Strengthening government peace and development institutions and mechanisms to increase their responsiveness to peace, conflict, and security issues</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>Workshop for the Development of Healing and Reconciliation Framework and Process for Indigenous Peoples for the Transformation Program for Former CTGs.</b> In furtherance of the reconciliation and unity function of OPAPRU, the formulation and approval of the Healing and Reconciliation (H&amp;R) Framework and Process for Indigenous Peoples (IPs) for the Transformation Program for Former Communist Terrorist Groups (CTGs) shall be pursued this year. The groundwork for the development of the IP H&amp;R was initiated last year through a series of consultation sessions with members of the Indigenous Political Structure (IPS) within select ancestral domains in the Davao Region. As there is still a need to deepen the understanding of indigenous cosmologies relevant to healing and reconciliation and strengthen the validity and reliability of the existing data through the application of various approaches and methodologies, it was agreed that aside from a whitshop, there will also be an inception workshop, key information, and from OPAPRU Mr. Thomas Kilip.</li> </ol> <p>In view of the expanded scope, the implementation of the whitshop and the additional activities were moved to the 2nd quarter of 2022. The activity aimed to provide a platform to brainstorm on the design for the conduct of the 1st round of consultations/dialogues and the 1<sup>st</sup> panel meeting. In the execution of A.O. 47, s. 2022, the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity (OPAPRU) established the OPAPRU Transition Committee and Technical Working Group (OPAPRU TC) through Office Order 69, s. 2022 signed last May 17, 2022. The Office Order designated members of the executive and management committee to lead the development of the OPAPRU Transition report to be turned over to the incoming management. It also outlined the general functions of the said committee and the pre-identified transition requirements for inclusion in the report package. The committee was likewise supported by a Technical Working Group (TWG) mobilized to provide administrative and technical secretariat support. Since the OPAPRU Office Order's implementation relative to the development of the transition report package, the PGSPS has served as the head secretariat, together with the Knowledge Management and Peace Institute Service (KMPIIS), to oversee, and from OPAPRU Mr. Thomas Kilip, Cherilite Malias, Jessica Bangunan and Frank Paigue, elissa Rivera and Frank Paigue, rates (UAE), Embassy of the United States, Fondati</li> </ul> <p><b>System and Business Process Improve</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Continuous operationalization of the Data Privacy Manual and Privacy Management Framework. Last 21 April 2022, the PGSPS, head of the Data Privacy Mechanism, and the Privacy Compliance Officers (PCOs) of all OPAPRU services and units convened for a coordination meeting relative to the development of the internal Information and Security Policies. During the event, the PGSPS facilitated a small group workshop aimed at gathering recommended policies for development. The consolidated policies were assessed and were used to identify two (2) policies for development. Last 19 June 2022, the PGSPS were able to draft the prioritized policies subject for review and vetting of the PCOs, and the approval of the executive and management committees.</li> </ul> <p>In view of the emerging threats to personal data and information, and in order to strengthen the operationalization of the privacy framework and manual towards privacy resiliency within the agency, a learning session on data and cybersecurity must be repetitive, updated, and constantly tested.</p> <p>The Data and Cybersecurity Learning Session held on 25 May 2022 was facilitated by Director Mary Rose Mangaysay from the Cybercrime Investigation and Coordinating Center (CICC) of the Department of Information and Communication Technology. She presented various practical applications of cybersecurity concepts in the daily agency operations involving the creation and processing of data. **Performance Checkpoint and Mid-Year Assessment Report.** On 6 April 2022, the MEAL Service conducted the FY 2022 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Performance Checkpoint in which PCME Focal Persons and other technical personnel of the OPAPRU Programs participated. Given the need to revisit and update the OPAPRU Results Framework following the results of the Strategy Refresh activities, the activity sought to gather inputs from the Programs in revising the OPAPRU RF. The activity also served as a venue to assess the Programs' 1<sup>st</sup> quarter physical and financial

progress relative to commitments based on the PGS roadmaps and scorecards and to provide orientation on newly developed MEAL guide and tools. Other activity outputs included the accomplished MEAL Self-Capacity Assessment Tool and schedule of consultation with Programs on the Evaluation Agenda.

The activity informed the mid-year assessment report presented to the ManCom on 11 May 2022. The report contained the progress of all programs in terms of their achievement of physical and financial targets. It assessed the status of achievement of Performance Governance System (PGS) targets, completion rates of PAPs, and obligation rates. It provided recommendations on preparations for the succeeding semester.

**Operationalization of the OPAPP Results Framework 2019-2022.** The 2019-2022 OPAPRU's Results Framework (RF) has been developed per the Results-Based Monitoring, Evaluation, and Reporting (RBMER) policy of the Department of Budget and Management, which was developed to recognize government deficiencies and the urgent need to manage the performance and results of all government operations. The OPAPRU RF harmonizes and articulates the intended results from each level of intervention based on the Performance Governance Systems (PGS) Roadmaps and Scorecards of OPAPRU's core and support programs.

To determine the extent to which targets are met at the organizational level, status of indicators along the OPAPRU Results Framework are being reported on a semi-annual basis. As of end of December 2021, the MEAL Service was able to collect and report data for 12 out of 15 indicators in the OPAPP RF MEAL Plan. The OPAPP RF needed to be updated based on the revised PGS Basic Governance Documents. There is also a need to determine and vet with Programs the targets along results so there are benchmarks against which accomplishments will be assessed.

**Automated Program Dashboard System.** The OPAPRU-MEALS continued to monitor the quality of data in the system and flag issues to concerned programs that were found. Overall, the PAPs for 105 out of 256 PGS targets were still yet to be determined; 36 out of 606 updates were not supplemented with means of verification; and there was a gap between data of the Finance Department and programs totaling Php 34 million. The MEALS continuously facilitates the rectification of these errors with the concerned programs.

As part of the continuing enhancements to the Automated Program Dashboard System, the MEAL Service integrated the user manual on the dashboard instead of using the SharePoint link initially provided to the PCME focal for easier reference. The continuing fund module was also disaggregated into two (2): Regular Continuing and Congress-introduced Continuing for a more accurate financial monitoring and updating. Next steps for the system enhancements include the further disaggregation of Program 4 - RPMP/RPA/BAB.

**Development of OPAPP Evaluation Agenda 2022-2025.** The OPAPRU MEAL Service continued to collaborate with Programs 1-8 for crafting their Evaluation Plan that will serve as a reference in the development of the OPAPP Evaluation Agenda. Meanwhile, MEAL Service culled out evaluation topics identified during the Workshop on the Harmonization of the OPAPP RF in FY 2021. Evaluation topics, questions, methodology, and timeline were drafted for majority of the programs and these were consolidated in one document. A Technical Working Group (TWG) Meeting for the GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process Transition Plan was conducted on 29-31 March 2022 in Gannu, Isabela province. The activity was participated by the Members of the TWG for the Transition Plan composed of the following: LTC Jesse James Tuguis (SID); MAJ Henry Bual II (AFP PDO); MAJ Freddie Francisco (PNP PFDG); Ms Virginia Tapat (Chief of Operations, DA-CAR); Thomas Killip (OPAPRU Consultant); and CBA-CPLA leaders: Engr. Andres Ngao-I, Ronald Balao-as and Michael Karel Suguinayo. The participants particularly Mr. Balao-as reiterated that the attendees to meetings or activities such as this should not be limited. He was insistent that those coming from Abra especially him, usually bring along a group of men. It was suggested to rotate the conduct of JEMC activities to experience and learn about the other areas across Cordillera.

**Security Component.** The turnover of scrap metals from the 339 units of demilitarized turned-in firearms of CBA-CPLA members was conducted on 8 February 2022. The activity was done in reference to the approved request letter dated 26 January 2022 from PBGEN/Ronaldo E. Olay (Chief/PNP) pertaining to the request for authority to dispose the scrap metals from surrendered firearms of CBA-CPLA members. The turnover was approved by the Chief of PNP, through the support and assistance of PNP Peace Process and Development Center, which made this endeavor possible and successful. The PNP-PROCOR provided transport services of these scrap metals to the Baguio City Field Office. OPAPRU will use these scrap metals for the installation of memorabilia in Manabo, Abra and Mt. Dala Hotel, Bauko, Mt. Province to be accomplished in May 2022. Likewise, OPAPRU has also turned over three (3) metal cutlery to PROCOR. The turn-over was facilitated by PNP PROCOR representatives: PMAJ Barnard Bone F. Navarra and PEMS Eduardo Dion, and from OPAPRU Mr. Thomas Killip, Charlotta Malbas, Jessica Banganan and Frank Palgue.

**Social and Economic Component**

**a. OPAPRU-NCIP Educational Assistance Program for CBA-CPLA and/or their Next of Kin.** The OPAPRU- NCIP Special Educational Assistance Program or SEAP is a study grant given to former CBA-CPLA members and their family members or next of kin who have successfully pre-qualified based on verification, submission of documentary requirements screening and selection process as prescribed in the MOA. It has an approved fund of Four Million and Sixty Thousand Pesos (PhP4,060,000.00) covering SY 2021-2022. Listed below is the breakdown of student-applicants per province who successfully completed the required documents/requirements and who have been verified and validated based on existing files, including consultation with CBA-CPLA Leaders:

**c. Accreditation of Peoples's Organization.** The interventions for the various peoples' organizations (POs) were mostly consultative of their current operations. Selected POs in Abra and Kalinga will undergo strengthening and capacity building through the partnership with Abra State Institute of Sciences and Technology (ASIST) based in Laganlagan, Abra and Kalinga State University (KSU) based in Bulanao, City of Tabuk, Kalinga. The Memorandum of Agreements for this partnership is scheduled to be signed in the first week of April 2022.

**d. Operationalization of the OPAPRU-DENR Joint Memorandum Circular 2013-02.** Some 70 units of geotagging devices were formally turned over to DENR-CAR on 17 February 2022. These will be used by the Forest Guards for their patrolling activities. Likewise, this is OPAPRU's response to one of the requests from the Banlay Gubat Personnel who participated in the series of Focus Group Discussions of the GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process conducted in May 2021. The geotagging devices were formally received by Engr. Ralph Pablo, Regional Executive Director of DENR-CAR. The distribution allocation as recommended by DENR-CAR Enforcement Division, is as follows: Abra – 13 units; Apayao – 15 units; Benguet – 6 units; Ifugao – 6 units; Kalinga – 15 units; and Mt. Province – 15 units.

**e. Implementation of Sustainable Inclusive Peace And Transformation (SIPAT) Program.** On 11 February 2022, some 89 heads of goats under the SIPAT Program were awarded to the Lamut Riverside Farmer's Association in Lamut, Ifugao. These ruminants were delivered last January 26, 2022 in Lamut and were received by the PO Officers. The PO prepared a range for the ruminants located in Magulon Proper, Lamut, Ifugao owned by one of its members. The PO members will undergo a skills training focused on the "Seven Points on How to Manage Goat Production." After the training, the goats will be distributed to the active members of the association. It was agreed that the first batch of eligible members will receive two (2) heads each and will collect a minimum of two (2) heads to the association to be availed by the other members. The awarding ceremony was attended by Ms. Charlemagne Migno of DA-CAR, Ms. Gwenoy Bacwaded – Lamut Municipal Agriculturist, JEMC Member Mariano Taglag, officers and members of the association, and from OPAPRU Mr. Thomas Killip, Charlotta Malbas, Jessica Banganan and Frank Palgue.

