maguindanao; Baloj in Lanao del Norte; and Sumisip in Basilan.

- **Ceremonial Activation and Deployment of JPST in Balindong, Lanao del Sur.** The JPSC led the ceremonial activation and deployment of JPST at Barangay Bubong Cadapaan, Balindong, Lanao del Sur on 10 April 2021.

- **National Task Force for the Disbandment of Private Armed Groups (NTF-DPAGs).** Parallel to the decommissioning of MILF combatants and weapons, a program on the disbandment of private armed groups will be initiated, together with other security modalities (e.g. small arms and light weapons management, policing, dispute resolution, amnesty), to provide a comprehensive approach towards achieving human security in the Bangsamoro as envisioned in the CAB. The NTF-DPAGs was created pursuant to the Memorandum Circular No. 83, s. 2015 and its subsequent Implementing Rules and Regulations approved in February 2020 to take charge in policy, planning, and implementation of the program on DPAGs. During the quarter, the NTF-DPAGs was able to accomplish the following:

- On 30 June 2021, the Interior and Local Government Secretary Eduardo Año, who is the chairperson of the NTF-DPAGs, led the conduct of press conference in Western Mindanao.

- The Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) led the roll-out on the program implementation of the DPAGs program.

- The Task Force - Western Mindanao has already disbanded a total of ten private armed groups that primarily operation in Maguindanao and North Cotabato.

				<p>- Small Arms and Light Weapons Program. The program on the management and reduction of small arms and light weapons (SALW) is based on the deliverable of the JNC under the Annex on Normalization to develop a program on SALW for individuals or groups in the Bangsamoro. Recognizing the role of the local government in community-level interventions in curbing the movement and reducing the number of firearms, the OPAPP, through the JNC, forged a partnership with the provincial local government units within the BARMM through a Memorandum of Agreement. OPAPP, through the JNC, is monitoring the implementation of the community-based program on SALWs that is spearheaded by the five provincial governments within the BARMM (Basilan, Lanao del Sur, Maguindanao, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi). The following were the key activities implemented under the SALWs program with these local government units:</p> <p>The Provincial Government of Basilan led the municipal-level consultation and the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding between the provincial government and the two city governments and 11 municipal</p> <p>governments within Basilan. The Memorandum of Understanding outlined the commitment of the municipal government to support the implementation of SALW program in Basilan, such the restriction of movements of loose firearms at the barangay, city, and municipal levels; facilitation of firearms registration in their localities; building a mindset wherein people are encourage to do away with the use of firearms as a tool for survival; and provision of socioeconomic development packages for individuals who voluntarily turn in their firearms and, later on, who can be trained as members of the Barangay Defense Force that can be activated as responders during disasters or against outside security threats.</p> <p>- The JNC Co-Chair Hernandez met with the Tawi-Tawi Provincial Administrator on 10 April 2021 to discuss the framework on the implementation of the program on SALWs in the province</p> <p>- Dispute Resolution Program. On 11 April 2021, the JNC and JNC held a consultation workshop with the Municipal Government of Patikul, Sulu on the implementation of dispute resolution.</p> <p>a. Socio-economic Development Programs. As part of the normalization process, the GPH and the MILF agreed to intensify development efforts for the rehabilitation, reconstruction, and development of conflict-affected areas. Socioeconomic programs will be instituted to address the needs of the MILF-BIAF members, internally displaced persons, and poverty-stricken communities in the Bangsamoro.</p> <p><i>After the actual decommissioning, the BIAF-MILF member earns the status of decommissioned combatant who is entitled to socioeconomic development packages programmed by the TFDCC. Implementation of Peaceful Return Aggressive Inclusion Social Entrepreneurship (PRAISE) in the MILF communities. The Task Force for the Decommissioned Combatants and Their Communities (TFDCC) together with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) conducted series of Orientation and Consultation to the 6 identified MILF Camps (Abubakar, Omar, Badre, Rajamuda, Bilal, Bushra) and DC Communities in Davao and Zamboanga for the implementation of Peaceful Return Aggressive Inclusion Social Entrepreneurship (PRAISE) as part of Socioeconomic Development Aspect of E.O 79. The Activity started on November 17, 2020 to January 26, 2021. The goal of the activity is to link the partner agency to the DCCs as the primary protocol and to explain to the target beneficiaries the phase of the implementation such as the Pre-implementation Stage, Social Preparation, Capacity Building, Implementation Stage, Project assessment/Monitoring phase. After the conduct of series of Orientation and Consultation the implementations. Specific indicators with corresponding gender issues and cause of gender issues in the context of peace and security concerns were identified,

