Human Resource Management. Apart from the regular process of compensation and benefits, for the second quarter (2nd) quarter of 2022, majority of the HRMS efforts were focused on the requirements for transition, such as Staffing Pattern, review and consolidation of all offices/services/individual Terms of Reference (TORs).

Majority of activities include the review of OPAPRU office/service structure and personnel terms of reference, finalization of job description and staffing pattern in accordance with the proposed ideal organizational structure submitted to Department of Budget Management (DBM). The process contributes to the staff complement for OPAPRU office/services to aid them in their efficient and effective delivery of their FPA's as it also contributes to the effort in rationalizing the staffing pattern of OPAPRU. This effort is in collaboration with FGSFS and concerned offices/service.

Utilization Rate. The results of the Obligation Budget Utilization Rate (OBUR) and Disbursement/Budget Utilization Rate (DBUR) for the first semester of FY 2022 represent **67.42%** and **97.24%**, respectively.

3rd Quarter

- **FY 2023 OPAPRU Proposed Budget.** For FY 2023, the OPAPRU submitted the agency budget proposal to the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) on 05 May 2022, originally amounting to **PHP4,045,977,051**. Below is the summary per expense class under the Personnel Services (PS), Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE), and Capital Outlay (CO) of the agency's proposed budget for Tier 1 expenditures and operations and Tier 2 unfunded programs:

On 25 July 2022, the OPAPRU through the Resource Management Service (RMS) submitted its appeal for its priority unfunded programs. To cover the OPAPRU expanded mandate and critical components, particularly the ongoing decommissioning activities and corresponding socio-economic interventions, on top of the recommended P637.4M budget for FY 2023.

The OPAPRU appealed for an additional budget for unfunded priority programs amounting to P1.650B as follows, for a total of P2.55B for FY 2023.

House of Representatives. On 23 September 2022, HRep passes the PHP 1,891,030,000 proposed budget of OPAPRU for FY 2023. The chamber also voted to support the increase in the proposed budget of OPAPRU of its request for additional untraded programs and projects amounting to PHP 608.4 million.</p> <p>b. Relative to the status of Notice of Cash Allocation (NCA) utilization as of September 30, 2022, the total amount of NCA for the 3rd quarter amounts to Php 216,121,000, and the total amount disbursed Php 213,904,160 which also shows a 99.00% utilization rate, and the unutilized or lapsed amount is Php 216,809.89 reverted to the Bureau of Treasury.

System and Business Process Improvement

- Conducted **Internal Vulnerability Assessment (VA)**. The conduct of the vulnerability assessment is a security measure attributed to the maintenance of the Data and Information Security Protocols within the agency in compliance to the Data Privacy Act of 2012. The particular activity was implemented in two parts, first was last August 4, 2022 which involved a brief orientation with the targeted Privacy Compliance Officers and Units on the general flow of the VA, while the second part was the actual execution of the VA overseen and governed by the FGSPS and the Information Communication and Technology Division (ICTD). The output of the said VA was turned over to the FGSPS which will be translated into a technical report.

Major deliverables relative to Privacy (i.e., policy development and privacy training) were conducted on time. The remaining activities are targeted to be accomplished within the year.

Sorted out Best Practices employed on the accomplishment report from the programs, offices and units covering years from 2016 to 2022 through MS SharePoint.
- Provision of **library services to internal and external clients**. Disseminated 11 issues of The Economist and 5 issues of TIME Magazine to OPAPRU Personnel and provided necessary library services to 593 internal and external library clientele through physical and online platform.
- Digitization of Amnesty Files**. The OPAPRU through KMPIS facilitated the accounting, digitization and organizing of 30,538 amnesty files uploaded to Amnesty Records Management System (ARMS).

Complementing the abovementioned activities is the successful facilitation of the Privacy Manual Cascading last 13 December 2022 to which the PCOs were capacitated to lead the lecture sessions on the salient contents of the approved Manual—a testament of the PDSMS' commitment to foster shared responsibilities in furthering the privacy goals of the Agency. Apart from the PCOs, the Service was likewise fortunate to invite experts from the Cybercrime Investigation and Coordinating Center (CICC) to shed light on the best practices in the implementation of an organizational privacy manual. The cascading event was participated by sixty (60) OPAPRU personnel via Zoom video teleconference (VTC).

The activity also served as a venue to assess the Programs' 1st quarter physical and financial progress relative to commitments based on the PGS roadmaps and scorecards and to provide orientation on newly developed MEAL guide and tools. Other activity outputs included the accomplished MEAL Self-Capacity Assessment Tool and schedule of consultation with Programs on the Evaluation Agenda. The activity informed the mid-year assessment report presented to the MarCom on 11 May 2022. The report contained the progress of all programs in terms of their achievement of physical and financial targets. It assessed the status of achievement of Performance Governance System (PGS) targets, completion rates of PAPS, and obligation rates. It provided recommendations on preparations for the succeeding semester. Operationalization of the OPAPP Results Framework 2019-2022. The 2019-2022 OPAPRU's Results Framework (RF) has been developed per the Results-Based Monitoring, Evaluation, and Reporting (RBMER) policy of the Department of Budget and Management, which was developed to recognize government deficiencies and the urgent need to manage the performance and results of all government operations. The OPAPRU RF harmonizes and articulates the intended results from each level of intervention based on the Performance Governance Systems (PGS) Roadmaps and Scorecards of OPAPRU's core and support programs. To determine the extent to which targets are met at the organizational level, status of indicators along the OPAPRU Results Framework are being reported on a semi-annual basis. As of end of December 2021, the MEAL Service was able to collect and report data for 12 out of 15 indicators in the OPAPP RF MEAL Plan. The OPAPP RF needed to be updated based on the revised PGS Basic Governance Documents. There is also a need to determine and vet with Programs the targets along results so there are benchmarks against which accomplishments will be assessed. Automated Program Dashboard System. The OPAPRU-MEALS continued to monitor the quality of data in the system and flag issues to concerned programs that were found. Overall, the PAPS for 105 out of 256 PGS targets were still yet to be determined; 36 out of 606 updates were not supplemented with means of verification; and there was a gap between data of the Finance Department and programs totaling PHP 34 million. The MEALS continuously facilitates the rectification of these errors with the concerned programs.

As part of the continuing enhancements to the Automated Program Dashboard System, the MEAL Service integrated the user manual on the dashboard instead of using the SharePoint link initially provided to the FOME locals for easier reference. The continuing fund module was also disaggregated into two (2) Regular Continuing and Congress-introduced Continuing for a more accurate financial monitoring and updating. Next steps for the system enhancements include the further disaggregation of Program 4 - RPMP/RPANA/B3.

Development of OPAPP Evaluation Agenda 2022-2025. The OPAPRU MEAL Service continued to collaborate with Programs 1-8 for crafting their Evaluation Plan that will serve as a reference in the development of the OPAPP Evaluation Agenda. Meanwhile, MEAL Service culled out evaluation topics identified during the Workshop on the Harmonization of the OPAPP RF in FY 2021. Evaluation topics, questions, methodology, and timeline were drafted for majority of the programs and these were consolidated in one document. Programs 1-8 were requested to provide inputs to the draft Evaluation Plan for the OPAPRU Results Framework.

Operationalization of the Feedback and Response System (FRS) Guidelines. As part of the continuing improvement of the FRS implementation and ensuring its compliance to the approved PGS Roadmaps and Scorecards, an online assessment was conducted from 6-15 June 2022 with the designated FRS coordinators to determine the status of their implementation of the FRS and address any issues and concerns encountered. The FY 2022 1st Semester Report was shared with the FRS coordinators

1. Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning

Status Report of PGS FY 2022 Strategic Deliverables as of August 2022. The status of Performance Governance System (PGS) strategic deliverables and fund status as of August 2022 based on program reports were reported to the PAPRU and the Management Committee (ManCom) on September 5. The report included a recapitulation of how the dashboard system works. The report informed the body on the status of PGS Strategic Deliverables as of August 31, the status of financial obligation based on units' updates, and proposed ways forward. Recommendations were adopted to address the PGS targets that were identified as not feasible to be achieved within the year and the delayed implementation of programs/ activities/ projects (PAPs) and corresponding funds.

Automated Program Dashboard System Version 2. The approved FY 2022 PGS roadmap and scorecards have separated the targets for the RPA - NDCG group from the RPA - KAPATIRAN. Thus, there was also a need to create a separate module in the Automated Program Dashboard System for reporting. The OPAPRU Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning (MEAL) Service, in coordination with the ROCCO, discussed the proposed additional module for the NDCG targets and was finalized and presented last August 2022. Other features integrated included a summary of the system usage and monitoring of system logs, and auto-generation of program dashboard quarterly reports. Moreover, the Data Management Section is currently integrating additional features such as the OPAPRU Results Framework and integration of GAD Reports.

Support to the development of the Transformation Program (TP) Framework. The MEALS provided technical support to the Localized Peace Engagement Office and TP TWG in the development of the TP Framework. Specifically, MEALS drafted the TP LGU Assessment Checklist to assess the capacities and readiness of LGUs in adopting the TP framework. MEALS also prepared a matrix to compare the interventions under the TP and E-C-LIP. The matrix was utilized in crafting the TP Interventions from Surfacing Phase to Mainstreaming Phase until the Transformation Phase with reference to the TP components of Security, Socioeconomic, Social Healing and Reconciliation, and Confidence-Building Measures. Likewise, MEALS facilitated the discussion on the identification of the milestones per Phase of the Former Rebels, their families, and their communities. A draft Transformation Plan template and guide was also prepared by MEALS to be utilized in the TP Planning sessions with LGUs. MEALS is set to provide assistance in the TP o of DOLE-CAR, Mr. Allen Yadao of TESDA-CAR, Mr. Rex Parades of DPWH-CAR, Atty. Chairin

Support to the development of IP H&R Framework. The MEALS participated in the various activities for the development of the Indigenous Peoples Healing and Reconciliation Framework (IP H&R Framework). It facilitated a session in the Vetting Session of the IP H&R Framework with partner stakeholders on August 9-11, 2022 in Davao City. It led the development of the Results-Based Framework that serves as guide in the crafting different components of the entire IP H&R Framework document. Inputs were also provided to enhance the draft document. Pending the completion of the various parts of the document, MEALS will draft the Monitoring and Evaluation part of the Operationalization Guidelines.

Data Quality Assessment Guidelines. Since its launch last June 2021, the Automated Program Dashboard System became the official repository of data gathered from Area Management Units (AMUs) and implementing partners. It is also being used as the data source for the reporting of physical Program accomplishments and served as database to internally track status of financial accomplishments. In line with the above-mentioned purpose, there is a need to ensure that the datasets encoded and generated in the system are within quality standards. Thus, the MEAL Service shall introduce and spearhead the conduct of the data quality assessment or DQA. A guideline was developed to be used in the succeeding iterations of technical assistance extended to OPAPRU units.

Technical Assistance Provision to Program Departments on MEAL Requirements. Following the 1st Quarter Performance Checkpoint conducted last April, the MEALS conducted a series of consultation sessions with program offices on the development of their Program MEAL Plans, inputs to the OPAPRU RF MEAL Plan and accomplishment of the Agency Performance Data Tables. As of writing period, Programs are still finalizing their respective MEAL Plans and inputs to the tables. The MEALS also consulted the programs on the status of their respective program MEAL system components. Proposed steps to facilitate the set-up and enhancement of said systems were identified as well.

Updating of the MEALS Database Repository. The MEALS coordinated with implementing partner agencies and requested the latest datasets as part of its annual updating of its repository. As of the writing period, the Data Management Section is currently validating received datasets and currently following up on the pending requests. Said datasets will be used as supporting information during OPAPRU's regular programming and budgeting processes and map generation.

PAMANA Information System. As part of the continuing implementation of Transparency and Accountability Mechanisms (TAM) of OPAPRU, the MEALS, in coordination with the ICTS and NPMO developed the PAMANA Information System (PIS). Taking off from the previously unused version, the PIS was redesigned wherein geo-tagged projects are now embedded with ArcMap to help programs visualize the coverage of the PAMANA program, per geographical region through maps. The PIS was presented to the NPMO last August 2022 and comments during the said presentation are now being integrated into the system.

4th Quarter

1. Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning

FY 2022 Strategy Review. The PAPRU Management Committee Members and key technical personnel undertook the FY 2022 Strategy Review last 19 December 2022 to assess the FY 2022 accomplishments and contributions along the Performance Governance System (PGS) scorecard, key implementation strategies, good practices and challenges encountered. Unaccomplished targets at the level of strategic deliverables may have likely affected the non-achievement of some of the scorecard targets. It was identified that there is a need to assess the programming processes in the organization to see how targets are determined and to improve robustness of plans. The report along scorecard accomplishments were limited by the non-submission of preparatory work by the Program Departments. MEALS is currently finalizing the Strategy Review report based on the updated submissions of program offices and guidance from the EveCom and expected to be vetted by January 2023.

2. Implementation of the Normalization Program

A Technical Working Group (TWG) Meeting for the GFH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process Transition Plan was conducted on 28-31 March 2022 in Genu, Isabela province. The activity was participated by the Members of the TWG for the Transition Plan composed of the following: LTC-Jesse James Tugac (SID); MAJ Henry Bual II (AFP PDD); MAJ Fredelin Francisco (PNP PFDC); Ms Virginia Tapat (Chief of Operations, DA-CAR); Thomas Kilip (OPAPRU Consultant); and CBA-CPLA leaders: Engr. Andres Ngado-I, Ronald Balao-as and Michael Karei Sugayroy. The participants particularly Mr. Balao-as reiterated that the attendees to meetings or activities such as this should not be limited. He was insistent that those coming from Abra especially him, usually bring along a group of men. It was suggested to relate the conduct of JEMC activities to experience and learn about the other areas across Cordillera.

Security Component. The turnover of scrap metals from the 339 units of demilitarized turned-in firearms of CBA-CPLA members was conducted on 5 February 2022. The activity was done in reference to the approved request letter dated 26 January 2022 from PBGEN Ronaldo E. Ojay (Chief PNP) pertaining to the request for "authority to dispose the scrap metals from surrendered firearms of CBA-CPLA members." The turnover was approved by the Chief of PNP, through the support and assistance of PNP Peace Process and Development Center, which made this endeavor possible and successful. The PNP-PROCOR provided transport services of these scrap metals to the Baguio City Field Office, OPAPRU will use these scrap metals for the installation of memorabilia in Marabo, Abra and Mt. Data Hotel, Baguio, Mt. Province to be accomplished in May 2022. Likewise, OPAPRU has also turned over three (3) metal cutlery to PROCOR. The turn-over was facilitated by PNP PROCOR representatives: PMAJ Barnard Bone F. Navera and PEMS Eduardo De Information Agency (PIA), conducted an outreach program participated by women and the KALIGASAN Warriors (youth group) to

a. OPAPRU-NCIP Educational Assistance Program for CBA-CPLA and/or their Next of Kin. The OPAPRU-NCIP Special Educational Assistance Program or SEAP is a study grant given to former CBA-CPLA members and their family members or next of kin who have successfully pre-qualified based on verification, submission of documentary requirements, screening and selection process as prescribed in the MOA. It has an approved fund of Four Million and Sixty Thousand Pesos (PHP4,060,000.00) covering SY 2021-2022. c. Accreditation of Peoples's Organization. The interventions for the various peoples' organizations (POs) were mostly consultative of their current operators. Selected POs in Abra and Kalinga will undergo strengthening and capacity building through the partnership with Abra State Institute of Sciences and Technology (ASIST) based in Laganglang, Abra and Kalinga State University (KSU) based in Bukmanao, City of Tabuk, Kalinga. The Memorandum of Agreements for this partnership is scheduled to be signed in the first week of April 2022.

d. **Operationalization of the OPAPRU-DENR Joint Memorandum Circular 2013-02.** Some 70 units of geotagging devices were formally turned over to DENR-CAR on 17 February 2022. These will be used by the Forest Guards for their patrolling activities. Likewise, this is OPAPRU's response to one of the requests from the Banay Gabal Personnel who participated in the series of Focus Group Discussions of the GPHCBA-CPLA Peace Process conducted in May 2021. The geotagging devices were formally received by Engr. Ralph Pablo, Regional Executive Director of DENR-CAR. The distribution allocation as recommended by DENR-CAR Enforcement Division, is as follows: Abra – 13 units; Apayao – 15 units; Benguet – 6 units; Ifugao – 6 units; Kalinga – 15 units; and Mt. Province – 15 units.

e. **Implementation of Sustainable Inclusive Peace And Transformation (SIPAT) Program.** On 11 February 2022, some 59 heads of goals under the SIPAT Program were awarded to the Lamut Riverside Farmer's Association in Lamut, Ifugao. These luminants were delivered last January 26, 2022 in Lamut and were received by the PO Officers. The PO prepared a range for the luminants located in Magulan Proper, Lamut, Ifugao owned by one of its members. The PO members will undergo a skills training focused on the "Seven Points on How to Manage Goat Production". After the training, the goals will be distributed to the active members of the association. It was agreed that the first batch of eligible members will receive two (2) heads each and will follow a minimum of two (2) heads to the association to be availed by the other members. The awarding ceremony was attended by Ms. Charlemagne Mamgo of DA-CAR, Ms. Gwendolyn Bawadad – Lamut Municipal Agriculturist, JEMC Member Mariano Teglag, officers and members of the associate Information Agency (PIA), conducted an outreach program participated by women and the KALIGK.

Implementation of Confidence-Building Component

a. DAYAW Program

. A meeting with TESDA-CAR regarding the implementation of Community-based Skills Training Programs of DAYAW was conducted on 11 January 2022 in TESDA-CAR, Lodiak, Baguio City. Participants of the meeting were TESDA Regional Director Jeffrey Dy, Regional Operations Division Chief Daisy Bungalon and OPAPRU Representatives.

. On 12 February 2022, a coordination meeting with PNP Provincial Police Office-PVAV was conducted in Bangad Tinglayan, Kalinga to discuss the collaboration on women and youth activities. As a result of the meeting, OPAPRU and PNP 2nd Mobile Patrol Force will capacitate the women on VAWC (wherein the resource person will be coming from the PNP); responsible parenthood/stress management by the MSWDO; Women, Peace and Security (OPAPRU); and, IEC on Cordillera Autonomy (NEDA-SFCAR/Community Elder). For the youth, anchored under the DAYAW, OPAPRU will conduct a one-day community-based orientation with the KALIGKASAN (Kalkasan and Kaligkasan) Youth Organization on VAWC (PNP), Drug Abuse (PNP/AFP), Communist Terrorist Group (AFP) including lecture on YPS/Autonomy. The activity will invite youths from Lubuagan, Tinglayan, Pasil and Babalan. The PNP will transport the participants to the venue.