**Implementation of Confidence-Building Component**

**a. DAYAW Program**

A meeting with TESDA-CAR regarding the implementation of Community-based Skills Training Programs of DAYAW was conducted on 11 January 2022 in TESDA-CAR, Loakan, Baguio City. Participants of the meeting were TESDA Regional Director Jeffrey Dy, Regional Operations Division Chief Daisy Bungalon and OPAPRU Representatives.

On 12 February 2022, a coordination meeting with PNP Provincial Police Office-PVAM was conducted in Bangad, Tinglayan, Kalinga to discuss the collaboration on women and youth activities. As a result of the meeting, OPAPRU and PNP 2nd Mobile Patrol Force will capacitate the women on VAMC (wherein the resource person will be coming from the PNP); responsible parenthood/stress management by the MSWDO; Women, Peace and Security (OPAPRU); and, IEC on Cordillera Autonomy (NEDA-SPCAR/Community Eker). For the youth, anchored under the DAYAW, OPAPRU will conduct a one-day community-based orientation with the KALIGKASAN (Kalkasan and Kaligasan) Youth Organization on VAMC (PNP), Drug Abuse (PNP/AFP), Communist Terrorist Group (AFP) including lecture on YPS/Autonomy. The activity will invite youths from Lubuagan, Tinglayan, Pasi and Baibalan. The PNP will transport the participants to the venue.

The OPAPRU office in CAR spearheaded the observance of the Women's Month Celebration on March 4, 2022. It was attended by the farmer's association-beneficiaries in Surjos, Manokyan who participated in the discussions on such topics as Women, Peace and Security; and Project Sustainability including pursuit for Cordillera Autonomy. The participants requested other capacity building interventions from OPAPRU in the future. This was followed by a convergence of services on 9 March 2022 in Barangay Cagaluan, Pasi, Kalinga. The activity involved women and youth in the mountain villages through informal, education and communication activities and relief distribution that were coordinated and facilitated by the 2nd Kalinga Provincial Mobile Force Company (KPMFC), The Barangay Council of Cagaluan, Pasi in Kalinga, in partnership with the Philippine National Police (PNP), Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP), Rural Health Unit of Pasi (RHU), Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), Philippine Information Agency (PIA), conducted an outreach program participated by women and the KALIGKASAN Warriors (youth group) from the area of responsibility of the 2nd KPMFC. Jessica Benganan of OPAPRU discussed the concepts and principles of women and youth, peace and security as the core agenda of the *Deliberations and Advocates of Youth and Women (DAYAW)* while Ms. Charolita Matias of the same agency presented the salient provisions of the proposed bill on Cordillera Autonomous Region; Peter Balcont of PIA, talked on women empowerment highlighting the role of women on family upbringing and community development and the role of the youth on environment preservation; SF03 Mark Buelig of the BFP discussed the topic on fire prevention; and PLT Divina Kawi of the 2nd KPMFC presented RA 9262 or the Violence Against Women and their Children law. Moreover, PLT Anthony Bunoan of Pasi Municipal Police Station led the Anti-Bastos law, Nirjithune Bailit of TESDA, discussed their services while Dr. Mera Bacawan of RHU Pasi explained the non-communicable diseases and top three common causes of mortality among women, bloodletting and COVID-19 Vaccination. The celebration, also dubbed "BARANGAYanihan" benefited 150 individuals from the feeding program, medical mission and relief distribution (rice and sugar), gift-giving of tumblers, batipen, IEC materials and calendars in the communities mentioned.

**b. Support to Autonomy**

- A consultation meeting with NEDA-SFCAR and NCIP-CAR relative to the conduct of Grassroots Level IEC on Autonomy was conducted on March 21, 2022. The meeting was attended by Mr. Aris Das Ocampo of NEDA-SFCAR, Ms. Crislyn Zarate of NCIP and OPAPRU representatives.
- On 14 February 2022, a consultation meeting with Mr. Henry Gupaal and Sir Thomas Kilip regarding the IP-led/grassroots level campaign for Autonomy was conducted.

**4. Implementation of Healing and Reconciliation Component**

Four (4) boxes containing all scrap metals were turned over to the commissioned artists last February 17, 2022. These would be used in developing artworks for the three sites (3) at Mt. Data Hotel, Bauko, Mt. Province; Manabo Abra, and brass marker at PMA-Longayban Hall.

On 28 February 2022, a meeting with MLGU Manabo was conducted to discuss the installation of Peace Memorabilia in Manabo, Abra. The municipal representative was informed that the memorabilia site will be at the Manabo Pilot Elementary School (MPES) grounds as recommended by Governor Ronald Balao-as. Ms. Evangelina Diwayan of MPSE assisted the team to the proposed location/site which is on the MPES open ground where they usually conduct the flag raising ceremony.

On 23 February 2022, a cleansing ritual for the scrap metals was performed by the elders of Sagada to ward-off bad omens. After the ritual, the metals were formally turned over to the artists. Groundworks of the Mt. Data Peace Memorabilia commenced on 15 March 2022 with KC Stop as the hired contractor.

A ground working on Babwagan and Bugnay boundary conflict was conducted in Bugnay, Tinglayan and Babwagan, Sadanga last 27 February 2022. The activity was participated by the CBA-OPLA Elders: Celso Yag-ao, Wilson Gawang, Maimo Lemawan, and OPAPRU representatives.

On 26 March 2022, the first *longtong* (dialogue) of the elders/mansakusaks was undertaken in Bontoc, Mt. Province with the full participation of the four (4) elders from Kalinga and three (3) elders from Mt. Province. DILG Provincial Director Mayer Adong also joined the activity.

**2ND QUARTER**

**1. Continued operationalization of the implementing mechanisms (JEMC, JB-DAF, SERC, and SCT)**

**a. Socio-Economic Reintegration Cluster (SERC).** The SERC is tasked to assist the JEMC in ensuring a holistic implementation and delivery of socio-economic and security interventions to the KAPATIRAN.

Through the SERC, twelve (12) Kapaitran members in Cuisai, Antique became beneficiaries of Pangabuhayan sa Pagbanganon at Ginhawa Program (PPGP) of DTT Region 6. The Kapaitran also attended an Entrepreneurship Seminar and Financial Literacy given by DTI Antique Negosyo Center. Of the 170 DTT PPGP beneficiaries in Region 6, 146 are operational and 4 were reported as non-operational.

The Kapaitran Iloilo Chapter produced 25 graduates of TESDA Organic Agriculture Training NC II, conducted in Brgy. Ceraudan, January, Iloilo. The graduates were already awaiting for Assessment Schedule from TESDA Central Office.

The OPAPRU through its Field Office participated in the Bike Hike Plant+ activity of DENR Forest Management Bureau. Seedlings of hardwood trees were planted by field office staff together with representatives from Iloilo LGUs: AFP, PNP, PAF, and BFP. The forest reserve in Maasin, Iloilo is a nearby barangay of the Kapaitran Community Peace Dividend area.

**b. Site Coordinating Teams (SCTs).** The Site Coordinating Teams were formed under JEMC Resolution No. 2, series of 2019 and are tasked to assist in implementing all components of the CID as well as to ensure effective collaboration of agency commitments such as the establishment of settlement sites as peace and development communities (PDC) and the provision of government social protection packages to KAPATIRAN members.

The OPAPRU through RCCO-RPA Division provided both technical and administrative support to the SCTs to facilitate the conduct of the following activities to deliver the corresponding outputs:

1. On April 4-6, the Antique SCT met resulting in the following action points:
  - Three (3) housing site options shall undergo deliberation and assessment to determine the most feasible for KAPATIRAN housing;
  - The proposed sites shall be ranked based on priority;
  - The DENR Provincial Office shall seek the advice of the Regional Office on the requirements for acquiring lands (alienable and disposable) with claimants; and,
  - The proposed NHA Site in Cuisai was validated to be in Brgy. Panningayan. The Provincial Planning Board to determine the number of units available and unoccupied
2. The convergence meeting with MLGU Cuisai, Antique resulted in the following action points:
  - Mayor Lumogdang offered the Panningayan NHA Housing Project as the housing site of the KAPATIRAN. The MLGU requested the actual number of occupants to determine the number of units to be awarded as well as the location of the said facilities.
  - The DENR proposed site in Brgy. Osoño was proposed to be utilized as a production area for the KAPATIRAN.
3. The Negros Oriental Provincial Site Coordinating Team conducted its 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter SCT Meeting on 5 April 2022 to discuss updates on the implementation of programs and projects for the Kapaitran Peace and Development Community in Sitio Ling-ab, Brgy. San Miguel, Tanjay City.

As a result, an SCT Cluster meeting was scheduled on April 28 (For Socio-Economic Cluster) and May 17 (Security and Infra Support Cluster) respectively to particularly discuss the livelihood and the scheduled Ceremonial Turnover of Housing units to the sixteen (16) Kapaitran members.

The Kabankalan SCT convened on April 27 for its 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Meeting to discuss the needed preparation for the forthcoming Ceremonial Turnover of 20 Housing Units. A Committee was organized for the purpose.

A follow-through SCT meeting was conducted on 17 May 2022, to finalize the program flow of the Ceremonial Turnover and Groundbreaking of programs and projects for the Kapaitran in Brgy. Loodian, Kabankalan. Also discussed was the progress of each committee tasked with the venue preparation and other needed logistics.

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The RCCD Provincial Coordinators attended the DSWD's Planning Workshop and Crafting of the Comprehensive and Integrated Intervention Plan for the KAPATIRAN in Malay, Aklan last June 27-30, 2022. The activity highlighted the implementation of the initial phase of the case management program for the KAPATIRAN and to calibrate the design of the intervention plans to facilitate the social and economic reintegration of the KAPATIRAN.

*iii. Implementation of Social Protection Programs.* On April 6, 2022, the RCCD facilitated the conduct of orientation on COVID-19 and Vaccination Roll Out in Sitio Mambinay, Bigy, Looatan, Kabankalan. As a result, a medical mission was conducted on May 27 in partnership with City Health Office (CHO) Kabankalan, 15IB, 54P<sup>th</sup> ECB, PNP Kabankalan, BLSU Looatan and RCCD. Kapatiran members, NOK, and adjacent community members were able to avail the following medical services: General consultation, COVID-19 Vaccination, Dental, Circumcision, Haircut, and received food packs, used clothes and Vitamins and Medicines.

Facilitated preparation of project proposal to be submitted to the Scholarship Division of the Provincial Government of Negros Occidental. The PLGU allocated budget amounting to 1M for 200 Kapatiran NOK who are currently enrolled in College and Senior High. A cash assistance amounting to 5,000.00 will be awarded to each NOK per semester.

**a. Partnership with Academic and other Private Institutions.** Series of follow-through meetings with Central Philippine State University and Negros Oriental State University on the needed requirements to facilitate the release of PNP 1,000,000.00 for the operationalization of the M&E System covering the socioeconomic reintegration and CPD Component of the CID.