On June 3,4, and 10, 2021 launching and turnover together with the Signing of Usufruct Agreement between DTI and Cooperatives' officers of the approved and implemented project of 30 units of mobile rice mills was successfully done and has a 75% completion rate.

The projects will benefit the 30 MILF cooperatives comprising 1,617 individuals as a member and their communities from Lanao Del Norte, Lanao Del Sur, and Maguindanao. The launching was attended by the parties from the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) represented by Usec. Abdulgani Macatoma, Office of The Presidential Adviser on the Peace Process (OPAPP) represented by Ariel C. Hernandez, Head, ICCMN Socioeconomic Development Sub Cluster and Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) represented by Akmad Toks Brahim, Head, MILF Joint Normalization Committee and the officers of the MILF Cooperatives. While DCCs in Davao and the Zamboanga Peninsula with 5 identified cooperatives, each comprising 402 including 150 Decommissioned Combatants as direct beneficiaries of the project, are in Social preparation and Capacity Building Training stage of implementation.

Also, the ongoing monitoring of the livelihood project was launched on March 12, 2021. This includes the Mechanized Solid Waste Segregation System (Waste Processing Livelihood Project) under the PRAISE Program funded by OPAPP in Butig, Lanao Del Sur. This Project aims to create employment and livelihood for the out-of-school youth and the Decommissioned Combatants. The segregated materials like cartons, recyclable plastic, and metals can be sold to recycling partners or buying stations. The broken glass residual plastic can be a component of Eco Brick and Eco Concrete Hollow Blocks (CHB). The concrete Hollow Block can be used in Government and Private sponsored non-high-rise construction projects. It can also be used in the street pavement and park beautification.

Payout of MILF Beneficiaries for the Tulong Panghanapbuhay sa Ating Disadvantaged/Displaced Workers (TUPAD). Schedule of salary payout to 1,116 MILF beneficiaries under Tulong Panghanapbuhay sa Ating Disadvantaged/Displaced Workers (TUPAD) of Department of Labor and Employment will be on July 2021 after the approval of the revised pertaining document prerequisites for the release of salary. Overall, the project has 81.3% completion rate.

Construction and Rehabilitation of Irrigation System in the MILF communities. Rehabilitation of the Irrigation System project of National Irrigation Administration is one of the projects intended for the Decommissioned Combatants Communities with the total approved budget of Php77,000, 000.00 for the 7 identified sites of irrigation.

The National Irrigation Administration rehabilitation system project is one of the projects designed for decommissioned combatants's communities, with a total authorized budget of Php 77, 000, 000.00 for seven (7) designated irrigation sites. For this quarter, 6 out of 7 irrigation projects are under construction with 29.5% total completion rate. Overall, the project has a 34.9% completion rate.