. The OPAPRU office in CAR spearheaded the observance of the Women's Month Celebration on March 4, 2022. It was attended by the farmer's association-beneficiaries in Suroy, Madayyan who participated in the discussions on such topics as Women, Peace and Security, and Project Sustainability including pursuit for Cordillera Autonomy. The participants requested other capacity building interventions from OPAPRU in the future. This was followed by a convergence of services on 9 March 2022 in Barangay Cagaban, Pasil, Kalinga. The activity involved women and youth in the mountain villages through information, education and communication activities and relief distribution that were coordinated and facilitated by the 2nd Kalinga Provincial Mobile Force Company (KPMFC). The Barangay Council of Cagaban, Pasil in Kalinga, in partnership with the Philippine National Police (PNP), Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP), Rural Health Unit of Pasil (RHU), Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), Philippine Information Agency (PIA), conducted an outreach program participated by women and the KALIGKASAN Warriors (youth group) from the area of responsibility of the 2nd KPMFC. Jessica Bangaran of OPAPRU discussed the concepts and principles of women and youth, peace and security as the core agenda of the *Defenders and Advocates of Youth and Women (DAYAW)* while Ms. Chrylotie Malias of PIA talked on women empowerment highlighting the role of women on family upbringing and community development and the role of the youth on environment preservation. SFO3 Mark Buslig of the BFP discussed the topic on the prevention, and PLT Divina Kawi of the 2nd KPMFC presented RA 9262 or the Violence Against Women and their Children Law. Moreover, PLT Anthony Baraan of Pasil Municipal Police Station tackled the Anti-Bastos law, Nijhane Ballit of TESDA discussed their services while Dr. Mara Basawen of RHU Pasil explained the non-communicable diseases and top three common causes of mortality among women, bloodletting and COVID-19 Vaccination. The celebration, also dubbed "BARANGAYanhan" benefited 150 individuals from the feeding program, medical mission and relief distribution (rice and sugar), gift-giving of lambetas, balpoon, IEC materials and calendars in the communities mentioned.

b. Support to Autonomy

. A consultation meeting with NEDA-SFCAR and NCIP-CAR relative to the conduct of Grassroots Level IEC on Autonomy was conducted on March 21, 2022. The meeting was attended by Mr. Ats Dos Ocampo of NEDA-SFCAR, Ms. Crislyn Zarale of NCIP and OPAPRU representatives.

. On 14 February 2022, a consultation meeting with Mr. Henry Gupaal and Sr. Thomas Kilip regarding the IP-led/grassroots level campaign for Autonomy was conducted

4. Implementation of Healing and Reconciliation Component

. Four (4) boxes containing all scrap metals were turned over to the commissioned artists last February 17, 2022. These would be used in developing artworks for the three sites (3) at Mt. Data Hotel, Baako, Mt. Province; Manabo Abra; and brass marker at PMA Longyan Hall.

. On 28 February 2022, a meeting with MLGU Manabo was conducted to discuss the installation of Peace Memorabilia in Manabo, Abra. The municipal representative was informed that the memorabilia site will be at the Manabo Pilot Elementary School (MPES) grounds as recommended by Governor Ronald Balao-as. Ms. Evangeline Diwayan of MPSE assisted the team to the proposed location/visible which is on the MPES open ground where they usually conduct the flag raising ceremony.

. On 23 February 2022, a cleansing ritual for the scrap metals was performed by the elders of Sagada to ward-off bad omen. After the ritual, the metals were formally turned over to the artists. Groundworks of the Mt. Data Peace Memorabilia commenced on 15 March 2022 with KC Shop as the hired contractor.

. A ground working on Belwagan and Bugnay boundary conflict was conducted in Bugnay, Tinglayan and Belwagan, Sadanga last 27 February 2022. The activity was participated by the CBA-CPLA Elders: Ceiso Yagao, Wilson Gawang, Marino Laramain, and OPAPRU representatives.

. On 26 March 2022, the first *longlong* (détourage) of the elderchamakuskasak was undertaken in Bonloc, Mt. Province with the full participation of the four (4) elders from Kalinga and three (3) elders from Mt. Province. DILG Provincial Director Mayer Adong also joined the activity.

The monitoring activity assessed and evaluated the financial aspect (fund utilization, income statement, liquidation, financial records), organizational structure, absorptive capacity of the KAPATIRAN Chapter and the physical status of every LSG Projects. Likewise, to reinforce the existing or operational livelihood projects of the KAPATIRAN and supports the continuous reintegration of the KAPATIRAN Chapters in which the assistance aims to contribute to the resiliency of the members and the organization to external shocks such as but not limited to COVID-19 pandemic and other form of disaster.
- Supported DSWD Region 6, LSWDOs and Pantawid CIMunicipal Links in updating the Social Welfare and Development Indicators (SWDI) of the KAPATIRAN in Region 6. The SWDI assessment measures the level of well-being of the KAPATIRAN and evaluate the level of risk and vulnerability of their families. Also, the information gathered in the assessment will serve as references in the formulation of the Comprehensive and Integrated Intervention Plan for the KAPATIRAN, (April 25 to May 20, 2022)
- The RCCO in coordination with DSWD SLP R06 planned to monitor the operationalization of SLPAs in the CPD Barangays in Region VI. The activity aimed to support the active SLPAs and sustain the gains of the ongoing peace process by gathering the latest status of the operations and the organization and facilitate the local registration and accreditation, (May 23 to June 30, 2022)
- The RCCO Provincial Coordinators attended the DSWD's Planning Workshop and Crafting of the Comprehensive and Integrated Intervention Plan for the KAPATIRAN in Malay, Avilan last June 27-30, 2022. The activity highlighted the implementation of the initial phase of the case management program for the KAPATIRAN and to calibrate the design of the intervention plans to facilitate the social and economic reintegration of the KAPATIRAN.

iii. **Implementation of Social Protection Programs.** On April 6, 2022, the RCCO facilitated the conduct of orientation on COVID-19 and Vaccination Roll Out in Sitio Mambiny, Brgy. Locotan, Kabankalan. As a result, a medical mission was conducted on May 27 in partnership with City Health Office (CHO) Kabankalan, 15B, 54th ECB, PNP Kabankalan, ELGU Locotan and RCCO. Kapaitiran members, NOK, and adjacent community members were able to avail the following medical services: General consultation, COVID-19 Vaccination, Dental, Circumcision, Harcut, and received food packs, used clothes and Vitamins and Medicines.

Facilitated preparation of project proposal to be submitted to the Scholarship Division of the Provincial Government of Negros Occidental. The PLGU allocated budget amounting to 1M for 200 Kapaitiran NOK who are currently enrolled in College and Senior High. A cash assistance amounting to 5,000.00 will be awarded to each NOK per semester.

a. **Partnership with Academia and other Private Institutions.** Series of follow-through meetings with Central Philippine State University and Negros Oriental State University on the needed requirements to facilitate the release of PHP 1,000,000.00 for the operationalization of the M&E System covering the socioeconomic reintegration and CPD Component of the CID.

Facilitated the conduct of Ceremonial Turnover of Checks amounting to 1M to CPSU and NORSU on April 11-12, 2022. Dir. Susana Marcada led the ceremonial turnover with JEMC Co-Chair Veronica Tabara. Also present during the event were University Presidents of respective Academia and their appointed Project Team.

Moreover, the RCCO conducted coordination meetings with CPSU and NORSU project teams on April 18 and 25 respectively to discuss the details of the partnership and its work timeline.

b. **Support to the Implementation of Executive Order No. 70.** Three monthly meetings of the RTE-ELCAC 6 was attended by RCCO Fiscal Person, bringing the agenda on the updates of the Local Peace Engagement (LPE) in the Region. Updates from the National LPE Cluster were also provided during the said meetings. The Office was also represented during the FRRD Legacy activity held at Campo Marín Delgado, Iloilo City where inter-agency efforts were made available to the public thru a service caravan.

E. Completion of the 2011 Memorandum of Agreement with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA – CPLA) (Program 4)

1. **Support the Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC) and Components.**

On June 1, 2022, the GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee CBA-CPLA members were convened at Davidson Hotel in Tabuk, Kalinga. During this activity, the body provided initial inputs on the draft Normalization Program Document. The JEMC was likewise provided with the status of the ongoing Normalization Program projects particularly the Special Education Assistance Program (SEAP), completion and installation of the peace memorabilia at Mount Dala Hotel, documentation of the CBA-CPLA old guards and martyrs, and legacy documentation framework. Via online, the Department of Agriculture-CAR also presented the targeted sixteen barangays as SIPAT FY2022 recipients. On the SIPAT areas, the JEMC has identified and recommended other communities or barangays as recipients. This will be transmitted officially through a letter addressed to DA-RFO-CAR. It was also agreed that a follow up workshop will be conducted to finalize the Normalization Program of the GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process. There interview and participant observation. Last June 21, 2022, the Transition Committee, TWG, and its secretariat, have successfully submitted the report

2. **Implementation of the Normalization Program.** A Planning and Formulation of a Legal Document with the JEMC's designated Study Group was conducted on May 25-28, 2022 in Baguio City to support the implementation of the 5-Year Normalization Program. The study group is composed of lawyers and uniformed officers from various units of AFP (AFP PDO, OJAG, and SID), PNP (PNP PPDC, Legal Service, PROCOR) and OPAPRU (LAD). Present in the workshop were Mr. Thomas Killip (OPAPRU Consultant), representatives from PNP PPDC: EGEN Yamed Yu, RLTCOL Joy Borromeo, PMAJ Freddie Francisco, PMAJ Leslie Jalorina and PMSG Michael Dela Cruz, AFP PDO: COL Egierto Dacosos, Michele Carrizo, and MSG Tito Subang, AFP OJAG: LTCOL Mark Aquino, Anam Aquino, and Remedios Puliano, PROCOR: PMAJ Fred Tuazon, PMAJ Ryan Wakat, PMAJ Anselmo Buenafe, OPAPRU – Legal Services: Atty. Bea Tarrico, Dani Blitaro Molina, and OPAPRU-RCCO: Joey Marcial Ojibido, Jessica Bangunan, Charbitte Matias and Melissa Rivera.

On 16-18 June 2022, another planning and formulation was conducted with the CBA-CPLA IEMC Technical Working Group members on the drafting of a Memorandum of Agreement in preparation for the Transition Plan. The workshop focused on the preparation of additional inputs to the draft roadmap and reference to the objective of crafting a legal document. This was also related to the workshop conducted last May 2021 that formulated the draft roadmap for the 5-YNP of GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process. This activity involved the engagement of Ms. Milagros Rimando as the subject matter expert for workshop facilitation. Present in the workshop were the OPAPRU Consultants: Mr. Thomas Killip, EGEN Bismarck Soliba and EGEN Ramon Yogyog, CBA-CPLA members from Abra, Benguet, Ifugao, Kalinga and Mountain Province, and OPAPRU-RCCO: Director Susana Marcalda, Joey Ojibido, Jessica Bangunan and Melissa Rivera.

• **Security Component.** Strategies and insights related to the writing of the guidelines of the decommissioning program, security arrangement and conflict monitoring protocols including guidelines for the disposition of firearms were being shared continuously by the AFP PDO and PNP PPDC through phone conversations and other social media platforms. The suggestions are included in the draft guidelines.

• **Social and Economic Component**

a. **OPAPRU-NCIP Educational Asistencia Program for CBA-CPLA and/or their Next of Kin.** The OPAPRU in collaboration with NCIP-CAR conducted a series of orientations on the OPAPP-NCIP Special Educational Assistance Program from May 26-27, 2022 in Kalinga and Apayao and June 9-10, 2022 in Mountain Province and Ifugao to discuss elaborately the specific as well as the general requirements that a grantee must possess in order to be considered under the Program and its process flow. Of the 100 grantees, 60 grantees were oriented to the Program. After the orientation program, the student-grantees were given proper time to submit their documentary requirements to the representatives of OPAPRU and NCIP-CAR for the completion of the required documents for the 2nd batch of 100 for SY 2022-2023.

b. **PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program.** On 3 February 2022, RCCD endorsed a total of 847 CPLA PhilHealth beneficiaries for renewal to PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program. Breakdown of submitted beneficiaries are as follows:

c. **Accreditation of Peoples's Organization.** A meeting (blended methodology) with Regional Council on Cacao with DTI-CAR, DTI Apayao, DENR-CAR and DA-CAR was conducted on 2 June 2022 in Luna, Apayao to comment on the CAR Regional Roadmap on Cacao and to discuss plans and interventions for the CBA-CPLA members in Apayao under the 5-Year Normalization Program. The meeting resulted in the following:

- There is an evident need for continuous capacity building for farmer-producers and processors in terms of technical training, record keeping, and other managerial skills.
- DENR-CAR will share the list of POs that will be recipients of cacao seedlings.
- DA-CAR also reiterated to the body that POs can submit proposals for training or request for farm inputs provided they are accredited and registered in the RSSSA.
- All provincial offices of DA or DTI were requested to submit the required details on the cacao production for CAR to include area of coverage, number of farmers, productivity, number of processors, volume of production, etc.

d. **Operationalization of the OPAPRU-DENR Joint Memorandum Circular 2013-02.** The OPAPRU has successfully endorsed one applicant for Bantay Gabat in CENRO Calarasan, Apayao to fill out the vacated slot because the former BG opted to look for other employment.

Coordination and conversations made with the Enforcement Division and Planning and Management Division of DENR-CAR to gather updates and/or discuss plans and activities such as schedule of assessment at the CENRO/FENRO level, completing the needed supplies or materials by the BG Personnel based on the FGD undertaken in July 2021, opportunities for engagement by the CBA-CPLA under the National Greening Program or other DENR-related interventions like provision of lenient instruments to peoples' organizations.

e. **Implementation of Sustainable Inclusive Peace And Transformation (SIPAT) Program.** A ceremonial signing of the memoranda of agreement with Department of Agriculture – Regional Field Office – CAR for the SIPAT Program and two premier educational institutions in Cordillera – the Kalinga State University (KSU) and Abra State Institute of Sciences and Technology (ASIST) for capacity building programs was held on April 8, 2022 in Baguio City. The signing was attended by PAPRU Carillo G. Galvez Jr., DA-CAR Regional Executive Director Dr. Cameron Odisay, KSU President Dr. Eduardo Bagling and ASIST President Dr. Gregorio Turqueza.

The Department of Agriculture-Cordillera Administrative Region (DA-CAR) in collaboration with the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity (OPAPRU) and the Municipal Local Government (MLGU) of Markayan, awarded P900,000.00 worth of livelihood interventions to Central Palasa-an Farmers Association Inc (CPFA) of Suyoc, Markayan, Benguet last 17 June 2022. The livelihood interventions awarded were 520 crates, 30 knapsack sprayers, 20 water tanks, 9 grass cutters, 8 power sprayers, 2 power pumps, and 1 shredder. This is in support of the high-value crop production of the farmer group such as potatoes, cabbages, broccoli, Chinese cabbage, and lemons.

In support of the expansion of SIPAT Program for 2022, the final list of the 16 barangays to be covered was thoroughly discussed and finalized by the CBA-CPLA leaders/members and was transmitted to DA-CAR on June 22, 2022. The Community Orientation Activities were already conducted in the three (3) barangays of Apayao last June 8-10, 2022.

• **Implementation of Confidence-Building Component**

a. **DAYAW Program.** The OPAPRU facilitated the distribution of solar lights in the Province of Kalinga on May 17, 2022. In this province, at least 70 CBA-CPLA member households were served during the distribution of solar lights. This was followed by the same activity in Apayao with 50 recipients distributed on May 11-12, 2022; Ifugao with 50 recipients distributed on May 20, 2021; Mountain Province with 70 recipients distributed on May 25, 2022; and Benguet with 50 recipients distributed on June 9, 2022. The remaining 50 will be distributed on July 8, 2022. The solar lights are intended to light up unenergized CBA-CPLA households in remote areas or communities specifically facilitating the women in their daily chores and/or the students currently enrolled under the modular modality of learning.