Facilitated the conduct of Ceremonial Turnover of Checks amounting to 1M to CFSU and NORSU on April 11-12, 2022. Dir. Susana Marcalda led the ceremonial turnover with JEMC Co-Chair Yvonica Tabara. Also present during the event were University Presidents of respective Academe and their appointed Project Team.

Moreover, the RCCD conducted coordination meetings with CFSU and NORSU project teams on April 18 and 25 respectively to discuss the details of the partnership and its work timeline.

**b. Support to the Implementation of Executive Order No. 70.** Three monthly meetings of the RTF-ELCAC 6 was attended by RCCD Focal Person, bringing the agenda on the updates of the Local Peace Engagement (LPE) in the Region. Updates from the National LPE Cluster were also provided during the said meetings. The Office was also represented during the PRRD Legacy activity held at Camp Martin Delgado, Iloilo City where inter-agency efforts were made available to the public thru a service caravan.

**E. Completion of the 2011 Memorandum of Agreement with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA – CPLA)**

**1. Support the Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC) and Components.**

On June 1, 2022, the GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee CBA-CPLA members were convened at Davidson Hotel in Tabuk, Kalinga. During this activity, the body provided initial inputs on the draft Normalization Program Document. The JEMC was likewise provided with the status of the ongoing Normalization Programs/ projects particularly the Special Education Assistance Program (SEAP), completion and installation of the peace memorabilia at Mount Data Hotel, documentation of the CBA-CPLA old guards and martyrs, and legacy documentation framework. Via online, the Department of Agriculture-CAR also presented the targeted sixteen barangays as SIPAT FY2022 recipients. On the SIPAT areas, the JEMC has identified and recommended other communities or barangays as recipients. This will be transmitted officially through a letter addressed to DA-RFO-CAR. It was also agreed that a follow up workshop will be conducted to finalize the Normalization Program of the GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process. There e Information Agency (PIA), conducted an outreach program participated by women and the KALIGKASAN Warriors (youth group) from the area of responsibility

**2. Implementation of the Normalization Program.** A Planning and Formulation of a Legal Document with the JEMC's designated Study Group was conducted on May 25-28, 2022 in Baguio City to support the implementation of the 5-Year Normalization Program. The study group is composed of lawyers and uniformed officers from various units of AFP AFP PDO, OTJAG, and SID), PNP (PNP PPDC, Legal Service, PROCOR) and OPAPRU (LAD). Present in the workshop were Mr. Thomas Killip (OPAPRU Consultant), representatives from PNP PPDC: *BGEN Ysmael Yu, PLTCOL Jay Borromeo, PMAJ Fredelin Francisco, PMAJ Leslie Jalorina, and PMSG Michael Dela Cruz*; AFP PDO: *COL Ederardo Decosco, Michelle Cardillo, and MSG Tito Subang*; AFP OTJAG: *LTCOL Mark Aquino, Aranny Aquino, and Remedios Pulanac*; PROCOR: *PMAJ Flor Tuzanon, PMAJ Ryan Waskat, PMAJ Arselmo Buanale, OPAPRU – Legal Services: Atty. Bea Tarrasa, Dani Britton Molina, and OPAPRU-RCCO: Joey Olpinod, Jessica Bangunan, Charlotte Malias and Melissa Rivera.*

On 16-18 June 2022, another planning and formulation was conducted with the CBA-CPLA JEMC Technical Working Group members on the drafting of a Memorandum of Agreement in preparation for the Transition Plan. The workshop focused on the preparation of additional inputs to the draft roadmap and reference to the objective of crafting a legal document. This was also related to the workshop conducted last May 2021 that formulated the draft roadmap for the 5-NP of GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process. This activity involved the engagement of Ms. Milagros Rimando as the subject matter expert for workshop facilitation. Present in the workshop were the OPAPRU Consultants: Mr. Thomas Killip, BGEN Bismarck Solba and BGEN Ramon Yogyo, CBA-CPLA members from Abra, Benguet, Ilugao, Kalinga and Mountain Province, and OPAPRU-RCCO: Director Susana Marcalda, Joey Olpinod, Jessica Bangunan and Melissa Rivera.

**Security Component.** Strategies and insights related to the writing of the guidelines of the decommissioning program, security arrangement and conflict monitoring protocols including guidelines for the disposition of firearms were being shared continuously by the AFP PDO and PNP PPDC through phone conversations and other social media platforms. The suggestions are included in the draft guidelines.

**Social and Economic Component**

**a. OPAPRU-NCIP Educational Assistance Program for CBA-CPLA and/or their Next of Kin.** The OPAPRU in collaboration with NCIP-CAR conducted a series of orientations on the OPAPP-NCIP Special Educational Assistance Program from May 26-27, 2022 in Kalinga and Apayao and June 9-10, 2022 in Mountain Province and Ilugao to discuss elaborately the specific as well as the general requirements that a grantee must possess in order to be considered under the Program and its process flow. Of the 100 grantees, 60 grantees were oriented to the Program. After the orientation program, the student-grantees were given proper time to submit their documentary requirements to the representatives of OPAPP and NCIP-CAR for the completion of the required documents for the 2<sup>nd</sup> batch of 100 for SY 2022-2023.

**c. Accreditation of Peoples's Organization.** A meeting (blended methodology) with Regional Council on Cacao with DTI-CAR, DTI-Apayao, DENR-CAR and DA-CAR was conducted on 2 June 2022 in Luna, Apayao to comment on the CAR Regional Roadmap on Cacao and to discuss plans and interventions for the CBA-CPLA members in Apayao under the 5-Year Normalization Program. The meeting resulted in the following:

- There is an evident need for continuous capacity building for farmer-producers and processors in terms of technical training, record keeping, and other managerial skills.
- DENR-CAR will share the list of POs that will be recipients of cacao seedlings.
- DA-CAR also reiterated to the body that POs can submit proposals for training or request for farm inputs provided they are accredited and registered in the RSBSA.

Galvez, Jr., DA-CAR Regional Executive Director Dr. Cameron Odsey, KSU President Dr. Eduardo Bagtang and ASIST President Dr. Gregorio Turqueza.</p> <p>The Department of Agriculture-Cordillera Administrative Region (DA-CAR) in collaboration with the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity (OPAPRU) and the Municipal Local Government (MLGU) of Mankayan, awarded P990,000.00 worth of livelihood interventions to Central Palas-an Farmers Association Inc (CPFA) of Suyo, Mankayan, Benguet last 17 June 2022. The livelihood interventions awarded were 520 crates, 30 knapsack sprayers, 20 water tanks, 9 grass cutters, 8 power sprayers, 2 power pumps, and 1 shredder. This is in support of the high-value crop production of the farmer group such as potatoes, cabbages, broccoli, Chinese cabbage, and lemons.</p> <p>In support of the expansion of SIPAT Program for 2022, the final list of the 16 barangays to be covered was thoroughly discussed and finalized by the CBA-CPLA leaders/members and was transmitted to DA-CAR on June 22, 2022. The Community Orientation Activities were already conducted in the three (3) barangays of Apayao last June 8-10, 2022.</p> <p>Implementation of Confidence-Building Component</p> <p>a. <b>DAYAW Program.</b> The OPAPRU facilitated the distribution of solar lights in the Province of Kalinga on May 17, 2022. In this province, at least 70 CBA-CPLA members/households were served during the distribution of solar lights. This was followed by the same activity in Apayao with 50 recipients distributed on May 11-12, 2022; Ilugao with 50 recipients distributed on May 20, 2021; Mountain Province with 70 recipients distributed on May 25, 2022; and Benguet with 50 recipients distributed on June 9, 2022. The remaining 50 will be distributed on July 8, 2022. The solar lights are intended to light up unenergized CBA-CPLA households in remote areas or communities specifically facilitating the women in their daily chores and/or the students currently enrolled under the modular modality of learning.</p> <p>b. <b>Support to Autonomy.</b> From April to May 2022, the OPAPRU continuously coordinated with LGU partners to reinforce and sustain the partnership and collaboration with NCP-CAR and IPMRs in pursuit of the effective and efficient conduct of the IEC on Cordillera Autonomy for the IP groups/communities; to come up with a list of participants for the Speakership Training that will involve the women, youth and elders; and to formulate a convergence plan that will ultimately achieve full support to the cause.</p> <p>As a result, a series of Advocacies on Peace and Regional Autonomy were conducted in Apayao, Benguet, Ilugao, Kalinga and Mountain Province from May 18 to June 16, 2022. A total of 294 IPMRs/elders, women leaders, youth leaders, and LGU partners actively participated in the training and have gained adequate knowledge, values and skills that will fully support their role as advocates for Cordillera Autonomy. Provincial and municipal plans of action were crafted and ready for implementation from August to October 2022.</p> <p>In Benguet, the participants representing the three sectors (youth, women, IP leaders/IPMRs) shared their expectations and reflections on Cordillera Autonomy. While most of them have been involved in the consultations over the past years, some are first-timers and are looking forward to fully understand the concepts of Autonomy. As to their assessment of the support level of their respective municipalities to Autonomy, their rate is between 0-30%. They have also shared some appalling concerns about how the campaign on Autonomy is undertaken on the ground. In full support, the group named Benguet Indigenous Peoples (IPs) Advocates for Regional Autonomy in Cordillera came up with a signed resolution requesting President/Elect Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. to certify as urgent legislation in his first State of the Nation Address the bill creating of Autonomous Region of the Cordillera.</p> <p>Implementation of Healing and Reconciliation Component. To formally introduce the Mt. Data Memorabilia to the public, Director Susana Guadalupe Marcalda and OPAPRU consultants BGen. Ramon Yogyog (Ret.), BGen. Bismarck Solba, and Thomas Killip did a walk-through and photo documentation of the installed artwork last 17 June 2022 in Bauko, Mountain Province. The following were the highlights of the meeting:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The OPAPRU shall transfer funds to the SSC amounting to PHP 2.3 million to facilitate and support the data gathering, contact-building, needs assessment, and social case management of MNLF members/combatants as part of the implementation of the Transformation Program in Sulu.</li> <li>The transferred fund shall be utilized for the provision of capacity building and development activities, planning workshops, including regular and special meetings, operational support, and administrative cost for the SSC and the salary of the 30 profilers hired by the SSC for three months covering the duration of the profiling activity.</li> <li>The transfer of funds shall be covered by a new memorandum of agreement (MOA), to be charged against the FY 2021 Continuing Funds of the OPAPRU.</li> <li>To uphold and protect the confidentiality of all information or data collected and processed by the profiling activity, the OPAPRU and SSC shall likewise execute a Data Sharing Agreement (DSA). The DSA shall be executed concurrently with the new MOA.</li> </ul> <p>11. <b>Training on System and Process Flow of the profiling for MNLF Combatants.</b> The OPAPRU through its Transformation Division conducted a two-day training on 23-26 February 2022 at the Sulu State College on the system and process flow of the profiling of MNLF combatants. The activity was composed of workshops, consultations, and simulations on the proper use of the system as well as discussions on the process flow of the actual implementation of profiling.</p> <p>The said activity provided training participants the foundation for data collection and data processing and developed their competencies in strong technical skills, attention to detail, and good personal skills.</p>	
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12. **OPAPRU's Visit to Sulu for the MNLF Peace Process.** On the 17<sup>th</sup> of March 2022, Secretary Carlo G. Gabez Jr., together with Undersecretary Arthur I. Tabaquero (Chair of the GPH Coordinating Committee with Sema Group), Undersecretary Cesar B. Yano (Chair for GPH Security SubCommittee), and Assistant Secretary Andres S. Aguinaldo, Jr. (Socio-economic Subcommittee Chair and Assistant Secretary for Bangsamoro Operations) visited the Province of Sulu for the MNLF Transformation Program.