These irrigation projects and its corresponding completion rate are as follows:

- Malaig River Irrigation in Butig, Lanao Del Sur (36%)
- Langkong Communal Irrigation System in Matanog, Maguindanao (27%)
- Upper Tuayan Communal Irrigation System in Datu Hoffer, Maguindanao (73%)
- Tuayan Communal Irrigation System in Shariff Aguak, Maguindanao (36%)
- Ahan small Irrigation in Talayan, Maguindanao (27.56%)
- Solar pump Irrigation, Rajamuda in Pikit, North Cotabato (7%)
- Libuan Communal Irrigation System in Parang, Maguindanao (0%)

Confidence Building Measures. As part of the confidence building measures under the Annex on Normalization, the Parties agreed to undertake necessary measures for the transformation of the six MILF camps acknowledged in 1999 to peaceful and productive communities, and the GPH shall take immediate steps through amnesty, pardon, and other available processes towards the resolution of cases and persons charged with or convicted of crimes and offenses connected to the armed conflict in Mindanao.

Issuance of Amnesty Proclamation for the MILF Members. On 5 February 2021, President Rodrigo Duterte issued Proclamation No. 1090 granting amnesty to MILF members who have committed crimes punishable under the Revised Penal Code and Special Penal Laws in furtherance of their political beliefs. The proclamation recognized the undertaking of the GPH to take immediate steps towards the resolution of cases and persons charged with or convicted of crimes and offenses connected to the armed conflict in Mindanao as essential on attaining healing and reconciliation in the Bangsamoro. The proclamation covers MILF members who committed crimes in pursuit of their political belief, except to those who have already been proscribed or those charged under the Human Security Act of 2007 or the Anti-Terrorism Act of 2020; those who committed kidnap for ransom, massacre, rape, terrorism, and other crimes committed against chastity as defined in the Revised Penal Code; those who committed crimes for personal ends; those who voiesent the proposed activity and acquire comments and/or recommendations from the said local mechanisms in Region XI. The activity was initially programmed in May 2021, but was cancelled due to a COVID-19 case in the venue. As decided by the research team, the activity shall be held on 20 – 23 July 2021 these workshops, reports contain

Proclamation No. 1090, together with three other presidential proclamations on amnesty for three armed groups in the country, was submitted to the Congress of the Philippines for concurrence. Based on the Philippine Constitution of 1987, the presidential mandate to issue amnesty proclamations should be concurred by a majority of all members of the Congress. On 16 March 2021, the Joint House Committees Justice and on National Defense and Security held its first public hearing on its House concurrent resolutions on amnesty proclamations. On 24 March 2021, the two Committees approved the four House concurrent resolutions, including House Concurrent Resolution No. 12 for Proclamation No. 1090 – which was unanimously approved by both House committees.

Parallel to Proclamation No. 1090, President Duterte also promulgated Executive Order No. 125, s. 2021 that created the National Amnesty Commission, which is tasked with receiving and processing applications for amnesty and determining the applicants are entitled to amnesty under the Proclamation No. 1090 and three other proclamations on amnesty.

b. Transitional Justice and Reconciliation. Under the Annex on Normalization, the Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commissioned (TJRC) was mandated to undertake a study and to recommend to the Panels appropriate mechanisms to address the legitimate grievances of the Bangsamoro people, correct historical injustices, and address human rights violations and marginalization through land dispossession towards healing and reconciliation in the Bangsamoro.

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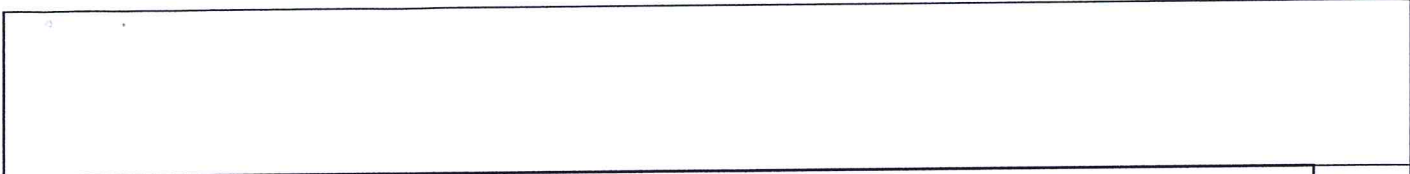