<p>b. Support to Autonomy. From April to May 2022, the OPAPRU continuously coordinated with LGU partners to reinforce and sustain the partnership and collaboration with NCIP-CAR and IPMRs in pursuit of the effective and efficient conduct of the IEC on Cordillera Autonomy for the IP groups/communities, to come up with a list of participants for the Speakership Training that will involve the women, youth and elders, and to formulate a convergence plan that will ultimately achieve full support to the causes.</p> <p>As a result, a series of Advocacies on Peace and Regional Autonomy were conducted in Apayao, Benguet, Itogon, Kalinga and Mountain Province from May 18 to June 16, 2022. A total of 234 IPMRs/elders, women leaders, youth leaders, and LGU partners actively participated in the training and have gained adequate knowledge, values and skills that will fully support their role as advocates for Cordillera Autonomy. Provincial and municipal plans of action were crafted and ready for implementation from August to October 2022.</p> <p>In Benguet, the participants representing the three sectors (youth, women, IP leaders/IPMRs) shared their expectations and reflections on Cordillera Autonomy. While most of them have been involved in the consultations over the past years, some are first-timers and are looking forward to fully understand the concepts of Autonomy. As to their assessment of the support level of their respective municipalities to Autonomy, their rate is between 6-30%. They have also shared some appalling concerns about how the campaign on Autonomy is undertaken on the ground. In full support, the group named Benguet Indigenous Peoples (IPs) Advocates for Regional Autonomy in Cordillera came up with a signed resolution requesting President-Elect Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. to certify as urgent legislation in his first State of the Nation Address the bill creating of Autonomous Region of the Cordillera.</p> <p>Implementation of Healing and Reconciliation Component. To formally introduce the Mt. Dana Memorabilia to the public, Director Suzana Casadape, Marcadas and OPAPRU consultants EGen, Ramon Yogyog (Ret.), BCen, Bismarck Soliba, and Thomas Kilip did a walk-through and photo documentation of the installed artwork last 17 June 2022 in Baitko, Mountain Province. The LSG is a program implemented in partnership with DSWD, which is part of the Social and Economic Reintegration component under the Clarificatory implementing Document (CID) to the 2000 GPH-RPM-PRP/PA/ABB Peace Agreement.</p> <p>A Series of consultation meetings with the KAPATIRAN chapters in Negros and Panay were conducted by the OPAPRU-RCCO in partnership with DSWD Regional Office VI & VII to document and referred issues and concerns in the implementation of KAPATIRAN livelihood projects.</p>
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		<p>On 19 September 2022, a technical meeting was conducted with DSWD-OUISP, SLP and PMB relative to the implementation of LSGLRG and Case Management of KAPATIRAN in the 12 chapters. Highlights of the meeting are as follows.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - DSWD SLP Focal provided status report of LSG Liquidation per KAPATIRAN Chapter. For Chapters with pending compliances, deadline of submission is on 30 September 2022. - Conduct of case management in NCR and Bukidnon to be scheduled this September in coordination with OPAPRU and KAPATIRAN NCR Chapter. SWDI Assessment in Regions VI and VII have already been accomplished. DSWD Focal for Protective Services also informed that there will be a scheduled workshop on the trainer's Manual for the Case Management Guide on 4-7 October 2022 of which OPAPRU RCCO was invited. - Furthermore, OPAPRU RCCO conveyed the concern raised by Tarjay Chapter regarding 'no assigned or designated PDO for KAPATIRAN in Negros Oriental' to focus on LSGLRG implementation. SLP Focal to issue a memorandum to support the Tarjay chapter in the absence of a supposed designated focal or PDO. - Relative to the implementation of 2022 PAMANA SLP in CFD Areas, SLPAs previously identified and organized in 2016 with assistance from KAPATIRAN Community Organizers, whether active or inactive, are still being recommended for the 1st cycle of PAMANA-SLP grant under its regular program, subject for validation and assessment. <p>The LGU of Tarjay led by Mayor Jose Otino and Vice Mayor Neil Salma distributed 5 kilos of rice to sixty (60) KAPATIRAN members during the Monitoring activity of DSWD OUISP and SLP Case Management in-charge on 21 September 2022 in Silo Ling-ab, Brgy. San Miguel, Tarjay City where the RCCO assisted. The City Council also committed to support the ongoing peace process of the GFH with the RPM/PRP/AMBB.</p> <p>On 22-23 September 2022, the OPAPRU-RCCO facilitated the conduct of livestock production and management seminar in Kabankalan and Cauayan Chapters in partnership with the Provincial Veterinary Office of Negros Occidental and the concerned Local Government Unit.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Establishment of Settlement Sites. <p>On 12 August 2022, RCCO facilitated a dialogue between KAPATIRAN Negros Oriental Chapter Officers and the 542nd Engineer Construction Battalion (ECB) headed by LTC Roque Dupu relative to the concern raised by KAPATIRAN Chapter Chair, Mansuelo Perlas. The matter is on the proposed construction of cross drainage, as contained in the approved Site Development Plan (SDP), that is said to cause erosion due to non-existent natural stream or river as an outlet. A Site Validation was scheduled on 17 August 2022, together with PENRO Negros Oriental and LGU Tarjay to survey the area where the cross drainage will be constructed. Agreed upon were the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 542nd ECB to revise the SDP considering that the proposed cross drainage canal is situated in an area where there is no natural drainage (fivers, stream) as an outlet. As such, this may have an effect on the outlet of water as this can saturate the area with water and cause instability of soil that might cause erosion or landslide. - As a supporting document to the proposed revision of the SDP, KAPATIRAN Chapter will pass a resolution requesting revision of the SDP. - As per agreement during the meeting, LGU Tarjay thru the City Engineer's Office will recommend the revision of the SDP and endorse the same to 542nd ECB for appropriate action. <p>The OPAPRU-RCCO arranged a meeting with KAPATIRAN Chapter Officers of Cauayan and SONFOFA People's Organization on 15 August 2022 to discuss the needed requirements to be submitted by the eligible community-based service provider as stipulated in the Manual on Community Participation in Government Procurement for the Two (2) proposed projects that were approved under the AECOD fund namely: (1) Construction of Satellite Market amounting to 2M, and, (2) Construction of Rice and Corn Mill amounting to One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Pesos (Php 1,800,000.00).</p> <p>On 7 September 2022, LGU Cauayan represented by Vice Mayor Anna Lisa Solisano formally received the check amounting to Twelve Million pesos (Php 12,000,000.00) from OPAPRU represented by Dir. Susana Marcadia of OPAPRU as the first tranche of funds for the implementation of the 1.6 kms. Farm-to-Market Road (FMR) Project in Silo Bmalay, Brgy. Talardan, Cauayan where the KAPATIRAN Congregaled Site is located. Also present during the ceremonial turnover was Engr. Arnel Tanjussy of the Municipal Planning and Development Office (MPDO), Municipal Treasurer Concepcion Foscado and SB on Environment Hon. Celso Sunogal.</p> <p>On the Iloilo settlement site, coordination was made with NHA Iloilo on the Land Acquisition updates on 22 September 2022 with the following highlights:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - NHA Iloilo presented the TWG Technical Report on the Proposed Land Acquisition of Properties located in January. The report showed that a certain area is considered to be unbuildable because of the 80 degrees, 30-meter-high steep slope. The NHA Memorandum Circular specifies that only an 18-degree inclination is allowed for residential areas. - The southern portion of the area is bounded by a mere or less two-meter creek that shall be debulked from the total land area to be acquired by NHA. - To fast track, the process of acquisition, the NHA Iloilo recommended pushing through with the acquisition of 3.75 hectares, buildable area. The utilized fund shall be returned to the OPAPRU. - OPAPRU shall explore and request from DBM, to have the remaining balance downloaded to LGU or any appropriate agency for the acquisition of the remaining 4 hectares to be utilized as production area of the KAPATIRAN Iloilo. <p>Series of follow through with CENRO Kabankalan on the submission of documentary requirements for the Solid Waste Management Facility and Nursery project in Kabankalan and Cauayan Chapter to be programmed under AECID.</p> <p>c. Implementation of Social Protection Programs.</p> <p>The OPAPRU coordinated with the Public Employment Services Office (PESO) Kabankalan on the submission of documentary requirements of 12 KAPATIRAN NOK in Kabankalan Chapter who are under SPES (Special Program for the Employment of Students) of LGU Kabankalan.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Partnership with Academe and other Private Institutions: On 15 July 2022, the DOST Regional Office VI, together with Ateneo de Manila University (ASU) conducted a number of activities to the KAPATIRAN in Cabaogon POC in Ateneo as follows: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Pinging Pinyon and E-Nuhun seminar on meal planning - Training Food Safety - Orientation and Turnover of STARBOOKS <p>The main beneficiaries of the abovementioned activities were the women and children of the KAPATIRAN and its neighboring communities.</p> <p>Support to the Implementation of Executive Order No. 70</p> <p>The RCCO field staff represented OPAPRU to the conduct of PITF-ELCAC meetings in Ateneo, Antique, Iloilo, Negros Occidental, and Negros Oriental as co-lead for the Localized Peace Engagement Cluster (LPE). For the mainstreaming of the Transformation Program (TP) for the CTGs, their families, and community, pilot areas identified were the provinces of Antique and Negros Oriental.</p> <p>During the first PITF-ELCAC meeting in Antique on 19 July 2022, the TP was briefly presented for the appreciation of the members. Another orientation session shall be scheduled for an in-depth discussion of the program. Similarly, the TP was presented during the Iloilo PITF-ELCAC meeting on 22 September as one of the updates of the LPE cluster implementation.</p> <p>On 28 September, the ECLIP core team (OPAPRU, PHP CIDG, NICA) met and discussed the security and accommodation of CTG surrenderees awaiting their enrollment to ECLIP and receipt of government support.</p> <p>E. Completion of the 2011 Memorandum of Agreement with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CSA - CPLA) (Program 4)</p>
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1. **Implementation of the Normalization Program.** A write-shop on the recitation of the strategic communications plan for the GPH-CBA-CFLA Peace Process was conducted on 9 August 2022 in Bukio, Mountain Province to identify appropriate key messages to help the OPAPRU, JEMC and CBA-CFLA be on the same understanding on the goals and purposes of the Normalization Program. Likewise, the workshop also aimed to enhance the knowledge and skills of the participants in formulating and creating a communications plan. The activity was attended by Baguio Field Office staff namely Joey Marcial Ophindo, Jessica Berganan, Charlotte Malias, Angel Palma, Jr, Melissa L. Rivera, Frank Palgue, and Mazyza Randa and Mary Jane Addagan via video teleconference. It was led by Ms. Betty Listino, as the Subject Matter Expert, from Pansidogan Advocacy Cooperative. The activity resulted into the following:

a. The general communication objectives and key messages per audience were determined. For instance, in the case of CBA-CFLA and JEMC members, the communication objective is to educate the CBA-CFLA as peacebuilders and peace advocates. To counter the CBA-CFLA sentiment, RCCO suggested that the key message shall be *"Alisaw Ji Kagpis: Program nga mangyayay ili nagun-od nga taba para ili narducas nga ili"* translated as "Tokens of Peace: Programs sustaining the gains of peace to promote progressive communities."

b. RCCO also labeled the specific communication objectives which are categorized into Knowledge, Attitude, and Practice (KAP). The communication objective describes the desired change in KAP of the intended audience and is aligned with the objective of the program or project. For example, the KAP for the CBA-CFLA/JEMC is the following: *"Knowledge"* to revisit and articulate the intentions of 1986 Sipat towards the achievement of a meaningful autonomy. *"Attitude"* to be cognizant of the values that bring about just and lasting peace; and *"Practices"* to model the ideals of a peace advocate.

c. The delivery mechanism was also determined. RCCO suggested the appropriate communication activity per audience. For CBA-CFLA/JEMC audience, the activity suggested was to conduct a learning session with peacebuilders to highlight lessons learned from their communities in CAR or in Mindanao.

Security Component. Related to the encoding and documentation of the CFLA Master List, CAPT Roger Agustín of the 503 Brigade conferred with OPAPRU CBA-CFLA Division on 22 August 2022 and clarified what is the better strategy to finish the proposed encoding. It was agreed that since an electronic file has been shared as part of the submission by the CBA-CFLA, it will be used to organize the list while the other arrangement like the process to be implemented by the JAFPC will be integrated later in the file.

Both partners, the AFP Peace and Development Office and PNP Peace Process and Development Office, have continuously communicated to OPAPRU for updates of the peace table including schedule of activities within the quarter as reference of their participation.

Social and Economic Component

a. **OPAPRU/NCIP Educational Asistencia Program for CBA-CFLA and/or their Next of Kin.** The OPAPRU in collaboration with NCIP-CAR conducted a series of orientations on the OPAPP-NCIP Special Educational Assistance Program from May 26-27, 2022 in Kalinga and Apayao and June 9-10, 2022 in Mountain Province and Ifugao to discuss elaborately the specific as well as the general requirements that a grantee must possess in order to be considered under the Program and its process flow. Of the 100 grantees, 60 grantees were oriented on the Program. After the orientation program, the student-grantees were given proper time to submit their documentary requirements to the representatives of OPAPP and NCIP-CAR for the completion of the required documents for the 2nd batch of 100 for SY 2022-2023.

b. **PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program.** On 3 February 2022, RCCO endorsed a total of 847 CFLA PhilHealth beneficiaries for renewal to PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program. Breakdown of submitted beneficiaries are as follows:

c. **Accreditation of People's Organization.** A meeting (blended methodology) with Regional Council on Cacao with DTI-CAR, DTI Apayao, DENR-CAR and DA-CAR was conducted on 02 June 2022 in Lura, Apayao to comment on the CAR Regional Roadmap on Cacao and to discuss plans and interventions for the CBA-CFLA members in Apayao under the 5-Year Normalization Program.

The meeting resulted in the following:

- There is an evident need for continuous capacity building for farmer-producers and processors in terms of technical training, record keeping, and other managerial skills.
- DENR-CAR will share the list of FOCs that will be recipients of cacao seedlings.
- DA-CAR also referred to the body that FOCs can submit proposals for training or request for farm inputs provided they are accredited and registered in the RSSSA.
- All provincial offices of DA or DTI were requested to submit the required data/info on the cacao production for CAR to include area of coverage, number of farmers, productivity, number of processors, volume of production, etc.

d. **Operationalization of the OPAPRU/DENR Joint Memorandum Circular, 2015-02.** The OPAPRU has successfully endorsed one applicant for Bantay Gabat in CENRO Calananan, Apayao to fill out the vacated slot because the former Bantay Gabat opted to look for other employment.

Coordination and conversations made with the Enforcement Division and Planning and Management Division of DENR-CAR to gather updates and/or discuss plans and activities such as schedule of assessment at the CENRO/PIPHRO level, completing the needed supplies or materials by the BG Personnel based on the FGD undertaken in July 2021, opportunities for engagement by the CBA-CFLA under the National Greening Program or other DENR-related interventions like provision of tenural instruments to peoples' organizations.

e. **Implementation of Sustainable Inclusive Peace And Transformation (SIPAT) Program.** A ceremonial signing of the memoranda of agreement with Department of Agriculture – Regional Field Office – CAR for the SIPAT Program and two premier educational institutions in Cordillera – the Kalinga State University (KSU) and Abra State Institute of Sciences and Technology (ASIST) for capacity building programs was held on April 8, 2022 in Baguio City. The signing was attended by PAPRU Carito G. Galvez, Jr., DA-CAR Regional Executive Director Dr. Cameron Odsey, KSU President Dr. Eduardo Bagtang and ASIST President Dr. Gregorio Turqueza.

The Department of Agriculture-Cordillera Administrative Region (DA-CAR) in collaboration with the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity (OPAPRU) and the Municipal Local Government (MLGU) of Markkayon, awarded P950,000.00 worth of livelihood interventions to Central Palasa-an Farmers Association Inc (CPFAI) of Markkayon, Benguet last 17 June 2022. The livelihood interventions awarded were 620 crates, 30 knapsack sprayers, 20 water tanks, 9 grass cutters, 8 power pumps, 2 power pumps, and 1 shredder. This is in support of the high-value crop production of the farmer group such as potatoes, cabbages, broccoli, Chinese cabbage, and lemons.

In support of the expansion of SIPAT Program for 2022, the final list of the 16 barangays to be covered was thoroughly discussed and finalized by the CBA-CFLA leaders/members and was transmitted to DA-CAR on June 22, 2022. The Community Orientation Activities were already conducted in the three (3) barangays of Apayao last June 8-10, 2022.