The objective of this visit was for the PAPRU to meet with various stakeholders in Sulu such as the security sector and Provincial and Municipal Chief Executives to seek their support for the implementation of the MNLF Transformation Program.

13. **Solidarity Activity for the 54th MNLF Founding Anniversary.** In solidarity and in pursuit of confidence-building with the MNLF, the MCO team headed by Ms. Maria Magdalena Barros and the 11<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division of the AFP participated in the celebration of the 54th MNLF Founding Anniversary on 18 March 2022. The OPAPRU dispersed six (6) cattle to the Sema and Misuari Group (3 for each Group), and 400 sacks of NFA rice (200 for the Sema group and 200 for the Misuari group) to Pasil and Kagay MNLF Camps.

14. **Planning Workshop on the Finalization of the MNLF Profiling Process.** The OPAPRU thru the office of the MNLF Concerns Office conducted a Planning Workshop on the Finalization of Implementing Guidelines and Implementation Plan with the AFP, SSC, DSND, and PSA for the MNLF Transformation Program, held at the Hotel Elizabeth, Baguio City from 31 March to 1 April 2022. It resulted to the discussion and finalization of the proposed process flow of the agencies' respective roles and interventions during the actual conduct of validation, verification, and profiling, as well as the actual delivery of initial socio-economic intervention for the MNLF combatants.

**2ND QUARTER**

As of this reporting period, the following were accomplished:

**1. Political Engagements**

6<sup>th</sup> **GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee.** The OPAPRU through the MCO conducted the 8th GMCC meeting at Astoria Plaza, Pasig City on 19 May 2022. In attendance from the GPH are the GPH Coordinating Committee Chair, Usec. Arthur Tabaquero, GPH Security Subcommittee Chair Usec. Cesar Yano, GPH Community Healing Subcommittee Chair, BGen. Buenaventura Pascual, and GPH Head Secretariat Dir. Jana Gallardo. From the MNLF, the MNLF Coordinating Committee Chair Mr. Ulath Salen Culan, MNLF Security Subcommittee Chair Datu Faizal Karon, MNLF Community Healing Subcommittee Chair Mr. Alexis Malina, MNLF Socioeconomic Subcommittee Chair Mr. Awad Hamid, MNLF Head Secretariat Engr. Dong Anayatin, and MNLF Confidence-building Subcommittee Chair Mr. Alhabsi Hassan.

The OPAPRU reported in the meeting that the initial list of 1,000 combatants for verification and profiling submitted by the MNLF was successfully validated by the JVAT. Further, the GPH Coordinating Committee mentioned that the arrangements for the conduct of the verification and profiling processes are being finalized as well as the preparation for the Transition Report of the GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee to the next administration.

**GPH Coordinating Committee Meeting.** On 09 June 2022, the GPH Coordinating Committee conducted a hybrid meeting with the attendance of members of the Security Subcommittee, Joint Body on Disposition of Arms and Forces, and other security-related mechanisms.

The meeting resulted in the following agreements and next steps:

1. Enhance the terminologies to highlight that there would be no turning of weapons specifically during the verification and profiling phase.
2. 11th Infantry Division to discreetly talk to the MNLF Leadership in Sulu to ensure the success of the verification and profiling and fully communicate the program to the MNLF

**Consultation meeting of the GPH Peace Coordinating Committee with the MNLF Misuari Group for the implementation of the MNLF Transformation Program.** The MNLF Concerns Office assisted the meeting of the GPH Chair of the GPH-MNLF Peace Coordinating Committee Secretary Carlo Gabez, Jr. with the MNLF Chairman Nur Misuari, Ms. Tanihata Ibrahim and its secretariat namely, Ms. Nur Alinea Lim, Ms. Nur Redha Misuari, Mr. Khalid Misuari, Ms. Nurhata Misuari and Mr. Aldren Ibrahim at the NAAA Terminal 2.

The two chairs discussed matters relative to the implementation of the Transformation Program interventions for the MNLF combatants in Sulu under his leadership and other concerns of the MNLF in different areas in Mindanao.

**Coordination Meeting and Site Inspection of the Command Center of the JBDAF.** The OPAPRU, in cooperation with the Armed Forces of the Philippines - Peace and Development Office (AFP-PDO) and the Philippine National Police - Peace Process and Development Center (PNP-PPDC), conducted the Coordination Meeting and Site Inspection of the Command Center of the Joint Body on the Disposition of Arms and Forces (JBDAF) at the Western Mindanao Command (Westmincom), Camp Navarro, Zamboanga City on 19 April 2022.

The activity aims to achieve the following: (1) to orient AFP Westmincom on the JBDAF and the Security Component of the MNLF Transformation Program, particularly the validation, verification, and profiling processes for the MNLF members to be profiled in Sulu under the program; and (2) to consult, clarify, and refine with the Westmincom the administrative, technical, and logistical matters relative to the operationalization of the JBDAF, including the reporting process and requirements; and to inspect the identified spaces for the proposed JBDAF Command Center at the Westmincom.

The OPAPRU delegation was headed by GPH Coordinating Committee Member, BGen Buenaventura C Pascual (ret). Also present from the OPAPRU-MNLF Concerns Office (MCO) are Mr. Reynmark K. Raajulir (Head of Political Engagement Division of MCO), Ms. Maria Magdalena C. Barros (Head of Transformation Division of MCO), and Atty. Henrey C. Benitez. On the other hand, the AFP-PDO was represented by COL Rummual J Perez and Col Noel E Buncab while the AFP Westmincom was represented by its Chief of Staff, Col Elmer B Sudeno. Lastly, the PNP-PPDC was represented by Maj Deo Gene M Bonggawan, Elmer B Sudeno. Lastly, the PNP-PPDC was represented by Maj Deo Gene M Bonggawan.

**Organizational Training of the Joint Verification Team.** The Joint Body on Disposition of Arms and Forces (JBDAF) under the GPH-MNLF Peace Process conducted a three-day Organizational Training of the Joint Verification Team in order to orient and prepare all involved units/offices for the upcoming verification process for MNLF combatants in Sulu under the MNLF Transformation Program.

The said JBDAF Activity was facilitated by the OPAPRU's MNLF Concerns Office (MCO), in cooperation with the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), through its Peace and Development Office (PDO) and 11th Infantry Division (11ID), the Philippine National Police (PNP), through its Peace Process and Development Center (PPDC) and Sulu Provincial Police Office (SPPPO), and the MNLF, through its Sulu State Revolutionary Committee.

The activity aims to orient and train the following matters on all members of the verification squads, to wit: (1) task organization and process flow of the verification process, (2) duties and responsibilities for the encoders relative to electronic data processing and safe-keeping, (3) duties and responsibilities relative to documentation of combatants and firearms, including the recording, photo-capturing, and slanting thereof, and (4) duties and responsibilities of MNLF translators and verifiers. The activity culminated with the conduct of a simulation of the whole verification process, as undertaken by the verification squads.

Relative to the success of the simulation undertaken by the JVET, the JBDAF has proposed, as a way forward, to conduct a site inspection of the verification and profiling site agreed upon by the GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee (GMCC), so that the plans and procedures formulated by the JVET for the verification process may further be enhanced and polished, thereby considering material contingencies and possibilities on the ground. As such, the JBDAF Secretariat, with the assistance of the OPAPRU, has been tasked to coordinate with the MNLF relative to the proposed site inspection.

**2. Transformation Program**



Assistance to the Six (6) MNLF members granted with plea bargain agreement relative to the 2013 Zamboanga Siege. In line with the Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) under the leadership of its Founding Chair Nur Misuan request to assist the return to their respective residences six (6) MNLF individuals who were released from the Manila District Jail Annex 5 in Camp Bagong Diwa, Lower Bicutan, Taguig City on 30 March 2022 upon completion of their service relative to their approved plea bargain agreement.

The OPAPRU, International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and Batay Rehabilitation Center, Inc. have successfully provided assistance in their travel from Taguig City to Ninoy Aquino International Airport Terminal 2 for their flight to Zamboanga City on 10 April 2022 and sea travel from Zamboanga City to Lantian, Basilan on the same day.

Assistance to Twenty-Four (24) MNLF members granted with plea bargain agreement relative to the 2013 Zamboanga Siege. The OPAPRU was able to provide assistance to the 24 MNLF members who were released from the Metro Manila District Jail Annex 5 (MMDJ Annex 5) at Camp Bagong Diwa, Lower Bicutan, Taguig City. Upon completion of their service relative to their approved plea bargain agreement. These individuals were incarcerated since 2013 as co-accused of MNLF Founding Chairman Nur Misuan for the cases relative to the 2013 Zamboanga Siege. The MNLF are safely arrive in their respective residence in various areas in Mindanao.

The activity was held in partnership with the ICRC who shouldered the airfare of the 24 PDLs. The ICRC likewise conducted a debriefing activity before the PDLs departed for the airport. This would be the last batch of MNLF PDLs to be assisted of OPAPRU relative to their involvement in the Zamboanga siege in 2013.

Conduct Series of Iftar during the month of Ramadhan to the MNLF Sama Group in Sulu. The OPAPRU through the MCO and other stakeholders renewed their commitment in pushing social healing and reconciliation efforts within the Bangsamoro areas. Before breaking the fast, represented from each of the peace stakeholders delivered message of support for the MNLF community. For the MNLF, Commander Tahir Usman, Deputy Chief of Staff of the Bangsamoro Armed Forces, Vice chairman Faical Jiao of the 1<sup>st</sup> district and chairman Fushethan Hussain of the 2<sup>nd</sup> district were present.

Likewise, Bgen. Pascual representative from the GPH highlighted in his remarks the projects under the MNLF Transformation Program such as programs for economic, security, amnesty, and entry into the Philippine National Police (PNP). He also announced that National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) will have a National Special Qualifying Exam (NSQE) for those who want to become police officers and invited those interested to participate.

In addition, the activity also serves as consultation of the MNLF members on their queries with regards to the implementation of Transformation and Amnesty Program as a result some of the participants showed interest to participate on the program. The said activity was participated by 200 MNLF Combatants.

Women Peace Conversation in Partnership with the BARMIM. The OPAPRU and Bangsamoro Women Commission led by Commissioner for Sulu Nihar Mohammad conducted a conversation with the MNLF women highlighting their role in the MNLF Transformation program. The activity was participated by 50 MNLF Women from the different municipalities of District 1, and a representative from the municipalities of Luuk and Omar in Sulu.

