Significant accomplishments of the GPH MILF Peace Process for the year are as follows but it should be noted that the delivery and completion of these deliverables are jointly agreed upon by the GPH and the MILF: Political Track - Oath taking of the new members of the Bangsamoro Transition Authority (BTA) - NAPOLCOM Special Qualifying Eligibility (NSQE) Examinations - Convening of the National Government - Bangsamoro Government Intergovernmental Relations Body (IGRB) and Philippine Congress - Bangsamoro Parliament Forum (PCBPF) - 5th MasterPEACE Project in Enriching Youth Perspectives on Peace and Human Security Normalization Track - Decommissioning and provision of immediate cash assistance of 5,499 MILF combatants under Phase 3 - Decommissioning of 2,450 MILF firearms and disposal of 2,857 ammunitions - Deployment of additional 2 JPSTs (total : 20 JPSTs deployed) - Reconvening of the ICCMN and NTF-DPAGs - Accelerated efforts for the implementation of Socioeconomic Development Program for the 33 Core Barangays in the 6 MILF Camps and for the decommissioned combatants under Phase 2 and 3 (i.e. TVET, ALS) - PhilSys Registration in MILF Camps through Philippine Statistics Authority - 20 Rido incidents acted upon - UXO clearing with AFP/PAFP EOD - Completion of Transition Report of the GPH-MILF Technical Working Group on Transitional Justice and Reconciliation (TWG-TJR) for the GPH-MILF Peace Implementing Panels (PIPs)

The accomplishment of the MNLF Peace Process relative to the remaining commitments of the 1996 Final Peace Agreement is attributed to the following accomplishment: 1. Strengthening the relationship between the Government and the MNLF groups through established coordinating committee mechanism. The mechanism served as the venue for the Government and MNLF groups to discuss issues surrounding the establishment of the Bangsamoro Development Assistance Fund (BDAF) and Tripartite Implementation Monitoring Committee (TIMC). 2. Fourteen (14) MNLF members, seven each from the group headed by MNLF Founding Chair Nur Misuari and that of Chair Muslimin Sama, were appointed as members of Parliament of the Bangsamoro Transition Authority (BTA), anchored on the principle that the MNLF groups should be represented in the governance of the BARMM to promote healing, reconciliation and unity in the Bangsamoro. 3. Enhancing the processes, system and approaches in the implementation of the MNLF Transformation Program especially on security and socio-economic components to contribute to the crafting of the implementation roadmap for the establishment of BDAF and TIMC. It is expected that the eventually the implementation of Transformation Program shall be assisted by the BDAF and the TIMC. Consequently, based on the approved strategy refresh and roadmaps of the P2, it is projected that the commitments on BDAF and TIMC are also expected to be completed by FY 2025 depending on the support from the National Government and the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC). Further, it should be noted that the remaining commitments on BDAF and TIMC are a tripartite obligation among the Government, MNLF and OIC hence the policy and implementation arrangements shall be agreed by these parties.

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For FY2022, 15% is the annual target for the percentage of completion of GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process. The peace table has accomplished 21.2% during 4Q (see 4th Quarter Narrative Accomplishment Report and After Activity Report), totaling the accomplishment to 77.8% out of 100%.
The annual target for the percentage completion for the GPH - RPM, PIRPA/ABB peace process is divided into 94% for the TFG and 30% for the NDCG. 30.93% of the 25% target for 3Q has been accomplished (see 3rd quarter narrative accomplishment report).

Based on the quarter's accomplishments, we are pegging the percentage of accomplishment of both peace tables on account of significant headway in terms of implementing the key components, initiatives and holistic delivery of commitments for both the CBA-CPLA and RPA-ABB peace tables.

The 400 is composed of women and girls that were reached in Lanao del Sur, Marawi, Pagapo, Bulig, and Maguindanao through the solidarity interventions during the Marawi Liberation as well as providing support to women and girls affected by Typhoon Paeng in alignment with the NAP-WPS Pillar 2 on Protection and Prevention