Implementation of Confidence-Building Component

<p>Anique SCT conducted its 4th Quarter Meeting and Year-end Assessment held at Kinaraya Hotel, San Jose Antique on 9 December 2022. Discussed during the meeting were updates on the implementation of commitments for the Kapaitiran and the Proposed Settlement Site in Quias, Antique. The meeting resulted to the scheduling of meeting between the NHA, LGU Quias and Lapa-an, PENRO, and the Provincial Housing Board.</p> <p>The Kabankalan SCT had its 4th Quarter Meeting on 15 December 2022 to discuss the accomplishments and proposed activities of the SCT for the establishment of the PDC and Kapaitiran. The different member-agencies reported the updates of their project implementation to the Settlement Site. Two (2) regular teacher items were allocated for Lowag Elementary School at the PDC site. There is also a plan to open additional grade levels for the next school year. The Schools Division Office of Kabankalan featured the Kapaitiran Site in the Regional Innovation showdown of DEPED under Teaching-related category with their title entry, "Winning Peace thru Education" and bagged the 1st Runner-Up on its category. DPWH reported that the Rain Water Collector Project for the PDC has been approved and will be implemented this January of 2023.</p>	<p>On 16 December 2022, Cauayan SCT convened and discussed with the Vice Mayor the updates on the status of Kapaitiran Congregated Site in Sitio Binacay, Brgy. Talacdan and Kapaitiran Chapter.</p> <p>Moreover, through the facilitation of the SCT, various activities/programs were conducted and achieved as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Boy Scout of the Philippines (BSP) Tree Planting Activity at the Kapaitiran PDC Site in Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. The program is part of the Social Responsibility (CSR) of URC SONEDCO, in which portion of the PDC site in Sitio Mambinay, Brgy. Locotan (Chectares) will be developed for reforestation. Kapaitiran was represented by Kabankalan Chapter Chair Rudy Trazo. - On 18 December 2022, OPAPRU was given a Certificate of Appreciation by the Felix G Yusay Foundation, Inc. during its 15th Anniversary Celebration in Bacolod City. The certificate is an appreciation for the support and contribution of the office in fulfilling FSYFI mission and vision. <p>2. Implementation of programs for the transformation of combatants, their families, and communities to lead productive and peaceful lives</p> <p>a. Disposition of Arms and Forces. With the assumption of BGen Leo Francisco as the new Regional Director of PNP Regional Office VI (PRO VI), a courtesy meeting was held on 26 October 2022 with the following highlights:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Discussion of updates on the CID, particularly the role of PNP during the decommissioning process of the Kapaitiran. - Provided updates on the LPE and the Transformation Program <p>The meeting resulted to the assurance of commitment by BGen Francisco, that the police force of PRO VI shall give its full support to all programs and activities of the OPAPRU.</p> <p>b. Social and Economic Reintegration of the Kapaitiran Members.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Livelihood and Employment. <p>Various planning sessions between Kapaitiran SEC (Socio-Econ Committee), RCOO, and DSMD was conducted relative to the drafting of proposals for the Livelihood Settlement Grant (LSG) and Livelihood Reinforcement Grant (LRG). Kapaitiran Chapters in Negros and Panay. The OPAPRU-RCCO field offices provided technical assistance to the Kapaitiran in the review process and in accomplishing the liquidation reports for final submission to DSMD.</p> <p>Training on Emergency Food Reserve (EFR) Muli Flour Production was conducted at the Kapaitiran PDC in Ibayay Alian facilitated by DOST Alian on 16-21 October 2022. The training focused on the methods of production, machine operation and maintenance, and marketing. The training activity was participated by JEMC Co-Chair, Veronica Tabara, representatives from ASU, Kapaitiran and OPAPRU-RCCO field staff.</p> <p>On 21 October 2022, the Kapaitiran Negros Oriental received livelihood assistance from DSMD amounting to Pp1,500,000.00, as a reinforcement grant to their existing livelihood projects under the Sustainable Livelihood Program of the Agency. This is in support to the continuous reintegration of Kapaitiran pursuant to the CID. In addition, forty (40) SLPAs within the identified Conflict-Affected and Vulnerable barangays in Negros Oriental also received from DSMD Livelihood assistance amounting to 12,000,000.00 under the PAMANA program. JEMC Co-chair Ms Veronica Tabara of the Kapaitiran and SPH representative Mr. Milo Trazo J gave their responses to the program intervention.</p> <p>In Ibayay, Alian PDC, OPAPRU-RCCO Field Office and DTI, Alian conducted skills training on Homemade Food Processing. Thirteen (13) Kapaitiran members and next of kin (NOK) were able to learn the methods and ways to prepare ham, embutido, lito, longanisa, and tapa. Training kits were provided by DTI as an incentive to the training beneficiaries.</p> <p>Building for Kapaitiran Members was conducted by DSMD Regional Office VI in partnership with OPAPRU-RCCO Field Officers of Alian, Antique, Iloilo, and Negros Occidental from December 9 to 10 (Negros) and 12 to 13 (Panay), 2022. Each Kapaitiran Chapter was represented by their Chapter Leaders along with 10 members of the socio-economic committee. Project proposals and liquidation reports were reviewed during the activity which gave the Kapaitiran the opportunity to clarify on the release of their LRGs.</p> <p>As the second phase of the Women in Transformation (WIT), start-up kits were provided to the training beneficiaries through the funding of AECID on 26-30 December 2022. Cooking tools and ingredients, baking supplies and equipment, and garden tools for backyard organic agriculture production were distributed to 76 women beneficiaries.</p> <p>c. Community Peace Dividends</p> <p>A Technical Planning Session was conducted with the Local Chief Executive and concerned Department Heads of the Municipality of Cuartero, Capiz on 7 October 2022. This is in relation to the implementation of the PAMANA 2020 Water System Project in Brgy. Caralaya, Pulian, Mahud-hudud and San Antonio. Projects in the concerned areas were reportedly not functional, thus the need to reevaluate and monitor for evaluation. A Technical Working Group was created for this purpose.</p> <p>Consequently, a consultation meeting was initiated by OPAPRU-RCCO Field Office with DSMD Regional Office VI and Kapaitiran, relative to the implementation of FY 2022 Sustainable Livelihood Program (SLP) for the identified People's Organization (PO) within the CPD Areas in Panay and Negros areas. The identified POs will receive additional livelihood support amounting to 300,000.00 (2nd cycle) contingent on the result of the assessment facilitated by DSMD.</p> <p>A series of consultations and monitoring were conducted by OPAPRU-RCCO Field Office, in partnership with DSMD, to the identified SLPAs within the CPD barangays in Negros and Panay. Some SLPAs were reportedly inactive, or have existing issues and concerns. Together with DSMD, the team provided technical assistance and conducted an assessment to ensure the readiness of PO to implement the 2nd cycle livelihood project.</p>
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The RCCO Field Office agreed to join the next Peace and Order Meeting to answer queries from the council and the local security sector on the activities involving the NDCG.</p> <p>A virtual meeting was conducted on 25 November 2022, together with the government representatives of the JEMC and discussed the arising issues and concerns involving the NDCG in Iloilo. The Iloilo Provincial Police Office presented a summary of issues and consolidated cases filed to members of the NDCG. BGen Cesar Yano, gave guidance to the security sector to perform their mandated duties to uphold the law and maintain peace and order in the province. Documents on the Peace Agreement were provided as references of the PNP and AFP in apprehending armed personalities. Relative to this, the Iloilo PNP and Battalion Commanders under the 3ID were briefed on the Peace Agreement and the Reengagement with NDCG on 26 December 2022.</p> <p>e. Support to the Implementation of Executive Order No. 70</p> <p>In celebration of the National IP Month on 25 October 2022, the OPAPRU-RCCO Field Office became one of the resource speakers to the 25th IPRA Commemoration, Indigenous People's Month activity in Brgy. Malibog, Cainta, Iloilo. Programs with the IP community included in the CPD areas were presented and the commitment to deliver inter-agency interventions were highlighted during the presentation.</p> <p>As co-lead to the Local Peace Engagement (LPE), PNP Regional Office VI consulted with RCCO Field Office on the conduct of LPE Consultative Meeting in the region on 7 November 2022. The accomplishments and ongoing activities with the FRs and Local Peace Panel was discussed and shall be included in the AYP to be produced by the PNP.</p> <p>The OPAPRU-RCCO provided inputs to the Peace and Security Chapter of the Regional Development Plan for Region VI, during the Planning Committee Consultation Meeting facilitated by NEDA VI on 16 November 2022. Completion of the 2011 Memorandum of Agreement with the Cordillera Bodong Administration - Cordillera People's Liberation Army (CBA – CPLA)</p> <p>The completion strategy for the CBA-CPLA peace process has a two-track approach. The first approach is the implementation of an inclusive normalization process. The overall objective of which is the former CPLA combatants' transformation into active partners for a peaceful and developing Cordillera Region free from CPP-NPA and other threat groups guided by the following principles:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Transform – support the transformation of the CBA-CPLA, building on the gains since the 1988 Sipat. This will cover four (4) levels of transformation: (i) individuals, (ii) CBA-CPLA as a former armed organization; (iii) communities supportive to the peace process; and (iv) their relationship with the Philippine Government and its instrumentalities. –From leaders of war to leaders of development and influential advocates of peace; meaningful participation in decision-making processes in their communities*; - Sustain – sustain the gains of the Cordillera peace process by giving back to communities supportive to the CBA-CPLA; and, - Include – in the spirit of the MI Data Sipat, support inclusive regional growth by prioritizing tribal communities that have lagged behind due to conflict and geographic isolation. <p>The 5-Year Normalization Plan (2020-2024), has the following components: (i) Security Component, (ii) Socio-Economic Reintegration Component, (iii) Transitional Justice Component, and (iv) Confidence Building Component.</p> <p>As of reporting period, the following were accomplished:</p> <p>1. Operationalization of the Joint Evaluation and Monitoring Committee (JEMC).</p> <p>A regular quarterly JEMC Executive Committee meeting ensued last 13 October 2022 via video teleconference, where the mission to transfer the JEMC Chairmanship to OPAPRU was raised and seconded. Further, it was recommended that the succeeding JEMC meetings should be face-to-face. With the approval of transfer of JEMC Chairmanship to OPAPRU, Secretary Galvez appointed retired BGen Ramon C. Yogyog as the new JEMC Chairperson. This was made official through the issuance of Office Order No. 204 series of 2022.</p> <p>On December 22, 2022, the OPAPRU through the FACTO facilitated the 4th Quarter 2022 hybrid meeting held at 455 Hotel participated by representatives from 5ID, AFP PGO, PROCOR, DOLE-CAR, DAF-CAR, DA-CAR, PhilHealth-CAR, DepEd CAR, PIA-CAR, DSWD-CAR, JEMC Chairperson BGen Ramon Yogyog (ret.), OPAPRU Consultant Mr. Thomas Kilip, JEMC-CBA-CPLA members, OPAPRU- PACT Office personnel based in Baguio City, and PNP PDOC (via video teleconference). With concentrations and ongoing implementation of various socioeconomic programs, the JEMC-RLA representatives strengthened their commitment/support the GPH-CBA-CPLA Peace Process as peace partners for the CBA-CPLA identified communities. Subsequently, AFP PGO signified to become a member of the JEMC Secretariat considering that the Chairmanship was transferred to OPAPRU as such the AFP 5th Infantry Division will serve as Co-Chair for the Security Component in lieu of the 503rd Brigade.</p> <p>To support the JEMC, the amount of Four Hundred Sixty-Eight Thousand Two Hundred Nine Pesos (P468,209.00) was successfully transferred to the 5th Infantry Division in November 2022. This is purposely to renovate the Paasal Building designated for JEMC Office within the 5th Infantry Division (5ID), Philippine Army, Camp Melchor F. Dela Cruz, Upi, Garna, Isabela. The presence of said physical office will facilitate coordination, establish smooth communication and JEMC meetings or gatherings, among others as it is more accessible to the CBA-CPLA Leaders in the JEMC. To date, an Issuance of Alignment Advice was requested by the OSIO, PA, 5ID to the Central Management for the Logistics Office to undertake necessary repairs for the said office space as part of AFP protocols.</p> <p>2. Implementation of the Normalization Program.</p> <p>a. Implementation of Socio-Economic Component (Individual Level)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - OPAPP-NCP Educational Assistance Program for CBA-CPLA and/or their Next of Kin. Additional two hundred (200) OPAPP-SEAP grantees for one-time grant/ 1st semester SY2023 were successfully endorsed to the NCP-CAR on 1 December 2022. An official list of qualified and validated SEAP grantees was requested by NCP-CAR to serve as basis in preparation master list for one semester beneficiaries to be forwarded to NCP Central Office which was subsequently approved last 20 December 2022 and forwarded to NCP-CAR on 23 December 2022. 	
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<p>PAMANA-PhilHealth Sponsored Program. In support of the PAMANA-PhilHealth program, OPAPRU continuously monitored a total of eight hundred forty-nine (849) CBA-CFLA members who are currently enrolled in the said Program. Last October 2022, one (1) CBA-CFLA member, Mr. Roberto Gamito, from Kalinga was endorsed as a walk-in member due to discontinued sponsorship under the LGU.</p> <p>5-Year Normalization Program (Referral System adopted and operationalized). On 12 October 2022, OPAPRU endorsed the twenty-five (25) retired CBA-CFLA members who were integrated into the Armed Forces of the Philippines to DSWD-CAR for verification of DSWD Social Curnilla of DSWD-CAR. A dialogue ensued with Dr. Leo Cunilla at Sandigan National Technical-Vocational and Skills Training School on 26 October 2022. As a result, all referrals were tagged as walk-in and will be served under the regular program of DSWD. To date, DSWD-CAR confirmed a total of eight (8) referees, who qualified based on interview and guidelines of Listahanan 3, to be referred to Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps), Sustainable Livelihood Program (SLP), and Assistance to Individuals in Crisis Situation (AICS).</p> <p>One of the CFLA members, was directly referred to DSWD-CAR for medical assistance. Immediate intervention was provided to Mr. Balais through Assistance to Individuals with Crisis Situation (AICS) amounting to Ten Thousand Pesos (P10,000.00). Chaitrino Hanzko M. Abalos, and OPAPRU-PACT Office personnel Jessica C. Bangaran and Angel G. Palma Jr. resulted in a proposal to amend the Joint Memorandum Circular 2013-02 on the provision on salary, by increasing the compensation of the Banlay Gubat (CFLA) members from Eight Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (P8,500.00) to Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (P13,500.00) inclusive of food allowance and travel expenses from the place of origin to the place of assignment. A list of Banlay-Gubat passed the age of sixty-five (65) or due for end of contract was requested by OPAPRU for endorsement to DSWD-CAR Social Pension Program.</p> <p>OPAPRU, through PACTO in partnership with DENR-CAR, spearheaded the conduct of Capacity-Building entitled 'Change Begins from Within' Capacity Building of OPAPP-DERR Banlay Gubat' for the 145 active BGS in Kalinga Province on December 7-8, 2022 with attendees from PENRO, Banlay Gubat from CENRO Pinatuk and CENRO Tabuk, OPAPRU Consultants, JEMV-CFLA members and OPAPRU Bagito City Field Office Personnel. As a result, thereof, the PENRO addressed issues and concern with regard to the marring of Banlay Gubat in the checkpoint area of responsibility, and the provision of cooking wares/ food to the Banlay-Gubat in all checkpoints since they are coming from distant places. Significantly, a letter for salary increase signed by the Banlay-Gubat was requested to the DENR Secretary thru the PAPRU for appropriate action.</p>	<p>b. Implementation of Socio-Economic Component (Community Level)</p> <p>Implementation of Sustainable Inclusive Peace and Transformation (SIPAT) Program.</p> <p>On 12 October 2022, turn-over and acceptance activities of the SIPAT interventions were conducted for Tonglayan, Natonin and Boklawan, Hungduan. The activity was attended by DAR-FOCAR, representative of Cong Maomo Dalog, OPAPRU personnel and LGU officials. Under the 2021 SIPAT Program, One Million Four Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Pesos (P1,425,000.00) worth of livelihood interventions was awarded to Pera Pap-arong Angharthy Farmers Association Incorporated of Tonglayan, Natonin which was composed of knapsack sprayers, grass cutters, free-range chickens with feeds, micro-tilers, HDPE pipes, and training to support the upgrading of heilloom rice and poultry production in the community. Additionally, a soft turn-over event also took place in Boklawan, Hungduan, Itagaos awarding the sets of HDPE pipes, micro-tilers to the Hugrap Farmer's Association amounting to One Million Four Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Pesos (P1,425,000.00) in support of their heilloom rice production project.</p> <p>On 18 October 2022, a SIPAT2021 Joint Ceremonial Turn-over of interventions was conducted at the Kalinga Capitol Building for the five (5) People's Organizations namely (1) Ijifila Farmer's Association Inc., (2) Panyapachachomas Peace and Development Advocate Association of Basao, (3) Mangali Canto Fisheries and Farmers Association, (4) Irimwid Ya Simmakat Womens Cooperative of Bagumbayan, and (5) Cacan Organic Farmers Agricultural Cooperative of Ieb, Tabuk. Representatives officially received their interventions through a Certificate of Award signed by RED Cameron Ocasay and Dr. Susana Guadalupe Marcada.</p> <p>On 15 December 2022, the CBA-CFLA-PACT Office together with Mr. Thomas Killip, OPAPRU consultant, and LGU partners witnessed the awarding of the agricultural machines and tools by DA-CAR personnel to the PARCAPA representatives. This is in support of the Heilloom Rice Production project of the PO under OPAPP-DA SIPAT Program 2021.</p> <p>On-going construction of Betwagan Bridge amounting to Seventy Million Pesos (P170,000,000.00). The OPAPRU through Assistant Secretary Andres S. Aguirreano graced the significant Groundbreaking Ceremony of the Betwagan Bridge at Betwagan, Saldanga, Mountain Province on October 27, 2022 with representatives from PNP, BFP, GOCC-CAR, DSWD-CAR, DPWH-CAR, OPAPRU consultants and OPAPRU PACT Office personnel. As the keynote speaker, he underscored the importance of Betwagan as one of the 232 CBA-CFLA identified communities in sustaining the gains of the peace process and as one of the legacies of one of the finest CBA leaders, the late Mayor Gabino Ganganagan. OPAPRU pledged support to help the community promote rural development in agrarian communities, enhance the productivity and raise the income of women and men farmers and traders, and most importantly to boost the overall welfare of the community.</p>	<p>c. Implementation of Socio-Economic Component (Organization Level)</p> <p>Support to Peoples' Organization.</p> <p>The OPAPRU monitored the status of capability building, product development, and other training programs such as Taro Production and Processing, Cassava Cake Production, and Poultry-raising in partnership with Kalinga State University (KSU) and Abra State Institute of Science and Technology (ASIST), respectively, as part of the Resilient Community Enterprise Program (RCEP) were undertaken.</p> <p>A coordination meeting with KSU RCEP focal Prof. May Josefina Buslig relative to the updates on RCEP transcribed on 09 December 2022 at KSU Main Campus, City of Tabuk, Kalinga. As a result, seven (7) Women's groups from the seven (7) municipalities of Kalinga were supported by the project under OPAPRU-KSU Memorandum of Agreement in support of Taro Production and Processing as part of the skills training for DAYAW-Women. The proposed schedule of training will be conducted in mid-December or early January.</p> <p>An assessment meeting on 13 December 2022 at ASIST was facilitated by Prof. Zarina Orejudo, Prof. Elsa Banggawan, and OPAPRU-PACT Office personnel wherein the partner academe relayed that a total of five (5) municipalities namely Malibcong, Bucloc, Boliney, Dagupan, and Sallapadan are recipients of the project training on poultry-raising, three hundred ninety-eight (398) heads of chicks (broiler) piglets (weanlings), vegetables seeds and training on lacemaking sewing with starter kits. Implementation of Confidence-Building Component</p> <p>DAYAW Program. The honorarium for ten (10) female members' wives of CBA-CFLA who served as dial gatherers was released in order to aid them in their livelihood needs. Also, seven (7) Women's groups from the seven municipalities of Kalinga were supported by the project under OPAPRU-KSU Memorandum of Agreement in support of Taro Production and Processing.</p>
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			<p>Support for Autonomy.</p> <p>Series of Advocacy on Peace and Regional Autonomy was conducted from October to December 2022, in the provinces of Mt. Province and Kalinga. These advocacies were conducted to strengthen the level of awareness and support of the grassroots level to Regional Autonomy.</p> <p>On October 17, 2022, OPAPRU Dir. Susana Guadalupe Macaída, Thomas Kilip, EGen Ramon Yongso (Ret.) and OPAPRU-PACT Office personnel represented the PAPRU in the Cordillera Autonomy Regional Summit and launching of the Signature Campaign for Cordillera Autonomos Region at Kalinga State University. The video message of Secretary Carlito Galvez Jr. as the keynote speaker was played during the event. The Lona District Representative of Kalinga Allen Jessa Mangayang underscored that the best strategy for the Autonomy to move is to let the President Ferdinand R. Marcos, Jr. sign a priority bill and suggested that OPAPRU lead and convene Cordillera leaders to Malacatang and present the signatures.</p> <p>With attendees from the PLGU, OPAPRU Consultants, Communication and Public Affairs Services (CPAS), PACT Office and the Area Management Unit- North Luzon, a Forum on Peace and Development focusing on Cordillera Autonomy was held successfully on October 27, 2022. As a result, fifty-five (55) Punong-Barangays signed the Manifesto of Support for regional autonomy. The said activity was served as an avenue for the local leaders to clarify concerns relative to the on-going autonomy pursuit as well as emphasizing the roles of women, youth, elders, the community, among others to the said advocacy.</p> <p>From November 14 to 18, 2022, a total of ninety-nine (99) men and women CBA-CFLA old guards/pioneers and their next-of-kin, including Barangay Local Government Unit, and the Office of the Municipality Mayor of Sadanga, Mt. Province and City of Tabuk, Kalinga signed the manifesto of support to the establishment of the Cordillera Administrative Region.</p> <p>During the Capacity-Building for the Bantay-Gubat in Kalinga on December 7, 2022, a brief advocacy on Autonomy was included as an integral part of the program. OPAPRU Consultant provided an update of the Autonomy Bill and encouraged everyone to take part in the IEC to show the unity of the leaders and people.</p> <p>e. Implementation of Healing and Reconciliation Component.</p> <p>Two hundred twenty (220) old guards and martyrs are recognized, and one hundred fifty (150) of them are documented and assessed of their needs.</p> <p>The list of the CBA-CFLA martyrs and old guards was thoroughly organized during the field interviews which resulted in the sensible documentation of their life stories by the contracted writer, Infinitum Multimedia Services. These stories will form part in the production of a Legacy Documentation of the CBA-CFLA Journey.</p> <p>A total of one hundred fifty (150) participants from Mt. Province, Kalinga and Abra were assessed using the Needs Assessment Form developed by the team. The tool was able to capture the personal information, family composition/background and varied needs of the interviewee. It also noted the community participation/involvement of the interviewee, and the programs and services availed from OPAPRU and other agencies. The consolidated data will be used as a credible basis in developing appropriate programs/referrals for the old guards.</p> <p>Initial review and validation of the historical accounts of the CBA-CFLA journey was conducted for Mt. Province and Kalinga clusters on November 15-18, 2022.</p> <p>Two hundred twenty (220) gift packages worth Six Thousand Pesos (PHP6,000.00) each were distributed to the CBA-CFLA old guards and next-of-kin of martyrs.</p> <p>A total of two hundred (200) "subalit" packages amounting to Six Thousand Pesos (PHP6,000) per package were distributed to 220 CBA-CFLA old guards/pioneers and next-of-kin of martyrs across the Cordillera Administrative Region. These packages were offered as gifts during the field visit of the team for the documentation project. Each package contains assorted grocery items, vegetable seeds and multivitamins.</p> <p>One (1) Peace Dialogue with Belwagan BLDU, Belwagan, Sadanga. On October 27, 2022, the OPARRU met with the Belwagan officials, elders and women leaders carrying the mandate of the office on peace and reconciliation specifically the important role of OPAPRU on peacebuilding emphasizing their valuable insights on mediating conflicts and restoring relationships among individuals and communities. As a result, the barangay officials handed a copy of the Barangay resolution no. 2105, 2022 - "A Resolution requesting Carlito G. Galvez, Secretary of the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity to intervene on the resolution of the tribal conflict between Belwagan Bibe and the Bubut tribe, particularly Barangay Bignay to restore lucid relationship and attain just and lasting peace". They added that the resolution is a desperate call from the officials as they have exhausted all means to keep their community at peace but never sustained it PB Agpawan emphasized their willingness to forge sipat with the Bubut tribe once the Buguay community will remove their illegally herds (cattle) in Mt. Ebar</p>
			<p>Communicating Peace. The OPAPRU's strategic communications main task is to ensure that the Duterte Administration's Peace and Development Agenda and all the initiatives being carried out by the Agency are well communicated to the general public and key stakeholders.</p> <p>To achieve this, OPAPRU's Communication Team focused its efforts on implementing strategic and tactical communication efforts such as local media engagements, press briefings, and the release of stories. Specifically for the 1st quarter, the following were accomplished:</p> <p>Press Releases Values. The first quarter of 2022 garnered a total of PHP6,170,552.07 worth of PR values. The month of March had the highest number of pick-ups for the said quarter with PHP5,376,169.10, followed by February with PHP1,966,052.97, and the month of January with PHP798,328.99. Of this amount, Mt. F-related stories – which focuses on Program 1's activities, press releases and statements – had the highest value with PHP4,262,392.15 worth of PR value.</p> <p>The Program 1 – GPHMILF peace table also received the highest number of photo releases and news write-ups with 25 out of 48 releases published by the OPAPRU, or 52.1% for the first quarter. This was followed by the OPAPRU with 8 releases, 6 releases MMLF, 5 releases LPE, 3 releases for SHAPED, and one article each published for KAPATIRAN.</p> <p>Media Interviews/Press Briefings. The OPAPRU's Communication and Public Affairs Service (CPAS) provided media and coverage for the major events and/or activities for both OPAPRU and NTF COVID-19. For the NTF, CPAS had assisted the PAPRU in regular press briefings with POCO Asst. J.V. Arceña, Laging Handa, and with private media networks such as GMA News, DZBB, DZRH, RMN News, CNN Philippines, ANC's Politics As Usual with Tina Montzon-Palma, and others.</p> <p>Social Media</p> <p>Total Reach for (Facebook) for the period of 1 January – 31 March 2022 was 242,533. This is the number of people who had any content from the OPAPRU Page or about the Agency Page enter their screen. This includes posts, check-ins, ads, social information from people who interact with the OPAPRU Page and more.</p> <p>Total Engagements (Facebook) for the last 90 days was 41,216. It refers to the number of people who engaged with the Agency page. Engagement includes any click or story created. Live videos, photo releases, social cards and other social media activities contributed to this increase in reach and engagements.</p> <p>Total Impressions (Twitter) for 1 January 1 – 31 March 2022, was 38.4 Thousand. Impressions are the number of times users saw the OPAPRU tweets on Twitter. Aside from the live videos and other media updates on Facebook, CPAS simultaneously provided live updates on Twitter for the activities this period.</p>

Communicating Peace

2022 Peace Month Celebration

The OPAPRU through Communications and Public Affairs Service (CPAS), Policy, Governance and Strategic Planning Services (PGSPS) and the Knowledge Management and Peace Institute Services (KMPIIS) spearheaded the celebration of the National Peace Consciousness Month 2022.