The objective of the activity was achieved which will be useful on the implementation of the 2017-2022 NAPWPS; it aims also to increase the awareness, gather the support and participation of the LGUs, partner stakeholders and grassroots women and girls on the implementation of the NAPWPS. Furthermore, this will help to draw issues of women and girls on the ground that has bearing peace and security that can be used in enhancing and/or formulating programs and policies for them. With this, initial sustainable livelihood activities from respective municipalities was identified.

Conduct Series of Iftar during the month of Ramadhan to the MNLF Sama Group in Maguindanao. The Ramadhan is a spiritual time for Muslims and it symbolizes compassion, reflection and willpower which is also known as a month of giving and sharing. It is in this wisdom that OPAPRU would like to partake in the celebration of Ramadhan through series of peacebuilding activities that will enhance collaboration, healing and empathy in the community and peace partners.

Relative to this, series of activities such as Iftar were conducted to enhance social-healing and foster relationship with the MNLF leadership, its community, and other stakeholders such as AFP, PNP, LCU, and CSOs.

The activity was graced by the GPH and MNLF, present for the GPH are Secretary Carillo Galvez, Usac, Cesar Yano, Usac Dave Diciano, Bgen Buenaventura Pascual, Bgen Antonio Nalarete, Col Joel Mamon and Pcol Jeffrey Fernandez. For the MNLF, Chair Muslimin Sama, MP Halimil Hassan, MP Romeo Sama, MP Baiton Karon, MP Omar Sama, Atalul Montaha Babao and Dabu Fraizal Karon attended the aforementioned activity.

Likewise, BGen. Pascual representative from the GPH highlighted in his remarks the projects under the MNLF Transformation Program such as programs for economic, security, amnesty, and entry to the Philippine National Police (PNP). He also announced that the National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) will have a National Special Qualifying Exam (NSQE) for those who want to become police officers and invited those interested to participate.

On the other hand, Chairman Muslimin Sama highlighted that the efforts of the Secretary and the entire OPAPRU team is beyond imagination. He further stated that the presence of Secretary Carillo Galvez is more than anything and the said visit is will be part of the history between the GPH and the MNLF.

Secretary Galvez provided the brief MNLF updates on the peace process. He highlighted that through the active participation of the MNLF to the Transformation Program and its related activities are set to commence. He also ensured the MNLF that despite the upcoming change of administration, the GPH shall respect all its commitments and continue with its peace advocacies in the Bangsamoro. Moreover, Secretary Galvez gave the assurance that the national government remains steadfast in fulfilling its commitments under all signed peace agreements, and will continue to help uplift the lives of the MNLF.

Consultation meeting with the Philippine National Police- Firearms and Explosives Office (PNP-FEO). The OPAPRU through the MCO facilitated individual consultations with Ideals Inc. and the National Police Commission for the upcoming NAPOLCOM Special Qualifying Eligibility Examination (NSQEE) on 29 May 2022.

Pursuant to the requirements for policing, Ideals Inc. presented their planned activities for the preparation of the examination which involves providing assistance in acquiring legal identity to MNLF members through birth certificates in coordination with PSA. Ideals Inc. seeks assistance from OPAPRU-MCO in connecting their organization to FSA as well as reference materials on the NSQEE.

The NAPOLCOM provided updates on their progress in preparation for the NSQEE. It was conveyed to OPAPRU-MCO that there are still logistical concerns that need to be finalized to conduct the exam.

The OPAPRU was represented by Atty. Henrey C. Benitez and Ms. Patricia Beatriz M. Gener. Ideals Inc. was represented by Executive Director Edgardo B. Ligon, Program Manager Marco Bayadog and M&E Coordinator for Mindanao, Ms. Eunice Faith Zipangan. Lastly, NAPOLCOM was represented by Director Evangeline R. Almirante, NAPOLCOM Staff Service Chief of Planning & Research, Director Randy Babao, NAPOLCOM-BARMIM Regional Director and Director George Daskey, Director for Personnel and Administrative Services.

Leadership Training with the MNLF National Women's Committee. The OPAPRU organized an event with the UN Women on the leadership training with the MNLF National Women's Committee from 16-20 May 2022 at Richmond Hotel, Quezon City.

The project was conceptualized for the MNLF Women to (1) Organize a collective of MNLF Women with shared vision, mission and goals, (2) Build MNLF Women's capacities on leadership and participation as they engage in formal and non-formal spaces in the Bangsamoro, and (3) Support in developing innovative projects, showcasing their leadership in contributing to a just and lasting peace in the Bangsamoro.

**2ND QUARTER**

1. **FY 2023 PAMANA Programming.** The proposed implementation of PAMANA Projects endorsed to prospective implementing partner agencies for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 amounting to PHP 3,931,492,776.90 (e.g., BFAR, DA, DENR, DICT, DILG, NEA, DOH, DOLE, DOT, DPWH, DSWD, MCH, MPW, NCP, NIA and PHIC).

2. **Inter-Agency Collaborations.** The OPAPRU through PAMANA National Program Management Office (NPMO) spearheaded the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Inter-Agency Meeting on 01 April 2022 via video teleconferencing. The activity served as the venue for the OPAPRU and its implementing partners the opportunity to share project implementation updates and discuss "where we are now" in terms of physical and financial progress; determine further actions to be taken or "what still needs to be done" on slow or non-moving projects; and, come up with action plans in aid of fast-tracking project implementation and completion particularly those from prior years as deemed feasible. The meeting was attended by representatives from partner NGAs (e.g., DOLE, DOT, NCP, DA, DA-BFAR, DILG, DENR, DPWH, NEA, MPW-BARMIM, DSWD, DICT and OPAPRU).

3. **Bilateral Meetings with Implementing Agencies.** As part of its mandate as the oversight of PAMANA, the OPAPRU conducted regular monitoring activity with implementing partners at the national and local levels. The PAMANA-NPMO co-organized and/or participated in the virtual Meeting with DSWD-KALAHI CIDDS regarding the exclusion of barangays covered by the National Task Force To End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTE-ELCAC) in the targeting of Kapit-Bisig Laban sa Kahirapan – Comprehensive and Integrated Delivery of Social Services (KC) – National Community Driven Development Additional Financing (NCDDP-AF) Areas.

The said meeting resulted in the following agreements:

- The NEDA must be informed that both parties (KALAHI-CIDSS and OPAPRU) agreed on the non-de-listing of the entire list of NCDDP-AF Areas also listed in the NTE-ELCAC areas due to non-duplication
- Follow-up reply of NEDA on the first letter of KALAHI-CIDSS regarding the 140 barangays that already ensued implementation
- Sharing of NCDDP Additional Financing documents that cite criteria on the exclusion of NTE-ELCAC areas to the target beneficiaries

**4. FY 2017 PAMANA-OPAPRU Projects**

In lieu of the submission of quarterly reports of the GPH Peace Implementing Panel to the Third Party Monitoring Team (TPMT), the former instead met with the latter on 3 March 2022 at the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC) during its 43 <sup>rd</sup> monitoring session and right after when the TPMT released its 7 <sup>th</sup> public report with a press conference at the Discovery Suites Manila in Ortigas Center, Pasig City. The GPH Peace Implementing Panel presented to and discussed with the TPMT the recent updates and developments in the implementation of the CAB, along with pertinent concerns relative to the transition to the next administration.  c. Renewal of the mandate of the Ad Hoc Joint Action Group (AHJAG) until 31 March 2023. The GPH and the MILF Peace Implementing Panels renewed the mandate of the Ad Hoc Joint Action Group (AHJAG) for another year until 31 March 2023. The mandate of the AHJAG is subject to annual renewal.  d. Renewal of the mandate of the Civilian Protection Component (CPC) until 14 December 2023. The GPH and the MILF Peace Implementing Panels renewed the mandate of the Civilian Protection Component (CPC) for two years until 14 December 2023. The mandate of the CPC is subject to renewal every two (2) years.  e. Monthly issuance of safe conduct passes for 12 key MILF leaders. The OPAPRU issues monthly safe conduct passes for key MILF leaders and personalities to ensure their unimpeded involvement in the GPH-MILF peace process mechanisms and in the Bangsamoro Government.  f. Continuing engagement and consultation with various stakeholders to ensure inclusivity and constituency in the implementation of the CAB  i. Purchase of Cabatangan Properties. The TWG on the Purchase of Cabatangan Properties convened twice for this period. It held its fourth meeting on 31 January 2022 via videoconference during which its Terms of Reference (TOR) have been approved. The TWG held its fifth meeting on 15-16 February 2022 in Zamboanga City, which included an ocular visit to the Cabatangan Complex and several dialogues with the Zamboanga City Government, government agencies with offices located at the Cabatangan Complex, and local chief executives from Sulu. The TWG agreed to form a Task Group on the Resurvey of Cabatangan Properties to determine the final price for purchasing by the National Government.  The National Government side of the TWG convened twice for this period, on 31 January 2022 and 21 February 2022 via videoconference. The National Government TWG also consulted with the Bureau of Local Government Finance (BLGF) on 7 February 2022 and the Development Bank of the Philippines (DBP) on 22 March 2022, both via videoconference.  The Task Group on the Resurvey of Cabatangan Properties convened on 8 March 2022 in Zamboanga City. The resurvey began on 14 March 2022 at the Cabatangan Complex and the Task Group is expected to submit its report to the TWG in April 2022.  ii. Entry of MILF and MILF into the PHP. For this period, the National Government TWG on the entry of MILF and MILF into the PHP convened twice, on 15 February 2022 and on 18 March 2022 via videoconference to discuss the finalization of the guidelines to be issued by the National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) and the operational issues raised by the Bangsamoro Government in the implementation of the guidelines. The guidelines is currently pending approval of the NAPOLCOM en banc.	