In particular, the CPAS facilitated the crafting of theme and logo designing for Peace Month 2022, promoted peace month through LED screen advertisements in partnership with AFP, PNP, and MMDA. CPAS also produced Peace Month collaterals in line with this year's theme.

The OPAPRU-CPAS also supported major Peace Month activities by being part of its preparation, ensuring media coverage and online presence, and publicity materials are prepared and released on time. Publicity materials produced by CPAS include videos, posters, tarpaulins, photo releases, to mention a few. CPAS also mounted the Milestones of Peace Process which was showcased during the Launch of Gawad Kapiyapaan last September 30 at Philippine International Convention Center in Pasay City.

The OPAPRU-CPAS also prepared the Peace Month 2022 Digital Packet which was disseminated to the Agency's online platforms as well as national and local government agencies, peace partners and stakeholders.

PR VALUES AND MEDIA PICK-UPS. From July 01 to September 30, 2022, the CPAS has recorded 52 press releases, statements, social media posts, other communications materials and events which were picked up by the media. These events translated to 309 media pick-ups, with a combination of online, print, and broadcast pick-ups.

Releases and pick-ups per program. The OPAPRU-CPAS has also categorized the media pick-ups per peace table. This will help the focus from CPAS to strategize their communication plans. For categorization purposes, this report used the program assignment based on the Six-Point Peace and Development Agenda.

From July to September 2022, **Program 1 recorded the highest number of releases with media pick-ups, followed by OPAPRU.** Program 1 recorded 21 releases within this period, while OPAPRU recorded 19.

Program 2 recorded three releases, Program 3 had six, Program 4 had three, Program 5 had two, and Program 6 had one.

The number of releases is parallel to the number of media pick-ups, particularly for Program 1 and the OPAPRU.

Out of 309 releases, 118 (38.19%) are from Program 1, while 114 (36.89%) are from the OPAPRU.

Media Engagements. Based on CPAS' strategic deliverables under the Performance Governance System, the Unit has to engage at least 8% of its media partners for this year. This translates to 41 media personnel this 2022.

As of September 30, 2022, the CPAS has already surpassed this and already reached 23.52% of the target after engaging with 119 news personnel from different news organizations who reported on the government's peace agenda.

From this total number, 65 media personnel have been engaged within the third quarter of 2022 alone. These individuals picked up various news releases from the OPAPRU.

Media Briefings And Interviews. The CPAS is also tasked to conduct media briefings and interviews with various media partners, to further promote the peace, reconciliation and unity agenda of the government. The said activities are also part of CPAS' FGS strategic deliverables.

For the reporting period, the following were accomplished.

Conflict-Sensitive and Peace Promoting (CSPP) Communications Training-Workshop for Government. The OPAPRU-CPAS successfully held two (2) workshops which was attended by 29 information officers from different government agencies such as Presidential Communications Operations Office, Department of Agriculture, Department of Social Welfare and Development, Philippine News Agency, PTA, Department of the Interior and Local Government, National Commission on Indigenous Peoples, Department of Education, Radyo Pilipinas, and Philippine Information Agency.

PR Values and Media Pick-Ups. From October to December 2022, the CPAS has recorded 31 press releases, statements, social media posts, other communications materials and events which were picked up by the media. These events translated to 171 media pick-ups, with a combination of online, print and broadcast pick-ups. The OPAPRU earned a total of Php 100,402,160.25 worth PR Values from August to December 2022 from media pickups based on official releases made by the agency. This means that the agency's releases as events garnered media mileage and placements worth that amount, without having to pay for actual advertising rates to OPAPRU's media partners.

			<p>Media Engagements to Promote the Government's Peace and Development Agenda. As of 31 December 2022, the OPAPRU-CPAS has already surpassed this and reached 31.62% of the target after engaging with 160 news personnel from different news organizations who reported on the government's peace agenda.</p> <p>From this total number, 41 media personnel have been engaged within the fourth quarter of 2022 alone. The following individuals picked up various news releases from the OPAPRU.</p> <p>Media Briefings and Interviews. To further promote the peace, reconciliation and unity agenda of the government, the OPAPRU-CPAS conducted briefings and interviews with various media partners.</p> <p>Aside from the usual media briefings and interviews, the OPAPRU has also conducted various media thanksgiving activities to strengthen the relationship of the agency with its media partners. 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<p>The activity aims to achieve the following: (1) to orient AFP Westmincom on the JEDAF and the Security Component of the MNLF Transformation Program, particularly the verification, profiling, and profiling processes for the MNLF members to be profiled in Sulu under the program; and (2) to consult, clarify, and refine with the Westmincom the administrative, technical, and logistical matters relative to the operationalization of the JEDAF, including the reporting process and requirements, and to inspect the identified spaces for the proposed JEDAF Command Center at the Westmincom.</p> <p>The OPAPRU delegation was headed by GPH Coordinating Committee Member, BGen Buenaventura C Pascual (elb) Alco present from the OPAPRU-MNLF Concerns Office (MCO) are Mr. Reymark K. Radufi (Head of Political Engagement Division of MCO), Ms. Maria Magdalena C. Barrios (Head of Transformation Division of MCO), and Aty. Henry C. Benitez. On the other hand, the AFR-PDO was represented by COL Rummual J Perez and Col Noel E Buncab while the AFP Westmincom was represented by its Chief of Staff, Col Elmer B Sudero. Lastly, the PNP-PPDC was represented by Maj Dao Gene M Bonggawen, represented by COL Rummual J Perez and Col Noel E Buncab while the Westmincom was represented by its Chief of Staff, Col Elmer B Sudero. Lastly, the PNP-PPDC was represented by Maj Dao Gene M Bonggawen.</p> <p>Organizational Training of the Joint Verification Team. The Joint Body on Disposition of Arms and Forces (JBDJAF) under the GPH-MNLF Peace Process conducted a three-day Organizational Training of the Joint Verification Team in order to orient and prepare all involved units/officers for the upcoming verification process for MNLF combatants in Sulu under the MNLF Transformation Program.</p> <p>The said JEDAF Activity was facilitated by the OPAPRU's MNLF Concerns Office (MCO), in cooperation with the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), through its Peace and Development Office (PDO) and 11th Infantry Division (11ID), the Philippine National Police (PNP), through its Peace Process and Development Center (PPDC) and Sulu Provincial Police Office (SPPO), and the MNLF, through its Sulu State Revolutionary Committee.</p> <p>The activity aims to orient and train the following matters on all members of the verification squads, to wit: (1) task organization and process flow of the verification process; (2) duties and responsibilities for the encoders relative to electronic data processing and safe-keeping; (3) duties and responsibilities relative to documentation of combatants and firearms, including the recording, photo-capturing, and stenciling thereof; and (4) duties and responsibilities of MNLF translators and verifiers. The activity culminated with the conduct of a simulation of the whole verification process, as undertaken by the verification squads.</p> <p>Relative to the success of the simulation undertaken by the JNET, the JEDAF has proposed, as a way forward, to conduct a site inspection of the verification and profiling site agreed upon by the GPH-MNLF Coordinating Committee (GMCC), so that the plans and procedures formulated by the JNET for the verification process may further be enhanced and polished, thereby considering material contingencies and possibilities on the ground. As such, the JEDAF Secretariat, with the assistance of the OPAPRU, has been tasked to coordinate with the MNLF relative to the proposed site inspection.</p> <p>2. Transformation Program</p> <p>Assistance to the Six (6) MNLF members granted with plea bargain agreement relative to the 2013 Zamboanga Siege. In line with the Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) under the leadership of its Founding Chair Nur Misuan request to assist the return to their respective residences six (6) MNLF individuals who were released from the Manila District Jail Annex 5 in Camp Bagong Diwa, Lower Bicutan, Taguig City on 30 March 2022, upon completion of their service relative to their approved plea bargain agreement.</p> <p>The OPAPRU, International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and Balsey Rehabilitation Center, Inc. have successfully provided assistance in their travel from Taguig City to Ninoy Aquino International Airport Terminal 2 for their flight to Zamboanga City on 10 April 2022 and sea travel from Zamboanga City to Lantian, Basilan on the same day.</p> <p>Assistance to Twenty-Four (24) MNLF members granted with plea bargain agreement relative to the 2013 Zamboanga Siege. The OPAPRU was able to provide assistance to the 24 MNLF members who were released from the Metro Manila District Jail Annex 5 (MMDJ Annex 5) at Camp Bagong Diwa, Lower Bicutan, Taguig City, Upon Completion of their service relative to their approved plea bargain agreement. These individuals were incarcerated since 2013 as co-accused of MNLF Founding Chairman Nur Misuari for the cases relative to the 2013 Zamboanga Siege. The MNLF are safely arrive in their respective residence in various areas in Mindanao.</p> <p>The activity was held in partnership with the ICRC who shouldered the airfare of the 24 FDLS. The ICRC likewise conducted a debriefing activity before the FDLS departed for the airport. This would be the last batch of MNLF FDLS to be assisted of OPAPRU relative to their involvement in the Zamboanga siege in 2013.</p> <p>Conduct Series of Iftar during the month of Ramadhan to the MNLF Sema Group in Sulu. The OPAPRU through the MCO and other stakeholders renewed their commitment in pushing social healing and reconciliation efforts within the Bangsamoro areas. Before breaking the fast, represented from each of the peace stakeholders delivered message of support for the MNLF community. For the MNLF, Commander Tahir Usman, Deputy Chief of Staff of the Bangsamoro Armed Forces, Vice chairman Faisal Jao of the 1st district and chairman Fushethan Hussain of the 2nd district were present.</p> <p>Likewise, BGen. Pascual representative from the GPH highlighted in his remarks the projects under the MNLF Transformation Program such as programs for economic, security, amnesty, and entry into the Philippine National Police (PNP). He also announced that National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) will have a National Special Qualifying Exam (NSQE) for those who want to become police officers and invited those interested to participate.</p> <p>In addition, the activity also serves as consultation of the MNLF members on their queries with regards to the implementation of Transformation and Amnesty Program as a result some of the participants showed interest to participate on the program. The said activity was participated by 200 MNLF Combatants.</p> <p>Woman Peace Conversation in Partnership with the BARMM. The OPAPRU and Bangsamoro Women Commission led by Commissioner for Sulu Nihar Mohammad conducted a conversation with the MNLF women highlighting their role in the MNLF Transformation program. The activity was participated by 50 MNLF Women from the different municipalities of District 1, and a representative from the municipalities of Luak and Omar in Sulu.</p> <p>The objective of the activity was achieved which will be useful on the implementation of the 2017-2022 MAPWFS. It aims also to increase the awareness, gather the support and participation of the LGUs, partner stakeholders and grassroots women and girls on the implementation of the MAPWFS. Furthermore, this will help to draw issues of women and girls on the ground that has bearing peace and security that can be used in enhancing and/or formulating programs and policies for them. With this, initial sustainable livelihood activities from respective municipalities was identified.</p> <p>Conduct Series of Iftar during the month of Ramadhan to the MNLF Sema Group in Maguindanao. The Ramadhan is a spiritual time for Muslims and it symbolizes compassion, reflection and willpower which is also known as a month of giving and sharing. It is in this wisdom that OPAPRU would like to partake in the celebration of Ramadhan through series of peacebuilding activities that will enhance collaboration, healing and empathy in the community and peace partners.</p> <p>Relative to this, series of activities such as iftar were conducted to enhance social-healing and foster relationship with the MNLF leadership, its community, and other stakeholders such as AFP, PNP, LGU, and CSOs.</p> <p>The activity was graced by the GPH and MNLF, present for the GPH are Secretary Catillo Galvez, Usac Cesar Yano, Usac Dave Diciano, BGen Buenaventura Pascual, BGen Antonio Nalferrete, Col Joel Mamon and Pool Jeffrey Fernandez. Moreover, Secretary Gavez gave the assurance that the national government remains steadfast in fulfilling its commitments under all signed peace agreements, and will continue to help uplift the lives of the MNLF.</p> <p>Consultation meeting with the Philippine National Police- Firearms and Explosives Office (PNP-FEO). The OPAPRU through the MCO facilitated individual consultations with Ideals Inc. and the National Police Commission for the upcoming NAPOLCOM Special Qualifying Eligibility Examination (NSQEE) on 29 May 2022.</p> <p>Pursuant to the requirements for policing, Ideals Inc. presented their planned activities for the preparation of the examination which involves providing assistance in acquiring legal identity to MNLF members through birth certificates in coordination with PSA. Ideals Inc. seeks assistance from OPAPRU/MCO in connecting their organization to PSA as well as reference materials on the NSQEE.</p> <p>The NAPOLCOM provided updates on their progress in preparation for the NSQEE. It was conveyed to OPAPRU/MCO that there are still logistical concerns that need to be finalized to conduct the exam.</p> <p>The OPAPRU was represented by Atty. Herrey C. Benitez and Ms. Patricia Bealtiz M. Gener. Ideals Inc. was represented by Executive Director Edgardo B. Ligon, Program Manager Marco Bayadog and M&E Coordinator for Mindanao, Ms. Eunice Faith Ziplangan. Lastly, NAPOLCOM was represented by Director Evangeline R. Almirante, NAPOLCOM Staff Service Chief of Planning & Research, Director Randy Babao, NAPOLCOM-BARMM Regional Director and Director George Daskey, Director for Personnel and Administrative Services.</p> <p>Leadership Training with the MNLF National Women's Committee. The OPAPRU organized an event with the UN Women on the leadership training with the MNLF National Women's Committee from 16-20 May 2022 at Richmond Hotel, Quezon City.</p> <p>The project was conceptualized for the MNLF Women to (1) Organize a collective of MNLF Women with Shared vision, mission and goals, (2) Build MNLF Women's capacities on leadership and participation as they engage in formal and non-formal spaces in the Bangsamoro, and (3) Support in developing innovative projects, showcasing their leadership in contributing to a just and lasting peace in the Bangsamoro.</p> <p>Below are the key agreements and ways forward from the OPAPRU:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Continuation of Woman Agenda to the next administration (under Confidence-Building Measures) - Initiative in developing the NWC's five (5)-year Strategic Plan is still under OPAPRU's Strategic Plan for the next six years and will be conveyed to the next administration - Training on Capacity Building for leaders and members concerning organizational strengthening. There are also training mentioned that are skills-based which includes the Computer Literacy - Specific programs for the youth under the Youth, Peace and Security, and - Innovation Labs, women will be capacitated on this specifically in the development of project proposals <p>Consultation meeting with the PNP-FEO. The OPAPRU through the MCO a consultation meeting with the PPNP-FEO at PNP Headquarters, Camp Crame, Quezon City.</p> <p>The consultation with the PNP FEO aimed to seek guidance on the transposition of the MNLF Combatant's Firearms within Sulu Province to Camp Yusop Jikin in Pasil, Indanan Sulu. OPAPRU/MCO sought the guidance of FEO on the proper steps in requesting a permit to transfer firearms during the COMELEC Election ban.</p> <p>The OPAPRU was represented by Ms. Magdalena Barrios, Atty. Herrey Benitez and Ms. Patricia Gener. With them were personnel from the AFPDDO, represented by Col. Noel Buncab and Mr. Kin Montako and personnel from the PNP, represented by PMaj. Deo Gene Bonggawen.</p> <p>Meeting and site survey with the MNLF Sama-Jikin group in Sulu. The OPAPRU through the MCO, headed by Dir. Jana Gallardo and Ms. Maggs Barrios conducted a meeting and site survey with the MNLF Sama-Jikin group in Sulu for the verification and profiling of MNLF Combatants.</p> <p>The meeting was conducted to brief the MNLF on the verification and profiling activities prepared together with the JBDAF and Joint Verification Team on 27-29 May 2022. Further, it aims to address issues and concerns of the GPH and MNLF on the verification and profiling processes as well as the finalization of the arrangements for the conduct of site survey.</p> <p>Finalization of Profiling Process. The OPAPRU conducted a coordination and consultation meeting with the peace partner agencies on 17-20 June 2022 in Sulu. The activity aims to discuss with the partner agencies the preparatory activities for the actual conduct of combined verification and profiling of the 100 MNLF Combatants.</p>	<p>3rd Quarter</p> <p>The Government is currently engaging the two factions of the MNLF, namely, the group under the leadership of Founding Chairman Nur Misran and another headed by Yusop Jikin to complete the remaining commitments of the 1996 Final Peace Agreement (FPA). The two (2) remaining commitments resulting from the Tripartite Review Process (TRP) of the 1996 FPA are geared towards uplifting the socio-economic and security conditions of the MNLF combatants, their families, and communities, especially for members who were not integrated into the AFP and PNP by virtue of the 1996 FPA.</p> <p>Through the Joint Coordinating Committees that were established in 2019, a transformation program for the MNLF combatants, their families, and communities will be implemented beginning with the profiling of MNLF combatants in Sulu this year. The OPAPRU attended and participated in the inauguration and blessing of the Command Center (ComCen) of the Joint Body on the Disposition of Arms and Forces (JBDAF) at the Headquarters of the Western Mindanao Command (Westmincom), Barangay Upper Calaitan, Zamboanga City. The activity essentially aimed to formally commence the operation of the JBDAF ComCen in order to fulfill the JBDAF's mandate to implement the security arrangements under the MNLF Transformation Program.</p> <p>The said activity was attended by the esteemed officers and representatives of the GPH Coordinating Committee, Westmincom, and JBDAF, to wit: BGen Buenaventura C Pascual (rel), Chair of the GPH Community Healing and Reconciliation Sub-Committee; BGen Antonio G Narrales, Deputy Commander of Westmincom; Col Rummuel J Pirez of the AFP Peace and Development Office (PDO) on behalf of BGen Marvin L Loudine, Co-Chair of the JBDAF; and PCOL Clarence C Casilio, Co-Chair of the JBDAF and Chief of the PNP Peace Process and Development Center (PPDC). 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	<p>Joint GPH-MNLF Review, Enhancement, and Planning Workshop of the verification and profiling processes. The OPAPRU conducted the joint meeting of the GPH Coordinating Committee and Joint Body on the Disposition of Arms and Forces (JEDAF) in order to strategize and discuss the enhancement and implementation of the MNLF Transformation Program, including the verification and profiling processes thereof. The said meeting was attended by BGen (Ret) Cesar B. Yano and BGen (Ret) Buenaventura C. Pascual of the GPH Coordinating Committee and representatives from the Joint Body on Disposition of Arms and Forces (JEDAF) from the AFP Peace and Development Office and PNP Peace Process and Development Center. Representatives from OPAPRU presented the Updates and Developments on the GPH-MNLF Peace Process, including the MNLF Transformation Program and the Amnesty Program for MNLF members. This activity aims for the participants and stakeholders to formulate a roadmap that will: (1) further protect the gains and secure the foundation of lasting peace in Basilan; (2) provide the Province of Basilan with strategic focus for economic development and social services that will bring collective prosperity and pride to all Basilanenses; and (3) facilitate a lasting legacy and model for Good Governance, Peace, and Security.</p> <p>The participants discussed and proposed various and specific action points concerning the following matters that would contribute the roadmap, to wit: (a) institutionalization of multistakeholder, barangay, municipal mechanisms for risk self-identification with corresponding provincial and regional support; (b) municipal-led land survey and tenurial security program with provincial and regional support in order to address land disputes, marginalization, and dispossession; (c) Continuation and enhancement of Balik-Loob Support programs, including Enhanced Comprehensive Localized Integration Program (E-CLIP) for former members of Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG) and other local terrorist groups; and (d) Continuation and enhancement of community-based Small Arms and Light Weapons management program.</p> <p>Information Education & Communication Dissemination Activity on the MNLF Transformation Program. Presidential Peace Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity Secretary Carlito G. Galvez, Jr. flew to this island province last 19 September 2022 to lead the information and education campaign on the Transformation Program for Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) members, their families and communities in Camp Yusuf Jhin, Brig. Pasi and Camp Acharab, Brig. Kagay Indanan, Sulul.</p> <p>The IEC campaign series is part of the efforts of the Government of the Philippines (GPH), through the Office of the Presidential Adviser for Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity (OPAPRU), to ensure the implementation of the GPH's remaining commitments under the 1996 Final Peace Agreement (FPA) with the MNLF. This aims to disseminate information on the MNLF Transformation Program to the combatants and their families.</p> <p>The MNLF Transformation Program aims to facilitate the transition of the MNLF members, especially those who were not integrated into the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) and the Philippine National Police (PNP) under the FPA, as well as their families into peaceful and productive civilians.</p> <p>Pegluksal Sangsah 2022: Service Caravan. The OPAPRU together with BARMM initiatives and MNLF Groups, conducted service caravan on 20 September 2022 in Camp Ikin, Barangay Pasi, Indanan, Sulul, which benefited at least 500 MNLF beneficiaries and on 22 September 2022 in Kagay Elementary School, Barangay Kagay, Indanan, Sulul, which benefited at least 600 MNLF beneficiaries.</p> <p>Key services included the provision of the following: (1) COVID-19 vaccination; (2) vitamins and deworming tablets; (3) insecticide-treated mosquito nets; (4) wheelchairs for PMDs and senior citizens; (5) assorted seedlings and fertilizer; (6) National ID System (PhiSys) registration; (7) 10-kg rice for vaccinated beneficiaries; (8) orientation on Rural Workers Association; (9) orientation on livelihood and entrepreneurial literacy; (10) free legal assistance and consultation; (11) orientation on Basic Human Rights and Transitional Justice; and (12) orientation on women's rights and anti-violence against women and their children.</p> <p>Sports Peace 2022: Sports Peace 2022: Pagpahugut sa Pursugpatan para sa Kasaligtraan (Strengthening Partnership Towards Peace). The OPAPRU, together with the 11th Infantry Division conducted Sports Peace 2022 with the following activity: (1) Basketball; (2) Volo; (3) Jits for Kids and 4P-Palarang Pang-bata; the activity aims to strengthen the harmonious relationships between the Government security and law enforcement agencies and the MNLF through various team and individual sports. The activity foster a culture sensitive, peace-loving community, and an opportunity to engage with each other on mutual grounds. The activity was held on Brig. Pasi and Brig. Kagay, Indanan Sulul on 20 & 22 September 2022 respectively.</p> <p>4th QUARTER</p> <p>As of this reporting period, the following were accomplished:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> GPH-MNLF Peace Mechanisms Planning Meeting at Waterfront Insular Hotel, Davao City. On 14 October 2022, the GPH and the MNLF Coordinating Committee (GMCO) together with the Joint Body on the Disposition of Arms and Forces (JEDAF) and the MNLF Sulul State Revolutionary Committee held a meeting at the Waterfront Insular Hotel in Davao City and agreed on the terms and conditions for the conduct of the verification and profiling process for MNLF combatants. <p>Following the agreement on Clause 8 "Subsequent batches shall be implemented as agreed later on by both parties", MNLF Coordinating Committee Chair Utloh Salem Cutan requested a Chair-to-Chair Meeting with GPH Coordinating Committee Chair Cesar Yano to discuss the next batches of combatants in Sulul that will undergo the verification and profiling processes and receive initial socio-economic interventions. The OPAPRU through the PAMANA-NPMO participated in both internal and external budget-related meetings including budget deliberation Hearing regarding the proposed FY 2023 Budget on 22 September 2022, in the House of Representatives, Balasan Road, Quezon City and 23 September 2022 in the Senate of the Philippines, Pasay City.