Prior to the approval of the guidelines, the NAPOLCOM issued Resolution No. 2022-0081, "prescribing a NAPOLCOM Special Qualifying Eligibility (NSQE) Exam as appropriate eligibility for temporary appointment to the rank of patrolman/woman in the PNP for members of the MILF and the MNLF". The NSQE Exam is scheduled to be held on 29 May 2022.

iii. **2<sup>nd</sup> Project Steering Committee (PSC) Meeting of the Peace and Development in the BARMIM (PD BARMIM) Programme under the European Union.** On 9 February 2022, the Project Steering Committee (PSC) of the PD BARMIM convened its 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting via videoconference to deliberate the approval of four proposals from the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), Center for Humanitarian Dialogue (CHD), and the Initiatives for Dialogue through the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF). The project proposals from IDEALS, UNDP and CHD aim to contribute to the development and transformation of the six (6) previously acknowledged MILF camps, while the proposal from UNICEF is geared towards the recovery and rehabilitation of Marawi.

iv. **MPH-IPJ-JNC Joint Training on Introduction to Monitoring and Evaluation for Peacebuilding Practitioners.** The JNC facilitated the conduct of the Mindanao Peacebuilding Institute Foundation, Inc. (MPI) – Nonviolent Peaceforce (NP) – Joint Normalization Committee (MPH-IPJ-JNC) Joint Training on Introduction to Monitoring and Evaluation for Peacebuilding Practitioners, held every Saturday from 22 January 2022 to 26 February 2022 and was participated by representatives of the different Normalization mechanisms both from GPH and MILF. This training approaches monitoring and evaluation from a learning perspective and introduces theories of change, indicators, monitoring, evaluation design, and tools for reflective practice. The training objectives are: to enable participants to practice evaluative thinking, design better projects; monitor and learn from those projects more regularly and effectively; engage with evaluation more thoroughly; and improve practice and accountability to all concerned parties. #### 2ND QUARTER

1. **On the Political Track.** In line with its mandate to support the Government of the Philippines Peace Implementing Panel (GIP) and the peace process between the GPH and the MILF, the OPAPRU through the GIP Secretariat facilitated the conduct of the following during this reporting period:

a. **32<sup>nd</sup> Meeting of the GPH and the MILF Peace Implementing Panels.** The GPH and the MILF Peace Implementing Panels held their 32<sup>nd</sup> meeting on 3 June 2022 at the Rizal Park Hotel in Manila. During the meeting, the Parties agreed on the following:

• The GPH Panel shall communicate to the MILF Panel the proposal of the GPH for the transition of the International Monitoring Team (IMT) for the immediate resolution of the IMT's status;

• The Panels shall continue to discuss the socioeconomic packages for decommissioned combatants;

• The Panels agree to reconstitute the Working Group for Vulnerable Sectors, which was created by the GPH and MILF Peace Negotiating Panels in 2016, and to direct the Working Group to submit its formal report;

• The Study Group shall submit its report on the Small Arms and Light Weapons (SALW) program for other MILF weapons to the Joint Normalization Committee (JNC), and the JNC shall submit its report to the Panels;

• The MILF Panel shall study the GPH Panel proposal on the involvement of the Bangsamoro Government, particularly the Ministry of Public Order and Safety (MPOS) in the disarmament of private armed groups;

• The Panels agree to include humanitarian reasons in the qualifications for the issuance of safe conduct passes to MILF personalities, pending the effectivity of the amnesty process, but the GPH Panel shall decide on a case-by-case basis the qualification for humanitarian reasons;

• The Panels agree to create a technical working group (TWG) for the police force for the Bangsamoro that will make recommendations including the drafting of executive issuances;

• The Panels advise the joint TWG on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation (TJR) to also invite international experts to provide advice on the crafting of the TJR roadmap; that the MILF Panel shall study and come up with inputs and comments to the draft declaration of continuity on or before 6 June 2022; and

• On the invitation of the Third Party Facilitator, the Panels considered to hold a special meeting in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia before the end of the current administration. However, in case of exigencies, the Panels may invite the Third Party Facilitator to hold the meeting in Manila, Philippines.

At the end of the meeting, the Panels issued a joint statement expressing their commitment and responsibilities in the continued implementation of the CAB.

b. **Meetings with the Third Party Monitoring Team (TPMT).** In lieu of the submission of quarterly reports to the Third Party Monitoring Team (TPMT), the GPH Peace Implementing Panel regularly meets with the TPMT in its monitoring sessions to provide updates on the developments in the GPH-MILF peace process. This is to aid the TPMT in its mandate to monitor, assess, and evaluate the implementation of the Framework Agreement on the Bangsamoro (FAB) and its Annexes. For its 44<sup>th</sup> monitoring session, the TPMT met with the GPH Peace Implementing Panel on 13 June 2022 at the PICC in Pasay City.

c. **11th meeting of the IGRB.** The IGRB convened for its 11<sup>th</sup> meeting on 1 June 2022 at the DOF building in Manila. As its last meeting under the Duterte Administration, the IGRB discussed ways forward for the resolution of pending issues which shall be turned over to the next set of members of the IGRB. During this meeting, the IGRB directed the TWG on Cabatangan Properties to continue its discussion and consider the possibility of co-management between the National Government and the Bangsamoro Government over properties of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) within the Cabatangan Complex in Zamboanga City, which shall be purchased by the National Government. The IGRB also requested

the National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) to hold in abeyance Memorandum Circular No. 2022-001 on the guidelines for the entry of MILF and MNLF members into the Philippine National Police (PNP), pending resolution on the reckoning of the five-year application period. The IGRB also directed the National Commission on Muslim Filipinos (NCMF) and the Bangsamoro Pilgrimage Authority (BPA), and the Department of Health (DOH) and the Ministry of Health (MOH) to form TWCS to resolve the issues on *Haji and Umrah* and on DOH-retained hospitals in the BARMIM.

d. **Presentation of the Second Progress Report of the IGRB.** The IGRB successfully presented and turned over to the President its Second Progress Report on 16 June 2022 at the Malacanan Palace in Manila. The Second Progress Report covers the period of 2021 and includes the accomplishments and activities of the IGRB and other IGR mechanisms for this year.

e. **3rd meeting of the Intergovernmental Fiscal Policy Board (IFPB).** Following the 11<sup>th</sup> meeting of the IGRB, the Intergovernmental Fiscal Policy Board (IFPB) held its third meeting on 1 June 2022 at the DOF Building in Manila. During this meeting, the IFPB discusses next steps towards the resolution of pending issues, particularly on taxation, that will be worked on by the next set of members of the IFPB.

g. **Purchase of ARMM properties outside the BARMIM.** The National Government side of the TWG on Cabatangan Properties met with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Regional Office IX on 17 May 2022 via video teleconference to consult and raise clarifications on its report on the resurvey of the ARMM properties within the Cabatangan Complex in Zamboanga City.

The 24 participants of the said workshop were composed of representatives from the different consultations conducted by the YPS. With this number, it is ensured that the five pillars of UNSCR 2250, from which the NAPWPS is anchored, are represented. Parallel to the formulation of the Youth Drafting Group of their inputs on the NAPWPS focusing on the pillars, the Multi-Stakeholders' Working Groups will also be working on their writing task to complete the NAP.

As a way forward, upon consolidation of the inputs and crafting of the initial draft, online sessions will also be conducted to refine the draft and presentation to other stakeholders for further comments.

**Duyog Ramadan 2022 and Solidarity Activities in Lanao del Norte and Lanao del Sur.** The Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity (OPAPRU) through its Social Healing and Peacebuilding Office (SHAPEO) together with Area Management Office – Northern Mindanao (AMO-NM) spearheaded the 5<sup>th</sup> Duyog Ramadan 2022 and solidarity activities in observance of the Ramadan in Marawi City, Lanao del Sur and in Lanao del Norte on 24-29 April 2022.

This year's celebration reinforces the OPAPRU's expanded mandate on peace, reconciliation, and unity alongside with the continuing efforts in mainstreaming healing and reconciliation, promotion of social cohesion, and protection of the vulnerable sectors particularly the internally displaced persons (IDPs) and their families due to Marawi siege in 2017.

Solidarity activities in Matungao Bakwit Village were carried out with the distribution of 120 bags of rice in the morning and which were followed with the women's conversation and community *fitaratchien* in the afternoon on 26 April 2022.

On 27 April 2022, The 500<sup>th</sup> Combat Engineering Battalion (500CEB) provided the hauling support of 200bags of rice to the shelter. The activity was also participated by the TFBM and PLA. Community *fitar* was graced with a variety of Maranao delicacies like the grating *tiapia*, shrimps, chicken recipes and others shared among the community residents. Similarly, the rice distribution for the surging former violent extremist (SFVEs) was conducted on 29 April 2022 with the support of the 103rd Infantry Brigade.

Moving forward, it is worth noting that in the conduct of Duyog Ramadan and other similar intra and inter-faith dialogues, it is important to include local religious sectors to foster a more comprehensive and inclusive conversations. In addition, aside from the peace conversation, a short teaching or similar activity on preventing and countering violent extremism (PCVE) ideals can also be included in the program designed intended for youth and children, also to recognize the importance of faith-based interventions in the PCVE.

**Social Healing and Peace Constituency Building during the 5th Marawi Week of Peace.** The OPAPRU through its Social Healing and Peacebuilding Office (SHAPEO) together with Area Management Office – Northern Mindanao (AMO-NM) partaked in the annual observance of the 5<sup>th</sup> Marawi Week of Peace on 16 – 27 May 2022 in Marawi City. Peacebuilding interventions geared at enhancing social cohesion among IDP communities and hostages survivors affected by the 2017 Marawi siege.

Collaborative engagement with stakeholders and partners played an important contribution to the success of the whole activity series posing as advocacy multipliers cognizant of the limited resources of the OPAPRU in Lanao del Sur. For instance, in terms of human resources, the partners from Save the Children, youth volunteers, Armed Forces of the Philippines, Marawi City Health Office, IDP shelter leaders, CSO partners such as Duyog Ramadan Inc. provided the additional technical support and human resources.

**Conduct of Social Healing activities through Culture of Peace during the Peace Orientation for CTG Former Rebels.** The OPAPRU led by its Localized Peace Engagement Office (LPEO) together with the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Reconciliation and Unity (OAS-RU) and Social Healing and Peacebuilding Office (SHAPEO) conducted a two-part peace orientation towards transformation program for CTG Former Rebels on May 21-23, 2022 in Fort Magasaysay, 70D Nueva Ecija and on June 21-25, 2022 in 91st IB Baker, Aurora. A total of three hundred (300) CTG FRs attended as part of the remaining commitment of the LPEO for 2022 deliverables in the implementation of the Transformation Program for the CTG in Region III.

As part of the expanded mandate of OPAPRU by virtue of Executive Order 158 on mainstreaming healing, reconciliation and unity in sustaining the gains of the comprehensive peace process, the SHAPEO was tasked to deliver the social healing component of the Transformation Program under the localized peace engagement.

The presentation on Culture of Peace (CoP) was contextualized and designed to walk-through the whole process of the Transformation Program (TP) anchored in the proposed comprehensive TP Framework for Former CTG Rebels, their Families and communities developed by the LPEO. In addition, the presentation on COP emphasized the social healing and reconciliation component as enshrined in the expanded mandate of OPAPRU.

**Implementation of the National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security (NAPWPS).** The OPAPRU as Chair of the National Steering Committee on Women, Peace and Security (NSCWPS) through the WPS Division of the Social Healing and Peacebuilding Office (SHAPEO) spearheaded the NSCWPS Technical Working Group (TWG) Second Quarter Meeting on 17 June 2022 via virtual teleconference (Zoom). These quarterly meetings as provided in the NAPWPS 2017-2022, are regularly conducted to maintain and institutionalize reporting and collaboration, and to amplify the implementation of National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security (NAPWPS). Specifically, the meeting aimed to gather commitments for collaboration in the implementation of activities relative to the review, updating and cascading of the NAPWPS; updating and finalization of the draft EO amending Executive Order No. 865 and Joint Memorandum Circular as operational guidelines; and, brief the newly designated NSCWPS TWG members on WPS and YPS.

The regular conduct of the NSCWPS meetings is significant to further strengthen the steering committee as well as to firm up the member agencies' commitments in contributing to the expansion of women's role in the peace process and conflict transformation, as well as in the protection of their rights in conflict situations.

**Capacity Building on Women, Peace and Security for the Regional Gender and Development Committee (RGADC).** In support to the Local Peace Engagements and as part of OPAPRU's support to Sectoral Unification, Capacity Building and Empowerment Cluster of the NTF ELCAC, the Women, Peace and Security Division of SHAPEO and AMO Eastern Mindanao, in partnership with the CARAGA Regional Commission on Human Rights, the Capacity Building on Women, Peace and Security for the Regional Gender and Development Committee (RGADC) was conducted on 26-29 April 2022. The said training aimed to enhance the appreciation and capacity of the Committee member agencies as co-lead in the localization of the National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security in the region. This examined the existing WPS interventions in the region particularly in the areas affected by communist context and enable the tapping of the local agency Gender and Development Budget to support the interventions for women and young women in the region.

The training and data mapping has been a long standing request of the RGADC-XIII through the Area Management Office (AMO) for Eastern Mindanao to encourage more and active participation of the regional member agencies and other relevant peace partners in the crafting of the CARAGA Regional Action Plan on WPS anchored on the implementation of the PCVE, anti-terrorism, localized peace engagement, and humanitarian action as it highly requires local ownership for a more practical and sustainable implementation.

**Review of the Implementation of the BARMIM- Regional Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security and development of the next generation WPS action plans.** With the objective of strengthening the initiatives on building community resilience particularly in protecting, empowering and upholding women and girls' rights before, during and after conflict contexts, OPAPRU, in partnership with the BARMIM-Bangsamoro Women Commission (BWC), United Nations Development Program (UNDP), UN Women and The Asia Foundation (TAF) conducted the workshop on the review of the implementation of the BARMIM- Regional Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security and development of the next generation WPS action plans on 23-27 May 2022 in Davao City.

<p>The activity focused on reviewing the implementation of the localized action plans on WPS to harvest relevant and necessary data and information and document key milestones, good practices, challenges, lessons learned, and mitigating measures of LGUs as well as to identify areas for improvement and calibration of the current plans to adapt to the emerging realities and developments. The output shall also serve as input in the assessment of the National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security Implementation</p> <p><b>OPAPRU's Participation in the Fourth Capital-Level Meeting of the Women, Peace, and Security Focal Points Network (WPS-FPN).</b> With the aim to encourage the development of transformative strategies that can be integrated into National Action Plans, policies, strategies and regional WPS frameworks, representatives from the RPWP-RPA-ABB and CPLA Concerns Office and Policy, Governance, and Strategic Planning Service (PCSPS) participated in the Fourth Capital-Level Meeting of the Women, Peace, and Security Focal Points Network (WPS-FPN) in Geneva, Switzerland on 18-19 May 2022.</p> <p>The WPS Focal Point Network was gathered under the co-chairship theme: "Partnering for Change – Translating the Women, Peace and Security Agenda into Action" which embodies the objective of the Network as a global platform advancing the implementation of the WPS agenda through cooperation and captures the partnership between South Africa and Switzerland.</p> <p>The Meeting focused on two interrelated pillars of the WPS agenda, participation of women in peace processes and the protection of women's rights.</p> <p><b>Gender, Peace and Security Seminar.</b> On June 21, 2022, members of the WFS Division served as Resource Persons during the conduct of the Gender, Peace and Security Seminar to the designated GAD Officers and NCOs of the 8th Infantry (Stormtroopers) Division, Philippine Army. The activity intended to educate the military personnel to safeguard the welfare of women and help soldiers to avoid committing human rights violations and gender-based violence and develop a culture of equity to advance its strides on Gender and Development.</p> <p><b>Gender and Conflict Sensitivity Training (GCST).</b> The SHAPEO through the WFS Division conducted the first batch of Gender and Conflict Sensitivity Training (GCST) for OPAPRU personnel on 20-22 April 2022 to raise awareness and increase the institutional capacity on gender mainstreaming. Pursuant to the Magna Carta of Women and cognizant to the agency's mandate to oversee, manage, coordinate and integrate the relevant components of the peace process, the said training is part of the transformative process of increasing the knowledge and changing behaviors and perspectives of employees towards gender and conflict issues that are affecting inequalities and offer a more positive outlook aligned with the principles of peace, reconciliation and unity. It was participated in by 50 OPAPRU personnel from the Central Office and Field Offices through Zoom meeting platform.</p> <p>The said learning session served as an avenue for OPAPRU personnel to further understand the month-long celebration of Ramadan from its context and foster inter-faith and inter-cultural understanding among the personnel. For Phase 3, a total of 2,450 firearms are expected to be decommissioned by the IDB.
			b. Socio-economic Development Aspect. As part of the normalization process, the GPH and the MILF agreed to intensify development efforts for the rehabilitation, reconstruction, and development of conflict-affected areas. Socio-economic programs will be instituted to address the needs of the MILF-BIAF members, internally displaced persons, and poverty-stricken communities in the Bangsamoro.

**i. Resumption of Phase 3 Decommissioning and Needs Assessment of MILF Combatants.** On 15 February to 01 March 2022, OPAPRU through the Task Force for Decommissioned Combatants and their Communities (TFDCC) in collaboration with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) has disbursed the **One Hundred Ninety-Five Million Pesos** (PHP195,000,000) worth of transitional cash assistance to the 1,950 MILF combatants decommissioned by the Independent Decommissioning Body (IDB). This social protection assistance aims to assist the decommissioned combatants (DCs) in their settling-in and transitioning phase towards productive, civilian lives. During this process, DCs are biometrically identified, profiled, and assessed for their socio-economic needs by social workers, and then given an identification card to allow them to access additional government services. As part of the processes at TFDCC Station 5, the OPAPRU and DSWD development workers also facilitated the encoding of data from profiled DCs. Data on Information Agency (PIA), conducted an outreach program participated by women and the KALIKASAN Warriors (youth group) from the area of responsibility of the 2nd KP/MFC. Jessica Baganan of OPAPRU discussed the concepts and principles of women and youth, peace and security as the core agenda of the Del

**ii. Technical-Vocational Education & Training.** From January to March 2022, the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization (ICCMN) Socio-economic Development Subcluster, chaired by OPAPRU, has trained a total of 1,353 DCs and their next of kin on various technical-vocational courses through the Technical Education Skills Development Authority (TESDA) and its regional counterpart – the Ministry of Basic, Higher, and Technical Education (MBHTE) of the BARMAM. Trained beneficiaries were from the Davao Region: Davao del Norte, Davao de Oro, Davao Oriental, Compostella Valley, SOCCARGEN: North Cotabato, Sarangani, South Cotabato; Northern Mindanao: Lanao del Norte, Zamboanga Peninsula; Zamboanga del Sur; and BARMAM: Cotabato City, Maguindanao, Lanao del Sur, Tawi-Tawi.

**iii. Values Transformation Training.** From February to March 2022, OPAPRU through the Bangsamoro Development Agency (BDA) and Nonviolent Peaceforce (NP) has provided values transformation training to additional 90 decommissioned combatants under Batches 13, 14, and 15 at Midway Minkay Resort, Initao, Misamis Oriental. The program is part of the capacity development program which aims in teaching Islamic Values, as a critical component in the self-development of DCs as they return to civilian life. As of 31 March 2022, some 460 (100%) out of the target 460 maximum coverage under the EU fund completed the VTT. This batch still comprises 3.7% out of 12,145 overall target of decommissioned combatants for Phases 1 and 2.

**iv. Ceremonial Turnover of Social Entrepreneurship Livelihood Projects.** OPAPRU through the TFDCC in partnership with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) conducted the Turnover Ceremony of five (5) remaining Livelihood Projects to MILF Cooperatives in the Zamboanga Peninsula on 24 February 2022 at the Covered Court, Barangay Canacan, Kabasalan, Zamboanga Sibugay. This marked the completion of the delivery of 100% (41) livelihood projects for the MILF cooperatives in DC communities. The project is part of the socio-economic livelihood programs, which the TFDCC aims to provide as social entrepreneurship and sustainable livelihood initiatives for decommissioned combatants and their communities.

**. Ceremonial Turnover of Communal Irrigation System Projects.** The TFDCC Secretariat in partnership with the National Irrigation Authority (NIA) conducted a series of turnover ceremonies of three (3) completed irrigation system projects in Bulig, Lanao del Sur; Datu Hoffer, Maguindanao; and Pikit, North Cotabato on 16 February, 10 March, and 25 March, respectively. Said irrigation facilities aim to support the agricultural productivity of decommissioned combatants and their communities for sustainable livelihood. As of 31 March, 93.7% or 6 out 7 irrigation system projects were completed, while the remaining project in Parang, Maguindanao is still under construction with an estimated physical accomplishment of 55.7%.

**a. Transitional Justice and Reconciliation.** Under the Annex on Normalization, the Transitional Justice and Reconciliation Commission (TJRC) was mandated to undertake a study and to recommend to the Panels appropriate mechanisms to address the legitimate grievances of the Bangsamoro people, correct historical injustices, and address human rights violations and marginalization through land dispossession towards healing and reconciliation in the Bangsamoro.

On 14 February 2022, the GPH-MILF TWG on TJR convened, as a result of the Joint GPH-MILF Study Group session on 20 December 2021, where both Panels agreed that the GPH-MILF TWG-TJR should reconcile their comments, finalize and submit their recommendations on the draft TJR Roadmap to the Panels.

As the mechanism mandated to draft the TJR roadmap and submit it to the Panels for concurrence and approval (per its signed and amended Terms of Reference), on 4 August 2020, the following action points were agreed upon and signed through Resolution No. 01, s. 2022, as follows:

- A working group will be constituted and tasked to draft the policy on the National Transitional Justice and Reconciliation (NTJR) mechanism that is geared toward promoting healing and reconciliation in the Bangsamoro. It shall also review existing bills filed on TJR in Congress and come up with a roadmap for the NTJR establishment.

- The TWG-TJR to engage BARMAM agencies and ministries so they are informed and consulted on their possible contribution to the TJR Roadmap and its implementation. Thus, the MILF TWG-TJR shall take the lead in engaging BARMAM agencies and ministries. The MILF TWG-TJR volunteers shall be mobilized to engage BARMAM agencies/ministries with assistance/support from the GPH TWG-TJR.

- On the other hand, the GPH TWG-TJR shall take the lead in facilitating the interface between the national government agencies and BARMAM ministries to ensure that national, regional, and local efforts on Transitional Justice in the Bangsamoro are harmonized and/or collaboratively implemented at different levels.

- To jointly formulate the TJR Roadmap for submission to the Peace Implementing Panels for approval on or before June 2022, with assistance from TJ champions and subject-matter experts.

As agreed during the Joint Panels Meeting on 11 March 2022 and per the letter of instruction issued on the same date, it was agreed that in lieu of forming a working group, the existing TWG-TJR can invite experts who can help in the review of the bill creating a commission, lobby with and provide technical assistance to members of Congress, and engage with other stakeholders towards strengthening support for the bill. The TWG-TJR was also given clearance to engage agencies and stakeholders on specific recommendations in the TJRC reports that can be implemented and submitted to the national commission once it has been created.