2. Inter-Agency Collaborations. The OPAPRU through PAMANA National Program Management Office (NPMO) spearheaded the 2nd Inter-Agency Meeting on 27 September 2022 via face-to-face. The activity served as the venue for the OPAPRU and its implementing partners the opportunity to share project implementation updates and discuss where we are "new" in terms of physical and financial progress; determine further actions to be taken or "what still needs to be done" on slow or non-moving projects; and, come up with action plans in aid of fast-tracking project implementation and completion particularly those from prior years as deemed feasible. The meeting was attended by representatives from partner NSAs namely, NCIP, DA, DA-BFAR, DILG, MPW/BARRM, DSWD, and OPAPRU.

3. Bilateral Meetings with Implementing Agencies. The PAMANA-NPMO in close coordination with the Peace Tables organized and participated the OPAPRU-DSWD Coordination Meeting for the implementation of FY 2022 PAMANA-DSWD Program which aims to (a) presentation and discussion on the final target areas for FY 2022 PAMANA-DSWD Program; and, (b) address the anticipated challenges in the implementation of various projects under the FY 2022 PAMANA-DSWD Program.

4. FY 2017 PAMANA-OPAPRU Projects

Physical Accomplishment. Subject to further updating, the FY 2017 PAMANA-OPAPRU has accomplished 383 or 71.86% completed projects, 138 or 25.89% ongoing, 7 or 1.31% preparatory and 5 or 0.94% cancelled/awarded.

1. **PAMANA Programming – Inputs to the Public Investment Program.** The National Economic Development Authority (NEDA) issued the joint call for all concerned government agencies and offices to submit their priority programs and projects (PAPs) for the formulation of the PIP 2023-2028 and TRIP FYs 2024-2028, as input to the FY 2024 budget preparation.

Approximately PHP 7.92B proposed PAPs encoded and submitted to PIP and TRIP of NEDA from the period of FY 2024 to FY 2028 representing proposed PAMANA budgets under the DA (PHP 11.61M), DENR (PHP 600.0M), DPWH (PHP 2.84B), DSWD-KC (PHP 494.3M), DSWD-SLP (PHP 1.26B), MPW-BARMM (PHP 64.0M), NCIIP (PHP 48.0M), NIA (PHP 12.0M), PHIC (PHP 195.56M) and OPAPRU (PHP 2.38B).

The above-mentioned figures relative to the submission of the priority PAPs was based on the prior endorsement of the concerned OPAPRU Peace Tables and Area Management Offices during the PAMANA Programming from FY 2019 and FY 2023. The PAMANA-NPMO has also provided/transmitted Memorandum to the concerned Peace Tables last October 2022 and follow-up Memorandum on December 2022 requesting for the submission of their proposed projects/programs to be lodged under the implementation of the PAMANA Program. However, no further input and response from the said Peace Tables regarding the requested data/information which shall be used by the PAMANA-NPMO as input for the PAMANA Programming.

The PAMANA-NPMO shall continue internal (i.e., Peace Tables) and external (i.e., DENR, DSWD, NCIIP, PHIC, etc.) coordination with respect to the proposed projects/programs to facilitate the implementation of FY 2024 PAMANA Program lodged to OPAPRU and/or various implementing partner LGUs and NGAs.

2. **Monitoring of FY 2012-2021 PAMANA Projects**

Inter-Agency Collaborations. The activity is a regular quarterly or semestral monitoring activity with implementing partners at the national level (i.e., BARMM-BPDA, MPW-BARMM, BARMM-MSWD, CHED, DA, DA-BFAR, DAR, DENR, DILG, DPWH, DSWD, NCIIP, NEA, PHIC, and OPAPRU).

The PAMANA-NPMO is set to conduct Inter-Agency Meeting with partner-NGAs relative to the implementation of FY 2012 to FY 2021 PAMANA Program last December 2022 via face-to-face. However, due to conflict of schedules with partner NGAs and other offices, the said activity was not realized and was moved on the 1st Quarter of FY 2023.

The conduct of the activity will serve as venue for the OPAPRU and its implementing partners the opportunity to share project implementation updates and discuss "where we are now" in terms of physical and financial progress; determine further actions to be taken or "what still needs to be done" on slow or non-moving projects; and, come-up with action plans in aid of fast-tracking project implementation and completion particularly those from prior years as deemed feasible.

Bilateral Meetings with Implementing Agencies. The activity is a regular monitoring and coordination activity with implementing partners at the national and local levels.

On 15 September 2022, President Ferdinand R. Marcos, Jr. graced the inaugural session of the new Bangsamoro Transition Authority (BTA). This is part of his administration's continuing efforts to untie the county's two major Moro fronts.

The top leadership of the MILF and MNLF, including MILF Chairman Ebrahim Murad and MNLF founding chair Nur Misuari, sat next to the President in a display of solidarity, marking a historic occasion and a significant turning point for the Bangsamoro peace process.

Other high-ranking MNLF leaders, including Chairman Muslimin Sema who is also BARMIL labor minister, former Deputy Speaker Abdugani Gerry Salappudin, former MNLF Leader, attended the occasion in a show of solidarity.

Following the President's plea for unity, local leaders, political families, and Moro royal clans attended the BTA session's beginning.

Sustaining Peace and Security

a. **Support to the conduct of Plebiscite for the ratification of R.A. 11550.** The Coordinating Committee On The Cessation Of Hostilities (CCCH) closely monitored the conduct of the Plebiscite for the ratification of R.A. 11550, which seeks to divide the Province of Maguindanao into two provinces namely, Maguindanao del Norte and Maguindanao del Sur. During the whole day's conduct of the plebiscite, there were no reported violent incidents in 469 polling centers in the 36 municipalities of Maguindanao. Upon releasing of partial results, MCL 700K voters voted "Yes" for the division of Maguindanao Province. According to reports, the plebiscite has a high voter turn-out which is considered a successful conduct of the plebiscite.

b. **Monitoring the overall security situation in the CAAM and its nearby areas.** As to the ground situation, a total of 40 was recorded for the quarter. Most of the incidents that happened were arrests, explosions, harassment, firefights due to riot, and shootings.

These incidents mostly happened in Maguindanao, Lanao, and North Cotabato.

c. **AHJAG Activities And Other Confidence Building Measures-**A total of eleven (11) meetings and CBMs were attended by GPH/AHJAG Chairman PMGEN EDEN T USGAL.

On the major activities of the GPH/AHJAG was on 011030 September 2022, when PMGen Eden T Ugalde, Chairman, GPH/AHJAG convened a meeting with the MILF Ceasefire Mechanism with the PRO BAR and Maguindanao PPO relative to the incident in Arapatuan, Maguindanao last 30 August 2022 which aims to gather information and to find ways to jointly cooperate against the perpetrators of the ambush incident.

<p>a. GPH Peace Implementing Panel. The GPH Peace Implementing Panel has been reconstituted in October 2022, with BGen. Cesar B. Yano (Ret.) as its Chair. Pending the official designation of members by the Office of the President, the GPH Peace Implementing Panel already convened four times during this period, beginning with an in-person meeting with the outgoing members on 18 November 2022 at the Philippine International Convention Center in Pasay City. During the meeting, the incoming members of the GPH Peace Implementing Panel were briefed on the implementation of the Comprehensive Agreement on the Bangsamoro (CAB) and pertinent issues related to it, particularly in the political and normalization tracks.</p> <p>This was followed by a series of briefings for the GPH Peace Implementing Panel on 25 November 2022 at the OPAPRU Central Office in Ortigas Center, Pasig City, on the security and socioeconomic aspects of normalization; 1 December 2022 at the Apo View Hotel in Davao City, on the work of the transitional components of normalization and the GPH-MILF ceasefire mechanisms; and on 7 December 2022 at the OPAPRU Central Office in Ortigas Center Pasig City, on transitional justice and reconciliation.</p> <p>b. Support to intergovernmental relations (IGR). Three IGR mechanisms have convened: the IGRB, Philippine-Congress – Bangsamoro Parliament Forum (PCBPF), and the Intergovernmental Fiscal Policy Board (IFPB).</p> <p>The newly reconstituted IGRB, by virtue of the Memorandum from the Executive Secretary dated 17 October 2022 and Bangsamoro Government Executive Order No. 7, s. 2022, held its 12th meeting on 1 December 2022 at the Malacanang of the South in Paraan, Davao City, where pertinent pending issues and action points therefor were discussed. During the meeting, the IGRB agreed to resolve the issue raised to it on amnesty, recognizing that the pending matter was already referred to and discussed by the PCBPF. It was also during this meeting that the IGRB signed its revised Terms of Reference (TOR), reflecting the new composition of the IGRB from the National Government and the Bangsamoro Government, mandating the conduct of regular meetings every 60 days, and limiting the administrative support of the OPAPRU to provision of meeting venue and meals only. The meeting was followed by a press conference of the IGRB Co-Chairs, Sec. Amnah F. Pangandaman of the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) for the National Government and the IGRB Co-Chair, Hon. Raul S. Mangalindan, Speaker of the House of Representatives, for the Bangsamoro Government.</p> <p>The PCBPF convened for its first meeting on 15 November 2022 at the Sofitel Philippine Plaza in Pasay City. During the meeting, the PCBPF agreed on the composition of its members from the Senate of the Philippines, House of Representatives, and the Bangsamoro Parliament and it formed a TWG to finalize its TOR. The PCBPF also discussed pertinent issues that require its action, including the extension of application periods for the entry of MILF and MNLF members into the Philippine National Police (PNP) and for the granting of amnesty for MILF and MNLF members.</p> <p>The IFPB held its fourth meeting on 1 December 2022 at the Malacanang of the South in Paraan, Davao City right after the 12th meeting of the IGRB to introduce to the new members the functions of the IFPB and to discuss pending issues, particularly the computation of the annual block grant of the Bangsamoro Government, deliverables of the Tax Study Group under the IFPB, and the participation of the Bangsamoro Government in the Al-Anwarah Islamic Investment Bank of the Philippines (AAIIB).</p> <p>The National Government TWG on the Entry of MILF and MNLF Members into the PNP under the IGRB, composed of representatives from the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), PNP, and National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM), held its meeting on 23 November 2022 via video teleconference to discuss the matters arising on the implementation of NAPOLCOM Resolution No. 2022-001 on the guidelines for the entry of MILF and MNLF members into the PNP. Discussed during the meeting was options for agriculture as a means for MILF communities in the six previously acknowledged MILF camps to generate income, as part of the Camps Transformation Plan (CTP). This was followed by technical meetings with the PhilMech on 16 December 2022 via video teleconference and with the PhiliFIDA on 19 December 2022 at the DA Central Office in Diliman, Quezon City.</p> <p>An inter-agency roundtable discussion on land classification and ownership in the BARMM was held on 14 December 2022 at the PICC in Pasay City. Attended by various National Government agencies and the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries, and Agrarian Reform (MAFAR) and the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, and Energy (MENRE) of the Bangsamoro Government, as well as the GPH JTFCI, the roundtable discussion served as an exploration of ways to resolve land-related issues in the six previously acknowledged MILF camps to ensure the smooth implementation of the CTP.</p>	<p>e. Meetings and dialogue were undertaken to address the emerging ceasefire issues to maintain the peaceful atmosphere in the CAAM.</p> <p>b. Rido Settlement Monitoring. Recurring problems in the CAAM are conflict characterized by sporadic outbreaks of retaliatory violence between families and kiratip groups as well as between communities due to land conflict, personal grudges, politics and among others. It can occur in areas where government or central authority is weak and in areas where there is a perceived lack of justice and security. One of the standing orders of PAPRU, is to make sure that any incidents that may hamper the ongoing ceasefire between the Government and the MILF should be addressed in order to de-escalate a looming problem of rido which may turn into a ceasefire problem.</p>

ANIPWO aims to ensure a collective representation of the aspirators and interests of indigenous women in the province. The group pioneers to advocate for sustainable development and protection of tribal women's rights. They espouse the principles of unity, peace, respect, freedom, and human rights.</p> <p>The establishment of the ANIPWO lays the foundation for social preparation to empower indigenous women and promote inclusivity in the planning and decision-making in the Indigenous Political Structure (IPS) of their ancestral domain. In sustaining the gains of such endeavor, OPAPRU in partnership with the regional NCIP, will be conducting a 3-phase series of interventions, namely, (1) profiling and capacity development, (2) peace conversations and stakeholders' meeting, and (3) formulation of the IP Women Development Plan. This will help enrich ANIPWO, as an IPO representing different tribes of the CARAGA Region in advocating for women, peace and security.</p>
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				<p>In the first phase conducted on October 10-14, 2022, members of ANIPWO were profiled while simultaneously learning the technical know-how of collecting initial baseline data. In February 2022, some 1,950 combatants were decommissioned giving a total of 7,200 MILF combatants decommissioned under Phase 3 as of March 2022. On 3 January 2022, the JPSC in partnership with the Coordinating Committee on the Cessation of Hostilities (CCCH) successfully conducted the initial collection and transport of 124 MILF firearms to be decommissioned during the Phase 3 decommissioning of MILF weapons. Deployment of Joint Peace Security Teams (JPSTs). On 14-24 February 2022, the Joint Peace and Security Committee (JPSC) in partnership with the Nonviolent Peaceforce (NPVF) successfully concluded the refresher course training of JPST Balindong (Lanao del Sur) and JPST Muna (Lanao del Norte). The program is part of the continuing capacitation of JPSTs for effective execution of their task and functions during the course of deployment. On 25 and 31 March 2022, the JPSC activated three (3) more teams or 90 additional JPST members that will take the lead role as frontliners of keeping the peace in their areas of responsibility specifically in the areas of Barangay Libutan, Mamasapano Maguindanao, Barangay Pigdalagan, Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao, and Barangay Balarogis, Pikit, North Cotabato. To date, some 17 Teams or a total of 520 JPST members are deployed and carrying out their mandate in their respective areas of deployment. Part of the deliverable under the UNDP-Japan Support to Normalization is the construction of JPST stations. On 25 March 2022, the JPST Mamasapano (Maguindanao) station has been completed and successfully turned over to the JPSTs. It is the 7th field station under the said program that was completed. ii. Disbandment of Private Armed Groups. For the 1st quarter of FY 2022, the National Task Force – Disbandment of Private Armed Groups (NTF-DPAGs) Secretariat met twice to ensure that all the ways forward during the previously conducted meeting of the Oversight Committee and the Year-End Assessment will be facilitated accordingly. This includes the amendment of the Implementing Rules and Operational Guidelines of the NTF-DPAGs, the establishment of its Coordinating Committee, and the implementation of its approved CY 2022 Work Plan. The Secretariat meetings were also facilitated to discuss the upcoming activities of the NTF-DPAGs, especially the next convening of the members of its Oversight Committee. Further, the CAB Implementation Department, OPAPRU as the lead agency of the NTF-DPAGs Secretariat, has disbursed an amount of PHP30M to the partner implementing agencies in order to support the program on the disbandment of private armed groups in the Bangsamoro. iii. During this process, DCs are biometrically identified, profiled, and assessed for their socio-economic needs by social workers, and then given an identification card to allow them to access additional government services. As part of the processes at TFDCC Station 5, the OPAPRU and DSWD development workers also facilitated the encoding of data from profiled DCs. Technical-Vocational Education & Training. From January to March 2022, the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization (ICCNM) Socio-economic Development Subcluster, chaired by OPAPRU, has trained a total of 1,353 DCs and their next of kin on various technical-vocational courses through the Technical Education Skills Development Authority (TESDA) and its regional counterpart – the Ministry of Basic, Higher, and Technical Education (MBHTE) of the BARM. The program is part of the capacity development program which aims in teaching Islamic Values, as a critical component in the self-development of DCs as they return to civilian life. Said activity was attended by the International Monitoring Team (IMT) M16, GPH-AHJAG, Chairman MILF CCCH, MILF-AHJAG, JTF Central/ID, PA, PRO BAR, and Provincial Election Supervisor of Maguindanao, COMELEC. The purpose of the agreement is to safeguard the GPH – MILF Agreement on the General Cessation of Hostilities and other ceasefire-related from adverse effects and repercussions while the government ensures the conduct of honest, orderly and peaceful elections on May 9, 2022. Atty. Muammar Guyo, Provincial Election Supervisor for Maguindanao (COMELEC Representative) has also witnessed the said signing.

b. **Signing of pledge of commitment by MILF commanders.** After the Signing of the Guidelines for Mutual Understanding between the GPH-MILF CCCH May 9, 2022 Local and National Elections last 30 April 2022 by the IMT, GPH CCCH and MILF CCCH, the initial signing of pledge of commitment follows. It was followed by the signing of pledge of commitment among the AFP, PNP and MILF Commanders.