On 24 February 2022, the Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) convened their 4<sup>th</sup> meeting at the Seda Centro Hotel, Cagayan de Oro City. The meeting tackled issues and concerns relative to the security and socio-economic aspect of the Normalization Program such as the redeployment of the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), program on Small Arms and Light Weapons (SALW), disbandment of Private Armed Groups (PAGs), transition plan for the Joint Peace and Security Teams (JPSTs), and Phase 3 decommissioning of MILF forces and weapons. Significantly, the new Terms of Reference (TOR) of the Nonviolent Peaceforce (NP) were also signed during the said meeting, establishing the NP as a CSO partner of not only the International Monitoring Team (IMT) under its Civilian Protection Component (CPC), but also in supporting the JNC and other normalization mechanisms on the ground.

**Meetings of the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization (ICCMN).** The ICCMN convened its 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> meeting on 18 April, 18 May, and 22 June 2022, respectively. During the said meetings, the body was continuously updated on the implementation of the Normalization Program, identified gaps in its implementation, and strategies to move the implementation forward. The meetings also highlighted the role of Bangsamoro government as well as local and international peace partners in the delivery of Normalization Programs.

One of the major outputs of the meeting was the crafting of the ICCMN Transition Report which contains the legacy accomplishments, learnings and insights, and strategies on the ways forward for the next administration.

**5<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Joint Normalization Committee (JNC).** The Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) convened its 5<sup>th</sup> and final meeting under the Duterte Administration on 24 June 2022 at Abo Hotel and Suites, Pasig City to tackle remaining key deliverables under its mandate in the Normalization Program, such as the programs on SALW, parameters for the Redeployment of the Armed Forces of the Philippines, Framework of the Program for MILF Communities Outside of the Six-Acknowledged MILF Camps, clearing of UXOs and landmines, M&E for the Normalization Program, JPSC Annual and Medium Reports, continuing support for the JPSTs, updates on the collection and safekeeping of firearms and ammunitions, and the transition report of the JNC as well as the signing of its Joint Statement on the aforementioned deliverables and to ensure continuity.

The Co-Chairs, members, and Secretariat Head of the JNC from both the GFH and the MILF are present - Mr. Ariel Hernandez, Usac, David Diciano and Usac Danilo Pamonag for the GFH; Minister Ed Guerra, Minister Naguib Sinarubin, Commander Abbas Jerry Abubacar for the MILF; with Secretariat Heads Dir Wendell Orbesa and Minister Ahmad Ibrahim. JPSC Co-Chair MGen Ariel Feliciano, JPSC counterpart, Chief AFP PDO also attending. Partners from the UNDP, Nonviolent Peaceforce Philippines, Fondation Suisse de Deminage and Catholic Relief Services are also present.

a. **Security Aspect.** This covers the decommissioning of MILF forces and weapons, disarmament of private armed groups, program for small arms and light weapons management, redeployment of the AFP, policing, and the clearing of unexploded ordnance and landmines.

**21<sup>st</sup> JPSC Meeting.** The JPSC conducted its 21<sup>st</sup> JPSC meeting on June 23, 2022. The said meeting provided the opportunity to the JPSC members and secretariat to discuss and sensuously agree on/approve the consolidated accomplishment reports within the 1st Semester of CY 2022 of the JPSC Secretariat, assessment on the completion of target programs, preview and plan for upcoming activities of the JPSC, planning for the training integration of the female JPST and GAD topic to the JPST Training module, and preparations for the reporting of the JPSC Co-Chairs to the JNC Co-Chairs for the upcoming JNC Meeting in Manila on 24 June 2022.

**JPST Refresher Course Training.** The JPSC, in partnership with Nonviolent Peaceforce, has facilitated 4 refresher course training in the following stations: JPST Balingoang on 15-17 February; JPST Minal on 22-24 February; JPST Tunawagan on 18 May; and JPST Tipo-Tipo on 21 May. JPST Refresher Course Training aims to reinforce and fortify the technical, administrative and operational know-how of JPST personnel to effectively and efficiently carry out their mandate as interim peacekeeping forces in mutually-agreed areas.

**Activation of Joint Peace and Security Teams.** Additional 3 JPST teams with 90 combined AFP, PNP and BIAF-MILF personnel were officially activated and deployed in 3 different mutually-agreed areas: JPST Mamasapano was activated and deployed on 25 March 2022 concurrent to the turn-over ceremony of their station with UNDP, while JPST Sultan Kudarat and PIM 2 were activated and deployed on 31 March 2022 in a simultaneous program. As of June 2022, a total of 515 JPST personnel are deployed in GFH-MILF Mutually-Agreed Areas.

**JPST Highlight Activities.** The JPST assisted in the peaceful amicable settlement of rido in 4 communities in mutually-agreed areas, provided 56 humanitarian assistance and disaster response, facilitated 90 stakeholder engagements, carried out 1 law enforcement operation assistance, and participated in over 300 other significant activities including tree planting, intergenerational peace dialogue, elections pledge of commitment activities, Sports for Peace Fest, JPST SIMEX Defense Drill with AFP, among others.

**Conduct of various activities of the NTF-DPAGs.** The National Task Force for the Disbandment of Private Armed Groups (NTF-DPAGs) convened its 7<sup>th</sup> meeting on 1 April wherein the different task groups and task forces of the NTF composed of different member-agencies lay down their accomplishments, plans, and ways forward for the next administration. The amended Implementing Rules and Operational Guidelines of the NTF was also signed during the meeting.

The NTF-DPAGs also convened its 8<sup>th</sup> meeting on 10 June in which the Task Force Western Mindanao declared that there are no more active private armed groups in Western Mindanao. The Chairperson, NTF-DPAGs also approved the Joint Operational Guidelines 01-2022, the transition work plan to be carried out for the next administration, as well as the forging of a memorandum of agreement between the different national government agencies to support the provision of rehabilitation and reintegration to the surrendered members of PAGs.

The NTF-DPAGs has rolled out an information and awareness activity in barangays across the provinces of Maguindanao, Koronadal City, Lanao del Sur, and Lanao del Norte. The activity was participated by the members and officials in barangays and municipalities of the said provinces.

b. **Socio-economic Development Aspect.** As part of the normalization process, the GFH and the MILF agreed to intensify development efforts for the rehabilitation, reconstruction, and development of conflict-affected areas. Socio-economic programs will be instituted to address the needs of the MILF-BIAF members, internally displaced persons, and poverty-stricken communities in the Bangsamoro.

**DE-CONFLICT Project Orientation to the JTFCT.** On 08 April 2022, the JTFCT Co-chairs with the Camp-level coordinator from the GFH and MILF attended the meeting/orientation for the baseline assessment organized by the Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue (HD). This is part of the inception and preparation phase of the DE-Conflict Dialogue and Engagement in Communities to Foster Peaceful Camps Transformation. This project is funded by the European Union and aims to address the challenges of camps transformation by using the tools of dialogue and mediation to help foster a peaceful and secure enabling environment for its implementation. Ultimately, the project intends to contribute to the sustainability of the peace process, in general.

The said activity was held to help validate the assumptions of the project and recalibrate the planned activities to fit the needs and context of each camp.

**PSA and OPAPRU-JTFCT Coordination Meeting.** On 06 January 2022, the OPAPRU facilitated request for assistance of the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) to facilitate and accommodate MILF members residing in the six (6) previously acknowledged MILF camps which are considered geographically isolated and disadvantage areas (GIDA) to undergo the Philippine Identification System (PhilSys) Registration.

Further, on 12 April 2022 the PSA and the Joint Task Forces on the Camps Transformation (JTJFCT) conducted a meeting to discuss the processes and requirements for the PhilSys Registration and provide briefing on the Camps Transformation as well as the security protocol in the implementation of programs, projects and activities in the six previously acknowledged MILF camps.

**7th Meeting of Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization Socioeconomic Sub-Cluster Meeting.** On 12 April 2022, the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization Socioeconomic Sub-Cluster convened its 7<sup>th</sup> Meeting via video teleconference to deliberate on multi-year programming of socioeconomic development projects for the decommissioned combatants of the Moro Islamic Liberation Front and for Camps Transformation Program as well as financing of intermissioned combatants and their communities while the JTFCT provided updates on the ongoing implementation of projects for the decommissioned MILF combatants and their communities.

**DA On Site Re-Validation and Consultation of Projects in the six previously acknowledged MILF Camps.** On April 19-21 and 25-27, the Joint Onsite Revalidation between the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity (OPAPRU) - Joint Task Forces on Camps Transformation (JTJFCT) and Department of Agriculture (DA) was held in order to revalidate the sites of the projects under Infrastructure Development Program amounting to P1p 60 million and consult the cooperatives in the six previously acknowledged MILF camps.

During the consultation, the JTFCT Secretariat gave an overview of the projects, its processes and why it took years the implementation as well as introduced the Department of Agriculture (DA) as the implementation partner of this projects. The representative from DA explained the different requirements and also asked the community regarding the status of the land as well as the profile and commodity profile. Further, the Barangay Chairman and the communities extend their gratefulness and lead the team into the different projects sites.

**ICCMN Socioeconomic Sub-Cluster Meeting with BARMM Ministries and Agencies.** On 17 May 2022, the representatives from the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization's (ICCMN) Socioeconomic Subcluster, Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity (OPAPRU) and Bangsamoro Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) ministries and partner-agencies.

The meeting was steered by Mr. Ariel Hernandez, head of the ICCMN Socioeconomic Subcluster. Also present during the activity was Atty. Laisa Alama, chairperson of the GFH TFDOCC and the Co-chairs of the JTFCT Edr Cesar De Mesa and MP Engr. Baintan Ampatuan. The MILF was represented by Hajji Abdullah Pacasem, chairperson of the MILF TFDOCC; Prof. Abhoud Syed Lingga, and MP Ali O. Saik, co-chairs of the MILF JTJFCT.

<p>Further, the meeting was also attended by the heads and representatives from the BARMW's Ministry of Social Services Department, Ministry of Human Settlements and Development, Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Agrarian Reform, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Labor and Employment, Ministry of Trade, Investment and Tourism, Philippine Statistics Authority - BARMW, and the Ministry of Basic, Higher, and Technical Education, Office of the Senior Minister, and Philippine Health Insurance Corporation - PRO BARMW.</p>	<p><b>Field Visit of the PBSP to Camp Rajamuda.</b> On 25 May 2022, the Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP) together with the JTFCT Camp Coordinators and Secretariat conducted a field visit at Barangay Rajah Muda, Pikit, North Cotabato to discuss the possible relocation of the Skills Development Center (SDC) site as a result of the latest technical assessment conducted by our site engineers. This activity is part of the Australian Government-assisted Classroom Construction Support Program (CCSP) that aims to contribute to increasing access to basic education by poor and disadvantaged school-aged children and youth in target project sites in the Philippines. Specifically, the SDC envisions supporting the camp normalization and transformation efforts of the BARMW government.</p> <p><b>PBSP Technical Inspection.</b> On 03 – 06 June 2022, the PBSP together with the JTFCT Camp Coordinators and Secretariat conducted a technical inspection and monitor the ongoing construction of the Skills Development Centers (SDCs) in the seven (7) MILF camps. Specifically, the PHiSys Registration aims to offer a valid proof of identification since it is an important step towards return to normalcy of the lives of the MILF combatants and their communities especially those that have not yet registered for the National ID.