On 07 May 2022, an Orientation of the Guidelines for Mutual Understanding between GPH and MILF for ceasefire related functions during 09 May 2022 NLE followed by the Signing of Pledge of Commitment of AFP, PNP and MILF Commanders under 105BC, BIAF-MILF at 1Mech Bde Hqs, Tacozang City in Sultan Kudarat Province.

On 07 May 2022, an Orientation of the Guidelines for Mutual Understanding between GPH and MILF for ceasefire related functions during 09 May 2022 NLE and signing of Pledge of Commitment of AFP, PNP, and MILF Commanders for 2022 NLE held at Hqs. 601Bde, PA. It was attended by Col. Onel Panggog PA, Cmr. 601Bde, and his Battalion Commanders, Cmr. Wahid Tundok of 116BC, Cmr. Haen Sindatlok of 105BC, Salahudin Angeles, JCM/Prep of 106BC, Cmr. Asraf Ali of TF Ilhhad.

c. **Establishment of the Joint Ceasefire Monitoring Center (JCMC).** Establishment and deployment of Joint Ceasefire Coordination Center (JCMC) by the CCCH and IMT from 08-16 May 2022 in the considered hotspot areas of elections. The JCMCs were deployed to closely monitor the incidents involving MILF and MILF and the deployment of AFP and PNP troops in the different Polling Centers in the respective AORs. The deployment areas include: Hqs. 1BCT, PA in Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao; Maguindanao PPO in Shariff Aguak, Maguindanao; Hqs. 1Mech Bn, PA in Pres. Quirino, Sultan Kudarat; Hqs. 602Bde, PA in Carmen, Cotabato; Hqs. 2Mech Bde, PA in Iligan City, WESTMIRCOM, AFP in Zamboanga City; and Hqs. 101D, PA in Marabou, Davao de Oro. The JCMC is composed of the CCCH, AHJAG and IMT who implemented the Guidelines for Mutual Understanding between the GPH-MILF CCCH for ceasefire-related functions during the May 9, 2022 National and Local Elections to safeguard the signed GPH-MILF peace agreements and preserve the gains obtained with the Bubut

d. **50TH CCCH Executive Meeting on 28 June 2022.** At around 271000, June 2022, the GPH-MILF CCCH convened for the 50th Joint Executive Meeting co-chaired by BGen Antonio G. Nifarrete PA, Chairman, GPH CCCH and Hon. Bulch P. Malang, Chairman, MILF CCCH to discuss and resolve protests filed by the GPH and MILF from 2020 – present. The GPH CCCH and MILF CCCH agreed to consider a total of 14 protest to be resolved pending compliance. The remaining 11 Unresolved Protests would be raised to the level of IMT during the Tripartite Meeting in the afternoon of 27 June 2022. Meanwhile, a total of three (3) protests have been agreed to be resolved during the meeting.

e. **Support to dispute resolution initiative on the ground that may have bearing to the implementation of the AGCH.** The Ceasefire Mechanisms have been active in intensifying its effort to contain the adverse effect of dispute or rido concerns to the ceasefire agreements. For the quarter, a total of eight (8) rido related concerns were successfully facilitated/attended by the CCCH of both parties.

The CCCH, JCOMP MILF and Cmr. Haen Sindatlok of 105BC, BIAF-MILF successfully facilitated the ceasefire between the warring groups of Guindit Kedlog, former Brig. Chair of Andawit, Dabu Salibo, Maguindanao and a member of 105BC, BIAF-MILF against the group of Cmr. Jamel Masdal, member of NSF, BIAF-MILF wherein both groups signed a ceasefire agreement on 22 April 2022.

The CCCH and JCOMP Kilangog facilitated the dialogue for the 105BC, BIAF-MILF who were involved in the encounter in Brig. Marungaling Mamasapano, Maguindanao to implement the ceasefire between the warring parties.

The CCCH attended the rido settlement between the group of Aham Indanan of 114BC, BIAF-MILF and Samar Eling, Brig. Chairman of Bangsang, Tipo-Tipo held at JPSI Tipo-Tipo Station on 21 May 2022. Said event was witnessed by the representatives of Tipo-Tipo LGU, 18B, PA; Coast Guard, JPSI Tipo-Tipo; and 114BC, BIAF-MILF.

The CCCH attended the rido settlement between the groups of Ibrahim Ali Cuno @Kagui Katalang, Brig. Chairman of Depiweng, Dabu Saudi Ampuban and Cmr. Sallah Salk of 118BC, BIAF-MILF held at Municipal Hall of Dabu Saudi Ampuban, Maguindanao on 24 May 2022. Said activity was facilitated in partnership between the MILF CCCH led by its Chair, Hon. Bulch Malang and Dabu Saudi Ampuban LGU led by Mayor Resly Sindatlok. Said event was also attended by Col. Onel Panggog PA, Cmr. 601Bde, PA; PLic. Barlowe Espiga of Maguindanao PPO; Lic. Charlie Baraag PA, CO, 61B, PA; Lic. Edwin Aburo PA, CO, 401B, PA; Hon. Anwar Alameda, Chair, MILF-AHJAG; Ust. Wahid Tundok of 118BC, BIAF-MILF and Cmr. Haen Sindatlok of 105BC, BIAF-MILF. During the event, Kaga Katalang and Cmr. Salk signed a settlement agreement which was witnessed by the LGU, AFP, PNP, MILF CCCH, MILF-AHJAG, and BIAF-MILF present.

The CCCH facilitated/attended the Grand Kendaui for the settlement of rido between Ampuhan/Mamasapano family and Sangah family on 06 June 2022 to implement the signed family covenant between the families last 08 October 2021 held at residence of Cmr. Mador "Dabu Item" Ampuban in Brig. Old Maganoy, Dabu Abdullahi Sangah, Maguindanao.

The CCCH attended the Rido Settlement between Ahmad Daniyal @Rambo of 126BC, BIAF-MILF and Eskie Manao @SK of 105BC, BIAF-MILF held at Brig. Tukarapiao, Mamasapano, Maguindanao on 16 June 2022. During the event, both parties signed a peace covenant that should prevent both parties from committing hostilities against each other and help the return of the displaced civilians. Part of the settlement is handing over of cash amounting to Four Hundred Thousand Pesos (400,000.00) to Eskie as blood money for his child who was killed and damaged properties during their armed clashes. Said event was witnessed Lt. Benjamin Cadente PA, CO, 331B, PA, Cmr. Haen Sindatlok of 105BC, BIAF-MILF, Local Government of Maguindanao; MILF CCCH; and members of 126BC, BIAF-MILF and 105BC, BIAF-MILF.

<p>The CCCH attended the exploratory talks/dialogue with the Sepi Family (most of who are members of the MILF) headed by Mr. Norodin Sepi, employee of VG Datu Lester Sinsuat of Magindanao on 21 June 2022. Said talks/dialogue was facilitated by Ergi Noldan Uyod, Datu sa Tawiran and former NIA Official and hosted by Mayor Datu Ali Hilmimbang Sr. of Talaran held at the Municipal Hall of Talaran, Magindanao. The dialogue aims to flesh out the issues behind the recent conflict involving MILF and MNLF members in Bigays, Berelen and Bagongod, both in Datu Odin Sinsuat, Magindanao since 2019 and last 11 June 2022.</p> <p>The CCCH of both parties met to plan out the resolution of on-going tension between the members of 104BC, BIAF-MILF and supporters of Meyer-elect Trucap Mestura of Sultan Kudarat, Magindanao on 02 June 2022. However, it was disclosed that the elements of both groups might trigger untoward incident. It was assured by Hon. His office is represented by CSAP Undersecretary Joana Prata A. Domingo who delivered his message during the activity.</p> <p>The Independent Decommissioning Body (IDB) Chairman and Turkish Ambassador Ahmet Adem Akay assured the body's commitment in the conduct of a smooth decommissioning process.</p> <p>Operation Support at Pre-Assembly and Processing area (Pre-APA) relative to the Phase 3 Decommissioning Process. The OPAPRU, through the JNC Secretariat leads the operations at the pre-Assembly and Processing Area (APA) wherein they ensure that all combatants have undergone the pre-registration and verified to be in the list prior to their actual decommissioning day. The JNC Secretariat also ensures that the MILF combatants are decommissioned as scheduled. A total of 1,415 combatants have been served by the JNC Secretariat.</p>
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<p>Support to Phase 3 Decommissioning of MILF Combatants and Weapons.</p> <p>On Sept. 13, 2022, the GPH and the MILF, through the IDB, resumed the Phase 3 decommissioning of MILF combatants and weapons. A total of 1,003 former MILF members and 2,500 weapons were safely transported and provided security convey by the combined force of JPSC and JPST from Pre-APA in Camp Durapaman to APA-Site, Old Capitol, Simuay, Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao, and thereafter received by IBD for decommissioning process. The resumption of Phase 3 Decommissioning of MILF combatants will last until November 2, 2022.</p> <p>The JNC-MILF Secretariat has been actively involved in the coordination of the collection and transport of MILF firearms and ammunitions that were decommissioned last 13-20 September 2022.</p> <p>The team has collected a total of 2,450 firearms, 923 magazines, and 2,974 ammunition. These weapons were successfully handed over to the Independent Decommissioning Body (IDB) which subsequently underwent the process of decommissioning.</p> <p>BARRM Chief Minister Ahd Ibrahim described the resumption of Phase 3 MILF decommissioning as a testament to the "continued mutual confidence, trust and commitment of the Government of the Philippines and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front to the Bangsamoro peace process."</p> <p>a. Socio-economic Development Aspect. As part of the normalization process, the GPH and the MILF agreed to intensify development efforts for the rehabilitation, reconstruction, and development of conflict-affected areas. Socio-economic programs will be instituted to address the needs of the MILF-BIAF members, internally displaced persons, and poverty-stricken communities in the Bangsamoro.</p> <p>Acceleration of Socioeconomic Development aspect of Normalization. On 30 August 2022, following the engagements of Sec. Catillo Galvez, Jr. with the Base Commanders of the Moro Islamic Liberation Front on August 19, 2022 in Cotabato City, a meeting with key actors and decision-makers of relevant implementing agencies of national and Bangsamoro Government was conducted to ensure for action setting. This meeting was a high-level meeting attended by decision makers of invited agencies such as the DPWH, DSWD, Bangsamoro Parliament, BARRM, Ministry of Public Works (MPW), and BARRM- Bangsamoro Planning and Development Authority (BPDA). This assistance may be used to purchase food and non-food items, and may also be used to start a small business.</p> <p>A total of 14,000 combatants is targeted to be decommissioned under the Phase 3 Decommissioning process. At least 7,200 have already been decommissioned in November 2021 to March 2022. For this batch, 5,500 are expected to be decommissioned until the end of October 2022.</p> <p>On the release of cash assistance, a total of Php 120,000,000.00 million was disbursed to the 1,200 out of target 5,500 MILF combatants decommissioned and processed at the TFDDC Station for this batch.</p> <p>Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) with TESDA and MBHTE-TESD. To date, a total of 2,209 DCCs and next-of-kin have graduated in various courses under the TESDA's flagship program – TVET. Completers of TVET either receive National Certification (NC) or Certificate of Completion (COC).</p> <p>For this quarter, sixty-six (66) decommissioned MILF combatants and next-of-kin graduated in Agricultural Crops Production NC II under TESDA's flagship program, Technical-Vocational Education & Training (TVET) in Brgy. Lahing-Ialbing, Omar, Sulu.</p> <p>In addition, profiling and training needs analysis of 63 decommissioned combatants and their next-of-kin were conducted on 5 September 2022 at Jebriel Doc Arfaal Hall, Sirawan Tontl, Davao City.</p> <p>Alternative Learning System: Functional Literacy Program for the Decommissioned Combatants with MBHTE-Basic Education Sector. From 119 to 27 September 2022, BARRM Ministry of Basic, Higher, and Technical Education—Basic Education Sector (MBHTE – BES) together with the TFDDC conducted a series of meetings with LQUS to brief them on Executive Order 79 s. 2019 (implementing the Annex on Normalization under the Comprehensive Agreement on the Bangsamoro) and Socioeconomic Aspect under the Normalization Program. The MBHTE, on the other hand, discussed the Functional Literacy Program for the DCCs and their next-of-kin.</p> <p>Small-scale Infrastructure Project: Construction of Rural Health Units with DOH. The construction of Rural Health Units with Birthing Facilities in six (6) identified communities of decommissioned combatants in Maguindanao, North Cotabato, Lanao del Sur, and Lanao del Norte is currently ongoing.</p> <p>The TFDDC Secretariat coordinates with the MOH's Program Manager on a regular basis to keep track on the state of the RHU facilities and their progress.</p> <p>As of 30 September 2022, 86.5% of the facilities under development have been physically completed.</p> <p>Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA)'s Technical Cooperation on Socioeconomic Assistance for the Bangsamoro Normalization Process. In August 2022, JICA held a series of meetings with OPAPRU and TFDDC officials. On 16 August, JICA met with GPH Peace Implementing Panel and the Joint Normalization Committee to discuss the contents of the approved technical cooperation project that will be implemented by JICA. Said project is focused on Skills Training of Decommissioned Combatants. On 14 July 2022, the JTFCT Secretariat and representatives from the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries, and Agrarian Reform (MAFAR) and Minister of Trade, Investment and Tourism (MITI) convened a meeting to discuss the possible partnership in support to the implementation of Camps Transformation Plan (CTP).</p> <p>Poultry Industry Investment Forum and Business Matching in Special Geographic Areas. On 28 July 2022, MILF JTFCT Co-Chairman MP Ali O. Salk and GFH JTFCT Head of Secretariat Engr. Casana Mendala together with the MILF JTFCT Coordinators of Camp Rajamuda participated during the Poultry Industry Investment Forum and Business Matching in Special Geographic Areas (SGA) organized by the Ministry of Trade, Investments and Tourism at 6th Avenue Hotel and Convention Hall, Kabaner, North Cotabato.</p> <p>The activity is in line with the projects identified in the Camps Transformation Plan such as the Provision of Micro-grants to Cooperatives, Support and Promotion of Halal Products and Linkages to Local and International Markets through Business Matching.</p> <p>Further, the said activity was attended by officials from the BARM government, poultry growers from SGA and representatives from Philippine Halal Marok Corp. (PHMC), Land Bank of the Philippines and United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).</p> <p>Project Validation and Appraisal. On August 8-11 and August 15-16, the JTFCT Secretariat in collaboration with UNDP project team conducted validation and appraisal in the six (6) previously acknowledged MILF camps. On 22-27 August 2022, JTFCT Co-Chair MP Engr. Banitan Ampatuan, JTFCT Secretariat and Camp Coordinators participated during the GFH Panel Engagement with MILF Communities. The activity was spearheaded by the GFH Peace Implementing Panel and in close coordination with Joint Task Forces on Camps Transformation and Task Force for Decommissioned Combatants and their Community. It aimed to provide salient provisions and updates on the implementation of the Normalization Program of the Comprehensive Agreement on the Bangsamoro (CAB). This engagement also provided a platform for constructive and open discussion of issues and concerns of the general public on the said matter.</p> <p>Further, the activity was also attended by MILF-BIAF/BIAWAB commanders and combatants, representatives from local government unit as well as officers from Philippine National Police, Armed Forces of the Philippines and members of the community.</p> <p>On 10 February 1999 in Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao, the Parties recognized Camps Abubakar as-Siddique (Maguindanao) and Buzrah Somotiang (Lanao del Sur). The Parties also acknowledged on 6 October 1999 in Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao four more camps: Camps Bilal (Lanao provinces), Rajamuda (North Cotabato and Maguindanao), Omar bin al-Khattab (Maguindanao), and Baadre (Maguindanao).</p> <p>The OPAPRU provided for grocery assistance to selected families in need. Meanwhile, the Office of MP Banitan Adli-Ampatuan provided for school supply kits for the children in the selected madrasah in MILF camps.</p> <p>DA and OPAPRU-JTFCT Coordination. On 09 September 2022, the JTFCT Chairpersons BGen Cesar De Mesa (Ret), MP Engr. Banitan Adli-Ampatuan and MP Ali O. Salk met with Engr. Zamzamin L. Ampatuan, Department of Agriculture Undersecretary for Special Concerns, for BARM and for Infrastructure, via video teleconference to discuss the progress of the implementation and to address issues and concerns with regards to the Infrastructure Development Program for the six previously acknowledged MILF Camps.</p> <p>During the meeting, the DA committed to fast track the delivery of the following farm inputs such high value crops, equipment/tools and fertilizer. Ampatuan met with the Ministry of Public Order and Safety (MPOS), Minister Hussein Muboz in partnership with Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue (HD).</p> <p>The meeting was held in order to provide a brief introduction to the Camps Transformation Plan (CTP) and on the possible partnership with the Ministry on the conflict mapping to address conflict and rido that are present in the six previously acknowledged MILF Camps. Coordination meetings were held in August and September 2022 relative to the PNP's deliverable in the ICCMN-approved TJR Roadmap, which involves an ongoing development of the Bangsamoro Police Program of Instructions (POI). This is in preparation for the training and education program for former members of the MILF and MNLF who are qualified to enter the PNP/Bangsamoro Police Force.</p> <p>The PNP-PPDC endorsed the proposal of the PNPTI for the proposed workshop on the development of the STP for the Bangsamoro Police. The Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) held its 23rd, regular meeting and year-end assessment workshop on 02 December 2022 in Davao City. During the meeting, the Co-Chairs and members of the JNC signed a Joint Statement to further intensify the commitment of both parties to implement various components of the Normalization Program prior to the signing of the Exit Agreement.</p> <p>Implementation of the Normalization Program</p> <p>a. Security Aspect. This covers the decommissioning of MILF forces and weapons, disarmament of private armed groups, program for small arms and light weapons management, redeployment of the AFP, policing, and the clearing of unexploded ordnance and landmines.</p> <p>National Task Force for the Disbandment of Private Armed Groups.</p> <p>The OPAPRU, as the lead agency of the NTF-DPAGs Secretariat, hold a meeting to brief its new Chairperson on 03 October 2022 at the DILG-NAPOLCOM Center, Quezon City. The Secretariat presented the overview and latest accomplishments of the NTF during the former administration.</p> <p>The NTF-DPAGs convened its 9th Oversight Committee Meeting and the first meeting during the current administration on 21 October 2022 at the PNP Headquarters, Quezon City. The meeting became a platform to ensure the streamlining and continuous implementation of the campaign against PAGs in BARM and its adjacent regions 9 to 12. The new officials and members of the Oversight Committee were presented to the Chairperson during the meeting.</p> <p>The NTF-DPAGs Secretariat, in collaboration with the DILG, spearheaded an information, education, and communication (IEC) campaign for the newly-elected chief executives of Regions 9, 11, & 12. The remaining 6,600 combatants and targeted 2,450 firearms under Phase 3 are expected to be decommissioned by 2023, with the 5,500 combatants this September to November 2022 and the remaining 1,300 combatants by 1st quarter of 2023. To date, under Phase 3, 90.7% or 12,699 combatants and 100% or 2,450 firearms have been decommissioned with the efforts of the Normalization Mechanisms (IDB, JNC, TFDCC, JPSC, CCCH, JND) and partner agencies (DSWD, AFP, PHO and Red Cross).</p> <p>During the 2nd resumption of 3rd Phase of Decommissioning from September 23 – October 28, 2022 the JPSC together with CCHH personnel and JPSTs successfully coordinated and facilitated the safe transport of BIAF-MILF Combatants to be decommissioned. The JPSTs also provided marshaling assistance and area security in Pre-APA and APA.</p>
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<p>The 2,450 turned-in MILF weapons were profiled and safely transported from point of origin to Assembly Processing Area in Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao to the Safe Arms Storage Area. The IDB Headquarters with support from the JPST, 12th FSSU and EOD conducted inventory and registration of all collected ammunition and explosives under Phase 3. The specifications of the ammunitions and explosives were collected and stored in the IDB database.</p> <p>After the inventory and registration, a total of 2,937 ammunition and explosives were detonated in Brig Dabo, Alameda, North Cotabato. The activity was witnessed by representatives of relevant normalization mechanisms of GHF and MILF including members of the AFP.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Joint Peace and Security Teams (JPST).</p> <p>Completed JPST Station Construction in The Provinces of Lanao, Basilan, and Zamboanga Sibugay. Five (5) more JPST stations under the Memorandum of Agreement between OPAPRU and AFP had been occupied and declared 100% completed.</p> <p>JPST Refresher Course Conducted. The training aimed at reinforcing and fortifying the technical, administrative, and operational know-how of JPST personnel to efficiently carry out their mandate as interim peacekeeping forces in mutually-agreed areas. The training is also intended to provide additional inputs on the current security situation in their areas of responsibility and capacitate them with skills and knowledge concerning unarmed civilian protection activities.</p> <p>Explosive Ordnance Risk Education Training. The FSD with the support of the European Union (EU) in the Philippines piloted its first EORE training to members of the JPST who are deployed in the field. This program aims to enhance their capacity to understand the dangers posed by UXO and also equip them with the required knowledge on how to deal with a UXO, if encountered or reported to them.</p> <p>Gender, Peace and Conflict Training (GPCT). The training was conducted in partnership with Nonviolent Peaceforce together with UNFPA. As peacekeeping forces deployed in mutually agreed areas, GPCT is a crucial step in the transformative process of increasing the knowledge and changing the behaviors of participants towards gender, peace and conflict issues that further inequalities and offer new perspectives to analyze and address such issues.</p> <p>Supported 24 Dispute Resolution Activities. The JPSTs are actively participating in peacekeeping activities in their respective areas of responsibility, and strong partnership with LGUs is very evident as shown in activities where JPSTs are regularly invited/appointed to provide assistance during riot settlement activities.</p> <p>Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Response. Part of the deliverable under the UNDP-Japan Support to Normalization is the construction of JPST stations; on March 25, 2022, another station has been completed and successfully turned over to the JPSTs, it is the 7th field station under the said program that was completed.</p> <p>Stakeholders and Community Engagement. These includes regular community and LGU peace dialogues and visitations, courtesy calls and meetings to LGU and friendly forces in the area including MILF camp and installation visitations, and participation in peace advocacies.</p> <p>Activation of JPST Maguing, Maguing, Lanao Del Sur — Peace and security efforts in the province continue to be strengthened as the Government of the Philippines and Moro Islamic Liberation Front Peace (GPH-MILF) Implementing Panels turned over a Joint Peace and Security Team (JPST) facility here as well activated another JPST in the province.</p> <p>Activation of JPST Balo-i. The JPSC, Lanao del Norte, local government, and the 1st Infantry (Tabak) Division Commander witnessed the turnover of the JPST Station and activation ceremony at Barangay Pealunao, Balo-i, Lanao del Norte on November 30, 2022.</p> <p>Activation of JPST Sumisip and Turn-over of Tipo-tipo and Sumisip Station. On 12 December 2022, the Ceremonial Activation of JPST Sumisip and Turnover of two JPST stations in Brig. Sapah Bulac, Sumisip and in Brig. Poblacion, Tipo Tipo Basilan. It is the 20th JPST activated and deployed in the mutually agreed areas and the 2nd station established in the Province of Basilan.</p> <p>b. Socio-economic Development Aspect. As part of the normalization process, the GHF and the MILF agreed to intensify development efforts for the rehabilitation, reconstruction, and development of conflict-affected areas. Socio-economic programs will be instituted to address the needs of the MILF-BIAF members, internally displaced persons, and poverty-stricken communities in Bangsamoro.</p> <p>Normalization Integration Workshop for the Socio-Economic Development in the Core Barangay. To harmonize the implementation of the national government's socioeconomic interventions for decommissioned Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) combatants under Normalization Program, a two-day integration workshop was held here. The workshop, held from October 11 to 12, is a collaborative effort of the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity (OPAPRU) and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).</p> <p>Punch Listing Activity and Technical Inspection on Skills Development Center (SDC). On 29 November 2022, the Joint Normalization Committee was invited during the Punch Listing Activity and Technical Inspection on Skills Development Center (SDC) established in Camp Bilal as part of the Classroom Construction Support Program (CSPP) of the Australian Government and the Philippine Business Social Progress (FBSSP) in coordination with the Joint Normalization Committee (JNC) and Joint Task Force for Camps Transformation (JTFC).</p> <p>This project aims to support the camp normalization and transformation of the Philippine Government and BARRM and create economic opportunities for decommissioned combatants and their communities through skills training and technical assistance. The said project is 90% done and is expected to be finalized and operationalized in April 2023.</p> <p>Task Force Decommissioned Combatants and their Communities (TFDCC)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - TFDCC Workshop/Consultation with Partner Agencies: Planning and Programming for 2023-2024. On October 26, 2022, SDO – TFDCC held an annual workshop consultation with its partner implementing agencies to plan and program 2023-2024 to fully implement the socioeconomic transformation program for the decommissioned combatants and their communities. <p>The workshop consultation is expected to significantly influence annual planning and programming of the national agencies and development partners which incorporate the target beneficiaries of the Comprehensive Agreement on the Bangsamoro in the regular programs of the national government agencies (NGAs).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Integration Workshop for the Socioeconomic Development in the Core Barangays. The GPH TFDCC represented by Atty. Almaria participated in the Integration Workshop for the Socioeconomic Development in the Core Barangays on October 11-12, 2022. The workshop was convened to integrate the efforts of the JTFC, TFDCC, JNC and other Normalization mechanisms and to discuss the implementation of the workshop for the integrated planning of core areas. With the instruction of Sec. Galvez, the implementation will cover interventions based on the program framework on socioeconomic development for decommissioned combatants which includes social protection, capacity development, livelihood and employment, and infrastructure components. <p>The workshop was held at Podium Hall, ACE Hotel, Pasig City. Other stakeholders also joined via video-teleconference.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - DSWD's Program Implementation Review for the Socioeconomic Development Program for MILF DCs. On December 12-16, 2022, a Program Implementation Review (PIR) organized and hosted by the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) was conducted to review, assess, and evaluate gaps in the performance of the agency and to identify strategies to address the issues in the implementation of the socio-economic development program for the decommissioned MILF combatants. 		


<p>The PIR was also a venue for the GPH TFDDC to strengthen its work towards gender mainstreaming in the general intake, case management, and re-engagement process.</p> <p>The workshop which was attended by nine personnel from the GPH TFDDC Secretariat was held at Kawa Resort, Brgy. Malinao, General Luna, Sargao Island, Surigao del Norte.</p> <p>Immediate Socioeconomic Intervention to Distressed MILF and MNLF Areas. Upon the instruction of Secretary Galvez, the TFDDC together with the Joint Task Force on Camps Transformation (JTFC) and the MILF Peace Process Office conducted relief operations to Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) and Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) areas that were severely affected by Typhoon Paeng.</p> <p>The TFDDC also led the ceremonial distribution of relief assistance in Sapad, Marabog, and Magsaysay, Parang in Maguindanao which was attended by Secretary Galvez, USec. David Diciano, Gen. César Yano (Rel), BGen. Buenaventura Pascual (Rel.), EDir. César De Mesa, and MP Engr. Bantlan Ampatuan.</p> <p>The operations benefited 4,000 households in provinces of Maguindanao, Sultan Kudarat, and North Cotabato.</p> <p>Listed below are the MILF communities and corresponding number of beneficiaries where TFDDC distributed the relief assistance:</p> <p>Datu Anggat, Maguindanao in barangay Adson with 120 beneficiaries; Datu Sauid Ampatuan, Maguindanao in barangay Kilargo with 100 beneficiaries; Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao in barangays of Macagaling with 32 beneficiaries, Simsay with 50 beneficiaries and Darapanan with 30 beneficiaries; Parang, Maguindanao in barangay Magsaysay with 100 beneficiaries; Datu Piang, Maguindanao in barangays of Maszigay with 100 beneficiaries and Reyna Rehente with 100 beneficiaries; Datu Odin Sinsuat, Maguindanao in barangays of Maker with 40 beneficiaries and Kuslong with 35 beneficiaries of 104th Base Command;</p> <p>Rajahm Buayan, Maguindanao in barangay Daparis with 115 beneficiaries; Kalamansig, Sultan Kudarat with 80 beneficiaries of 104th Base Command; Lebak, Sultan Kudarat with 40 beneficiaries of Inner Guard Base Command; Pigawayan, North Cotabato in barangay Cebang with 40 beneficiaries.</p> <p>Programs for Decommissioned Combatants & their Next-of-Kin. The TFDDC together with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) is tasked to process the general intake which includes biometrics registration, profiling and assessment, release of identification cards, and release of immediate intervention as the transitional cash assistance in the amount of PHP 100,000.00 for each decommissioned combatant.</p> <p>From September 22 to October 31, 2022, a total of PHP 549,800,000.00 million was disbursed to the 5,499 (89.98%) out of the target 5,500 decommissioned MILF combatants were processed at the TFDDC Station. One combatant was disqualified by the IDB and was not turned over to the TFDDC to undergo the general intake.</p> <p>Civil Registration of Decommissioned MILF Combatants, their Next-of-Kin, and Other Members of the Communities. Access to Legal Identity and Social Services (ALIAS-DC), a project being implemented by IDEALS Inc., and funded by the European Union, MISERECOR, The Asia Foundation, and Australian Department of Foreign Affairs, is currently conducting mobile registration to lead to issuance of civil registry documents such as certificate of live birth (COLB) and security paper (SecPa).</p> <p>Shown on the table below are the beneficiaries of the project in North Cotabato, Maguindanao, and Lanao Provinces. Among the beneficiaries of the project, decommissioned combatants were catered the most with 1,394 DCs. Further, among the areas, Maguindanao had highest number of beneficiaries with the total of 1,691 beneficiaries.</p> <p>Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) with TESDA and MBHTE-TESD. To date, a total of 2,592 out of 12,000 DCs and their next of kin under the signed partnership with TESDA. Of this number, 1,600 completed National Competency (NC) II and 992 completed Certificate of Completion (COO).</p> <p>In addition, profiling and training needs analysis of additional 1,141 decommissioned combatants and their next-of-kin was conducted through TESDA to undergo a series of technical vocational skills training provinces of Sultan Kudarat, Maguindanao, Lanao del Norte and cities of Davao, Iligan, and Cotabato with the following courses; Bread and Pastry Production NC II (275), Carpentry NC II (206), Organic Agriculture Production (196), Dressmaking (126), Electrical Installation and Maintenance NC II (160), Automotive Servicing NC II (25), Shielded Metal Arc Welding NC I (50), Animal Production (25), Cookery (60) and Electrical System leading MISES NC II (19) respectively.</p> <p>Study Grant/ Higher Education Access for Decommissioned Combatants: Opportunities for Resiliency and Empowerment (HEADCORE). The MBHTE- Higher Education Sector with the support of the GPH TFDDC have been facilitating the enrollment of 1,057 beneficiaries under the HEADCORE project. Each beneficiary is entitled to receive PHP 25,000/semester for school-related expenses.</p> <p>Construction of Rural Health Units with DOH. The construction of Rural Health Units with Birthing Facilities in six (6) identified communities of decommissioned combatants in Maguindanao, North Cotabato, Lanao del Sur, and Lanao del Norte is currently ongoing.</p> <p>To date, 87.62% of the facilities under development have been physically completed.</p> <p>Acceleration of Socio-economic Development aspect of Normalization. On 30 August 2022, following the engagements of Sec. Castillo Galvez, Jr. with the Base Commanders of the MILF on August 19, 2022 in Cotabato City, a meeting with key actors and decision-makers of relevant implementing agencies of national and Bangsamoro Government was conducted to ensure action setting. This meeting was a high-level meeting attended by decision-makers of invited agencies such as the DPWH, DSWD, Bangsamoro Parliament, BARMM, Ministry of Public Works (MPW), and BARMM - Bangsamoro Planning and Development Authority (BPDA). The Chairperson of the GPH Normalization Mechanisms - JNC, TFDDC and JTFC spearheaded the said meeting.</p> <p>During the meeting, the PAPRU instructed to prioritize the development of 27+ barangays this year. He said that moving forward, all interventions will be focused in the core areas and based on the program framework on socio-economic development for decommissioned combatants and communities (DCCs) such as social protection, capacity development, livelihood and employment, and infrastructure. He added that the Panels, JNC, TFDDC and JTFC must actively engage towards this effort. An Integration Workshop to take action on this instruction of the PAPRU is set to be conducted sometime in October 2022.</p> <p>c. Transitional Justice and Reconciliation</p> <p>TJR Training for BTA Officials, BARMM Ministries/agencies and CSO Leaders. The TJR training aimed to: a) to orient/re-orient new sets of BTA officials, BARMM agencies and CSO leaders on the basic principles and frameworks of Transitional Justice and Dealing with the Past (TJDP) as a pathway for forging lasting peace in the Bangsamoro and other conflict-affected communities in Mindanao; and, b) provide updates on the status of implementation of the Normalization Program and the government's responses to the TJRC recommendations. OPAPRU was represented by the TJRO and the MILF Peace Process Office to respond to the second objective.</p> <p>A total of 26 participants were capacitated on TJR which comprised of the following: MP Adzar Usman, a representative from NCMF, BARMM agencies (BCPCH, RMM, OBC), 20 CSO leaders from across the BARMM, and a newsletter consultant from Davao City.</p>	
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
				<p>The activity was held on 25-30 October 2022 at the Pinnacle Hotel, Davao City. It was organized and facilitated by the Consortium of Bangsamoro Civil Society (CBCS) with funding support from the European Union and Spanish Development Cooperation (AECID) and in collaboration with TIJO and CIOJINC.</p> <p>It was held to enhance the capacities of duty bearers in understanding the nexus of gender and TJ towards improving the delivery of gender-sensitive transitional justice programs. There were participants from the member-agencies under the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization (ICCMN), the National Steering Committee on Women, Peace and Security (NSC WPS), organizations involved in implementing TJ initiatives in the BARM and CAF, as well as the OPAPRU with representatives from the different peace table/program clusters. The seminar was followed with the launching of the Weaving Women's Narratives and a Policy Paper on Gender and TJ.</p> <p>In attendance were member-agencies of the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization (ICCMN), the National Steering Committee on Women, Peace and Security (NSC WPS), among other agencies/organizations involved in implementing TJ initiatives in the BARM and CAF.</p> <p>With this opportunity to be oriented/specialized on gender and TJ, the TIJO facilitated the participation of OPAPRU for the presentation of the PAPRU's opening message and a representation from the different peace tables given that TJ is not confined to the Bangsamoro areas.</p> <p>6th Meeting of the TJR Sub-Cluster under the Inter-Cabinet Cluster Mechanism on Normalization (ICCMN-TJR). The 6th Meeting of the ICCMN-TJR Cluster was convened on 17 November 2022 to apprise its members on the recent developments of the ICCMN and to inform them on their agency's specific role in facilitating the implementation of the TJR aspect of the Normalization Program.</p> <p>As GPH Focal for TJR, PA Wilson Mayor emphasized that the review and updating of the TJR Roadmap should consider the current thrusts and directions of the FRM Administration as well as the comments of the MILF and some BARMM agencies to the TJR Roadmap that was approved by the ICCMN body on 30 March 2021.</p> <p>He mentioned that the proposed NTJRCB creation under Track 1 of the TJR Roadmap may not be feasible as this will require legislation. A regional TJR mechanism can instead be pursued as provided in the Bangsamoro Organic Law (BOL), and that the ICCMN can be maximized for TJR issues that are national in scope.</p> <p>The member-agencies were briefed by Dir. Jang Gallardo on the developments and mandate of the ICCMN and ICCMN-TJR Cluster as well as on the TJR aspect of the Normalization and the ICCMN-approved TJR Roadmap.</p> <p>This meeting was intended to prepare them for directives that will be issued by the ICCMN body when it convenes in 2022. It was attended by 16 out of 22 ICCMN-TJR partner agencies.</p> <p>Roundtable Discussion on TJR. The RTD was organized by the Nonviolent Peaceforce (NP) in collaboration with the Bangsamoro Human Rights Commission (BHRC) and held on 26 – 27 November 2022 in Davao City with an online platform. It was a brainstorming session that sought to generate concrete suggestions and recommendations towards strengthening the mandate of the BHRC so it can ably fulfill its mandated duty to deliver on TJR in the Bangsamoro.</p> <p>The RTD was participated in by BHRC officials and staff, Non-violent Peaceforce (NP), Commission on Human Rights (OPAPRU), Consortium of Bangsamoro Civil Society (CBCS) and other human rights advocates and experts. OPAPRU was represented by the TIJO and the GPH Panel Secretariat as participants to the RTD.</p> <p>Agreed next steps are as follows:</p> <p>To sustain the RTD group as an Adhoc TJ Platform and schedule a series of meetings.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> u NP to circulate the documentation of RTD u CBCS to organize a face-to-face preparatory meeting in Cotabato City by the second week of January 2023 u Initiate a rapid inventory of CSO TJR efforts in the BARM u Reach out to other groups like Forum ZED to include in the Ad Hoc TJ Platform in o their February 2023 activity u Work with the MILF TWG on TJR, Mr. Ammer Dobo to seek an audience with the MILF Implementing Panel to discuss the initiatives of Ad Hoc TJ Platform in early 2023. <p>- For the CBCS to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> u schedule TJR inter-agency meetings by the third week of January 2023 u coordinate with the OCM to issue a memo requiring BMDAs to attend. u push the creation of an inter-agency mechanism u recommend a rapid inventory of BARMM Government TJR efforts <p>TJR Briefing for the Panel Chair of the GPH Peace Implementing Panel (PIP). The PIP Chair was briefed on the TJR aspect of the Normalization last 7 December 2022. Although there are TJRC recommendations that can already be implemented under Track II.
